II. FACULTY EVALUATION

A Committee on Faculty Evaluation was named by the University Senate to develop forms by which the students, faculty, and administration could make an evaluation of successful teaching in terms of meaningful learning. The Committee, headed by George Luckey, Associate Professor of Philosophy, has developed an instrument and placed it in the hands of the faculty. The Senate agreed that the process of faculty evaluation would be adopted next year on a voluntary and experimental basis. After a year of trial, the Committee and the Senate hope to develop and validate a document that can be approved by the Board and used in a very objective manner.

III. MAJOR IN JOURNALISM

The University has offered a Minor in Journalism for a number of years consisting of 21 semester hours. The School of Humanities through the Division of Communications has proposed a Major in Journalism consisting of 30 semester hours. The proposal has been studied and revised by the Committee on Undergraduate Curriculum and approved for submission to the Board. (Exhibit I)

I recommend that the Board approve
a Major in Journalism beginning with
the 1972 fall semester.

IV. AREA OF CONCENTRATION IN COMMUNICATIONS

We have improved our physical facilities, employed adequate and competent faculty, and developed course offerings in the special areas of Journalism, Speech, Radio-Television, and Dramatic Arts that we believe the University is in position to offer an Area of Concentration in Communications. There is a trend today toward preparing students in a broader area of communications. This new program will allow students to study in depth in the various fields of communications media. A student completing an Area of Concentration will be expected to take a core of subjects in all four areas. He will then specialize in one major field of study.

The Committee on Undergraduate Curriculum has approved the proposal as presented by the School of Humanities. (Exhibit II)

I recommend that the Board of Regents
authorize an Area of Concentration in
Communications at the beginning of the
1972 fall semester.

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V. OPEN HOUSE PROPOSAL

The Student Government Association proposed on February 14, 1972, that regulations governing open house in the residence halls be modified. The Committee on Student Life studied the proposal submitted by the Student Government Association, and on April 24, 1972, by a vote of eleven (11) to one (1) submitted its report to the President. The proposal, as submitted by the Student Life Committee, was placed before the Administrative Council on May 3, 1972. The President, who serves as chairman of the Administrative Council, requested that the Council study the proposal and be ready to act on it at a later meeting.

I am submitting the report to members of the Board of Regents with the suggestion that you study the proposal and be prepared to take final action when the Administrative Council completes its work prior to the beginning of the 1972 fall semester.

VI. REGISTRATION FEES

The Executive Budget which was adopted by the 1972 session of the General Assembly for the institutions of higher education provided for an increase in the registration fees at all of the colleges and universities. The Council on Public Higher Education complied with the mandate and adopted the fee schedule as prepared in Exhibit IV.

I recommend that the Board of Regents approve this fee schedule for Morehead State University to become effective at the beginning of the 1972 summer term and 1973 summer term respectively.

VII. LAND TRANSFER

The University has purchased four (4) tracts of land known as the Charlie Holbrook property. The land is adjacent to Lee Cemetery on the East and North as shown on the map as Exhibit V. The land in tract four (4) on the North boundary of Lee Cemetery is exceedingly rough and steep. It is of little or no use to the University. The Lee Cemetery Company, Inc. desires to obtain a strip of land, 474 feet long and 200 feet wide for expansion purposes.

I recommend that the Board of Regents authorize the President of Morehead State University to sign a deed for 200 feet of land, more or less, and convey the property to Lee Cemetery Company, Inc., Morehead, Kentucky, for the purpose of expanding burial plots.

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MAJOR PROPOSAL

Needs for a Major in Journalism:

1. Since the beginning of the minor program in Journalism, in the fall of 1967, enrollment has more than doubled, increasing steadily from 58 in 1967, to 89 in 1968, to 93 in 1969, to 100 in 1970, to 119 in 1971. Along with enrollment there has been a growing demand on the part of students participating for a major in this area.
2. There has also been an increased need by communications media for graduates in journalism, particularly for those in newspaper and broadcast news media, and also in advertising, public relations and in education.
3. There is a need to serve northeastern Kentucky with programs comparable to programs available at other regional universities.
4. There is a need to incorporate into one program present journalism courses and those journalism-related programs already offered at the University as Radio-Television courses, to serve students seeking a well-rounded background in Journalism, both printed and broadcast.

Practicality of implementing a Major in Journalism:

1. There are already offered by the University a sufficient number of courses to immediately implement a Major program, if courses in broadcasting may be included in the Journalism Major. Such courses are written into a Journalism Major at most universities which offer such a major.
2. Additional courses in Journalism may be easily added over the next school year to broaden the program sufficiently to give a student an attractive and practical choice of programs. Such courses would also facilitate planning of other programs, such as a Major and a Master's program in Communications.
3. A survey of faculty reveals that the whole proposal may be implemented without adding any new faculty, but by assigning courses to specific specialists in journalistic areas on campus. All these faculty have been in on the planning of this program and are agreeable to participating in it.

A PROPOSAL FOR AN AREA OF CONCENTRATION IN COMMUNICATIONS

I. Introduction

Today, in education, there is a trend oriented toward developing total communication skills rather than selected skills such as journalism, speech, radio, TV, or theatre arts. Many speech and dramatic arts departments have made the transition and numerous text books are presently on the market advocating communication skills rather than one particular area. This new program would allow students to study in depth related areas in Communications and to further develop a proficiency in one particular course of study. Furthermore, students graduating with majors in one area are often called upon to use skills in several communication areas other than the one in which they majored. Since our students are aware of that fact, many are presently taking a major in one area and a minor in another area. To better facilitate these students an area of concentration in communications should be offered.

II. Requirements for an Area of Communication

The student taking an area of concentration would be expected to take a core of subjects in all four areas of communication: Journalism, Speech, Radio-TV, and Dramatic Art. He would then further specialize in one major giving his program further emphasis. A breakdown of requirements may be seen on the following page.

III. Degree Offered

A teacher certification program may be taken with an emphasis in any of the four areas or the student may elect to take a non-certified program.

Students at Eastern ask regents to change dormitory rules for coeds

RICHMOND, Ky.—About 150 Eastern Kentucky University students, urging modifications in women's dormitory policies, marched peacefully across the campus here yesterday and then camped in a corridor outside a board of regents meeting while their proposals were discussed.

The students, through three spokesmen, told the regents they wanted curfews removed for all women and a specific policy for open dormitory visitations, allowing all students to visit each other in their rooms. EKV Student Association President Chuck Kelhoffer said a recent survey of students indicated that 1,252 of 1,830 students voting supported an open visitation policy 24 hours a day.

But he told the regents that most students realized such a liberal policy was unrealistic and then suggested that open visitation hours be set from 7 p.m. to 1 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays.

Eastern's current dormitory curfew sets specific hours for women with less than 24 semester hours, or most freshman coeds.

With parental approval, other women can set their own hours. Currently, slightly more than 1,000 Eastern coeds live in two dormitories where there are no curfew policies. They also pay an extra \$15 semester fee to cover the cost of additional security personnel to supervise these facilities.

After discussing the proposals for almost two hours, the regents finally approved President Robert Martin's recommendation that he and other administrators discuss the questions further with students and prepare specific proposals.

Martin told the regents that only about one-third of the school's dormitory residents had voted in Kelhoffer's survey, indicating that student interest in open visitation was considerably less than the results might otherwise indicate.

Many already regulate hours

Sharon Crews, another student and president of Eastern's Women's Inter-dormitory Council, also urged the regents

to remove the current requirement of parental approval for women to set their own hours and extension of the present policy to freshman coeds.

But she relented after Martin said the cost of properly supervising all the women's dormitories might be too great unless all women were willing to pay for the privilege.

Miss Crews also said many coeds already regulate their own hours by finding ways to leave or enter their dormitories throughout the night with the help of roommates and others.

Martin also said he had reservations concerning the open visitation question. He said such a policy could interfere with the privacy of roommates. "Also, these are bedrooms and why is it that visitation is something you want to do in a bedroom?" he asked.

He and others also said that on four occasions during the past year women's dormitories had an opportunity to vote on a one-day open visitation, but that only about half of the nine dormitories supported the plans.

In other regents' action, a budget of \$24.7 million for the 1972-73 school year, which included a \$14.8 million state appropriation, was approved. Martin said the recommended expenditures provide for continuation of university programs and cost-of-living salary increases for faculty and staff.

Also included in the regents approval of the budget was agreement with an earlier action by the state Council on Public Higher Education which increased tuition \$60 for each of the next two years for Kentucky undergraduates and slightly more for out-of-state students.

Martin also said that the budget's projected revenues are based on Eastern's current enrollment of slightly over 10,000 students, including about 15 per cent from other states.

The regents also approved the awarding of honorary degrees to Congresswoman Edith Green of Oregon; Dr. Robert Worthington, an EKV alumnus and deputy U.S. commissioner of education; and Allan Ostar, executive director of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

Discrimination claimed

Suit challenges Eastern's dorm hours

LEXINGTON, Ky.—A suit charging Eastern Kentucky University officials with "impermissible discrimination" for imposing curfews on coeds residing in campus dormitories was filed in U.S. District Court yesterday by the Kentucky Civil Liberties Union.

Named as defendants were ECU President Robert R. Martin and the university's board of regents. The suit was filed by Robert Sedler, a University of Kentucky law professor, on behalf of Ruth Robinson, an ECU freshman, and all other Eastern coeds "who desire equality

of treatment with male students, particularly with respect to dormitory hours."

The suit charges that the coeds are discriminated against "solely on the basis of their sex," and asks the court for a permanent injunction against Martin and others under his supervision to enjoin them from enforcing dormitory hours in a discriminatory way.

ECU's current regulation, the suit states, imposes no dormitory-hour restrictions on males and consequently the curfew for coeds violates their rights under the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

The current policy primarily affects freshman coeds. They are required to be in their dormitories by 10:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 1 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays and midnight on Sunday.

Upperclasswomen who do not qualify for unrestricted hours, have a midnight curfew during the week, must be in by 2 a.m. Friday and Saturdays and midnight on Sunday. Unrestricted hour privileges, or no curfews, are available for those women if they have parental permission (if under 21), are not on academic or social probation and pay an additional \$15 a semester fee.

Yesterday's suit is the result of an appeal submitted to the ECU regents late last month for the removal of curfews for women students. At an April 25 regents' meeting, nearly 150 students camped in the corridor of the school's administration building while the regents discussed this and other proposed changes in dormitory regulations. The regents took no action.

OPEN HOUSE GUIDELINES
SPRING SEMESTER 1972

Open House will be permitted in all residence halls that qualify and desire to participate on the dates and times listed below. To qualify, each hall must have four students (these students must be a member of the hall council, hall staff, or Student Government Association members living in that hall) providing supervision within the hall and in Men's #7 there must be six students. The hall council can decide by a majority vote of the hall council's membership not to participate in the open house.

All residence hall offices will be open during these hours and the office staff will be on duty. Each student must check in at the office desk, leave his ID card, and give the room number he will visit. The student is to be met by his hostess in the lobby and be accompanied to the room. The door to the student's room must be left open with the exception of Downing Hall, Nunn Hall, East Mignon Hall, West Mignon Hall, and Mignon Hall. In Downing Hall, Nunn Hall, East Mignon Hall, West Mignon Hall, and Mignon Hall, the door to the student's room must be unlocked but does not have to be open, however, the draperies must be open. The student visiting in a hall will pick up his ID card at the desk by the end of the open house.

The hall president and the student workers must meet with the hall director before 12:00 noon on Friday preceding the scheduled open house to work out the procedure for the open house. If within any residence hall, the hall president is unable to work out the proper procedures by Friday noon, this residence hall will not be permitted to have an open house.

DORMITORY OPEN HOUSE PROPOSAL

1972-73

I. Introduction

Open House participation will be determined by each individual student after consultation with his or her roommate(s) on the basis of what may best fit the behavioral expectations and the needs of the student, and in accordance with those hours set up by the Student Life Committee.

II. Guidelines

- A. Each upperclass residence hall student will be afforded the opportunity for Open House weekly during these hours:

Friday: 7:00 P.M. - 12:00 P.M.
Saturday: 7:00 P.M. - 12:00 P.M.
Sunday: 1:00 P.M. - 5:00 P.M.

- B. Each freshman residence hall student will be afforded the opportunity for Open House weekly during these hours:

Sunday: 1:00 P.M. - 5:00 P.M.

- C. Each student living in a regulated residence hall will be afforded the opportunity for Open House weekly during these hours:

Sunday: 1:00 P.M. - 5:00 P.M.

- D. The details of each dormitory's Open House policy shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the dormitory.

- E. Members of the opposite sex visiting a living unit during Open House must, upon entrance to living areas, leave proper identification at the desk. At this time, the individual in charge will notify the person who is to be host or hostess, and these persons must accompany visitors to their living units.

- F. Doors to individual living units must remain unlocked.

- G. If a residence hall wishes to deviate from the previously selected visitation option by reducing visitation hours, a 2/3 vote of the entire living unit residentiary is required. Notice of this deviation, at the time the change is made, should be given to the director of that living unit, the Director of Housing, the Vice-President for Student Affairs, and the Director of Security.

III. Enforcement of Policy

- A. Violations of this policy including additional rules established within a living unit, or behavior which infringes on the rights of other residents of the dormitory shall be considered a violation of the University regulations and subject to appropriate disciplinary action.
- B. Each resident is responsible for seeing that his behavior is in accord with the Open House Policy.
- C. The Dorm Council will coordinate and initiate the enforcement of this policy in accordance with the procedures outlined in the Open House Policy.
- D. The University retains responsibility and jurisdiction to enforce this policy.
- E. The appropriate body of the University judicial system will handle all violations of this policy.

IV. The cost of operating this program will be paid by the students through a fee to be assessed at registration. This fee is not refundable.

V. Definitions

- A. Upperclass residence halls include: Wilson, Men's No. 7, Alumni Tower, Nunn, Mignon Tower, West Mignon, and East Mignon.
- B. Freshman residence halls include: Fields, Allie Young, Thompson, Waterfield, Regents, Cooper, and Mays-Butler.
- C. Regulated residence halls include: Mignon Hall
- D. In the preceding sections, "Open House" refers to calling upon another individual as a temporary guest. It does not include establishing residence for an unlimited period of time in a location other than the one in which the student certifies he is living.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE COUNCIL ON PUBLIC HIGHER
EDUCATION IN KENTUCKY AT A MEETING HELD ON APRIL 11, 1972

It is shown in the minutes of a properly convened meeting of the Council on Public Higher Education in Kentucky held on April 11, 1972, that the following Resolution was duly introduced, seconded, discussed, put to a vote, and carried:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, it is provided in KRS 164.020 that it is one of the functions and duties of this Council to determine the amount of the entrance and/or registration fees for admission to the Commonwealth's Public Institutions of Higher Education, these being the University of Kentucky, at Lexington, Kentucky (including its Main Campus in Fayette County, Kentucky, and its Community Colleges elsewhere than in Fayette County, Kentucky, not only those which have previously been established but also any which are in the process of being constructed or established, and those which may be established in the future), Eastern Kentucky University, Kentucky State University, Northern Kentucky State College, Morehead State University, Murray State University, University of Louisville, and Western Kentucky University; and

WHEREAS, it appears that the General Assembly of Kentucky at its regular 1972 Session appropriated to each of said Institutions substantial sums toward the costs and expenses of operating and providing instruction, and the Council has given due and careful consideration to the aggregate money requirements of each Institution with respect to the present and projected academic building needs and programs of each such Institution, monies available from all sources, and the necessity for providing revenues for the financing thereof, and is otherwise sufficiently advised; and

WHEREAS, by a certain Resolution which was adopted by this Council at a meeting held on April 17, 1970, as subsequently amended by this Council at a meeting held on July 6, 1970 (hereinafter for convenience referred to simply as the "1970 Resolution"), certain entrance or registration fees were approved and specific schedules relating thereto were set forth in Exhibits attached to the 1970 Resolution; and

WHEREAS, in and by the terms and provisions of the aforesaid 1970 Resolution of this Council it was contemplated and provided that certain entrance fees be charged and exacted as an incident to enrollment in such Institutions; and that in each instance a portion thereof be identified, in terms of a specific number of dollars, as "Student Registration Fees," such as each of said Institutions has pledged for the security and source of payment of one or more Series of its "consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds" with annotated footnotes indicating that the remaining portions of the respective entrance fees (to the extent not specifically designated as Student Registration Fees), constituted and were identified in dollar amounts as representing a "Student Union Fee," or "Student Activity Fee," or "Incidental Fee," or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky has previously submitted to this Council a Resolution requesting that with respect to the entrance fees heretofore established for the said University's Community Colleges elsewhere than in Fayette County, Kentucky (and without application whatsoever to the similar entrance fees heretofore established with reference to enrollment at said University's Main Campus in Fayette County, Kentucky), the entire amount of the prescribed entrance fee be identified, designated and constituted the "Student Registration Fee," without segregation or deduction therefrom of any sum or amount as heretofore segregated and designated as a "Student Union Fee," or a "Student Activity Fee," or an "Incidental Fee," or otherwise, in order that the total amount of such previously designated entrance fees, whether for resident students, non-resident students, regular session, summer school session or otherwise, might constitute, in the aggregate, the "Student Registration Fee" which is pledged for the security and source of payment of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky's "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," and in the 1970 Resolution (and in a similar Resolution adopted in 1968), it was so provided; and

WHEREAS, the Council is fully advised with respect to all of the foregoing, and considers that it is proper and desirable that this Resolution be adopted in accordance with all of the foregoing,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL ON PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION IN KENTUCKY DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE I. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF NORTHERN KENTUCKY STATE COLLEGE

Section 101. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at Northern Kentucky State College shall

(a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1972, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto as Exhibit I, and

(b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1973, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto as Exhibit V;

and the Board of Regents of Northern Kentucky State College may, in its discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit I be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit V be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973. Said Board of Regents is hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE II. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARDS OF REGENTS OF EASTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY, KENTUCKY STATE UNIVERSITY, MOREHEAD STATE UNIVERSITY, MURRAY STATE UNIVERSITY, AND WESTERN KENTUCKY UNIVERSITY

Section 201. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at Eastern Kentucky University, Kentucky State University, Morehead State University, Murray State University, and Western Kentucky University, shall

(a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1972, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto as Exhibit II, and

(b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1973, be as set forth in the schedule attached hereto as Exhibit VI;

provided, however, the respective Boards of Regents of said institutions of Higher Education as hereinabove identified may, in their discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit II be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit IV be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973. The respective Boards of Regents of said Institutions are hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE III. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

Section 301. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at the University of Kentucky, including the Community Colleges thereof, shall

(a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1972, be as set forth in the two-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit III, and

(b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1973, be as set forth in the two-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit VII;

provided, however, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky may, in its discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit III be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit VII be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973. Said Board of Trustees is hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE IV. ENTRANCE OR REGISTRATION FEES WHICH MAY BE CHARGED AND EXACTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF UNIVERSITY OF LOUISVILLE

Section 401. It is hereby determined that the fees to be charged to students enrolling at the University of Louisville shall

(a) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1972, be as set forth in the four-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit IV, and

(b) effective not later than the opening of the Fall Term in 1973, be as set forth in the four-page schedule attached hereto as Exhibit VIII;

provided, however, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Louisville may, in its discretion, provide that the fees set forth in Exhibit IV be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1972, and the fees set forth in Exhibit VIII be made effective with the opening of the Summer Term in 1973. Said Board of Trustees is hereby given authority to establish such fees and make proper provisions and regulations for the collection thereof.

ARTICLE V. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 501. The authority and discretion of said respective Boards of Trustees and of the respective Board of Regents of said State College and Universities is hereby recognized (a) to allocate, set aside, pledge and encumber for academic building purposes and for debt service requirements (including reserves) of Revenue Bonds which may be issued for academic building program purposes all of said Student Registration Fees, or parts thereof from time to time if not already pledged in toto; (b) to segregate and retain the Incidental Fees and apply the same to any proper purpose or purposes; or (c) to allocate, set aside, pledge and encumber for

building program purposes (whether the building or buildings involved be for academic purposes or for any other proper educational purpose), and for debt service requirements (including reserves) of Revenue Bonds which may be issued to finance the same, all of said Incidental Fees or parts thereof from time to time; provided, however, that solely in connection with the educational buildings and appurtenant facilities of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky which are provided, or may hereafter be provided, for any of said Board's Community Colleges outside of Fayette County, Kentucky, and as constituting a part or parts of said Board's "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Project" and to be financed through one or more Series of its issue of "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," the authority and discretion of said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky is and shall continue to be restricted, as applicable to the full amount of the "Entrance Fee Schedule" as set forth in the schedules attached hereto as "Exhibits III and VII," to its authority to allocate, set aside, pledge and encumber for academic building purposes, and for debt service requirements (including reserves) of said "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," the entire amount of said fees, which entire amount has heretofore been redesignated in full, and is hereby affirmed as constituting "Student Registration Fees," and without previously indicated segregation of any part of such aggregate amounts for a "Student Union Fee" or for an "Activity Fee."

Nothing herein provided shall be deemed to preclude the privilege of said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, in its discretion, to come before this Council at any future time, with a request that the "Entrance Fee Schedules" so prescribed for all full-time students enrolling in its Community Colleges outside of Fayette County, Kentucky, be added to or increased for any proper purpose and according to any proper segregation or designation; but nevertheless said Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, having requested and having been granted the redesignation herein approved (as to its Community Colleges outside of Fayette County only), and once having pledged the entire amount of such redesignated "Student Registration Fees" for the security and source of payment of its aforesaid "Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds," shall be precluded thereby and may not reduce the same.

Section 502. The schedules of fees which are attached hereto, and which are referred to, respectively, as Exhibits I to VIII, inclusive, shall each be signed on behalf of this Council, and for the purpose of identification as being the respective schedules authorized hereby, by the signature of the Executive Director of the Council; and the respective State Institutions of Higher Learning herein referred to are authorized to accept and rely upon any such schedule (i) identified by the genuine signature of the said Executive Director or (ii) so identified by a reproduced or typewritten signature of said Executive Director if certified over the genuine signature of the Executive Director to be a true copy thereof.

Section 503. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and shall supersede all previous proceedings in regard to matters embraced herein.



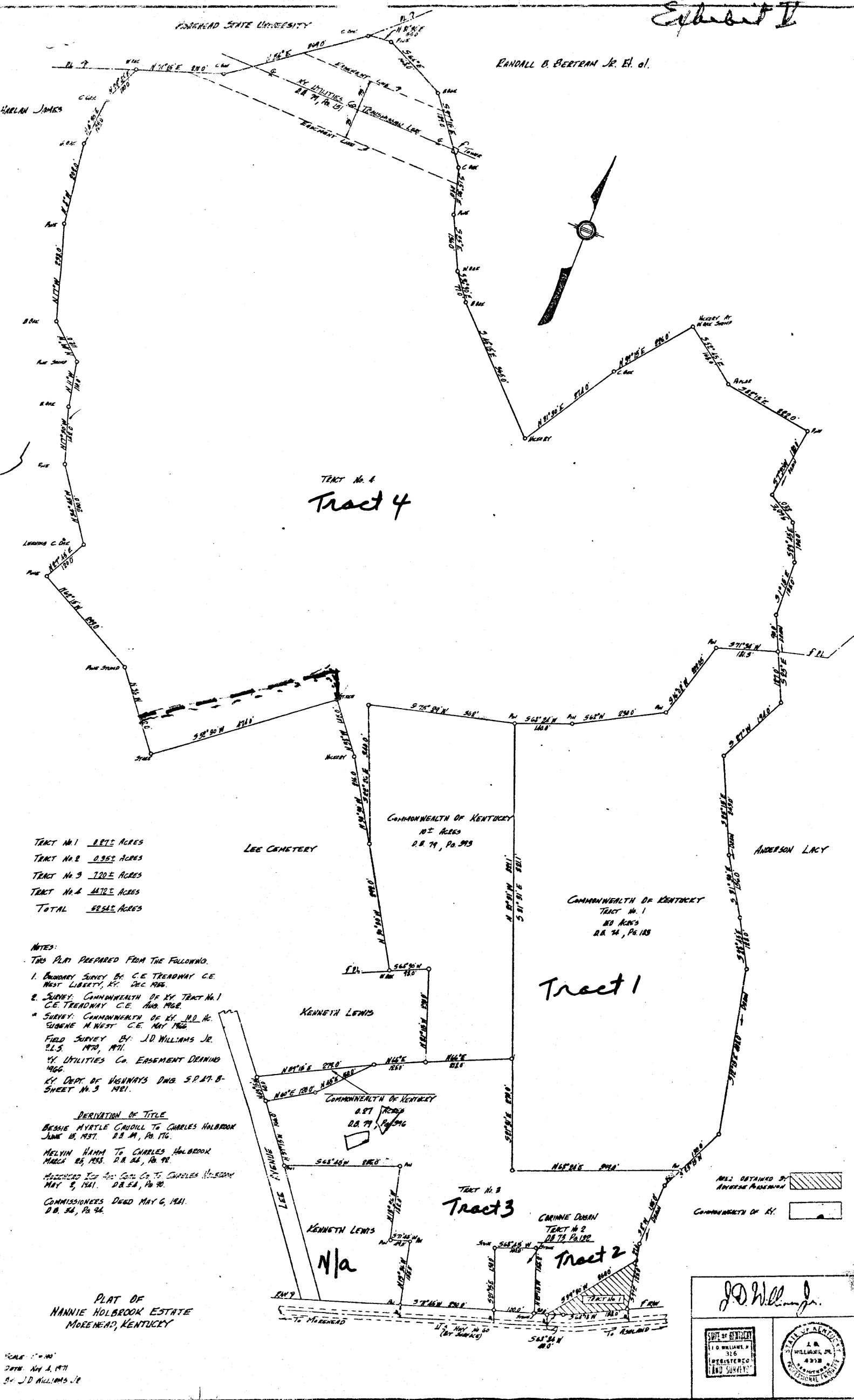


