The Council is following through with some of the programs initiated by last year's Student Council, who set an important "first" in bringing the Four Preps to the Morehead State College campus last year. Ron Lykins Heads 1963 Student Council

The new Student Council of Morehead State College, elected at the end of the spring semester will begin a year of leadership of the largest student body in the history of the College.

Under the guidance of President Ronnie Lykins, the Council is planning a broad program of student government for the year.

Lykins, a senior from Wamsley, Ohio, is a veteran participant in campus activities. During his past three years at MSC, Lykins has been secretary of Circle K, parliamentary officer of the Philosophy Club, secretary of the North Men's dorm council, a member

of Open Forum, Mystic club and S.N.E.A.

Last year, he was the treasurer of the Council. In addition, Lykins' is majoring in accounting and sociology.

Lykins is also active in MSC sports. He has been on the tennis team, a member of the cross-country and track teams, and has played intramural basketball.

Vice-President Crisp

Vice-president of the Council is Don Crisp, a junior from Ashland. Crisp is a history major and a member of the Mystic Club and the Cosmopolitan Club.

Ellena Rhea Robertson, from Combs, is a junior who is serving as secretary of the Council.

Lucas McCoy, McCarr, is also a member of the junior class and is treasurer of the Council. He is on the North Men's dorm council.

David Garvin, who wrote the Freshman Handbook '63-'64, is the reporter for the Council. He is a junior from West Union, Ohio.

Keeping the history of the 1963-'64 Student Council activities is Bob Wagel, a political science major, is a member of the Veterans Club and a monitor in North Men's Hall. He held this position on the Council last year.

President Lykins reassured the Freshman Class that "the Student Council wants to help make your college days the most remunerative and happy ones in your life."

He also encouraged all students to make their opinions and feelings known to the Council, so the Council can work for the students more effectively.

Student Council Publishes New Freshman Handbook

"In an effort to aid all new students entering Morehead State College this fall the Student Council presented its 1963 Freshman Handbook," said President Ron Lykins.

Lykins also said that the handbook contained factual information valuable to those unfamiliar with Morehead policies and traditions and were distributed to all new students at the beginning of orientation.

Articles and information used in the handbook were prepared by members of the Student Council and approximately 300 man-hours were required for its completion. It was published under the direction of editor Dave Garvin and Student Council President Ron Lykins.

The cover was designed by pressman Tom Erwin, who also offered technical assistance in the construction of the booklet.

Information contained in the

handbook included: freshman orientation information, a calendar of events, football and basketball schedules, and a listing of all telephone numbers on campus. Also included were articles on clothing for men and women, sports, student organizations and publications.

As a climax to publication came the problem of assembly. On the night before orientation began 1,200 handbooks were assembled and packaged by 17 volunteer workers. A task which did not end until the "wee hours" of Monday morning.

"It is hoped that the class of 1967 was saved many questions and relieved of many of its discerning problems through the use of the handbook. Suggestions are requested by the Student Council in regard to improvements which might be made in the publication of future freshman handbooks," said Garvin.

Joyce Taulbee, Berea, is a senior majoring in English. She is a member of the Honors Program and Cap and Gown.

Senior Representative

Gordon Staten, a senior Physical Education major from Ashland, is a member of Sigma Delta and is manager of the football team.

Marilyn Rigaulot, Long Island, N. Y., is a junior majoring in Elementary Education. She is a member of C A P A Tridents.

Bill Woody is a Junior from Bellbrook, Ohio, majoring in mathematics. He is a member of the Circle K Club, Philosophy Club, and Mu Phi.

Sue Hutchinson, Shelbyville, is a sophomore English major. She is active in the Literary Arts Club, B. S. U. and C W E N S. She is also secretary of the Mystic Club and a counselor in Allie Young Hall.

These representatives will meet and work in association with the Executive Committee of the Student Council to act as a channel to make the feelings of the student body known to the council.

"We feel the various classes have done an excellent job in selecting their class representatives," said Student Council President Ron Lykins.

The Editor's Desk

In the "Letter to the Editor" from Philip Sylvestro, the question of why the Council of Presidents and the majority of the social clubs voted against having the Lettermen on campus the Friday before Homecoming was raised.

Sylvestro also requested in his letter and personally that the ambiguity in the problem and the answers to "why" the Lettermen were turned down for that date be explain in the paper.

Therefore, the Trail Blazer will attempt to answer the question and explain the situation as best as possible.

First, there was a lack of communication between the Student Council members. President Ron Lykins had worked with Dean of Students Roger L. Wilson on a presentation and was prepared to speak to the Council.

As it turned out at the meeting, Vice-President Don Crisp appeared and presented the recommendation to the Council of Presidents. President Lykins did NOT even know that Crisp was going to be present. For some reason, HE had not been informed.

Second, the impression among the students seems to be that this is the only time the Lettermen will be able to come to Morehead State College.

It isn't, and the Council of Presidents knew this. The opinion was that it would be better to bring them at a later date. (This will be discussed in greater detail later in the story.)

Third, at the end of the meeting, President Lykins made the request that if the Student Council and the sophomore, junior and senior classes would sponsor the group, would they be allowed to present them and have the date, Oct. 11, put aside for that purpose.

The Council of Presidents complied with this request, leaving it up to the Student Council and the class presidents to use their discretion as to whether to bring the Lettermen to campus at this date or not.

President Lykins has now announced that they have decided against bringing the group on campus at that time, but they will bring them in November.

November is a "slack" season for sports, and the Trail Blazer feels that this will be an excellent time for the Lettermen to appear. The paper also feels that President Lykins and the class presidents made a wise decision in postponing the appearance of the Lettermen until this time.

Fourth, several members of the Council of Presidents were under the impression that the program was only going to be an hour long.

They felt that this was too short a show and that the \$1,750 requested by the Lettermen for the performance was too much for what was expected.

Fifth, as far as the mention of the \$25 from each club goes, it was mentioned, but that was all. This was never made a major point in the discussion.

And, the actual amount of money was never stated. Twenty-five dollars was mentioned, but the understanding was that the clubs would pay the difference if the \$1,750 goal was not obtained.

Sixth, the council felt that enough support for this could not be found on campus at such a late date. There were too many people who had made previous plans for the evening. They also felt that too many people would be working on Homecoming to be able to attend the concert.

There were other reasons presented, but these are the foremost. The Trail Blazer feels that this was the best thing to do at the time. However, if such a concert is desired prior to Homecoming 1964 (and many students feel this way), now is the time to begin planning, not the week before Homecoming.

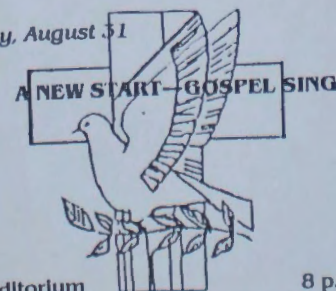

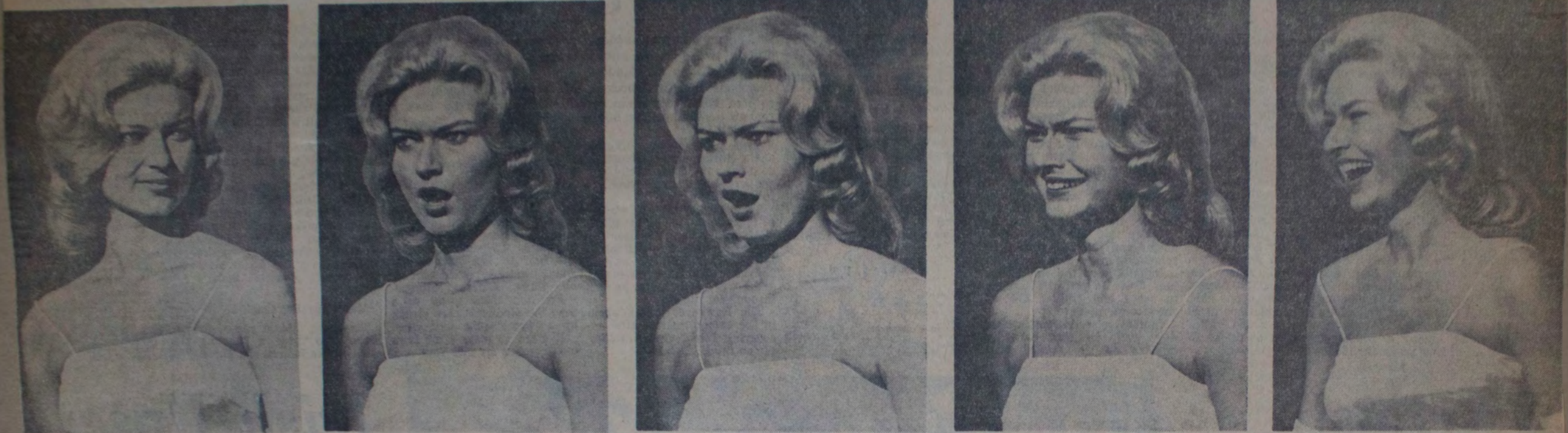

Thirty-Three Will Be Elected As Who's Who Representatives

Nationwide recognition will be conferred upon thirty-three seniors and graduate students of Morehead State College as their fellow seniors and graduate students will elect them to "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges", a yearly publication which contains the achievements of prominent students from the outstanding institutions of higher learning that are located throughout the United States today.

These persons will earn their positions of prominence upon the basis of their academic achievements, participation in extracurricular activities, citizenship, character, and future promise.

Each of the approximately sixty-odd candidates who were nominated have an abundance of these qualifications, and their immediate

promise for prominence lies in the voting wisdom of their fellow classmates.

Each club on campus that is recognized by the Council of Presidents and the Student Council had the right to nominate two candidates to be placed on the final ballots.

These clubs have made their selections, and the final voting will take place in the Doran Student House on Tuesday, Nov. 19.

The votes will be tabulated by the non-senior executive committee of the Student Council. The Student Council is the supporter of the Who's Who program, at Morehead, and through the use of the executive committee, they will complete this project by maintaining a voting booth and tabulating the results of the election.

Members of the Executive Council

who will tabulate the votes are: Don Crisp, vice president; Ellena Robertson, secretary; Bob Wagel, historian; Lucas McCoy, treasurer and David Garvin, reporter.

Student Council sponsors, Dean Roger L. Wilson and Dean Earlyne Saunders, will also be present at the voting and will aid the executive council in counting the votes.

Each senior and graduate student who votes will be allowed to select thirty-one names from the list of eligible students. The reason that they will not be allowed to select thirty-three names is that if they did select thirty-three names and there was a tie, it would be impossible to break the tie without holding another election.

Fifteen Morehead State College students were elected to four College standing advisory committees December 12, 1963.

Those elected were:

Library Committee — Donna Root (Jr.), Roberta McCline (Jr.) and Laradean Kohls (Sr.);

Athletic Committee—Tom Cooper (Soph.) and Larry Maynard (Jr.);

Student Affairs Committee — Lucas McCoy (Jr.), Ron Lykins (Sr.), Marilyn Rigoulot (Jr.), Polly Tucker (Sr.) and June Martin (Sr.);

Curriculum Committee — Ron Lykins, Sue Hutchinson (Soph.), Roger Dixon (Sr.), Ron Griffith (Sr.) and Sandra Howell West (Sr.).

Library Committee

The Library Committee consists of nine members including the chairman who is designated by the President, the Librarian, four faculty members, and three students.

The committee is responsible for policies concerning the operation of the library and its services; for recommendations regarding the library budget; and for allocation of the budget to departments of the library. In general, this committee assumes responsibility for continuous improvements of li-

brary services.

Nomination sheets have been mailed to all active alumni who are encouraged to nominate a member of the faculty for the award. The nominations must be returned to the Director of Alumni Affairs by March 1, 1964.

The Committee on Athletics is composed of nine members including the Dean of the College, the Registrar, the Director of Athletics, the Business Manager and the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, two faculty members and two students.

The committee has general supervision over the intercollegiate athletic program, including standard policy making and approval of athletic scholarships, intercollegiate athletic schedules, athletic awards, price of admission to and supervision of athletic events, the proposing of athletic events and the selecting of a voting delegate to the Ohio Valley Conference and the National Athletic Association.

The Committee on Student Affairs is composed of the Dean of Students, Associate Dean of Students, Director of Student Housing, Director of the Doran Student House, five faculty members and six students. This committee is responsible for planning and coordinating the student activities on campus.

It plans and supervises student activities and the over-all social program and is responsible for activities which are related to the moral and spiritual life of students. It also studies and evaluates the physical conditions of the college relating to the health, safety and well-being of the students and makes recommendations concerning such matters to the proper authorities.

Members of the Committee on Curriculum and Instruction include the Dean of the College, the chairman of the Division of Professional Education, fourteen faculty members and five students.

The committee is responsible for a continuous review and evaluation of all curricula and instructional practices in the college and training school; approval of new courses; consideration of program development; supervision of research designed to improve both on-campus and off-campus instruction as well as matters which affect the instructional program of the college.

Student members of these committees serve as representatives of the student body and meet with members of the faculty and administration to present a student viewpoint concerning the problems faced by the committees.

No Organization Should Be Allowed To Exist Outside Of Regulations

In the last issue of the Trail Blazer, we quoted Phyllis McGinley as saying that praise is an earned thing and not a free gift. Therefore, in accord with this policy, we wish to praise the action of the Student Council and the Circle K Club of Morehead State College for their recent action.

They plan to donate the proceeds of a dance held Oct. 26 — \$85.25 — to the United Community Fund. This transaction is beyond reproach. No one can find fault with donating money to a worthy cause.

For this, the Student Council and the Circle K are to be commended. However, the means by which they attained the money is not to be commended.

The Council of Presidents, on October 1, passed a new set of regulations governing campus dances. These rules were designed by the Morehead State College Student Life Committee as recommendations and were approved, with one addition. The addition was that no informal, semi-formal or formal dances were to be held the week prior to or of the week of a scheduled formal dance.

On November 2, exactly one week after the Student Council dance, the Morehead Players held a scheduled formal dance!

We can find no fault with holding a dance to raise money for a worthy cause; however, we can find fault with this direct violation of the dance rules as established by the Council of Presidents.

The dance rules were well known by the Student Council president, vice president and the Dean of Students. They were also known by the president of the Circle K. All of these people were at the last meeting of the Council of Presidents when the rules were passed.

Only One Problem

There is only one problem with the above argument: It is invalid because the Student Life Committee gave the Dean of Students the right to approve dances, sponsored by the Student Council, at any time he deems proper.

What then is the purpose of the Council of Presidents and the new set of dance regulations?

One of the primary functions of the Council of Presidents is to award calendar dates to various campus organizations eligible, under the new regulations, to hold dances. The Council was designed to do this to help avoid conflicts, and to work out other problems that might arise during the school year, which could not be solved except through a cooperative effort on the part of all of the clubs.

If, as happened in the past, every organization which so desired could hold dances or other social functions at any time they desired, innumerable conflicts would result.

An "Unwritten Agreement"

Yet, under the "unwritten agreement" between the Student Council, the Dean of Students and the Student Life Committee, the Student Council was able to hold a dance without being required to gain permission from the Council of Presidents. In fact, according to the "unwritten agreement," there is no real need for the Student Council to even at-

tend the Council of Presidents' meetings or be a member, other than to hear the views of the various club presidents, because they can do what they want when they want and where they want, regardless of any rulings by the Council of Presidents.

This dance — an open breach of the regulations — threw the recently-passed rules governing campus dances back in the face of the Council of Presidents and dared them to do something about it.

The problem would not have been so bad, if the Council of Presidents had even been informed of the "unwritten agreement" while they were passing the rules or after the rules were passed. However, they were not. For many of the members, this editorial will be their first source of information relating to any such agreement.

The motto of the Commonwealth of Kentucky is "United we stand; Divided we fall." This often-quoted axiom is true the world over, which definitely includes Morehead State College.

Therefore, why do the Student Council and the Circle K (which was asked to help with the dance by the Student Council) seem to feel that they can continue to stand in respect with the rest of the members of the Council of Presidents when they, especially the Student Council, remain outside the united group and are outside the regulations passed by the Council of Presidents?

The Real Question

The fact that a dance was held and the money donated to a charitable organization is of little consequence in respect to the real question at hand — should any group be allowed to openly violate the rules and regulations established by the Council of Presidents?

In the Trail Blazer's evaluation of the situation, it is felt that no fault can be found with the purpose of (1) striving to provide weekend entertainment for the students and (2) giving the proceeds to any charitable organization. However, also in our evaluation, it is a deplorable thing when any organization is allowed to exist outside the established regulations as passed by the Council of Presidents.

If any organization is allowed to violate campus regulations, then there is no valid reason why other organizations should not be allowed to do the same thing.

As the situation exists, the dance regulations are useless. Granted there should be arrangements made to provide for entertainment when nothing is happening on campus, but (1) must it ALWAYS be dances, (2) if it must be dances, then the regulations should be amended to provide for this and (3) when changes are made or regulations are designed, everyone should be informed of the change.

Something must be done, for such seemingly flagrant rule violations must not be allowed to exist or there will be no real need for any governing bodies at Morehead State College — we will all just take our marbles and go our separate ways.

Let's Begin Thinking Now About The Coming Student Elections

Winston S. Churchill once said, "... much depends on the personality of the sovereign." We would like to paraphrase Mr. Churchill and say that much depends on the "personality" of a college's Student Council and cheerleaders.

In saying this, we are not trying to criticize our present council or cheerleaders. But, we are trying to call attention to the fact that now is the time for the student body to begin thinking about the coming student elections.

Last year we called the elections (for both groups) a farce. We still hold to that view and will call any election similar to them a complete and utter farce.

For the freshmen and other students who were not here last spring, we will try and explain our reasons for this.

✓ We felt that student interest at the time was at an all-time low.

✓ In the Student Council race, only two candidates signed to run for the office of president, thereby obtaining a free pass to the finals. Out of a student body of almost 3,000, surely there were more than two qualified candidates for such an important office as this.

✓ In the race for the secretary and historian posts, only one person showed enough initiative to sign to run in each case. These people were not elected. They just walked in and took over the positions with no opposition. (Once again, we are not criticizing the current historian or secretary but are just pointing out a simple, pathetic fact).

✓ The cheerleader elections were as bad, if not worse. Only eight candidates for the five cheerleader positions turned out. EIGHT — it's pitiful. Of all the positions

held on any college campus, the cheerleaders group. They are in the public eye from the beginning of football season and school until the end of the year. They must be the best a school can offer.

We could continue with this, but these examples will serve to make the point. The Trail Blazer would hate, as we are certain the rest of the campus would, to see such a situation develop again.

There are many students with leadership ability on the Morehead State College campus. There are many students with ambition on the campus, or they wouldn't be here. There are students with the mental capacity to handle leadership positions — the tremendous number on the Dean's List proves this (504 — and we aren't trying to say that only these students are qualified).

Now is the time for all students to begin thinking about the coming elections. Tell the people you think are qualified — people you would want to represent you — to think about running. And, if you are qualified, consider trying for a position.

As for the Student Council, we would like to suggest that they get the publicity out in plenty of time to get the students know when they may sign to run for office. And, that they consider talking to the people who are not on the council, but would be good members.

As repetitious as this sounds, we want to repeat that we are not criticizing our cheerleaders or Student Council. We are merely attempting to point out — far in advance — a situation that needs the attention of the entire student body.

We do not want a repetition of last year's "farce."

Ruling Passed On Proper Dress Is An Excellent One

Better dress habits have long been advocated at Morehead State College by The Trail Blazer, the Student Council and other groups.

Recently, the Student Council took another step to help further the concept of better dress at Morehead. At their February 27 meeting, the Council voted to require all college men to wear shoes, socks, trousers and, if possible, ties for Sunday dinner in the cafeteria of the Doran Student House.

A regulation was passed in the long, long ago that girls would be required to wear appropriate attire (dresses, etc.) in the cafeteria on Sunday. But, such a ruling has long been lacking in regard to boys' clothing.

It has now been put into effect. And, the paper staff agrees with the Council, which stated that tongs, sweatshirts, football jerseys, short pants of any type and the absence of socks are inappropriate dress in the cafeteria on Sunday.

For such a campus function, and many others, semi-formal attire is called for. Yet, such costumes as football jerseys, parkas and sweatshirts were worn.

Words fail us at this moment. Just let it be said that such attire is not proper in any sense of the word.

For those many Morehead Students who do observe proper dress habits, keep up the good work. For those who don't, let's try to change for the better.

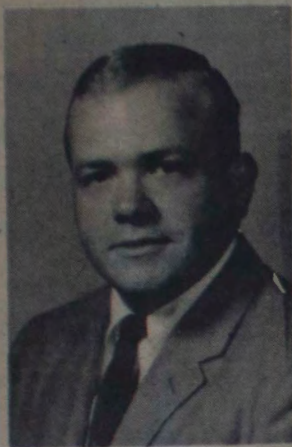

Student Council Election Dates Are Scheduled

The primary election for the 1964-65 Student Council will be held on May 6. The final election will be held on May 12.

Candidates for office must file in the Dean of Students Office in the Administration Building by 4:00 p.m. on April 27. No student will be allowed to run for office if he has not filed by this date.

To be eligible for a Student Council office, a student must be a full-time student, in good standing with the college and a resident at the college.

This year the candidates for the office of president, who must have served at least one previous term on the Council, will be required to take a test on parliamentary procedure. To be able to run for office, they must make a minimum score of 70.

The test will be administered by Dean Roger L. Wilson and Student Council President Ronnie Lykins in Dean Wilson's Office after the final filing date.

Rules Of Order

Voting and campaigning in the election will be governed by the Rules of Order governing all campus-wide elections. These rules were adopted on Jan. 2, 1962:

- There shall be no campaigning in the vicinity of the election polls.

- No person working at the polls shall solicit votes or influence the voter.

- There must be written notification of all campus-wide elections in each polling place not less than one week in advance of the election.

- Private voting booths must be used for voting in the Student House in all campus-wide elections.

- The record of the candidate must indicate that he is worthy of the prospective office or honor.

- All persons voting must present their identification cards to the election poll workers. No person shall vote without his identification card.

- The counting of the votes may be public when proclaimed so by the Student Council.

- The Student Council shall appoint the tabulators for each election.

- The results of elections shall be made public immediately unless directed otherwise by the Student Council.

- The Student Council shall appoint individuals to collect the ballot boxes.

- A student directory should be placed at each of the voting places.

- An Election Procedures Committee appointed by the Student Council will deal with the various and sundry problems of the elections. The committee shall consist of the following: three students, three members of the administration or faculty, and the Student Council president, or his personal appointee, as a member ex officio of this committee. A simple majority is necessary for action.

- In the event of disputes over elections or candidacy, the disputes will be heard by the Election Procedures Committee.
