

## 'Excellence in Teaching' awarded

Terry G. Elliott, associate professor of accounting, has been awarded the "Dean's Citation for Excellence in Teaching Award" from Morehead State University's College of Business.

"I was surprised to receive the award," said Elliott. "I love working with students and would not trade my career with anyone."

Elliott joined the MSU family in 1989, and for all but one year has split time between the Ashland and Morehead campuses. Prior to working for Morehead State, he spent five years with Ashland Community College.

He was recommended for the award by Dr. Bruce Grace, chair of the Department of Accounting, Economics and Finance.

In his letter, Dr. Grace stated: "He (Elliott) requires students to complete assignments using everything from spreadsheets to e-mail. He has successfully delivered his classes via ITV, Blackboard, and face-to-face. His student evaluations are consistently high and testify to his effectiveness. His peer evaluations also are excellent and leave little room for suggestions for improvement."

Dr. Grace added:

"Terry has also taken his teaching beyond the doors of MSU. Because of his teaching skills, he was selected to be a member of a Cost Accounting Focus Group by one of the publishers to review textbooks. He has taught in the Professors in the Classroom Fellowship Program. He spent several weeks at Lawrence County High School observing and teaching several classes and several more weeks at Oakview Elementary School observing and teaching a fourth grade class. He took part in a conference devoted to ideas for the improvement of the educational process. While some of these activities might come under the heading of "service," the point is that Terry sincerely enjoys teaching. And, his students and peers agree that he is good at it."

Elliott earned a bachelor's degree in secondary education in 1978 from the University of Kentucky and a Master of Business Administration degree in 1983 from Morehead State. In 1987, he obtained a master's degree in accounting from Marshall University and the same year he received his Certified Public Accountant license.

In making the presentation, Dr. Robert Albert, dean of the College of Business, said:

"Terry has consistently received high accolades from his students and his peers. His students give him especially high marks for helping them find ways to answer their own questions and for displaying a personal interest in their learning. His peers note that he very effectively engages the students by creating an active learning environment.

"He is one of the most student-centered faculty members we have. I am 100 percent confident that Terry's students receive nothing short of an excellent learning opportunity."

Elliott has been married to his wife, Danita Ann, for 27 years and the couple has two children, Robert and Sam.

"To be recognized by one's peers for any achievement is an honor and this is a big honor for me," Elliott said.

## Middle school students prepare for college

While their classmates were enjoying summer vacation, 40 middle school students were preparing for the future by participating in the Governor's Minority Student College Preparation Program (GMSCPP) Summer Institute on the Morehead State University campus.

The young men and women came from Lexington, Louisville, Maysville, Owingsville and Winchester. They studied math, science, English, computer technology, black history and study skills during the second week in June. The students also attended a statewide conference at the University of Louisville and took a day-trip to the Newport Aquarium.

The one-week residential experience was designed for African American middle school students to prepare them for college.

According to Dr. Clarenda Phillips, assistant provost and the program director, every effort was made to get the youngsters interested in continuing their education.

"The goals of the program are to provide ethnic minority students with an opportunity to be exposed to the college environment; to nurture the students in the fundamental classes they will need to succeed; and to provide encouragement and information about how to get into college," she said.

The summer institute focused on enhancing the students' growth both academically and personally while increasing the number of African American students who ultimately go to college.

"By completing the program in this structured, controlled environment, students are more prepared, allowing for a smoother transition from middle to high school, with postsecondary education as the ultimate goal," Dr. Phillips said.

## Herrons dedicate anniversary to Habitat

For Morehead State University retiree Dr. Dudley Herron and his wife Joyce of Morehead, 50 years of marriage has inspired them to count their blessings and to help others live in a decent home through Habitat for Humanity.

The Herrons, who will mark their golden anniversary July 6, have dedicated their celebration to one of Habitat's new houses that will be built this summer. They have asked that in lieu of anniversary gifts, well-wishers make a contribution of cash, building materials or labor towards the house, which is being built in the Humanity Hills area off KY 32 in Rowan County.

"We always have been interested in Habitat," Dr. Herron said. A past president of the Morehead Area Habitat for Humanity, he was the organization's executive director

during the Jimmy Carter Work Project in 1996. Dr. Herron was chair of MSU's Department of Physical Sciences January 1994 until June 1996.

As his anniversary approached, he says he was wondering one morning what he and his wife would do to mark the occasion when the "anniversary house" notion came to him.

"I thought this would be a good way to celebrate the anniversary, and also a good way to get others involved in Habitat," he said. "I knew Habitat was planning to build three houses this summer, so I talked with Joe Rowe (executive director of MAHH) and ran the idea by him. I suggested to Joe that we call it an anniversary house and invited others in the community to do the same thing."

Mrs. Herron, a retired nurse, agreed with the idea.

"We got married in college, and our life has been very, very good," she said. "We have been very lucky in always being able to pursue things and do things and travel, partly because Dudley was at the University."

Mrs. Herron said that in their travels, they were able to meet many people, some of whom endured various hardships, including living in substandard homes. "But we really don't need anything as far as gifts, and we just wanted to give to other people, and help in any way we could to get people started."

So far, the anniversary house project has been successful, Dr. Herron said.

"I have been pleasantly surprised at the number of people who have come by to work on the house," he said. Monetary contributions also have been accepted.

Construction on the Herron anniversary house is underway, according to Rowe.

"The Herrons have always been great supporters of Habitat," Rowe said. "This is a way that Dudley thought of where an individual can contribute to a good cause and help out a family. It isn't that expensive either, because most likely, friends would have bought a gift for them anyway, and this way, it can go to Habitat."

Valerie Rice and her family are projected to move into the new house in September, Rowe said.

The Herrons themselves will join the work effort all day on Friday, July 7, and during the morning hours of July 8 at the house site. "We'd love to have anyone who'd like to come join us to work," Dr. Herron said.

If physically working on the house is not possible for someone who would still like to help, there is always the option of contributing cash or building materials. There also is a Habitat gift registry at Lowe's in Morehead, and interested donors may contact the MAHH for other ways to give.

Mrs. Herron said that while their sons Alan, of Colorado, and Keith, of New York City, are excited about the anniversary house project, they still wanted a traditional celebration of their parents' 50 years together.

"So we're having a reception on Saturday the 8<sup>th</sup> at the Morehead Conference Center," she said. Among the guests expected to attend the 2-5 p.m. event is Dr. Franklin Owen, who united the Herrons in marriage.

## Choirs experience Costa Rican culture

After 10 days of bridging cultural gaps with songs and smiles, Morehead State University's Concert Choir and Chamber Singers have returned from a tour of Costa Rica.

The choirs, led by Dr. Greg Detweiler, associate professor of music, sang at seven concerts and numerous other impromptu performances.

"The Costa Rica tour was absolutely amazing," said Dr. Detweiler. "We saw and did so many wonderful things and the people were so warm and friendly. Our first concert was in San Jose with the University of Costa Rica choir about three hours after we arrived."

Among the choirs' highlights of the tour was giving a concert at the Basilica Cartago, an important pilgrimage church. As the choirs sang, the faithful crawled down the aisle, completing their pilgrimages.

Other scheduled performances were held at the Cathedral San Carlos, Instituto Tecnologico, City of Aguas Zarcas, Liceo San Carlos and the City of La Trinidad de Moravia.

The choirs performed a variety of pieces, from traditional American spirituals to Costa Rican folk songs.

"We were treated like stars whenever we sang. The audience rushed the stage after each concert to get autographs.

"Our Sunday concert was broadcast on the main Costa Rican radio station," Dr. Detweiler said. "On Monday, people came to our concerts telling us how they were looking forward to it because they heard us on radio. The rest of the week, we enjoyed having the high schools perform for us after our performances."

The Morehead State students enjoyed many non-choral activities as well. They toured areas of Costa Rica, watched the active Arenal volcano, crossed the Arenal hanging bridges over the rainforest, went horseback riding in the forest, fed crocodiles, visited a butterfly sanctuary and played in the ocean's waves.

Dr. Victor Ballesterro, associate professor of educational administration, accompanied the group to his native country and told Dr. Detweiler that he had "never been so proud of MSU in my life. You all really represented the University well, very well," he said. "I am proud that I was part of the experience. I am also proud that our students saw a side of Costa Rica that normal tourists do not see."

He added that the MSU group obviously touched their audiences with their spiritual songs. "In spite of 80 percent of the audience not speaking a word of English, the beautiful melodies and (Dr. Detweiler's) skills as a director really brought them a moment that will last in their memories forever." Dr. Ballesterro said that he is still receiving e-mails about the "magnificence" of the choir's presentations.

Dr. Detweiler praised the students' dedication to their music.

"The choirs sang beautifully and passionately no matter if it was 8 in the morning or 8 in the evening. Our students shared from their hearts and in return the Costa Ricans shared from their hearts."

## Mattingly named to new post

Dr. Bruce A. Mattingly, a professor with an extensive research background, has been named associate provost for research and sponsored programs at Morehead State University.

Dr. Mattingly was selected through a national search for this new position, which is the chief research, grants and contracts officer of the University. In his new role, Dr. Mattingly will provide leadership in the development, maintenance, and growth of the University's research infrastructure and capacity.

"Bruce has a long and successful history with the University," said Dr. Michael Moore, provost, in announcing the appointment. "His research experience, success in grant writing and administration, and his strong commitment to the mission and growth of the University were seen as major strengths by the search committee."

During his 26-year tenure as a professor of psychology, Dr. Mattingly has established an internationally recognized program of research directed primarily at understanding the neurochemical mechanisms mediating the long-term behavioral effects of cocaine and other psychostimulant drugs. His research has been continuously funded through 34 internal and external grants, including four from the National Institutes of Health worth more than \$450,000.

He and his students have published 63 research articles in international refereed journals, and have presented more than 160 papers at regional, national, and international scientific conferences. In recognition of his research accomplishments, he received the University's Distinguished Researcher Award in 1987, and again in 1999.

A strong supporter of student involvement in University research, he initiated an endowment to fund student research, and co-organized a workshop for MSU faculty and administrators designed to enhance undergraduate research and scholarly activity across the entire campus. He also is a founding member of the statewide Posters-at-the Capitol organizing committee that arranges an annual showcase of undergraduate student research and scholarly activity for state legislators. Based partly upon his student research mentoring activities, he received the Outstanding University Science Teacher Award from the Kentucky Academy of Science in 1993. In 2005, he served as president of the Kentucky Academy of Science.

On the campus, Dr. Mattingly has been involved in numerous leadership roles. He served on the Faculty Senate for more than nine years, and completed two terms as the faculty representative on the Board of Regents. Since 1998, he has served as chair of the Department of Psychology. Earlier this year, he received the University's Distinguished Faculty Service Award.

"I am extremely honored to accept this new position at the University," said Dr. Mattingly. "Under the outstanding leadership of Carole Morella, the Office of Research, Grants and Contracts is one of the best in the country, with an exceptionally qualified staff. I look forward to working with them and the university community to further enhance our research, creative, and scholarly activities."

Dr. Mattingly earned his Bachelor of Science degree in psychology and mathematics from Morehead State, and both a Master of Science degree and the Ph.D. degree in physiological psychology from the University of Kentucky. Additionally, he was awarded a Post-Doctoral Fellowship in psychopharmacology at the UK Medical Center.

**James Still remembered on his 100th birthday**

MSU's Camden-Carroll Library will honor a former English teacher and Appalachian writer with "The River Eternal: James Still Centennial Celebration," July 17-21.

James Still, who would have turned 100 this year, died in 2001. The Knott County native taught at MSU from 1961-1970.

Recognized as the dean of Appalachian authors, Still is memorialized in the James Still Collection which includes photographs, literary manuscripts, correspondence, and other materials primarily dealing with the early years of his life and career, with the bulk of the material covering the 1930s and 1940s.

The collection is located in the library's fifth floor in the James Still Room which was dedicated Oct. 12, 1961, and again in 1978 at the completion of the library's tower addition. Tours of his works may be arranged from 9 a.m. - 4:15 p.m. when the University is open.

The opening ceremony for the centennial celebration will be held Monday, July 17, from 4-6 p.m. in the library's Special Collections Department. A performance of reading, music and art will be performed by professor emeritus Joyce LeMaster, artist Doug Adams and keyboardist Jay Flippin. Birthday cake also will be served.

A "Still Story Swap" is set for Tuesday, July 18, from 3:30-4:30 p.m. at the Kentucky Folk Art Center's auditorium. The event is open to artists, musicians, writers, poets, storytellers and acquaintances to speak about Still's work or share their favorite stories about the man.

From 3:30- 5 p.m. on Wednesday, July 19, at the library's Special Collections Department, Dr. Ted Olson, a Still scholar, will share his talents and perspectives on the late author.

Olsen is associate professor of Appalachian Studies and English at East Tennessee State University. He is the editor of an award-winning poetry collection by Still and recently completed the editing of a book-length collection of scholarly essays that will be published in 2007.

The Kentucky Folk Art Center will host a film and discussion from 3:30-4:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 20.

Culminating the week's event will be "Moments in a Still Life" on Friday, July 21, from 3:30-4:30 p.m. in the library's Special Collections Department. Dr. Carol Boggess, professor and chair of the division of humanities at Mars Hill College, will impart her perspective on Still as biographer, scholar and colleague.

The week-long celebration is sponsored by the Camden-Carroll Library, Kentucky Folk Arts Center, Caudill College of Humanities, MSU's Arts and Humanities Council and Morehead State University. All events are free and open to the public.

## MSU to share stewardship funds

Morehead State University has been approved by the General Assembly and the Council on Postsecondary Education to share funding in the first state-financed Regional Stewardship Trust Fund in the country.

The CPE approved guidelines for administering the program on Monday.

Morehead State joins Eastern Kentucky University, Kentucky State University, Murray State University, Northern Kentucky University and Western Kentucky University in sharing \$4.8 million for stewardship activities over the next two years. Each institution is eligible for \$200,000 in infrastructure support in the first half of 2006-07.

"We are very pleased to be a part of this endeavor," said MSU President Wayne D. Andrews. "This new funding will allow the University to better serve the region by making sure our outreach efforts are sufficiently supported and effectively managed.

Dr. Andrews said MSU would concentrate its regional stewardship efforts on supporting K-12 schools, promoting economic development, helping community organizations and assisting local governments.

"We are very appreciative to the Governor and the Kentucky General Assembly for adopting our recommendation to establish this program on a statewide basis," stated Tom Layzell, president of the Council. "It will allow our universities to be even more instrumental in stimulating Kentucky's economic competitiveness in a global world and meeting educational, workforce, and community needs in their service regions," he added.

## Pharmacy technician program offered in Maysville

Morehead State University has formed a partnership with the Housing Authority of Maysville and the Big Sandy Kentucky Works Program to provide educational opportunities for residents of Maysville and Mason County.

As a result of efforts by of Kentucky Works' Joseph Stockham, coordinator, and Retha Mullins, regional director, a pharmacy technician certification course is being offered at the Amo Peters Community Center in Maysville.

Bruce Hanna, housing authority director, stated: "This course is helping to educate people who are place-bound and who also want to further their education. With the graying of the population, this class and other medically orientated training programs will help meet the need for key staff within the Buffalo Trace region.

"The efforts of Morehead State University in reaching out to the surrounding communities is an outstanding endeavor and shows their true commitment to increasing the educational attainment skills of citizens at all levels," Hanna added.

Peggy Gilligan, a registered pharmacist at the Kroger Pharmacy in Maysville, is lending more to the class than just pharmacy education. "Peggy has wonderful people skills and should be commended for her leadership and inspirational skills," Mullins said.

The pharmacy technician program will prepare individuals to take the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board's (PTCB) exam. During the 50-hour course, students will learn medical terminology and how to read and interpret prescriptions, as well as how to define drugs by generic and brand names. Using highly-qualified local citizens as the program's teachers helps to create enthusiasm for students because the instructor is someone they know, trust and have worked previously.

"This course will teach students core concepts needed to test for the Pharmacy Technician Certification Exam," Gilligan added, noting "that in today's society this and other medial certification programs are needed locally and nationally."

The pharmacy technician course is one of many courses the Housing Authority has offered as part of its educational mission.

The housing authority supports three computer learning laboratories including the Education Pays Distance Learning Center incorporating on-site instruction in the Masters of Computer Basics courses, the Kentucky Virtual University, the Kentucky Virtual Library, and the PLATO programmed learning system. A second computer center is used by Spectrum Learning Centers of Cincinnati for training and a third lab will be dedicated to those students wanting to prepare homework during the school year.

"We hope this course will begin a continuing partnership with Morehead State University, Big Sandy Regional Kentucky Works and the Housing Authority of Maysville," Retha Mullins said. "Everyone benefits when individuals receive quality marketable skills training," she added.

## Imaging sciences students have 100 percent pass rate

Imaging sciences graduates continue to demonstrate that Morehead State University offers a quality education to its students.

All 32 May graduates of the University's radiologic science program have passed their national licensure examinations administered by the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT), the certification agency for that program.

"One hundred percent of our students passed their boards on their first attempt," said Barbara Dehner, chair of the Department of Imaging Sciences. "What makes this even more remarkable is that this is the third consecutive year that the graduates have accomplished this."

The students completed the initial two-year, associate's degree component within the program, and were then eligible to sit for board exams. Once they passed their exams, they were eligible to work as a technologist.

Many of the students have or will return to MSU to pursue a Bachelor of Science in Imaging Sciences (BSIS) degree, with a specialty in computed tomography/magnetic resonance or diagnostic medical sonography.

"These excellent student outcomes reaffirms the quality of our educational programs and assures that our teaching methods in the Department of Imaging Sciences are effective, and are providing our students with the needed education to pass these national certifications," Dehner said.

Students in other MSU imaging sciences programs also are excelling, she continued.

"In our CT (computed tomography) program, we have had a 100 percent pass rate on boards for the fourth year in a row." The most recent exams for that program were in December 2005 for the 14 students then enrolled. In addition, Dehner said, students in the sonography and magnetic resonance imaging components have met and exceeded the national average passage score.

MSU's partnership with the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS) has brought good students to the BSIS program, according to Dehner.

"Some of our baccalaureate students completed their initial radiologic technologist program at a KCTCS school, and are finishing their studies here," she said. "We currently are working on making a baccalaureate degree even more accessible to students by implementing an online degree program, possibly by fall 2007."

These successes have not come about by accident, Dehner said.

"This is due to the hard work of not only our students, but also of our dedicated faculty members and clinical education centers."

Dehner said the job market outlook for imaging sciences professionals remains strong.

Nearly 400 of Kentucky's high achieving students spent June 24-July 28 on MSU's campus, participating in various academic, arts and enrichment activities. They each had a major and secondary area of study with day and evening classes and seminars, all while living in campus housing.

The Governor's Scholars Program, established in 1983, was designed for outstanding Kentucky students who have completed their junior year. The residential summer program provides academic and personal growth in a challenging, non-traditional environment that balances a strong liberal arts program with a full co-curricular and

residential life experience.

The program is offered on three campuses each summer. For MSU, this is the first time to host the program and the only public campus among the group, which included Centre College in Danville and Bellarmine University in Louisville. The 2006 program ended with a graduation ceremony on July 28.
