Dr. Robert R. Martin, Chairman of the Board, pointed out that the Statutes of Kentucky require a reorganization of the Board when new members are appointed to the Board, whereupon Dr. Elwood Esham was unanimously reelected as Vice Chairman, and Dr. Gearhart was unanimously reelected as Secretary of the Board.

The matter of a treasurer of the College was discussed, and on motion of Dr. Cartmell, seconded by Dr. Gearhart, Mr. Herbert Hogan, Business Manager of the College, was unanimously chosen as treasurer.

On motion of Dr. Esham, seconded by Dr. Cartmell, the minutes of the meeting held January 29, 1957, were ordered approved as read.

President Doran extended words of welcome and greetings to the new Board members, after which the president presented his report to the Board for the period, January 29, 1957, to May 14, 1957. The report is as follows, and is hereby made a part of these minutes:

Gentlemen:

I am submitting herewith a report on the operation of the College for the period January 29, 1957 to May 14, 1957, and certain recommendations for Board Action:

1. Staff Changes:

Resignations.

Mr. Silas Prewitt has tendered his resignation, effective May 30, 1957, as assistant football coach, to accept a position as head football coach at Alcoa High School, Alcoa, Tennessee, at a salary of \$6200.

2. Retirement:

- 6. Nursing Program.

Nursing Program continued -

At the direction of the Board of Regents, the president has investigated the possibilities of affiliation with some hospital for the continuation of our nursing program. We have discussed this matter in great detail with the Executive Director of the Kentucky Board of Nursing Education and Nurse Registration, and received no encouragement that an affiliation is possible, or would be approved.

We are now negotiating with the Miners Memorial Hospital Association, whose general hospital is located at Harlan, Kentucky. Miss Irene Healy has visited our campus and conferred with a committee of our staff on the possibilities of their nursing students completing their first year at Morehead State College. We are to receive notice within a short time on whether or not this program will materialize.

7. Allocation of Capital Construction Funds.

The Department of Finance has approved an allocation of \$250,000 from the Capital Construction Fund for Morehead State College. We have reached an agreement with the Division of Engineering and the Division of the Budget that these funds will be used to (1) renovate and enlarge the facilities of the four dormitories; (2) rewire and relight the library building; (3) repair and redecorate the auditorium, and (4) repair and redecorate the science building, and add and equip one science laboratory.

We believe that these funds will bring our plant up to an acceptable level. Mr. George Lusk, Ashland, has been employed by the Division of Engineering to serve as architect and consultant on these projects. We believe that we will be able to add 34 to 36 additional rooms to the four dormitories. We think this will accommodate our anticipated increased enrollment at the beginning of the fall term.

8. Gymnasium and Doran Student House.

An inspection has been made on the construction of the new gymasium, and adjustments are now being made by the contractors. A final inspection will be made soon, and the building will be accepted by the state.

The construction of the Student House is moving according to schedule, and we have all reason to believe that we will be ready to occupy it on September 1. We have already purchased the furniture and some of the facilities for the recreation room. We have laid plans for the dedicatory services for both buildings sometime during the first semester of next year.

9. Audit.

We have a communication from Mr. Harold E. Kelley, of Kelley & Galloway, Certified Public Accountants as follows:

Dr. Adron Doran, President Morehead State College Morehead, Kentucky

Dear Dr. Doran:

I talked to Miss Foust today relative to the audit of Morehead State College for the year ending June 30, 1957. She advised me that she would prefer our firm doing the audit with the assistance of one man from her office. She promised she would write you a letter explaining her position. She stated that this was the way the audit of Eastern and Western was conducted last year by another firm and that she planned to work the same arrangement again this year and with the same firm.

Our fee for the audit would be approximately \$1,000.00, not including travel, meals, and lodging expense. We would be happy if the college would furnish room and meals on the same basis as when we did the work last year.

If the above arrangement meets with your approval and the approval of the Board, we would appreciate hearing from you in order that we may plan to be at the college on June 30, for the purpose of counting cash on hand, verifying physical count of inventories and other year-end work that should be done on the last day of the year.

We shall be looking forward to hearing from you, and hope that we may have the opportunity of again serving you.

6. Nursing Program.

At the meeting of the Board of Regents on January 29, 1957, President Doran was instructed to investigate the possibilities of an affiliation with some hospital in an effort to continue our nursing program. Dr. Doran reported that he had been negotiating with the Miner's Memorial Hospital Association of Harlan, Kentucky, and that an arrangement had been reached between the college and the Miners Hospital, whereby the nursing program could be continued at Morehead State College, provided the Board of Regents concurred in this arrangement.

Dr. Day moved that the arrangement with the Miners Memorial Hospital Association as outlined by the president, be approved. Dr. Gearhart seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

7. New Construction:

President Doran reported to the Board that the Department of Finance had approved an allocation of \$250,000 from the Capital Construction Funds for Morehead State College, and that the college had reached an agreement with the Division of Engineering and the Division of the Budget that these funds be used to (1) renovate and enlarge the facilities of our four dormitories: (2) rewire and relight the library building; (3) repair and redecorate the auditorium, and (4) repair and redecorate the science building, and add and equip one science laboratory. Dr. Doran expressed the belief that when these projects will have been completed, we will be able to accommodate our anticipated increased enrollment at the beginning of the fall term.

Motion by Dr. Cartmell that the Board approve the recommendation of President Doran on the use of the \$250,000 allocated to the College for new construction. The motion was seconded by Dr. Esham and carried. The vote on this motion was as follows:
