Biographical / Historical Information: The Moonlight Schools of eastern Kentucky were established in 1911 by Cora Wilson Stewart to promote literacy among adults in the Appalachian region. A Rowan County native, Stewart's efforts in adult education received national attention. Moonlight Schools also served African American and Native American students.

Scope and Content: Collection consists of articles and research concerning the Moonlight Schools and the life of Cora Wilson Stewart, correspondence regarding the opening of the Cora Wilson Stewart Moonlight School at Morehead State University, teacher's certificate and school examination report issued by Cora Wilson Stewart, examples of student work at Little Brushy School, materials concerning Laura Lee Duncan's performance as Cora Wilson Stewart, and photographs of the Cora Wilson Stewart Moonlight School. Collection also includes twenty oral history audio cassette recordings and artifacts from the Moonlight School.
