with whom I was slightly acquainted. All knew that I was a militant sympathizer, but they treated me courteously and I took friends with the boys. Being in almost daily communication with friends in Nicholas, of course the soldier-boys were informed of my visits to the Confederate camp in a very early stage of the rebellion, and their evidence would be very damaging.

Now, sincerely I hoped that the rebel army and the Federal army by way of West Liberty, or had not accompanied Nelson at all, as in either case there would be a regular fight, either at the battle determined to get rid of the Federal letters the first opportunity, so that a search might reveal nothing calculated to excite suspicion against us, unless it might be a navy revolver in my saddle pocket. McCormick carried neither arms nor letters, and was, therefore, above suspicion.

Later in the evening the remaining of the Sevier's camp was accompanied by General Nelson.

Some Reminiscences OF THE Early Days of the Rebellion - Mixed State of Affairs in Bath and Nicholas Counties.

Individual Adventures. How The Boys Secluded.

BY MILFORD OVERLEY. (CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK.)

We were conducted to the headquarters of Major Robertson, who was there in command of a detachment of the 2nd and 3rd Regiments of the 1st Cavalry, as the advance of General Nelson's troops that were moving up the River camp at Prestonsburg. The Major informed us that he had orders from the commanding general to halt and hold all travelers. He gave us our choice either to be guarded in camp or to go to a hotel and be guarded there. We went to Trimble's hotel, where a guard was placed over us.

I had now ample time for reflection, and a review of what I had been doing during the past few weeks caused me to feel somewhat uncomfortable. I had been in General Nelson's camp in Mason county; and from there, soon after, I went to the Confederate camp at Prestonsburg in the interest of friends of the South and Federal lines with a pocket full of letters from Rebel soldiers in camp to sympathizing friends at home. Remembering, too, that while in the Rebel camp I had taken up arms against the Government, and that I had been the part of a citizen, that gave me no consciousness, as the Federal authorities could have no means of knowing anything about me.

I did not go to Nelson's camp for any treasonable or improper purpose, but, should it be necessary to do so, how was I to convince him of that fact with surrounding circumstances against me? I had been to Ohio in search of a runaway negro with a stolen horse, both the property of Col. James Jones, of Ball's company. Finding the man, I delivered him through the kindness of a friend, and returned comfortably to one engaged in my business. I received and was returning by way of Camp Cass, where I developed in through mere curiosity. There I unexpectedly met some of my neighbors who had recently returned from the Rebel army, and I also met Captain Bill Owen,
