

10 alumni to serve in 2009 legislative session

Ten Morehead State University alumni again will be among the 138 lawmakers serving in the 2009 session of the Kentucky General Assembly which opens Jan. 6.

Three MSU alumni serve in the Kentucky Senate. Sen. Johnny Ray Turner, D-Drift, is the minority caucus chair. He is starting his third four-year term. Sen. Charlie Borders, R-Grayson, chairs the Appropriations and Revenue Committee. He is serving his fourth term. The other MSU grad in the upper chamber is Sen. Walter Blevins, D-Sandy Hook, beginning his fifth term.

Seven MSU alumni serve in the Kentucky House. Rep. Rocky Adkins, D-Sandy Hook, is the majority floor leader, the second highest position in that chamber. He is starting his 11th two-year term. Rep. Hubert Collins, D-Wittensville, chairs the Transportation Committee. He is beginning his ninth term.

Rep. John Will Stacy, D-West Liberty, chairs the Education Budget Review Subcommittee of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee. He is starting his eighth term. Rep. Robin Webb, D-Grayson, is first vice chair of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee. She is beginning her fifth term.

Rep. Mike Denham, D-Maysville, is vice chair of three committees - Agriculture and Small Business, Banking and Insurance, and Local Government. He is starting his fourth term. The other MSU alumni in the House are Rep. Jimmy Higdon, R-Lebanon, beginning his third term, and Rep. Carl Rollins, D-Midway, starting his second term.

The organizational phase of the 30-day session opens Jan. 6 and runs four days. The legislators return to the Capitol on Feb. 3 for the final 26 days. The session must end March 24.

MSU police offers campus safety tips

As the fall semester begins to wind down, Morehead State University's Police Department offers this advice to the campus community: Be aware of your surroundings and take the necessary precautions to avoid loss of your belongings.

"It is not uncommon to see an increase in crime at this time of year," said MSU Police Chief Matt Sparks. "On the campus, everyone is busy with the end of the year activities and fail to adhere to the safety rules that they usually follow."

Purses, wallets, cell phones, I-pods and textbooks are among the list of items that are reported missing most often.

Always on the lookout for suspicious activity, an increase in the number of reports of theft has police officers being ever more vigilant. Students, as well as faculty and staff, are urged to take all necessary measures to secure and protect personal belongings in residence halls, offices and vehicles, in addition to office equipment and other vulnerable items.

"We want to remind you to take the extra time to secure items in the trunk or under the seat before leaving your automobile," Chief Sparks said. "The threat of a break-in is reduced if your belongings are not visible. Remember to lock your vehicle before leaving it in the parking area."

University police remind students to also practice safety in the residence halls:

- Make sure your door is locked when leaving your room, even if you are only going next door. It takes less than 10 seconds for a thief to enter an open room and steal property.
- Do not leave messages on phones, My Space or other computer accounts, indicating how long you will be away or when you expect to return.
- Follow the safety in numbers rule when going out at night and arrange to go with friends/roommates. It is a good practice to scan your surroundings whether walking on campus, traveling by automobile or enjoying a shopping excursion.
- Do not leave valuables or property (purses, backpacks, books, personal identification, etc.) visible in or around the office or living area.
- Keep emergency numbers by the phone. Call 911 to report any suspicious person or activity.
- Everyone should take the time to be aware of their surroundings and any unusual activity.

Regents hear outline of impact of potential budget cuts

President Wayne D. Andrews outlined to Morehead State University's Board of Regents on Thursday (Dec. 4) the impact statement submitted to Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education concerning a potential four percent state budget cut.

Gov. Steve Beshear late last month requested such plans from each state agency and public university. A four percent budget cut would mean \$1.8 million for MSU. That would follow a six percent reduction last fiscal year (2007-08).

Dr. Andrews' possible strategies include:

- Implement a hiring freeze on all current vacant positions;
- Conduct a comprehensive analysis on the viability of maintaining each of the five regional campuses;
- Considering the possibility of capping enrollment;
- Reassess institutional investments in merit-based student aid;
- Revise timelines and cost projections due to inflation on capital projects scheduled in the Campus Master Plan;
- Delay scheduled capital renewal and maintenance projects; and
- Adjust the timeline for remaining components of the institution's main computing system.

"After taking the cut last year, we just don't have the same flexibility that we did," said Dr. Andrews. "We want to make adjustments that will have the least impact on the education of our students."

During its regular schedule quarterly meeting, the Regents approved the 2008 winter graduates along with the granting of honorary doctoral degrees to Dr. Sue Y. Luckey and Dr. George M. Luckey, retired faculty members. The ceremony will be held Saturday, Dec. 13, at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center.

The Board also accepted the 2007-2008 financial audit conducted by the Lexington CPA firm of Dean, Dorton and Ford and approved the demolition of Wilson and Regents halls.

The next regular scheduled quarterly meeting will be held Thursday, March 12.

Former SUNY chief named CPE president

The Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education today (Dec. 9) unanimously named Robert L. King as its third president. King will officially begin his term no later than April 1. He replaces Thomas Layzell who retired in September 2007.

King, 61, is the former chancellor of the State University of New York (SUNY), the largest higher education system in the country with 64 campuses and an annual operating budget of \$8.5 billion. He

presently serves as president and CEO of the Arizona Community Foundation, a statewide charitable foundation with a strong focus on education, economic development and scientific research.

Since June, the Council has been operating under the oversight of Interim Council President Richard Crofts. Crofts will assist with an orderly transition. The current plan is for Crofts to remain in his position through the end of January.

King's appointment concludes a nationwide search that identified a pool of 40 highly qualified candidates.

King's three-year contract includes a \$360,000 salary, \$40,000 for housing or deferred compensation and a state vehicle. By statute, the president of the Council must make more than the base salary of the highest paid public university president which is \$352,000.

Beshear calls for smaller budget cut than expected

Morehead State University President Wayne D. Andrews Thursday reacted positively to Gov. Steve Beshear's budget reduction plan because it only requires a giveback of two percent of MSU's state general fund appropriation.

State universities, state agencies and school districts were asked late last month to plan for a four percent reduction in state funding. For MSU, the higher figure represents about \$1.8 million. Tuesday's announcement lowers that to just over \$900,000.

"It is clear that the governor recognizes the importance of education in his budget reduction plan and that higher education is a solution to the state's long term economic challenges, rather than a problem," Dr. Andrews stated. "I believe this is good news and I am optimistic that the General Assembly will help him find solutions to the state's revenue shortfall."

The core of the MWP is an invitational four-week Summer Institute, open to 15 of East Kentucky's best public school teachers. All teaching methods are interactive and interdisciplinary. The project also provides year-round contracted and grant-funded outreach programs and teacher training to schools in MSU's 22-county service region.

All MWP programs align with Kentucky Core Content and Program of Studies curricula and the Kentucky Professional Development Standards. As a National Writing Project affiliate, MWP qualifies as an exemplary professional development provider by No Child Left Behind regulations.

The National Writing Project (NWP) is a professional development network that serves teachers of writing at all grade levels, primary through university, and in all subjects. The mission of the NWP is to improve student achievement by improving the teaching of writing and improving learning in the nation's schools. National research studies have confirmed significant gains in writing performance among students of teachers who have participated in NWP programs.

The nearly 200 local sites that make up the NWP network are hosted by universities and colleges serving all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands as well as two associated international sites. Sites work in partnership with area school districts to offer high-quality professional development programs for educators.

Richardson KAS winner

Channing Richardson, an environmental science major in the Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy (IRAPP), was the 2008 winner of the Botany undergraduate research competition at the Kentucky Academy of Science held at the University of Kentucky.

Richardson's undergraduate research project, "Floristic inventory of the ferns and fern allies, mosses, hornworts, and liverworts," took place at Carter Caves State Resort Park under the mentorship of Dr. Allen Risk, professor of biological sciences.

Richardson, the son of Kit Richardson and Lynn Felty, is a 2004 graduate of East Carter High School.

"Channing and I conducted research at Carter Caves and four other herbaria and examined their fern collections. He conducted most of the field work in the park himself, however, I went with him to the park a lot.

We also traveled together to four other herbaria and examined their fern collections for specimens other workers had previously collected from Carter Caves. These trips gave him a lot of hands-on fern identification experience," said Dr. Risk.

The pair worked together to generate the species area curve with SPSS (statistical software) which allowed them to show that Carter Caves State Resort Park has more ferns relative to its size than does any other area studied in the region.

"My research has been accepted to the Kentucky Academy of Science journal and I am finishing revisions this week and will be submitting it to the editors of Kentucky Academy of Science," said Richardson.

Undergraduate biology and botany students were judged at the Kentucky Academy of Science's annual competition on scientific merit, knowledge, and understanding of environmental science concepts and Channing's research project has all of these components.

"I applied for a competitive grant through the Kentucky Academy of Science and was awarded \$883 to conduct my research at Carter Caves. The research project involved conducting a literature review, field work and creating tables and graphs.

"I enjoy being outdoors and conducting research allows me to synthesize all of the concepts and theories that I have learned in classes in a very hands-on manner. I am applying to graduate programs in botany and I plan on obtaining a Ph.D in plant ecology.

The mission of The Kentucky Academy of Science is to encourage scientific research, to promote the diffusion of scientific knowledge, and to promote the interaction of science with other sectors in seeking solutions to major social and environmental problems. Most importantly, it seeks to interest the youth of the Commonwealth in science and to encourage them to consider science as a profession.

"Dr. Risk was immensely helpful and has mentored me beyond what would be expected of a normal teacher, his insights and guidance have helped prepare me for graduate school," said Richardson.

KVMA honors MSU project

Morehead State University's Dr. Kimberly Peterson, assistant professor of veterinary technology, and Dr. Mattie Decker, associate professor of education, have been recognized for their work with a special project.

Their project, "Another Chance at Life and Learning: Department of Juvenile Justice Greyhound Program," won the prestigious Kentucky Animal Hall of Fame award. This award is a yearly recognition presented at the annual Kentucky Veterinary Medical Association business luncheon during the Mid-America Conference.

One of the primary goals of Dr. Peterson and Dr. Decker's project is to introduce youth in the juvenile justice system to occupational training through observation and participation in various animal careers. The project creates a unique partnership between at-risk youth and newly retired racing greyhounds.

"The changes that occur within each child working with the greyhounds are profound and lasting," said Dr. Peterson. "The positive environment the greyhounds create extends beyond the immediate handlers into the other youth and the staff."

The dogs live at the Morehead Youth Development Center (MYDC) for a 12-week retraining and obedience course. When they arrive at the center, the greyhounds are conditioned to kennel living and life on the racetrack.

After 12 weeks at the center, the dogs have mastered stairs, learned home life skills and have been taught basic obedience. Their new skills are celebrated at Greyhound Graduation when they move on to their "forever homes."

Many of the new owners attend the graduation ceremony to see the skills the youth have taught the greyhounds. "The ceremony is bittersweet as the youth read examples from their daily journals describing what the greyhound charge has meant to them, in life and learning," said Dr. Peterson.

The journal writing activities are supported by Dr. Decker, who works with the English teacher at MYDC to emphasize discovery and exploration of the human-animal bond.

Both the primary and secondary handlers of the greyhounds keep a journal and attend weekly writing workshops with Dr. Decker. These writings have become an important component documenting their exploration of the effects the presence of the dogs have in the lives of the youth.

The program also focuses on career development through vocational coursework at the center. The youth study basic husbandry skills, animal behavior and care techniques. They learn their obedience training skills through professionally-guided instruction.

MSU's Veterinary Technology Program provides for the medical needs of the greyhounds during their 12-week stay. MSU students work with MYDC students for procedures such as teeth cleaning, immunizations, inserting microchips, running diagnostic specimens and routine examinations.

The introduction of the greyhounds into the lives of at-risk youth, educators, and MSU students and administrators has created an environment where many people have come together to make the project work. "One great thing we've discovered is that the facility-wide incidence rate at MYDC has dropped to 25 percent of what it was before the greyhounds arrived," said Dr. Peterson. "Not only do the dogs have a positive effect on the handlers, but also on the entire population."

As part of the Kentucky Animal Hall of Fame award, the two were presented with a plaque and a monetary award. The monetary award was then presented on behalf of the project to Greyhound Pets of America-Louisville Chapter, the sponsoring adoption organization.

MSU in third place in OVC Commissioner's Cup race

Morehead State University's Department of Athletics is in third place in the 2008-09 Ohio Valley Conference Commissioner's Cup all-sport trophy standings, after the completion of the fall sport championships.

The Cup is a symbol of overall athletic excellence in conference-sponsored championships.

"We work very hard to facilitate a well-rounded, comprehensive athletics program," said Brian Hutchinson, director of intercollegiate athletics. "After winning our fourth straight OVC academic achievement award and to be in third place for the commissioner's cup competition after the fall sports despite not being able to count our football team's success, I think there is clear evidence that we are effectively working toward our goals. My hat goes off to all our coaches, administrative staff, and most importantly, our student-athletes for focusing on excellence in all facets of our program."

MSU had a first place (tie) finish in volleyball, a third place finish in men's cross country, a third place (tie) finish in soccer and a sixth place finish in women's cross country. Eastern Kentucky is in first place after claiming first-place finishes for men's and women's cross country and football; they also earned a second-place finish in soccer to account for their 41 total points. Murray State, who had a first-place finish in soccer, is second (35.5), followed by Morehead State (30), Tennessee Tech (29), Southeast Missouri (28.5), UT Martin (26), Eastern Illinois (24.5), Jacksonville State (24), Austin Peay (22) and Tennessee State (12.5).

The 2008-09 season marks the first for the re-formatted Commissioner's Cup, which was previously known as the All-Sports Trophy. The award (which started in 1962-63 for men's sports and 1980-81 for women's sports) was previously divided into a Men's All-Sport Champion and a Women's All-Sport Champion. Points were awarded for each of the 18 sponsored sports and each school was required to count its totals from each sport in its grand total.

Beginning this year, only one trophy will be awarded. Schools are required to count point totals for four main sports (football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball) along with their next eight highest point totals from the remaining sports, regardless of gender. Because MSU competes in the Pioneer Football League, it is required by the conference to count baseball as one of its four required sports.

The point system for scoring is as follows: For all sports (except rifle, men's indoor and men's outdoor track - which do not have six participating teams), the first place team earns 10 points, the second place team earns 9 points, etc. For rifle, men's indoor and men's outdoor track and field, the first place team earns 10 points and each subsequent place earns points equal to 1 less than the team that placed one position higher.

This also applies to any student who receives financial aid or scholarships, or whose college expenses are being paid by an outside agency.

MSU offers online bachelor's degree "completer" programs designed primarily for graduates of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS). These programs allow KCTCS graduates to earn bachelor's degrees while continuing to meet work and family obligations and without traveling long distances.

Courses are offered via the Internet, providing busy adults the opportunity to complete class work at a time and place convenient to them.

Statement of Intent deadline Jan. 5

A vital step in providing more privacy and convenience to students when accessing their financial accounts at Morehead State University is available online.

The deadline for payment in full or submitting a completed Statement of Intent is Monday, Jan. 5, for the spring semester and is accessible for students through MSU's Web site.

The completed statement confirms a student's intention to return for the spring semester. It also offers them the option to defer paying their account balance in full. MSU's Office of Accounting and Budgetary Control lists full instructions in its "How to Pay Tuition and Fees" on the University's Web site (www.moreheadstate.edu/abc).

The Statement of Intent must be filed electronically by each student after they register for classes each semester, according to Carol Ford, assistant director of accounting and budgetary control.

"All students must complete the Statement of Intent, and either 'accept' or 'opt out' of the terms of the agreement," she said. "By agreeing to the conditions of the statement, students confirm they will attend classes at MSU and acknowledge their bill. It also will give them the choice of extending the period of time they have to pay their account in full."

This requirement also applies to any student who receives financial aid or scholarships, or whose college expenses are being paid by an outside agency, Ford said.

If a student's account is not paid in full or a completed online statement is not on file by Jan. 5, the student's classes will be cancelled. Ford said students are encouraged to read the Statement of Intent carefully and make sure they understand the requirements and deadline dates before agreeing to abide by the terms of this document.
