

I recommend that the personnel changes suggested be approved by the Board.

## IV. PURCHASE OF TRAILERS:

We have completed final plans to construct 50 additional apartments for married students. The architect estimates the cost at \$926,277. We had hoped to contract for construction this spring and have the apartments ready for occupancy by the fall of 1971. However, the Commissioner of Finance refuses to authorize bidding on the apartments at the present time. Indications are that we will not have these apartments ready before 1972, if at all, under the Commissioner's present policy and procedure.

We found ourselves with 147 more applications for apartments than we could accommodate for the 1970 fall semester. Some of these were critical cases including married athletes. Our only alternative was to turn to securing trailers on a temporary basis.

We originally advertised for bids on 12 trailers to occupy space in the University Trailer Park on U.S. 60 East. Ed's Trailer Sales was the lowest bidder at \$3,629 each for one-bedroom mobile homes. We found later that we should and could increase the number to 37 units with the other 25 trailers costing \$3,561 each. The other bids which we received were as follows:

Thompson Hall Sales \$4,280.00 Charlie's Mobile Living \$4,387.00 Armor House of Kentucky \$4,945.00

The contract was awarded to Ed's Trailer Sales for 37 mobile homes in the amount of \$132,588.50. These units have been installed and occupied at a monthly rental rate of \$70 including utilities. The purchase cost will be liquidated in five (5) years.

We are now convinced that we will be required to find space and obtain additional units of mobile homes for married students by the beginning of the 1971 academic year. A recent survey shows that 30% of our enrollment is composed of married couples with one or both being enrolled in the University.

I recommend that the Board of Regents approve the purchase of and payment for 37 mobile homes in the amount of \$132,588.50 from the Capital Construction Funds Account.

#### V. UNIVERSITY FARM DEVELOPMENT

- The Commissioner of Highways, Mr. Eugene Goss, has approved our request and authorized the construction of a road leading from Highway 377 to the back side of the farm for a distance of .4 miles. This is an extension to the road which was built by former Commissioner Hazelrigg leading from the Highway to the residence.
- II. The farm manager and his family (wife and babies) have been living in a trailer for two (2) years. We have used our Maintenance forces to renovate and remodel the farm house for the manager to occupy this This project has been completed at a cost of \$17,450.

On January 27, 1969, the State Property and Buildings Commission authorized the Commissioner of Finance to provide interim financing for Projects 1 and 2 and 3.

The Board of Regents has acted under this authority to provide interim financing for Projects 1 and 2 in the amount of \$2,100,000.

The final plans for the Appalachian Technical Institute have been completed and the project is ready to be advertised for bids. The interim financing arrangements authorized by the State Property and Buildings Commission will now have to be revised to provide for Project 3.

F. L. Dupree and Company, which submitted a guarantee to bid on the \$2,100,000 worth of bonds, on which the Department issued a receivable, has now agreed to increase the amount of this guarantee to \$5,100,000 to cover construction of Project 3.

I recommend that the Board of Regents authorize the University to accept the interim financing for Series G as proposed by F. L. Dupree and Company and approved by the Commissioner of Finance in the amount of \$5,100,000.

## VII. CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Rader Hall is being reconstructed at a total cost of \$1,703,972.92. The contractor, C. H. Jimison Construction Company, has advised us that we will be able to occupy this building approximately two months ahead of the December 15 date on which it was originally scheduled. He is the best and most trusted contractor who has built a building on this campus during my 16 years. He was the contractor on Cooper Hall, the Addition to Baird Music Hall and the Claypool-Young Art Building. We hope he will bid the Appalachian Technical Institute.

For many years we have built <u>faculty housing</u> and have paid for the construction out of a revolving fund from income derived from rentals. We have enough money in this revolving fund now to construct a tri-plex apartment building for faculty on University property on Fifth Street.

I recommend that the Board of Regents authorize the University to proceed with the planning and construction of this three apartment building for faculty to be paid for out of funds accumulating in the Revolving Fund.

## VIII. AUDITORS FOR THE 1969-70 FISCAL YEAR

J. R. Meany and Associates of Bowling Green, Kentucky, have been approved by the Commissioner of Finance to audit the accounts of Morehead State University for the 1969-70 fiscal year.

I recommend that the Board of Regents authorize the President to approve the Personal Services Contract for J. R. Meany and Associates in the amount of \$7,500.00.

## IX. SIXTEEN YEARS ON THE FIRING LINE

This fall semester marks the beginning of my 17th year as President of Morehead State University. They have been great and rewarding years in many, many ways, yet they have been difficult and depleting years in many other ways.

We have been blessed with outstanding men and women who have served as members of the Board of Regents. Though I was elected President on April 6, 1954, by a divided vote, there has never been a negative vote cast since that time on any issue that has come before the Board. By open and free discussions the members have been able to arrive at decisions without divisions.

The five Governors under whom I have served have shown sound judgment and non-political action in appointments of Board members. One member, B. F. Reed, has served under all five (5) Governors from Wetherby to Nunn and another member, W. H. Cartmell, has served under four (4) Governors from Chandler to Nunn. During the term of Governor Nunn, five (5) appointments have been made to the Board and three (3) of the five (5) have been reappointments. This practice has established the University as one free from political consideration and involvement. Such continuity of service by members of the Board places the University in good stead in the eyes of accrediting associations and removes it from the stigma imposed upon it in the late 1940's because of political interference on the part of the Board and the Governor. I rejoice greatly in the freedom which I have had to administer the affairs of the University under the general policies of the Board and the laws of the Commonwealth without fear of personal and political intimidation.

I assure you that I have learned much about the management of an institution of higher education during these 16 years, which was not to be found in the textbooks which I studied in earning a Doctor's degree in Educational Administration. Many of my friends told me that the position as President of Morehead State College would provide opportunity for a quiet, peaceful and serene life with time to prop my feet upon the desk and meditate, while others thought I would follow the examples of my predecessors and remain for only a short time. However, the various elements of

the academic community and the public have had other thoughts about the matter. Many of the students, faculty, alumni, legislators and government officials think they know much more about administering the affairs of a college or university than one who has spent a lifetime in preparation and service. I admit also that there is much more for me to learn and do before I reach the journey's end.

Let me call your attention to some of the areas in which we are able to show progress during these past 16 years:

## 1. Enrollment

When I became President in 1954, there were 698 students enrolled for the spring semester. The Board had adopted a budget for the fiscal year which anticipated a decrease in enrollment because of the economic conditions in Eastern Kentucky. Members of the Board told me at my first meeting with them that there was little if any prospect of the enrollment increasing above 1,000 in the foreseeable future. At that time students from 50 Kentucky counties and 11 other states were represented in the student body. At the present time the 6,460 students come from 89 counties and 28 states and 8 foreign countries. We anticipate an enrollment for the 1970 fall semester of near 7,000 students.

## 2. Faculty

The faculty and staff have increased from 91 in 1954 to 747 in 1970. These faculty and staff members represent a higher level of competency, preparation and experience. In fact, we have employed 19 additional faculty members this fall who hold earned Doctor's degrees. This means that over one-third (1/3) of the faculty hold earned Doctorates.

## 3. Programs

We have been able to add programs of preparation relevant to the times and to eliminate many out-dated programs. Our latest catalogues will show that many courses which were offered in 1954 have been dropped from the curriculum while more meaningful ones have been added as we were able to attract faculty with more recent preparation and interests. We have provided for terminal programs and associate degrees in arts, science, and technology. Furthermore, we have added graduate programs leading to the Master's degree in Education, Music, Business, English, Chemistry, Biology and History with a sixth year program leading to certification in school administration and teaching. This sixth year is offered as a part of a cooperative program with the University of Kentucky leading to a Doctorate.

We plan to expand our curricular offerings as the demands and needs of the students arise and we are able to employ competent specialists and add library and laboratory facilities.

## 4. Financing

Minutes of August 26, 1970, cont'd

The general operation expenses of the University have been met by state appropriations and student tuition fees. The auxiliary enterprises have been self-supporting. In 1954 the University operated under a budget in the amount of \$820,066.00 with \$427,700.00 of the total coming from legislative appropriations. The tuition fees then were \$35.00 per semester for Kentucky residents and \$55.00 for out of staters. For the fall of 1970 the tuition fees for residents will be \$150.00 per semester and \$400.00 for non-residents. The budget for the 1970-71 fiscal year will be 15.3 million with 7.9 million coming from state appropriations.

In 1954 the College did not receive any of its funds from the Federal Government. However, in 1970 the University will receive a total of \$2,781,000 from the Federal Government to finance special projects and to provide student financial aid.

## 5. <u>Physical Facilities</u>

The most noticeable changes which have taken place since 1954 have been in physical facilities. Until Baird Music Hall was completed and dedicated in the fall of 1954, no building had been constructed since Mays Hall was built in 1938 and Lappin Hall was erected in 1937.

Prior to 1954 the Music Department was housed in the basement of Fields Hall, the Art Department in the Library, the Cafeteria and Grill in the basement of Allie Young Hall, the Business Department and Bookstore in the basement of Rader Hall, the English Department in the basement of Thompson Hall, the Agriculture Department in one room of the Science Building, the Home Economics Department in two rooms on the 4th floor and the Department of Industrial Arts in two rooms on the ground floor of Lappin Hall.

The Dean of the College and the Dean of Students occupied joint offices and employed the same secretary while the President shared his secretary with the Director of Extension.

Space and time forbid that I list for you the facilities which have been built since 1954 to provide for the needs of the students, the faculty, the administration and the general public. Suffice it for me to say that the old buildings have been renovated and refurbished and new ones have been constructed to bring the University plant in line with the objectives and purposes of a state institution of higher education. The academic facilities have been paid for by revenue bonds which are being retired from student fees and by grants from the Federal Government in the amount of \$24,325,000. The housing and dinding facilities have been paid for by revenue bonds and Government loans in the amount of \$17,852,000 which are being retired from room rentals in the dormitories and apartments and from profits from food services.

Additional facilities are being planned and will be constructed as the need arises and we establish the ability to finance them.

## 6. <u>University Status</u>

The University began in 1887 as the Christain Normal School established and financed by the Women's Missionary Society of the Christian Church. It became Morehead State Normal School by an act of the 1922 session of the General Assembly. In 1926 the Legislature changed the name to Morehead State Teachers College and Normal School, in 1930 to Morehead State Teachers College and in 1948 to Morehead State College.

In keeping with the national pattern and in recognition of the status of the College the name was changed to Morehead State University in 1966. When the College attained University status in name and in fact we were able to establish greater integrity as an institution of higher education, guarantee higher quality in programs, attract a more cosmopolitan student body and more distinguished and competent faculty, influence greater federal financing of special projects, and provide significant stature for the alumni in professional circles.

Let me turn now to problems which face us in the immediate and distant future of the decade of the 70's. Some of these problems require no more than a statement of fact while others require some elaboration. We must, therefore, make:

A. Provisions whereby the various facets of the total University can be involved in the decision making and implementing process.

Morehead State University is far ahead of many colleges and universities today in the solution of this problem. Every university committee is composed of students, faculty and administrators, including the University Senate which has 49 members, constituting 25 faculty members, 12 students and 12 administrators. The students and faculty are represented by non-voting members on the Board of Regents.

- B. Provisions whereby the responsible students and faculty can express dissent without becoming involved in destruction of property and violation of the rights of others.
- C. Provisions for curricular changes which will make the offerings relevant and keep the University in the main stream of change.
- D. Provisions for an orderly process by which the objectives and purposes of the University may be redefined, the structure of the University revamped, and the total academic community redesigned.
- E. Provisions by which the students and faculty may exercise their academic and human rights as adult citizens and at the same time maintain a level of responsibility to the total society which creates and maintains the University.

- F. Provisions whereby the state and federal governments will assume a greater share in financing higher education instead of passing the major costs of obtaining a college degree on to the recipient.
- G. Provisions for coordinating higher education whereby the institutions retain their autonomy rather than submit to state control.
- H. Provisions whereby the number of out-of-state students can be limited and required to pay a greater share of the costs of their education without pricing them out of the market resulting in provincialism on the university campus.
- I. Provisions whereby the students can exercise free choice in determining their pattern of behavior and at the same time the University meet its obligations to the parents, the taxpayers and the general public.
- J. <u>Provisions whereby the University will be able to justify its</u>
  <u>freedom to manage its own affairs as an academic community without</u>
  fear of repressive state and nation legislation and executive edicts.
- K. Provisions whereby those students can have an opportunity to prepare for leadership roles in the military in a quality program without subjecting the entering freshman to compulsion who has conscientious objections.

This is a very vulnerable area and one of great immediate import.

The ROTC Program was established and begun three (3) years ago requiring freshman and sophomore men to enroll in Military Science courses. At the close of the second year an agreement was reached with the Army for the compulsory requirement to apply to freshmen only. Our thinking was and still is that the freshman men will do well to explore the opportunities for leadership through participation in Military Science courses for one year. Those who administer the ROTC Program feel that this is the best procedure for all colleges and universities to follow. However, we are now faced with a decision by the Supreme Court which exempts young men from the Selective Service who claim and prove conscientious objections on moral and ethical grounds as well as on religious grounds. I am confident that we must determine ways and means by which such a person can be exempt from courses in Military Science. We shall, therefore, do so.

I want to say to you that I hope to see the day come, and that right soon when we can provide a quality program in Military Science without making it compulsory to anyone. I don't think that day is now. We have not had long enough to insure that we can meet the requirements, and I don't think we can until we have had opportunity to graduate the first class that entered as freshmen. At that time we will be able to determine the

possibility of making the program voluntary. If it is possible and feasible at that time, I will be one of the first to admit it and recommend such action to the Board of Regents.

There are other considerations related to the requirements of ROTC. If the colleges and universities cease to provide opportunity for civilians to prepare for officer training, then we may wind up with a professional Army with officers being trained in Military Academies. Furthermore, to drop the compulsory requirement of ROTC will not satisfy the protestor. He will then want us to quit giving academic credit. If we concede to this demand, the protestor will then propose that we abolish Military Science in every form and fashion as a part of the university experience. He would then, I suppose, petition the government of the United States to cease military training as a part of the defense measures of the Nation. However, I am not as troubled by the wishes of the protestor as I am concerned about providing opportunities for all of our youth to pursue the kind of preparation which they desire with the greatest degree of freedom and with the least compulsion as is possible.

I hereby give you my hand and dedicate myself wholeheartily "to the unfinished task" which lies ahead of us, to do my dead-level best, by offering the experiences of the past 16 years as evidence of my sincerity and total commitment to the work of this great University.

## X. STUDENTS' RULES AND REGULATIONS HANDBOOKS

I recommend that the Board of Regents approve the 1970-71 Official Handbook for Students, the Traffic Regulations, the Rules and Regulations under which Intramural Sports will be administered, the Parents' Permission Form for Women Students and the Handbook for Women in Residence at Morehead State University which are presented as exhibits.





#### REQUIRED HOUSING

All full-time undergraduate students (with exceptions listed below) are expected to live on campus unless they are granted permission by the Director of Housing to live elsewhere. The following students do not have to live on campus:

- A. Married couples living together in Morehead, widows, and/or widowers.
- B. Students commuting from their permanent residences.
- C. Veterans who have had at least 2 years of active military service.
- D. Students living with an immediate relative.
- E. Students who because of medical reasons based on a physician's statement cannot live in a residence hall.
- F. Students who receive permission to live off campus because of a proven need.

#### WOMEN'S HOURS

The closing hours of all women's residences are based upon student classification. They are:

Freshmen Women	Monday - Thursday Friday & Saturday Sunday	11:00 p.m. 1:00 a.m. 12:00 a.m.
Sophomores and Juniors	Monday - Thursday Friday & Saturday Sunday	11:00 p.m. 1:30 a.m. 12:00 a.m.
Senior Women	Monday - Thursday Friday & Saturday Sunday	12:00 a.m. 2:00 a.m. 1:00 a.m.

A woman may not leave her residence until 6:00 a.m. Permission to leave earlier must be granted by the Hall Director.

Remember: In case of emergency, regardless of the hour, telephone your Hall Director. In case of doubt about your arrival in the Hall by closing hour, follow the same procedure. By all means, return to your hall regardless of the hour.

At no time shall any person other than the Hall Director be privileged to open an outside door once the door has been locked for the night.

#### LATENESS

Lateness is defined as a woman being outside the hall or a man being in the lobby later than the specified closing hours. The closing hours are regulated by the clock at the lobby desk in each hall.

#### LATE PERMISSIONS

All women students are allowed to be in attendance at a University sponsored function until it is over. A reasonable amount of time will be allowed for you to return to the residence hall after the function is over.

Special requests for late permission will be weighed on their own merit.

Each senior resident will be granted eight (8) late permissions each semester to be used at her own discretion.

Senior late permissions will extend one hour after the regular closing hour or two hours if there are extenuating circumstances.

#### PARENT PERMISSION FORM

The permission form is signed by the student's parents and is valid for the student's four years. The permission form applies to all absences from the campus. If the permission is marked "no", the student must confer with the Hall Director and must receive special permission from parents.

These absences from the hall also apply to the Morehead vicinity.

If the parents wish to change the permission, a new form must be filed with the Hall Director.

#### THE SIGN OUT SYSTEM

Each student has a card on which she must sign out for absence from her hall:

- 1. All out-of-town trips (day or evening)
- 2. All overnights (in or out of Morehead)
- 3. Vacation periods
- 4. Late permissions

On returning, students must sign in giving the date and time of return. The sign-out card cannot be altered or crossed out on returning.

A WOMAN STUDENT WHO GIVES FALSE INFORMATION IN CONNECTION WITH AN OVERNIGHT ABSENCE OR WHO DOES NOT RETURN TO HER PLACE OF RESIDENCE WILL BE SUBJECT TO DISCIPLINARY ACTION WHICH MAY INCLUDE SUSPENSION OR DISMISSAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY.

#### VISITS TO OTHER RESIDENCE HALLS

- M.S.U. students who are guests in another residence hall must:
  - 1. Clear permission with Hall Director in advance.
  - 2. Sign out of her own hall for an overnight.
  - 3. Sign in the guest book in hall where she is visiting.
  - 4. Assume responsibility for her own actions and for violations of rules.
  - 5. Abide by regulations of the hall where she is visiting.
  - 6. Sign out when she leaves to return to her own place of residence.

Students may visit in the other residence halls only on Friday and Saturday nights.

#### **GUESTS**

Students may have guests overnight on Friday and Saturday nights.

Guests must arrive before the regular closing hour and may not leave before the regular opening hour. The guest must be registered with the Hall Director at least one half hour before the hall closes.

There will be a fee for each night. There will not be a fee for mothers visiting their daughters.

Guests must abide by the regulations for M.S.U. women. The hostess is responsible for informing the guest of the regulations and for any violation of rules.

Guests are not to be invited during the week of Mid-Term and Final Exams.

#### STUDY HOURS

Study hours are to be determined in individual residence halls by the House Council.

#### CALL AND CALLERS

Please limit all phone calls to five minutes. To allow for emergency calls, the lobby or first floor phone should not be used after closing hours.

Parents are welcome in the residence halls at any time the halls are open.

#### MALE CALLERS

Male visitors are permitted to come into the lobbies between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. to call for a student, but are not permitted to remain after the woman student appears.

Male visitors are permitted to visit in the lobbies of women's residence halls daily from 3:00 p.m. until closing hours.

#### HOUSEKEEPING

Students are responsible for the cleanliness and orderliness of their rooms. Rooms will be inspected periodically by the Hall Director.

Clean bed linen is provided once each week.

The use of tape and nails on the walls is not permitted.

Shades or draperies should be closed at dusk or at any time the room is lighted. At no time are the windows of your rooms to be used for the drying of clothes or for the storing of food.

The University reserves the right of entry into any room for the purpose of inspection, cleaning, repair, or discipline.

#### FOOD IN ROOMS

Cooking is not permitted in the rooms. Please use metal or similar containers for any food snacks you have in your room.

The restaurants in town are not allowed to deliver food in the residence halls.

#### CARS

Please consult the University Traffic Handbook for regulations regarding cars.

#### SUN-BATHING

Sun-bathing is limited to areas designated by the Office of Student Affairs. Men are not permitted in this area when women are using it for sun-bathing. The sun decks of a residence hall are to be used only by women living in those halls.

#### SWIMMING

Swimming in the University Lake is considered to be extremely dangerous. Students should swim only where life guard and dressing facilities are provided. The lake is a public water supply and state law prohibits swimming in an impounded public water supply.

#### ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

The use or possession of alcoholic beverages is prohibited in the residence halls or on University property. Students violating this regulation are subject to disciplinary action.

#### THE JUDICIAL PROCEDURE

The University has empowered those in charge of residence halls to deal with certain judicial problems through the House Council. The House Council deals with problems peculiar to its own hall.

Major disciplinary cases may be handled by the Student Senate Judicial Council or by administrative action.

The decision as to the major or minor character of a case is made through consultation of the Hall Director and Hall President with the Associate Dean of Students.

Serious discipline is shared with parents and the proper University officials.

The following recommendations have been made as a guide in handling judicial cases:

#### Lateness

One minute: A warning will be issued.

Two-five minutes: One half hour campus the following Saturday evening.

Six-ten minutes: One hour campus the following Saturday evening.

A student may choose to appear before the House Council instead of taking the automatic penalty.

Over ten minutes: Appear before the House Council.

Failure to sign out for overnight: Appear before the House Council. (Recommend a two-hour campus the following Saturday evening as a minimum penalty).

<u>Failure to sign in:</u> A warning will be issued the first time. A half-hour campus the following Saturday evening for additional failures to sign in.

<u>Consistent offenders</u>: Recommend that consistent offenders (three times) appear before the House Council. This applies to the above offenses and to individual hall regulations such as violations of quiet hours.

Postponement: When a campus is postponed, the penalty is doubled.

A request to change the night of the campus, e.g. from Saturday to Sunday must be approved by House Council.



RESOLVED, that the Board of Regents of Morehead State University offer sincere congratulations and deep appreciation for his service and wish for him continued success in the presidency in the years ahead.
