## 1962 - STUDENT COUNCIL - 1963 Rules Concerning Absences

### I. ABSENCE ALLOWANCE

- A. There will be an allowance for three acceptable excuses per year.
- B. Two unexcused absences require a Board meeting.
- C. Four absences of any nature require a Board meeting.

### II. EXCUSES

#### A. Acceptable Excuses

- 1. Emergency - family crises, etc.
- 2. Illness - a nurse's excuse is required.
- 3. Extracurricular activities - permitted only M.S.C. is to be represented.
- 4. Night classes - professor's excuse is mandatory.

#### B. Unexcused Absences

- 1. Studying for a test on the next day
- 2. Forgetfulness
- 3. Another club meeting

#### C. Written Excuses

- 1. All excuses for absences shall be submitted to the Board Chairman, in written form, no later than the following meeting.
- 2. In the event that no written excuse is submitted to the Board Chairman, the absence will be automatically considered unexcused.

### III. BOARD OF ABSENCES

#### A. Membership shall be limited to three (3).

- 1. Chairman
- 2. Two members

#### B. Meetings shall be determined by the Board Chairman.

C. Duties of the Board

1. The Secretary of the Student Council shall submit, at the close of each meeting, a list of all absentees to the Board Chairman.
2. The Board shall have the power to determine the validity of all excuses.
3. All absences shall be reviewed by the Board and final action shall be determined by open ballot (see voting).
4. In the event that a member is found unqualified by the Board, the Board shall submit a recommendation of dismissal to the Council at large.
5. Neither the Board Chairman nor any member of the Board shall possess the authority to excuse any absence prior to the absence.

D. Voting

1. Voting shall be done by secret ballot.
2. Action shall be determined by a majority vote. (2-1).

## Student Council Sign Nearing Completion

The 88th annual Congress held its meeting last week in an attempt to appropriate billions of dollars for new government projects, while the students of MSC were wondering about the hard-earned pennies and nickels that they had contributed to a fund which was to build a sign — a structure that would tell the travelers on Route 60 that this is Morehead State College, the home of the Eagles.

Members of the Student Council, in cooperation with the MSC administration have managed to see that the agreed sign was set up.

It is a solid structure of sedimented bricks that have been formed into formidable dimensions: six feet high and approximately eight feet wide, and it has been built in front of the Fieldhouse. On the sign, which points out the location of Morehead State College, a number of aluminum letters have been placed to form the words "Morehead State College". The words will be placed in the college seal which will be

centered on the sign.

### Shrubs Around Sign

To aid to the appearance of this sign, shrubbery will be planted around it, and a floodlight will be set up in the near future so that the contents of the sign will be visible at night. According to Frank Ramsey, the Lexington designer of the sign, and Pete James, the originator of its basic floor plans, this work will be completed within the coming semester.

This remaining work constitutes but a small portion towards the total completion of this project.

Pat O'Rourke, Student Council Reporter, said, "It's been a long hard struggle, but we've finally made this sign a reality that has only been made possible through the generosity of MSC students. It is this spirit of generosity that has led the students to create a more unified college."

The sign is the first structure of its kind upon this campus that pays a tribute to the existence of Morehead State College.

# High School Letters Should Be Left At Home, Not Brought To College

In any high school across the nation the wearer of a school letter is considered a person with a little more drive and just a little more initiative than the next fellow. Perhaps, this impression is an incorrect one, however, who has the right to say that it is or isn't.

One thing is certain in connection with the letters which are worn by any athlete: he is proud of that letter. He has put in many hard hours of practice in his respective sport to earn the letter, and he has had to work hard in the classroom keeping his academic standing high so he can continue playing the sport he loves.

The same thing is true of a college athlete, in fact, even more so!

The college athlete of today must be an individual with excellent physical and mental abilities to be able to compete against the nation's best athletes and still remain academically eligible to play.

At the end of the year, if he survives the rigors of the sport and final exams, the athlete is presented with a COLLEGE letter. He has earned this letter in competition against the best athletes in the nation and has done so while under the tremendous strain of college studies.

He is an individual who has the SOLE right to wear a letter on a college campus, and he has earned that right the hard way. What the Trail Blazer wonders is why do certain individuals on the Morehead State campus refuse to allow the athletes the right to be the only ones on campus who can wear a letter.

On a college campus, a high school letter is a piece of worthless junk as far as everyone, with exception of the wearer, is concerned. No one is interested in what you achieved in high school athletically. In fact, your high school is very remote and distant to everyone, including you, for now you are in college — not high school.

However, some people have not adjusted to this fact. They still seem to believe that the letter they earned in high school is still of some importance here at Morehead. Well, while hating to shatter illusions, the fact must be stated that it is not! In fact, a great number of times the people whom you try and impress with the letter on your jacket or sweater have achieved a great deal more academically and athletically than you have.

Paul West, president of the Student Council, has already talked to the freshman class about the situation on campus where one wonders if the school letter at Morehead State College is an M or the alphabet. They have responded very well, as few high school letters have been seen on the jackets of frosh, however, the upperclassmen (who are supposed to know better) still persist in wearing their high school letters.

The Trail Blazer hopes that when the same request to cease wearing high school letters is presented to the upperclassmen their response will be as complete as was the freshmen's.

Remember, at several larger colleges and universities, the members of the letterman's clubs don't ask an individual to remove his high school

letter over once. The second time they cut the letter off the jacket, whether the individual likes it or not!

Such treatment is a little strong, however, something must be done if some few students still continue to persist in wearing these high school letters.

At present, the problem is under consideration by the Student Council at MSC. Perhaps they can come up with a workable solution, if not, individuals wearing non-Morehead letters may someday find their letter being removed politely (or impolitely) by Morehead lettermen. And, it is a lot nicer to take your own letters off and place them in a memory box or give them to your girl friend than to have them physically removed by a 230+ pound tackle.

Morehead's newest residence hall, Mignon Hall, will be opened Sunday, Feb. 24, with an open house from 1:30 to 4:00, honoring Mrs. Adron Doran.

The \$1,166,495 residence hall was named for the active wife of President Adron Doran.

Mignon Hall is a six-story semi-circular structure with automatic elevator service. There will be 75 suites consisting of a study, living room, ceramic-tile bathroom, and a bedroom for four girls.

Other features of the building include a large entrance lobby, a sun deck on the roof, a snack room, a student laundry with washers and dryers, and a one-bed-

### Regents Name

The action to name the residence hall after Mrs. Doran was taken by the college's Board of Regents after hearing petitions from the Alumni Association and the Morehead Student Council, who cited her "untiring efforts in helping build a greater Morehead State College."

"It is a great honor," commented Mrs. Doran, "to have the residence hall bear my name and I appreciate the Board's sentiments."

Mrs. Doran is an active church and civic leader. A member of the Church of Christ, she has assisted in establishing a congregation in Morehead and financing the construction of a new church building.

As chairman of the Crippled Children's Easter Seal Drive in 1962, Rowan County led the state in percentage of increase. She has served as a member of the Crippled Children's Board in Kentucky for a number of years.

Mrs. Doran has been active in women's clubs, holding varied state positions. During the past year, she received the highest honor in the Kentucky Federation

of Women's Clubs when she was the unanimous choice of Kentucky clubwomen for the presidency.

### Accomplished Musician

An accomplished musician, Mrs. Doran has played the organ for a number of years at the Kentucky State High School basketball tournament, for N.C.A.A. fans in 1958 and plays the organ for the home games of the Morehead State College Eagles.

"A broad educational background, a deep religious faith and an understanding of people combined with charm and graciousness are the factors which have proved Mrs. Doran to be a leader with perspective and purpose," is the statement issued jointly by the college Student Council and Alumni Association in their petition to the Board of Regents.

Mrs. Doran is an honorary member of Beaux Arts, Sigma Alpha Iota, Delta Kappa Gamma and the Kentucky Association of the Future Homemakers of America.

She co-sponsors the Cwens and Cosmopolitan Club on the Morehead campus.

Also aiding in student projects, Mrs. Doran is the director of the annual Better Dress Week Style Show and plays the organ during the informal modeling which is done in the cafeteria during the lunch hour throughout the week.

## Four Preps To Be Featured March 26 At Morehead State

The Morehead State College Student Council in connection with the senior, junior and sophomore classes will present the Four Preps in a concert, March 26 in the Fieldhouse at 8 p.m.

The Preps, sometimes called "the best entertaining group in the country because of their versatility and exceptional abilities as vocalists and visual performers," were contacted by the Student Council in hopes of providing more evening entertainment for Morehead students.

Paul West, president of the Student Council, stated that he hoped all students would take advantage of this opportunity to hear the nationally famous group perform.

"Also," said West, "if student participation is good, we may be able to get more nationally known groups to come to the campus."

### Began Recording In '57

The Preps began recording for Capitol in 1957 and had their first hit record, "Dreamy Eyes", the same year. However, their million-selling "26 Miles" made them national celebrities in 1958.

Other top records the Preps have put out are: "Down by the Station", "Big Surprise", "Lazy Summer Night", "Got a Girl" and "Cinderella", which they sang in the motion picture "Gidget".

In the brief career of the Four Preps, they have

appeared on Ed Sullivan's show four times, the Ernie Ford show six times, the Ozzie and Harriet show six times, and Dick Clark's show 14 times. In addition, they have played almost every major state fair in the country and all of the top night clubs, including Los Angeles' Cocoanut Grove, and Hollywood's Crescendo.

Their college appearances have taken them to every state of the union. And, recently at the University of Minnesota, University of British Columbia, University of Illinois and University of South Dakota they broke all existing attendance records.

### Started In 1955

The Preps got their start in 1955 at Hollywood High School during a talent show. They were the only boys to be on the show, however they had plenty of company as 35 girls were also on the show.

Glen Larson, spokesman of the Preps, stated, "We were terrible," but we were the only boys in school the faculty could persuade to be on the show; so we were a smash."

From that time on, the Preps have been in demand.

By mid-summer of 1961, when their smash album, "The Four Preps On Campus", became a national best-seller, the Preps had "smoothly matriculated to college and adult audiences."

## Student Council Sponsored Sign Is Completed

"Rome wasn't built in a day" and neither was the sign that stands in front of the Fieldhouse that serves as landmark telling the world that this spot of terra firma dedicated to higher learning is Morehead State College.

Last year Pat O'Rourke made a motion at the Dec. 3 meeting of the Student Council suggesting that they sponsor a sign representing the college. This started the project, but he did not expect it to take so long.

The student body donated money to construct it and it was to have been completed when students returned this fall. The students came back in one solid piece, but they found the sign was still a confusing mass of paperwork. The students forgot about the project as the semester went along, but O'Rourke didn't forget.

He remembered the delay caused the previous year by lack of funds, and went to work on getting support that could get the job done; these people were the MSC administration and the Student Council. Now the sign stands on campus, a symbol of frosh (Pat was just that when he conceived the idea) initiative and campus-wide support.

## Prepare For Talent Show

The show will be held as soon as another suitable date can be arranged and should prove to be one of the entertainment highlights of the school year.

Each year the show features outstanding student talent in the various entertainment areas and gives the student body a chance to observe the talents of their classmates. The show is an all student endeavor directed and carried out by students.

Although the date is as yet undetermined, Student Council President Paul West has issued a plea to students to begin getting their acts or specialties ready for the show. West said he hopes this year's show will be the best to date and contain a larger number of acts than have been featured in the past. Singers, dancers, comedians and other performers are requested to get in touch with a council member and inform him of their particular act.

Audition dates will soon be announced in which prospective performers will be screened for the show.

The show will be the first of two entertaining campus-wide events to be sponsored by the council. The council will present the Four Preps, a nationally known singing group, on March 26.

## Wagel, Robinson Elected To Council

Bob Wagel and Dick Robinson have been awarded positions on the Morehead State College Student Council.

Wagel has taken over the position of Historian, vacated by Ed Hussey, and Robinson has been selected as the Student Council Representative from Wilson Hall.

He has also served as president of his junior and senior classes and as a member of the Student Affairs Committee. Robinson is a past member of the Campus Club, Cosmopolitan Club, and the Junior-Senior Men's Honorary Society.

Although last Tuesday's concert didn't measure up to the highest in entertainment standards and good taste, the Student Council is certainly due a large measure of praise for their efforts in bringing the Four Preps to the Morehead State College campus. The council set an important "first" in that this marked the first time a campus student organization had undertaken a project of this magnitude.

Many students voiced dissatisfaction in the performance given by the entertainers. We feel that their program in many instances bordered on the obscene and reflected poor taste in presentation. However, several of their vocal selections did reflect their professional character and led many to feel that their dollar was well spent.

Had the program been a complete flop, as far as entertainment is concerned, it would have still held a great deal of importance. Morehead students showed they were willing to cooperate with campus organizations in a program of this kind. As student council president Paul West said, "You have shown your interest in these programs so there will be more in the future."

West reports that the council was able to meet expenses and then some, and from a

financial standpoint, the program was a success. Other campus organizations should take notice of this in the future and endeavor to sponsor other groups of national acclaim in concerts here. It has been successfully done once, so let it be done again.

The secret of the council's success seems to have been their cohesiveness. Each member was assigned 100 tickets to sell and a time to work in the ticket booth in the student house. Each member cooperated, so the program was a success. Surely some of our so-called campus "fraternal brotherhoods" could muster enough initiative to sponsor a program such as this.

Morehead State College is a growing institution, both in building and in enrollment. The Morehead student body is also "growing up" and realizing that there is something more to do than just sit around and gripe because we don't have this or that. The student council has shown that with cooperation, the student body can take the initiative and provide some things for itself. Students now realize that they can do something about having a more varied entertainment calendar.

Through the student council's action, Morehead students "helped themselves" this time. This is a trend that should continue.

### Rules Of Order

Voting and campaigning in the election will be governed by the new Rules of Order governing all campus-wide elections. These rules were adopted on Jan. 2, 1962:

✓ There shall be no campaigning in the vicinity of the election polls.

✓ No person working at the polls shall solicit votes or influence the voter.

✓ There must be written notification of all campus-wide elections in each polling place not less than one week in advance of the election.

✓ Private voting booths must be used for voting in the Student House in all campus-wide elections.

✓ The record of the candidate must indicate that he is worthy of the prospective office or honor.

✓ All persons voting must present their identification cards to the election poll workers. No person shall vote without his identification card.

✓ The counting of the votes may be public when proclaimed so by the Student Council.

✓ The Student Council shall appoint the tabulators for each election.

✓ The results of elections shall be made public immediately unless directed otherwise by the Student Council.

✓ The Student Council shall appoint individuals to collect the

ballot boxes.

✓ A student directory should be placed at each of the voting places.

✓ An Election Procedures Committee appointed by the Student Council will deal with the various and sundry problems of the elections. The committee shall consist of the following: three students, three members of the administration or faculty, and the Student Council president, or his personal appointee, as a member ex officio of this committee. A simple majority is necessary for action.

✓ In the event of disputes over elections or candidacy, the disputes will be heard by the Election Procedures Committee.

Ellena Robertson is the only candidate for the position of secretary. She is also the only co-ed running for an office in this organization.

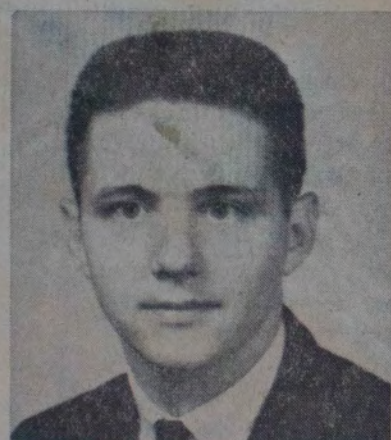
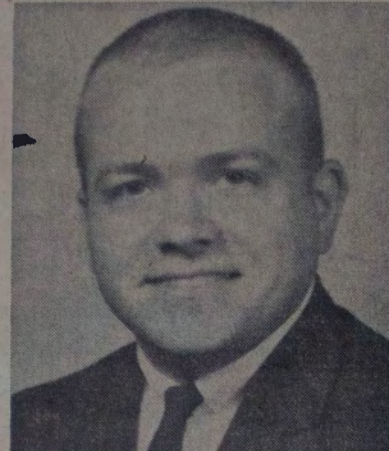
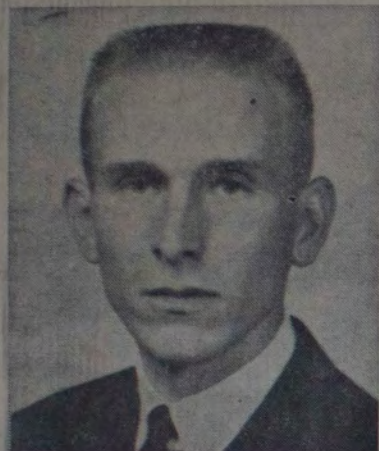
Successful candidates for treasurer were Bill Bellew and Lucas McCoy.

Nevertheless, the election is now over, and sleeping dogs can be left alone.

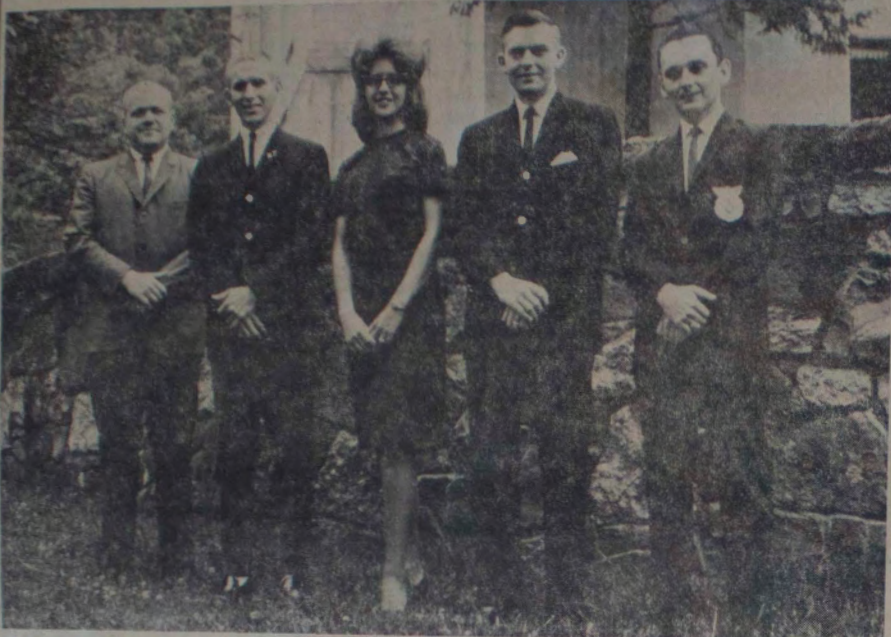
## 1962-63 Council Does Job
