

ROW HAS RESULTED

Peace Officers at Log York Are Laboring at New Gearheads.

THE JEALOUSY OF OFFICIALS

District Attorney's Office Presents the Action of Police in Not Turning Over to That Department Evidence Secured in Residential Murder Case.

New York, Sept. 18.—So swiftly executed was the arrest of "Lefty Louie" Rosenberg and "Gyp the Hood" Horvitz that the fugitives did not have time to destroy letters and manuscripts they had received while in hiding at 755 Woodward avenue, Brooklyn. Headquarters detectives ransacked the apartments where Rosenberg and Horowitz were captured. They even tore off the wall paper.

Deputy Commissioner Dougherty admitted that the correspondence found was of the utmost importance to the prosecution. The letters and postcards are in the hands of the police, but the district attorney's office demanded that they be turned over to that department. Assistant District Attorney Morse was agitated over the failure of the police to forward the find to him at once, because District Attorney Whitman, talking to him of the loss of the letters, advised from St. Louis, immediately after the arrest of Lefty and Gyp, expressed distrust of the police. In ordering Mr. Morse to take the original letters, the mislabeled Daugherty, Mr. Whitman intimated that the circumstances of the arrest had a peculiar look to him, and suggested that it was worth the detectives had not been able to run down the last of the Rothenthal case fugitives until he himself was 1,000 miles away.

"Gyp the Hood" and "Lefty Louie" were found by the police living with their wives in a flat in the Brownsville section of Brooklyn. The two men had been occupying the flat since Aug. 15 and were alone until last Tuesday, when they were joined by their wives, through whom clues to their whereabouts were obtained by the police.

The four were sitting at ten when Deputy Commissioner Dougherty and his men burst upon the door of their apartment and, with revolvers drawn, ordered them to hold up their hands. The others of the men made any show of resistance.

The Daughters of Veterans elected Miss Nina Littlefield of Cambridge, Mass., president. The National Association of Army Nurses retained its officers for another year.

Evidence Was Lackey.

New York, Sept. 18.—George Nolan, a newly appointed secretary to the United States legation at Panama, who was arrested recently on a charge of abducting a Scotch girl named Marion McVicker, the daughter of an innkeeper of Glasgow, was discharged by Magistrate Murray on a motion of Prosecutor Reynolds, who said he was unable to procure the evidence necessary for a conviction.

Vehicle Factory Burns.

Martinsburg, W. Va., Sept. 18.—The plant of the Stewart Vehicle company, one of the largest industries of the kind in this section of the state, was destroyed by fire. Hundreds of vehicles also were destroyed. The loss is \$150,000.

WOMAN MOONSHINER

Put Up a Fierce Fight Before Officers Overcame Her.

Whitesburg, Ky., Sept. 18.—United States Marshal Thomas Hollifield of Knott county, with a posse, has returned from the southern section of Letcher county, having under arrest Oma Frazer, a young woman, whom they captured after a fierce resistance on the charge of moonshining. The officers state that the woman had staid herself in a little glen in the mountains where she made whisky, and she had armed herself with a number of breech-loading rifles to protect her almost impenetrable hiding place. The woman had a sewing machine in the mountains with her and put in her odd times making garments.

The officers state that they had her completely surrounded before she was aware of their presence, but that she put up a fierce fight before they could capture her.

She is the first woman moonshiner to be arrested in this section in years. She will be tried at London, Ky., in November.

WOMAN ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

By Jumping From Window After Chasing Husband Over Several States.

Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 18.—Crazed with jealousy and scorned love, Mrs. Florence Perly, who has chased her husband over several states, attempted to kill herself in Captain Couch's office, at the police station by jumping from the window, 40 feet to the ground.

After coming from the office of a magistrate she entered Captain Couch's office and poured out the tale of her woes, intermingled with tears and shrieks against her husband and the woman she charges lived him away.

Frenzied when her threats failed to arouse the captain, the woman leaped for the window, her jewelry and other articles with which she might attempt to do herself violence were taken from her and she was locked up.

INQUIRY INTO LYNCHING

Of Robert Johnson is Opened in West Virginia Criminal Court.

Princeton, W. Va., Sept. 18.—A sweeping investigation into the lynching of Robert Johnson, a Negro, here on September 5, was opened when Mercer county criminal court convened.

Judge J. Frank Marhard pointed out among other things, that theynchon were murderers and that the Negro was slain. Numerous witnesses were examined. About 20 private detectives were called to the stand to support the belief among officers that Johnson was innocent.

EDWARDS AND ALLEN CAPTURED AT LAST

Letter to Former's Sweetheart Gave the Clue.

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 18.—Sidna Allen, leader of the Hillsville (Va.) Algonz, and Wesley Edwards, another member, were captured in this city by Boone detectives. Sidna Allen was captured in a home at Elvath and Locust streets, and Wesley was arrested while working with a paving gang. The arrests were accomplished by intercepting letters from Sidna Allen to her Virginia sweetheart. The detectives arrived at Des Moines on the same train with Maude Troler, a Virginia girl, who is said to have come from Virginia to meet Edwards.

Worthville, Va., Sept. 18.—Victor Allen, last of the Allen clan to be tried, was acquitted of the charge of having participated in the Carroll county courthouse murders at Hillsville last March. For the crimes two men have been sentenced to the electric chair, Floyd Allen and Claude Allen, father and brother of the man arrested here. CHIEF DISCHARGED

West Hammond Officer Was Accused of Neglect of Duty.

Hammond, Ind., Sept. 18.—At a stormy meeting of the West Hammond city council Chief of Police Kolesky was discharged by a vote of 8 to 5. Mayor Wasyrskyj casting the deciding vote. A special committee which had been appointed to investigate charges that the chief had been guilty of neglect of duty in failing to close the resorts, recommended the discharge. Tokio, Sept. 18.—Following the funeral ceremonies for Emperor Meiji, General Count Marosuke Nogi, supreme military controller, the hero at the siege of Port Arthur and many other notable engagements, and his wife committed hari kari, and died soon afterward from their self-inflicted wounds.

NOTICE TO BE GOOD

No Mistaking the Position of This Government.

Washington, Sept. 18.—In the form of a text of a note presented to the Nicaraguan government by United States Minister Weltzel at Managua on telegraphic instructions from Huntington Wilson, acting secretary of state, the first official and complete statement of the policy of the United States in the Nicaraguan situation has been issued at the state department. The note has also been placed in the hands of the rebel leaders by the Nicaraguan revolt, and has been given out for publication in every newspaper of the republic.

The purpose of the United States in Nicaragua, the note says, is to guard the American location, keep open communication in the republic and to protect American life and property from injury and destruction.

Of even greater significance, however, are the declarations that the United States will not countenance a restoration of the "busharous" order of things which prevailed under the tyrannical rule of the former dictator—President Zelaya. General Mtega is designated by the note as a man who is attempting to impose upon Nicaragua the regime of Zelayatism and castigated in the severest terms as a man of unkindred cruelty, a breaker of solemn pledges and the leader of an attempt to seize by force the control of Nicaragua.

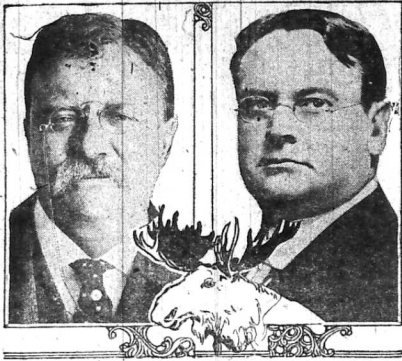
