Jerry L. Henderson, Olive Hill senior studying in Morehead State University's Department of Agricultural and Human Sciences, placed first in the Agricultural Sciences Poster Division at the 2005 Kentucky Academy of Sciences meeting, held recently at Eastern Kentucky University.

Henderson conducted research in the production of basil in float-bed systems utilizing the technology currently used to produce transplants for tobacco production. Drs. Debby Johnson and C. Brent Rogers, associate professors of agriculture, served as faculty mentors for Henderson during the course of this project. Dr. Rogers also is his academic adviser.

The poster presentation was titled "Effects of Media Composition and Spacing on Hydroponic Float-Bed Production of Basil, *Ocimum Basilicum* (Large Leaf Italian)."

In the months ahead, Henderson will continue his studies in the department and plans to continue researching herb production in float systems.

Gov. Fletcher visiting MSU Thursday

Gov. Ernie Fletcher will make his first visit to the Morehead State University campus this Thursday for a luncheon address to the Morehead-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to being a family physician, he also has served as a fighter pilot, lay minister, state legislator, and U. S. congressman.

The governor will be introduced by President Andrews.

Students offer free ultrasounds

Imaging sciences students at Morehead State University will offer a free fetal ultrasound program to expectant mothers beginning later this month.

The fetal scans will be conducted by appointment on selected days from Jan. 19 through March 7 at the University's sonography lab in Reed Hall. Performed by students, the scans will be supervised by faculty who are registered in obstetrics and gynecology through the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonographers (ARDMS).

Students performing the scans have already successfully completed MSU's radiologic technology initial program and are pursuing sonography as a fourth-year specialty.

The exams are non-diagnostic and are being conducted specifically as a learning experience for MSU students. Neither the University or its faculty and students are responsible for interpretation of the exams.

Women who would like to have a scan conducted may call for an appointment. All participant mothers must sign a consent form allowing students to perform the scan. On their exam day, volunteer mothers should bring a towel, as well as a VHS tape if they wish to record the ultrasound images.

Former VP Johnny Duncan dies

Dr. John R. "Johnny" Duncan, 67, former vice president, faculty regent and a retired professor at Morehead State University, died Jan. 2 in Seattle, Wash.

The funeral will be held Saturday, Jan. 7, at 1 p.m. at Northcutt and Son Home for Funerals in Morehead. Visitation will begin after 5 p.m. on Friday.

A Glasgow native, Dr. Duncan came to Morehead State University in 1964 as assistant professor of sociology. He served in various administrative posts, including dean of graduate programs and vice president for academic affairs, before retiring in 1991.

Dr. Duncan served from 1981 to 1987 as the faculty representative on MSU's Board of Regents.

He was director of admissions from 1967-68, dean of graduate programs, 1968-1975, and vice president and dean of the faculty from 1975 until he returned to full-time teaching in 1978.

A two-time MSU graduate, he earned a bachelor's degree in 1960 and the master's degree in 1961. He continued his education at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, where he was a part-time graduate student, and Purdue University in Lafayette, Ind., as a General Electric Fellow. He completed the Doctor of Education degree at Indiana University in Bloomington in 1967.

On campus, Dr. Duncan was chair of the Faculty Senate for two years; served a year as second vice president and a year as first vice president of the MSU Alumni Association; and a member of the steering committee of the NCATE Self-Study and co-chair of the Southern Association Self-Study.

He was director of Region 9 (Kentucky) White House Conference on Children and Youth, chapter delegate and Kentucky coordinator for Phi Delta Kappa, president of Southwestern Ohio Council for the Social Studies, speaker at various conferences across the United States and a semifinalist to the White House Fellows Program.

Dr. Duncan was a former president of the Rowan County Young Democrats, state chaplain for the Kentucky Jaycees, listed in "Who's Who in American Education" "Personalities of the South" and "Outstanding Community Leaders in America," and a Kentucky Colonel. He served two terms on Morehead City Council.

A former high school teacher, Dr. Duncan taught in Paducah and Jackson, Ohio, and MSU's University Breckinridge School.

He is survived by his wife, the former Gretta Ann Brown of Sandy Hook, a retired MSU faculty member; and a daughter and son-in-law, Laura Lee and Michael Duncan-O'Connell; and three grandchildren.

IET's Robotics Team takes third place

The Morehead State University Department of Industrial and Engineering Technology's Robotics Team captured third place in the nationwide Tele-Operated Robotic Manipulator Contest held in conjunction with the 2005 NAIT Convention in St. Louis, Mo.

MSU was well represented as 17 faculty and students attended the conference and President Wayne D. Andrews, was the keynote speaker.

Dr. Andrews spoke on "Journey to Higher Education Administration: the Important Skills of the Industrial Technologist." The audience was composed of approximately 500 industrial technologists and educators.

The IET Robotics Team was required to design and build a robotic manipulator without using any robotic kits or off-the-shelf robot manipulators and prepare a flat poster regarding the manipulator.

The robot had to run an obstacle course, pick up and carry an 8-inch long piece of 1.5 inch EMT conduit and place it through a 3-inch hole at the end of the course.

In the contest, MSU competed against teams from Central Connecticut State University, Eastern Kentucky University, Indiana State University, Iowa State University, Millersville University, Ohio Northern University, Purdue University, Spoon River Community Technical College, University of North Dakota, and the University of Wisconsin - Platteville.

Register now for healthcare certification programs

Registrations are now being accepted for the three new healthcare certification programs beginning in March by Morehead State University's Office of Continuing Education: Pharmacy Technician, Medical and Billing Coding, and Dental Assisting.

The Pharmacy Technician certification will prepare individuals to take the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board's (PTCB) exam. This 50-hour course will teach students medical terminology, how to read and interpret prescriptions, and how to define drugs by generic and brand names.

The class will be held every Monday and Wednesday from 6 - 9:30 p.m., March 13 - May 8. The fee for the program and textbooks is \$999.

Medical Billing and Coding certification will be offered March 14 - May 9. This 50-hour program provides the skills necessary to solve billing problems, file claims, complete insurance forms, trace delinquent claims, appeal claims, streamline billing procedures, and find service and codes using manuals.

After the individual completes this course and obtains the practical work experience, the student could be qualified to take several national certification exams, such as Certified Professional Coder Exam (CPC or CPC - H Apprentice).

The class will be held every Tuesday and Thursday from 6 - 9:30 p.m. The fee for the program and textbooks is \$1,299.

A 60-hour Dental Assisting Program will prepare the student for entry level positions in one of the fastest growing healthcare positions. The course will provide students with information in all areas of pre-clinical dental assistance, as well as training in the professional skills necessary to assist in a dental practice. Key areas covered in the program include administrative and clinical aspects.

This program also is ideal for students interested in becoming a dental hygienist.

The class will be held every Tuesday and Thursday from 6 - 9:30 p.m., March 14 -May 16. The fee for the program and textbooks is 1,199.

Honors Program has new emblem

A concrete emblem representing the ideals of its students has been installed at the headquarters of Morehead State University's George M. Luckey Jr. Academic Honors Program.

In 2003, the program's students were asked to create a symbol that would reflect the values and attitudes of the program. After considering many options, the students decided that the symbol should be a partially opened gate.

The layers of meaning behind the symbol of the gate are many, according to Dr. Marshall Chapman, associate professor of geology and program director.

"Morehead, Kentucky, has always seen itself as the gateway to the mountains, and MSU has seen itself as the gateway to higher education within its service region and beyond," he said. "The George M. Luckey Jr., Academic Honors Program has seen itself as a gateway to our highest potentialities."

The gate, now a sculpture on the front lawn of the Honors House, is fashioned after "Anne's Gate," an actual gate to a garden in Brook Green Botanical Gardens in coastal South Carolina.

"The gate is partially open, or partially closed, to represent our approach to critical thinking," Dr. Chapman said. "We in the honors program feel that our values and attitudes should be like this gate, and that a gate stuck open is just as useless as a gate stuck closed." He added that the gate in the partially open position encourages the viewer to consider the reasons why it is in such a position, and the gate opens towards the Honors House in a welcoming gesture.

The gate, designed by alumnus Lee Busick of **Wilmore**, a 2003 honors program graduate, was sculpted by senior Jason Barker of **Olive Hill**. Barker worked under the supervision of Stephen Tirone, MSU associate professor of art.

"They chose the location, color and the position of the sculpture with great care and thought to its meaning," Dr. Chapman said. "We are delighted with the crafting of the sculpture by Mr. Barker."

Appalachian Goldsmith Co. of Morehead is rendering the image of the gate in silver, according to Dr. Chapman. This rendition will be given to each graduating senior at the annual Awards Convocation, and worn on a ribbon during commencement ceremonies. The gate can then be used as a broach or lapel pin, signifying that alumni never leave the honors program.

Seed money from a trial program awarded

Morehead State University's Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy has announced the seed money awards from a trial program initiated last semester.

The program's objective was to facilitate and focus on the research and creative agendas of new and junior faculty and professional librarians who were hired between January 2003 and August 2005, according to Dr. David Rudy, dean of IRAPP.

The recipients and their project titles are:

M. Noelle N'Diaye, assistant professor of government, was awarded \$1,627 for her study "Identity or Issues? A study of the mobilization and engagement potency of ideology and issue salience among African American electoral advocacy organizations."

Dr. Stephanie Welter, assistant professor of biology, was awarded \$2,998 for "Pigment expression in wild populations of larval salamanders in eastern Kentucky."

Dr. Roger Cleveland, assistant professor of education, was awarded \$1,600 for "Black voices: African American students' educational experiences in Appalachian schools."

Dr. Myoungsu Sin, assistant professor of industrial technology, was awarded \$3,000 for "Evaluating shear strength of reinforced concrete beam-column joints by strut-and-tie model."

Contingent upon funding, IRAPP plans to make the awards available on an annual basis. Next year's competition would be open to faculty hired between January 2004 and August 2006 with an estimated proposal deadline of Sept. 22.

These awards further IRAPP's goal of increasing the research capacity of the university. Since 1999, IRAPP has allocated \$30,000 to \$40,000 annually to support faculty research and creative productions via the IRAPP-Funded Regional Research and Creative Production Grants Program.

Students present research paper in Washington, D.C.

Morehead State University students Shon Simpson, **Salt Lick** senior, and Stephanie Webb, **Prestonsburg** junior, presented a research paper, "Does Travel Time and Distance to Institutions of Higher Education Affect Participation?" to the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) in Washington, D.C.

The students are government majors in MSU's Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy (IRAPP).

In their research, Simpson and Webb used data obtained from the U.S. Census, Kentucky's school report cards and an Internet mapping program to examine the effects of travel time and distance to the nearest public university or community/technical college on post secondary participation after high school.

The two discovered that in the Appalachian portion of the Commonwealth, time and distance are significantly correlated with participation, but found that participation increased with increasing travel time and distance to the nearest public university but decreased with increased travel time and distance to the nearest community /technical college.

The project was mentored by Dr. Zack Bortolot, assistant professor of geography.

The presentation was part of the Appalachian Teaching Project, an annual event in which students from throughout Appalachia conduct research and present results to policy makers in Washington.

The Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy was designated as Morehead State's Program of Distinction by the Council on Postsecondary Education in 1999. Kentucky author Bobbie Ann Mason's "Clear Springs: A Family Story" has been selected as the initial book to be discussed by the newly established group to learn more about the Commonwealth's authors and their works.

Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library is inviting members of the Morehead community as well as University students, staff and faculty to join this voyage through the literary world.

President challenges faculty and staff to meet enrollment goal

Morehead State University President Wayne D. Andrews has challenged MSU's faculty and staff to meet the goal of a fall 2006 enrollment of 9,700 students as set by the Council on Postsecondary Education.

Addressing a convocation audience at the official opening of the spring semester, Dr. Andrews described the student recruitment marketplace as "fiercely competitive" and said enrollment growth could produce additional state support and tuition revenue to help MSU move "from good to better to great."

He identified development of additional online courses and degrees and the recruitment of more associate degree graduates from the Kentucky Community and Technical College System as priorities for MSU's enrollment plan for 2006-07. The new goal represents an increase of 638 students over last fall's enrollment of 9,062.

As a result of help from the legislature and MSU personnel, the University now has a funding formula in place to receive funding at the same rate as other state institutions.

"However, all new funding will be enrollment driven," Dr. Andrews explained. "The plain, unvarnished truth is that we cannot become a great institution by the sheer force of our collective will or by the sheer force of our combined intellect," he said. "We're going to have to have more money."

The president cited state funding gains as one of the key components behind MSU's successes. The cooperative efforts of Gov. Ernie Fletcher, the General Assembly - including several MSU alumni legislators - and others resulted in MSU not only receiving more state money in its current budget, but restorations of cuts made in the previous fiscal year.

"The good news didn't end with an increased operating budget," Dr. Andrews said. "The governor recommended and the legislature funded construction of the space science center at \$12.2 million in state bonds and authorized use of \$5 million in federal funds." Additional monies were secured to plan a new health education and research facility in partnership with St. Claire Regional Medical Center, and to expand the Mt. Sterling regional campus.

Dr. Andrews said the University must continue to recruit and retain academically strong students because they are more likely to complete degree programs and graduate. MSU's fall 2005 freshman class was the strongest ever, in regard to ACT scores.

He charged faculty and staff to assist all MSU students with their academic goals, whether it is through providing quality academic instruction, guiding them through financial aid processes, or mentoring them through difficult periods in their lives.

"KCTCS has thousands of students in online courses at the lower division level," he said, adding that many of those students will seek a baccalaureate or other "completer" degree. "We literally are in a race with other public institutions...to get into this market."

Access to education for all students is and must remain a priority for MSU, Dr. Andrews said. "I hope all of us have an appreciation for the five regional campuses and how important they are to our future. I'm proud that we have more regional campuses than any institution in the Commonwealth," he continued. "I feel strongly that our students are equally important - regardless of where they enroll or what mode of teaching they receive.

"The growth of our regional campuses and the online programs shows clearly that adult student participants expect the delivery system to come to them."

Dr. Andrews invited everyone to review and comment on the draft of the University's new plan, "Aspiring to Greatness," which focuses on six strategic goals: Academic Excellence, Student Success, Productive Partnerships, Improved Infrastructure, Resource Enhancement and Enrollment and Retention.

He asked faculty and staff to then determine "if this plan outlines the Morehead State University with which we want to be associated."

MSU students to offer free income tax assistance

The VITA site, in 311 Combs Building, will be open on Tuesdays, 3-5:30 p.m., from Feb. 7- April 11. The service will not be offered when the University is on spring break (March 20-24) or on March 8. No appointment is necessary.

Taxpayers should bring all tax documents for 2005 and a copy of their 2004 tax return. Students also should bring information regarding scholarships, tuition, fees and books for the 2005 calendar year, specifically the total amount of scholarships/grants awarded, total tuition and fees, and total cost of books.

In accordance with IRS rules, VITA will require that taxpayers provide photo identification and documentation of social security numbers for taxpayer/spouse and dependents.

Campus giving campaign reaches \$1.17 million

In a year when charitable causes and relief efforts strained the budgets of many donors, the Morehead State University family generously gave to the 2005 campus campaign, even surpassing the previous year's totals.

Barbara Ender, vice president for development, told MSU faculty and staff attending the spring convocation (Jan. 11) that 68 percent of employees made a contribution to the annual campaign, mostly through cash or payroll deductions.

The contributions, made by MSU faculty, staff, students and retirees, exceeded gifts made during the 2004 campaign. For that year, 446 employees elected to give through payroll deductions, and that number jumped to 488 this year, an increase of 9 percent.

Overall, hurricane and mudslide relief donations and other worthy causes were initially expected to adversely effect academic giving nationally, but Ender said she was pleasantly surprised by MSU's results.

"The effect of the natural disasters really seemed to sensitize folks, causing them to give more, and causing others to give," she said. "I am pleased to say that Morehead State University's campus campaign seems to mirror these projections."

The total for the 2005 campaign was just over \$170,491 - the third highest total in campaign history. It brought the eight-year total for the campaigns to \$1.17 million. Proceeds benefit various college and departmental funds, as well as scholarships and many other priorities of the University.

During convocation, campaign co-chairs Dr. Dayna Seelig, special assistant to the president, and Jeffrey Liles, assistant vice president for university relations, presented a symbolic check representing the campaign total to MSU President Wayne Andrews.

Police officers assist in theft ring investigation

Two Morehead State University police officers were among the law enforcement personnel whose combined efforts netted two arrests and the recovery of more than \$250,000 in stolen property.

Lt. James E. Frazier and Officer David C. Gavin contributed to the ongoing investigation of a theft ring that reached into at least seven Kentucky counties, Michigan and Indiana. As a result of the police work of nine enforcement agencies, including the MSU Police Department, two Magoffin County men have been charged with felony theft and receiving stolen property.

The MSU officers became involved when a trailer loaded with two motorcycles, with a total value of \$13,710, was stolen from a University parking lot in November. Part of that property was recovered when Michael Porter and Jerry Saylor were arrested last week by Magoffin County Sheriff Randall Bob Jordan.

Police recovered vehicles, trailers, a grill and many other items believed to have been stolen within the past several weeks.

"Our officers have the training and experience to perform all types of investigative work," said Joseph S. Cline, MSU police chief. "We have a first class police operation and seeing how their work has accomplished a mission, it is good for the officers and the University.

"Watching them work through the process, as they followed up on every lead--they are a credit to the department," he said.

Frazier, of Olive Hill, is a graduate of the basic police training program at the Kentucky Department of Criminal Justice Police Academy in Richmond. He has been an MSU police officer since 1999. Gavin, of Morehead, is a graduate of the Hampton Roads Regional Academy of Criminal Justice and the Department of Criminal Justice Police Academy in Richmond, Va. He came to the University in 2002, transferring from the Portsmouth (Va.) Police/Sheriff's Office.

Gunn named to Forward in the Fifth board

An educator with more than 35 years of experience, she served as director of the Illinois Virtual Campus at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and was a professor of educational technology at Northern Arizona University.

She earned her Ph.D. degree from the University of Oregon at Eugene, the M.A. degree from the University of Illinois at Springfield, and a B.S. of Education degree from Illinois State University at Normal.

CCL group to discuss Frank X. Walker's 'Affrilachia'

The Camden-Carroll Library at Morehead State University will hold its second book discussion group meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 22, to discuss "Affrilachia" by Frank X. Walker. The book is a compilation of poetry and speaks to the African-American experience in rural Appalachia. The discussion will begin at 7 p.m. on the fifth floor of the library. This book is powerful and beautiful. It is honest and true."

Funds allocated for MSU mapping initiative

U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers, R-KY, has included \$500,000 in the federal budget for Morehead State University to help improve the mapping of elevations in Kentucky.

The funds will support MSU's "height modernization" program, which seeks to develop accurate, reliable elevation information by using Global Positioning System (GPS) technology in conjunction with more traditional mapping methods. Height modernization is an important tool for community planning, flood plain mapping, mine remediation, and highway planning, design and construction.

"Although it is a complicated subject, height modernization plays an important role in all of our lives," said Congressman Rogers. "Accurate mapping information is critical to predicting, preparing, and even preventing flooding in our communities. Reliable mapping saves time and money when it comes to locating and constructing highways or public infrastructure sites such as industrial parks. This project also has a potentially big impact in Eastern Kentucky, where new technology could help map out the location of old, abandoned mines."

MSU will partner on the project with the Kentucky GIS Office, NOAA National Geodetic Survey Office, Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, Campbellsville University, Southeast Community College, and The Center for Rural Development.

Funding for the MSU initiative was included in the final version of the Fiscal Year 2006 Science, State, Commerce, Justice appropriations bill.

Rogers works to secure funding for projects throughout southern and eastern Kentucky in his role as a senior member of the House Appropriations Committee.

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Hudson achieves National Board Certification

Morehead State University alumnus Alicia R. Hudson earned the teaching profession's top certification by achieving National Board Certification in 2005. Hudson, formerly of Jackson, teaches music at Overdale Elementary in the Bullitt County School District.

She has been a teacher for seven years and earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from MSU. Hudson also has national certification in early and middle childhood music.

While in college, Hudson was a member of Sigma Alpha Iota music fraternity, Marching and Symphonic bands, and Horn Choir. She also was a member of Sigma Sigma Sigma social sorority.

The NBPTS announced that 166 Kentucky teachers earned the teaching profession's top recognition this year by achieving National Board Certification, an achievement that promises to improve student learning in classrooms statewide. The number of National Board Certified Teachers (NBCTs) in Kentucky now totals 899.

"Attracting and retaining competent and talented teachers is the most important ingredient in providing a sound education for all our children," said Gene Wilhoit, Kentucky commissioner of education. "National Board Certification is one of the most significant education reforms in recent years, and it has provided a way for Kentucky policy makers to recognize and provide additional compensation to those teachers who meet these rigorous standards. Those who attain National Board Certification are strengthening the teaching profession in the Commonwealth and across the country."

Nationwide, 7,289 teachers achieved National Board Certification this year, bringing the total number of teachers certified to 47,500.

National Board Certification is the highest credential in the teaching profession. A voluntary process established by NBPTS, certification is achieved through a rigorous, performance-based assessment that typically takes more than a year to complete and measures what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do. This process requires teachers to demonstrate how their activities, both inside and outside of the classroom, improve student achievement.

"Teachers who earn National Board Certification represent the gold standard in teaching and are among the most effective teachers in our nation's classrooms today," said former Georgia Gov. Roy E. Barnes, chair of the NBPTS Board of Directors. "While research has clearly demonstrated that National Board Certified Teachers (NBCTs) have a greater impact on their students' success, and quickly become instructional leaders in their schools and communities, it is also important to realize that NBCTs are helping their fellow teachers understand and promote high-quality teaching and learning. This 'multiplier effect' is making a positive difference nationwide in increasing student achievement and improving the performance of our nation's schools."

Barnes noted that 43 percent of schools with at least one NBCT are Title I schools. "The percentage of Title I schools now served by NBCTs represents the National Board's commitment to ensuring that all teachers have access to National Board Certification and that all students have access to National Board Certified Teachers."

National Board Certification not only identifies accomplished teachers, but it is also a profound professional development experience for all candidates who go through the process, whether or not they achieve certification. "National Board Certification continues to be reported by candidates to be the most important and valuable professional development of their careers," said Joseph A. Aguerrebere, NBPTS president and CEO.

The National Board for Professional Teaching Standards is an independent, nonprofit, nonpartisan and nongovernmental organization governed by a board of directors, the majority of whom are classroom teachers. Its mission is to establish high and rigorous standards for what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do.
