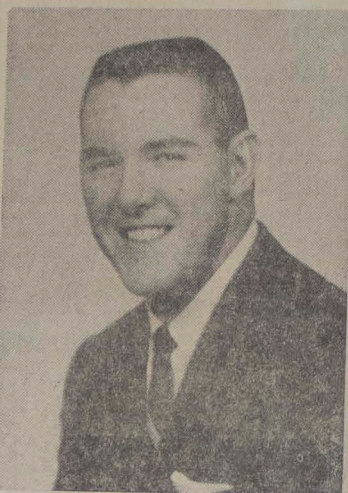

Treasurer of the Student Council is Sarah Coleman, a sophomore

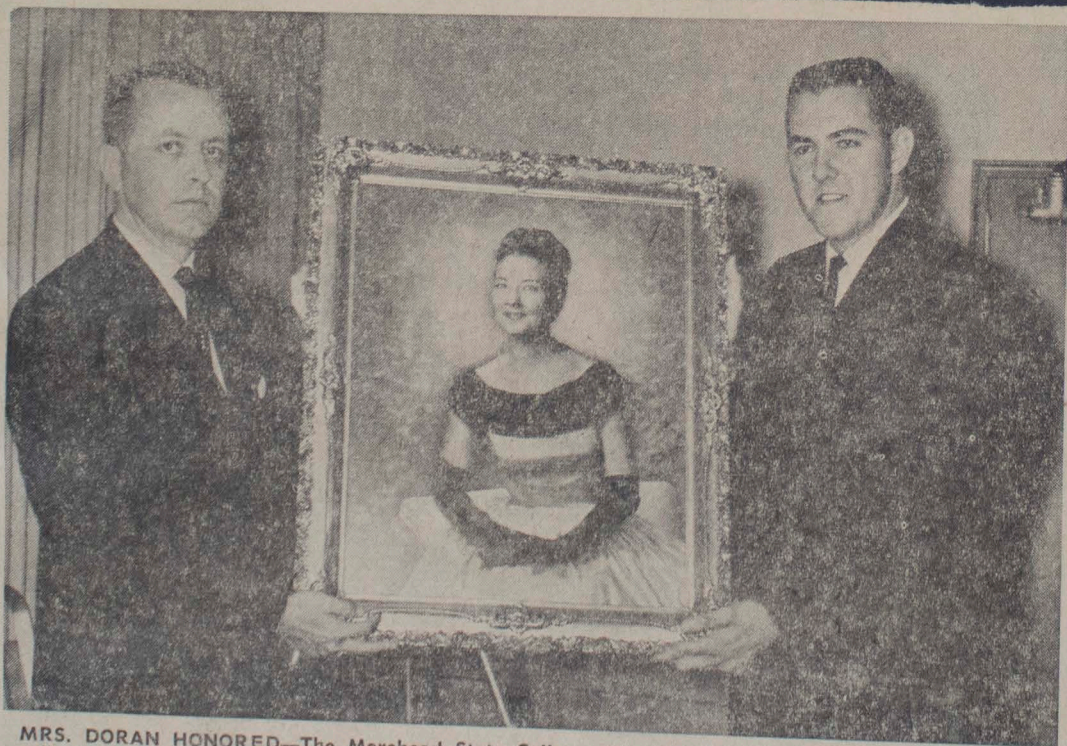
from Morehead. Sara was a freshman class representative last year. She is a commerce major.

Total Campus Club Members Give Blood In Council's Drive

The Red Cross Bloodmobile unit was on the MSC campus to receive donations of blood from students and faculty members on Mon., Nov. 14.

The unit visits the college twice yearly for this purpose, generally during the months of November and May.

Fifty-one people, including 12 women and 39 men, contributed a pint of blood to this cause. Two of the Morehead donors were faculty members.

Each donor received a free pass to the Trail Theatre. In addition a door prize of \$7.50 was given to one lucky donor, James Birchwell. Awards were given to the clubs having the highest percentage of their members contributing.

The \$15 first place award went to the Campus Club which had 100 per cent of its members donating a pint of blood. Second place, with an award of \$7.50, was held by the Newman Club, and the third place \$5 award was won by the Student Council.

Student Council Election Dates April 27, May 4

The Student Council has announced the date of April 27 for the primary election and May 4 for the final election of officers for the 1961-62 school year.

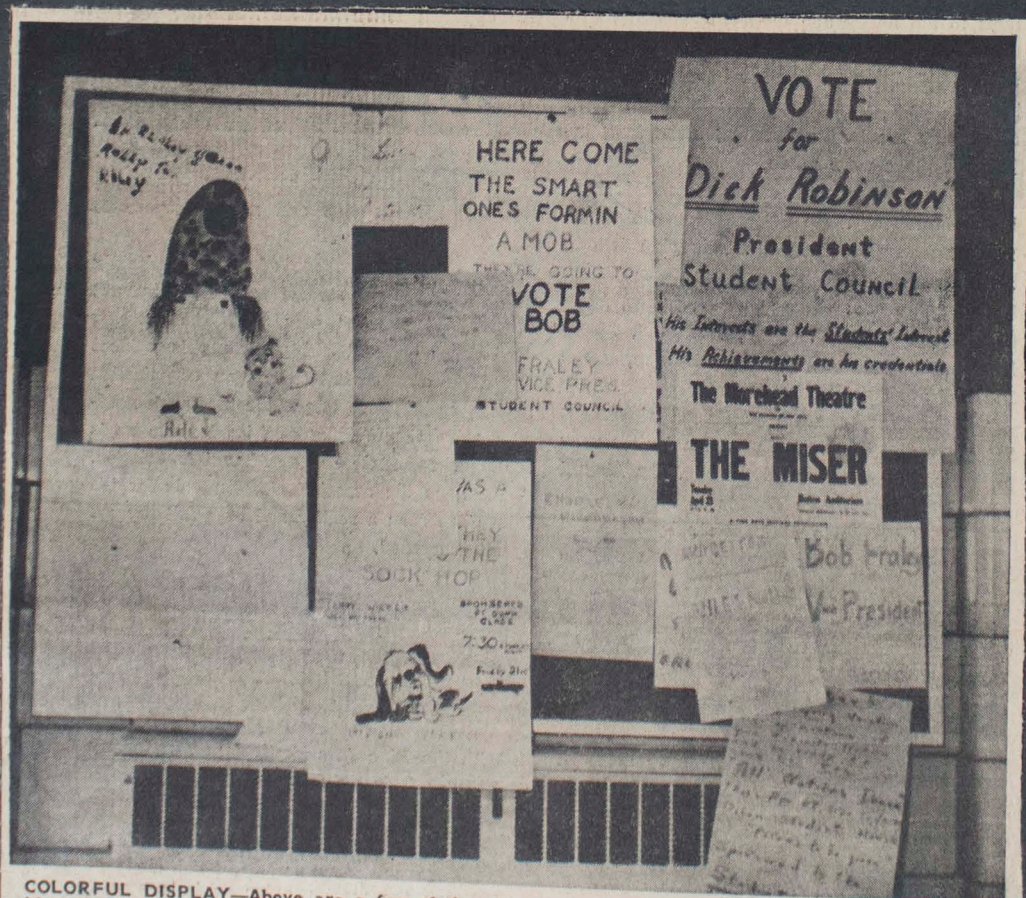
The Council has requested that those interested in running for an office file their intention of such candidacy in the office of the Dean of Students by 4 p. m. April 25.

Student Council Constitutional qualification requirements for holding the several offices are as follows:

1. Candidates for the presidency of the Student Council shall have at least one year's experience on the Student Council and shall be classified as Sophomore or Junior.

2. Candidates for the vice-presidency shall be classified as Sophomore or Junior at the time of election.

3. Candidates for the presidency and the vice-presidency of the Student Council shall be required to pass a simple test on parliamentary procedures administered by the out-going officers and the Dean of Students.

Student Council Primary Race Scheduled Thursday

The Student Council primary election will be held this Thursday. Ballots may be cast in the lobby of the Doran Student House from 9:45 a. m. to 6 p. m. and in residence halls from 9:45 a. m. to 5 p. m.

The two winning candidates for each office will be eligible to compete in the general election to be held Thursday, May 4.

Gary North, president of the Council and general chairman of the elections, said prospective candidates should file their intentions to run for office by 4 p. m. today in the Dean of Students office. Prospective candidates who do not do this, North said, will not be placed on the ballot, although there will be a space for write-in candidates.

Officially, there are three candidates running for President who have filed their intentions in the Dean's Office. Their names and date of filing are: George Hazelwood, Jr., April 18; Niles King Walton, Jr., April 18; Dick Robinson, April 19; Jim Riley, although he has not filed to run, has announced he will run for the presidency.

Other candidates for the various offices who have filed their intentions to run in the Dean's office are:

Vice-president—Charles R. Richardson, April 14; Bob Fraley, April 14.

Secretary—Jimmy Norsworthy, April 16; Danny Graves, April 19.

Treasurer—Robert Barnett, April 18; Tom Browne, April 19; James Vergne, April 20; Leo Bradley, April 21; Millie Ryle, April 21.

Reporter—Donald Dewey Baldridge, April 17—John Scott Carter, April 19; James A. Scobee, April 19.

Historian—Harold Jarvis Greenstone, April 14; Max B. Calhoun, April 19; Jerome J. Hartlage, April 20.

Candidates for the office of president have numerous suggestions for improving campus life.

George Hazelwood says that he is for extended hours for the girls and that the library should reconsider its timetable. He also feels the Council could aid numerous general improvements on campus.

"It is my firm conviction that you, the student, have no right to gripe if you do not vote in the elections," Hazelwood said. "You have chosen no one to represent your interest as a student on campus."

One of the primary points in Hazelwood's platform is the conduct of the Student Council itself. He says meetings should be held in strict accordance with the constitution in a place where visitors could be accommodated. "Permanent steering committees for the purpose of efficient movement of problems through the council should be established," he said, "and suggestion boxes should be placed at strategic points on campus."

Dick Robinson says that his main interest as president of the Council would be to "channel the ideas and

interests of the students" to a point of satisfactory agreement among all concerned. He is quick to point out that "The next president of the Council is not going to revamp all the rules and regulations now in force, nor should they be, for many are worthwhile and should not be changed for the sake of change only."

"Through planned and intelligent meetings of representatives of the student body to the Council there can be many improvements made which will greatly benefit the college as a whole," he added.

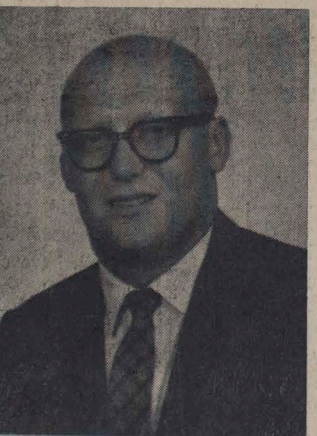
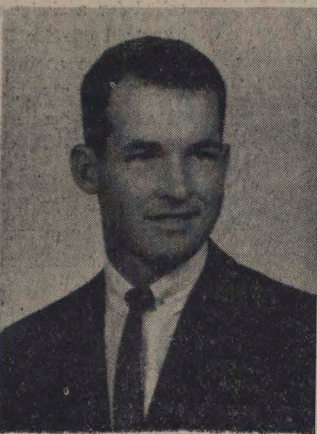
Niles Walton says that the prob-

lem of student representation is growing with the growth of the college. He advocates a more personalized Student Council with all students feeling free to voice their opinions, either through a representative or in person.

"It is up to the officers of the Council to know and share the sentiments of the student body," Walton said, "and only through a knowledge of these sentiments can the student body be represented as they would be represented."

A record setting turnout of over 1,000 voters elected the Student Council officers last Thursday for the school year 1961-62.

Record Number Vote

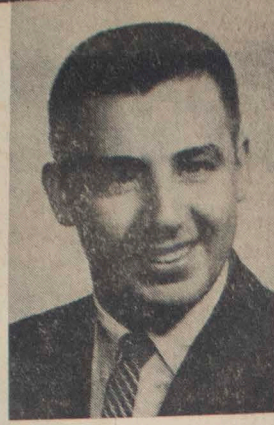
Student Council President Gary North said an all time record vote for a Student Council election was cast in this year's race. It's the first time over 1,000 voters have gone to the polls.



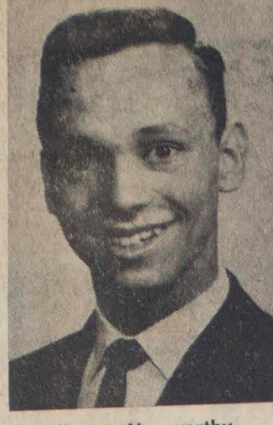

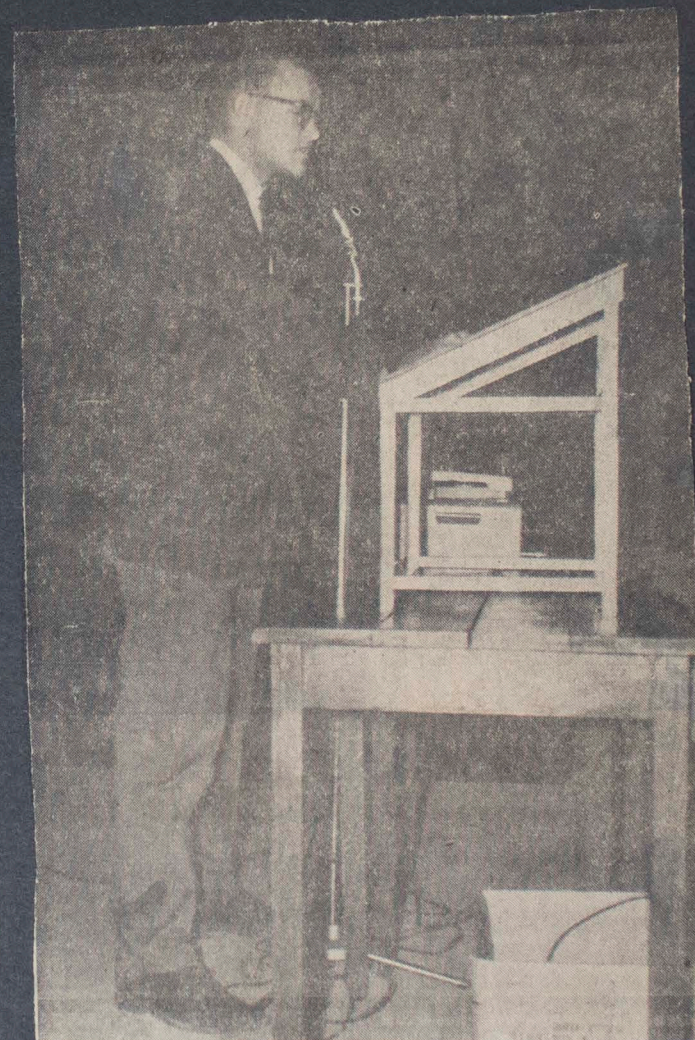
