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In a Nutshell

- Headcount enrollment in Fall 2007 was 9,066, up 41 (<1%) from Fall 2006 (9,025).
- First-time freshman headcount was 1,409, an approximate 8% increase from Fall 2006 freshman enrollment (1,306).
- Seventy-six percent of undergraduates (5,771 of 7,619) enrolled full-time compared to 24% of graduate students (348 of 1,447), the majority of which were enrolled part-time.
- Women outnumbered men at the University, accounting for 61% of undergraduates, 66% of graduate enrollment, or 62% of enrollment overall.
- The mean age of undergraduates was 24 years (minimum 15 years, maximum 76 years) compared to 33 years for graduate students (minimum 21 years, maximum 78 years).
- Eighty-five percent (7,745 of 9,066) of enrollees were Kentuckians; 65% (5,915) originated from MSU's 22-county Service Region.
- Minorities (including international students) represented 5% of University enrollment overall.
- MSU conferred 1,608 first degrees in 2006-2007; 128 Associate, 1,072 Bachelor, and 408 Master/Specialist. An additional 21 second degrees were conferred in 2006-2007; 17 Bachelor and 4 Master/Specialist.
- Residence halls housed 2,350 students in Fall 2007.
- Approximately 67% of MSU's alumni reside in Kentucky.
- MSU's 379 full-time and 137 part-time faculty taught 2,428 courses in Fall 2007.
- In addition to faculty, MSU employed 761 full-time and 289 part-time staff (including 125 graduate assistants).
- The University's opening budget for 2007-2008 was \$119 million.

University Overview for Fall 2007

Meeting the educational needs of East Kentucky while striving to constantly improve the quality of its public service, economic development and applied research programs are the primary objectives of Morehead State University.

Historically, the University traces its lineage to the Morehead Normal School, which opened its doors in 1887. The private school closed in the spring of 1922 when the Kentucky General Assembly established Morehead State Normal School. The state institution accepted its first students in the fall of 1923 and graduated its first class in 1927. Name changes occurred in 1926 when "and Teachers College" was added, again in 1930 when it was shortened to Morehead State Teachers College, again in 1948 when "Teachers" was dropped and, finally, to university status in 1966. Thirteen men, starting with Frank C. Button, have served as president. Dr. Wayne D. Andrews assumed office as the 13th president on Jan. 1, 2005.

Academically, the University offers 70 undergraduate degree programs, including 10 associate level degrees and 13 pre-professional programs, in four colleges -- Business, Education, Humanities, and Science and Technology -- and 20 academic departments. There are 51 graduate degree programs plus 24 graduate level non-degree programs designed especially for professional educators. The education specialist in 5 specialty areas is also offered. A master's degree for physician assistants, social workers and a cooperative doctoral program, all with the University of Kentucky, are available on the MSU campus.

Classes are conducted in Ashland, Jackson, Maysville, Mt. Sterling, Pikeville, Prestonsburg, West Liberty and other locations. Regional campuses -- located in Ashland, Jackson, Mt. Sterling, Prestonsburg and West Liberty--are staffed with full-time directors. Additionally, the University offers a number of distance learning courses throughout the region via the Internet and interactive compressed video. Sixty-seven percent of MSU's 379 full-time faculty members hold doctoral degrees.

Physically, the University is located in the foothills of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Rowan County. The nearly 500-acre main campus within the city limits of Morehead includes more than 50 major structures with a total replacement value of more than \$144 million. Beyond the city, the University's real estate holdings include the 320-acre Derrickson Agricultural complex and Eagle Trace, a par 72, 6,902-yard public golf course. The instructional plant includes 120 classrooms and 112 laboratories. Housing facilities include space for approximately 2,600 students in a variety of housing styles including traditional residence halls, suites and apartments.

Fiscally, the University currently operates on an annual budget of \$119 million with \$49.3 million provided by the state and \$47.9 million coming from tuition and fees. Additionally, grants and contracts from external sources for research, service and academic/student support projects generate more than \$15 million each year. Annual private donations to the University, through the MSU Foundation, Inc., average \$3 million annually.

Statistically, the University has awarded more than 50,000 degrees and currently has more than 1,100 full-time employees. Enrollment for Fall 2007 was 9,066, with the student body representing 107 Kentucky counties, 46 states and 35 foreign countries. The University attracts more than 50,000 visitors annually and its economic impact, directly and indirectly, on the Morehead area is estimated at more than \$80 million yearly.

Administratively, an 11-member Board of Regents governs the University with eight citizens appointed by the governor and three seats held by elected faculty, staff and student representatives. Management of the institution is vested primarily in six divisions -- Academic Affairs; Administration and Fiscal Services; Development; Planning, Budgets, and Technology; Student Life; University Relations -- with each headed by a vice president.

Athletically, the University sponsors 16 intercollegiate sports for men and women in accordance with the regulations of the Ohio Valley Conference, the Pioneer Football League and Division I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. MSU also supports an intramural program involving more than 25 team and individual sports.

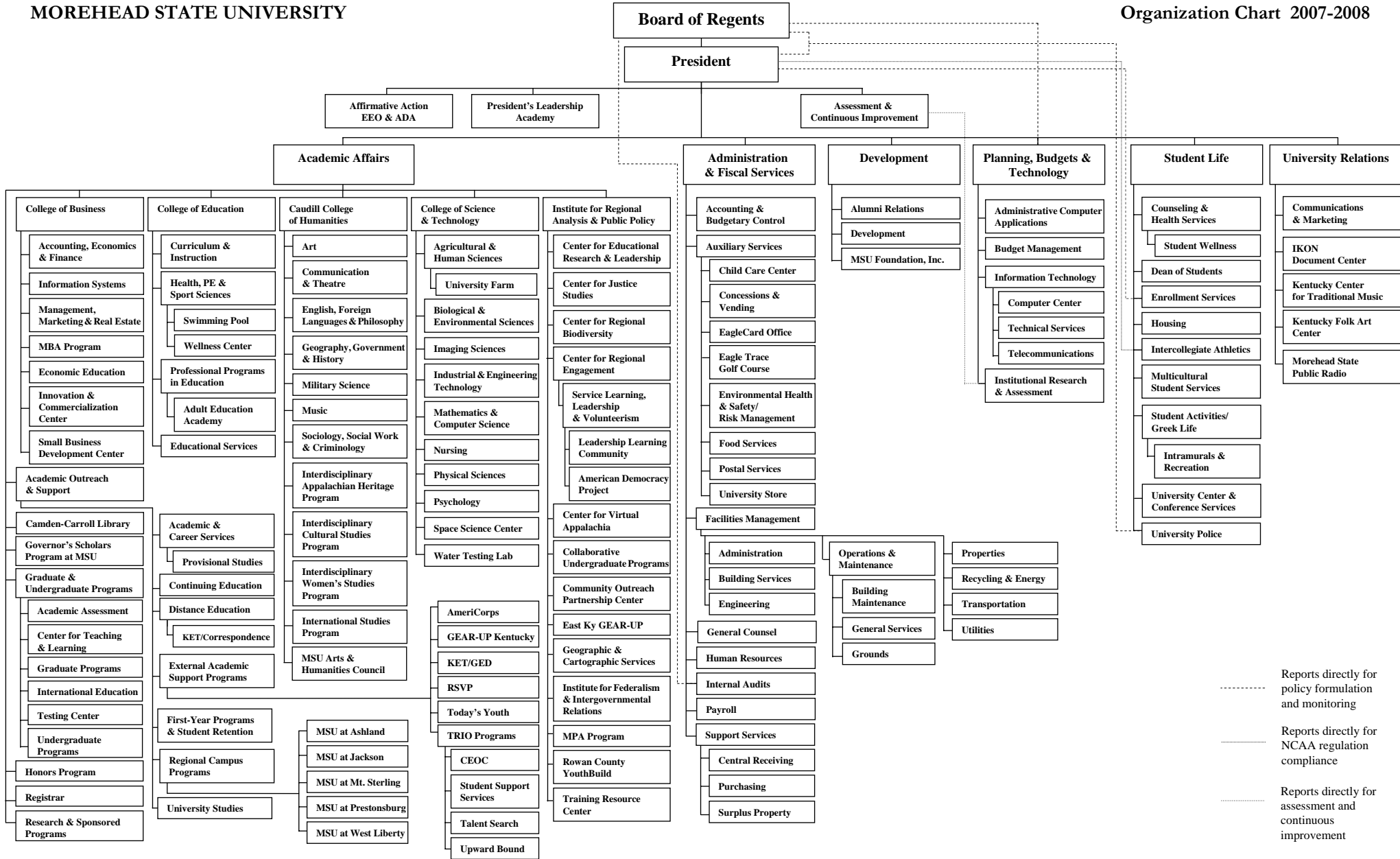

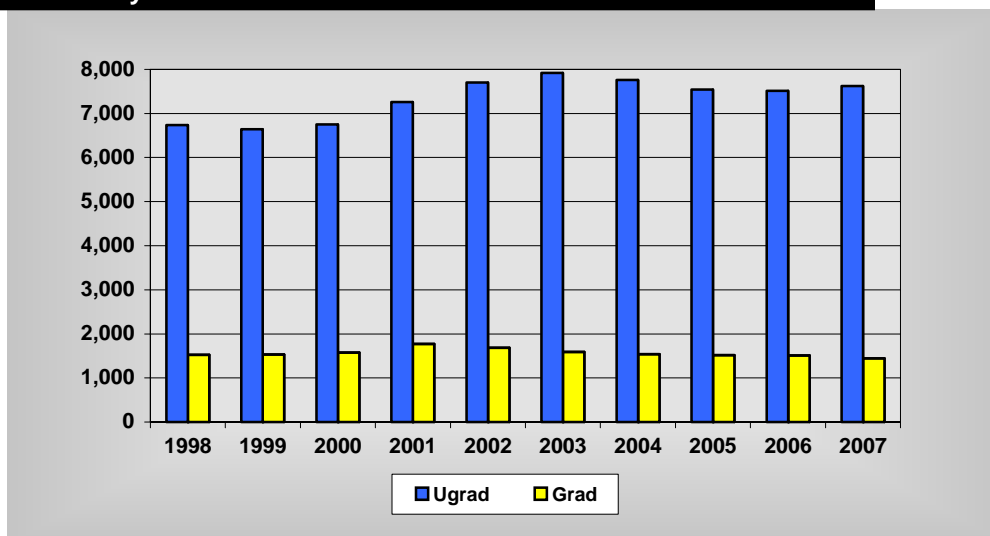

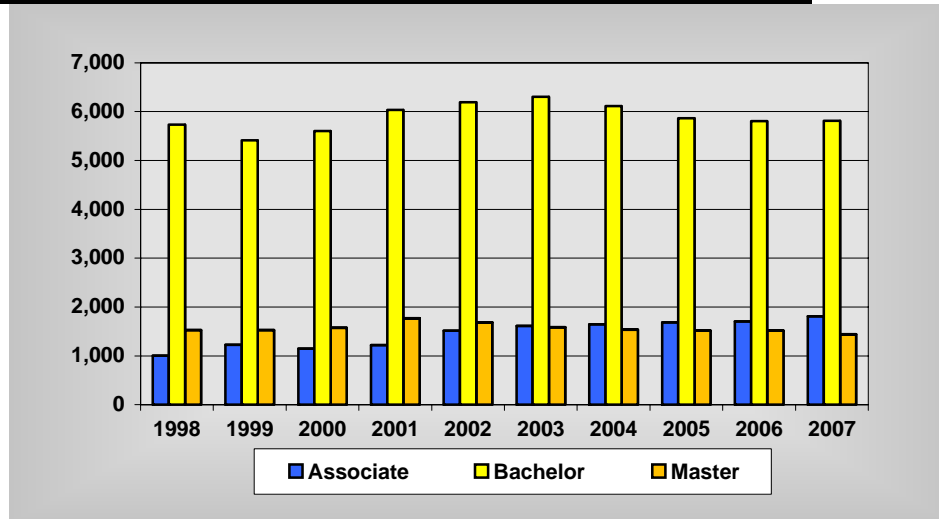
*Prior to 2006, the Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) calculation of full-time equivalent (FTE) for undergraduates was $FTE = (\text{total undergraduate credit hours})/16$ and for graduates was $FTE = (\text{total graduate credit hours})/12$. For the 2006-2007 academic year, the CPE calculation of FTE for both undergraduates and graduates was $FTE = (\text{total full-time students}) + 1/3 (\text{total part-time students})$. Beginning in Fall 2007, the CPE calculation of FTE is as follows: Undergraduate FTE = $(\text{total student credit hours})/15$; Graduate FTE = $(\text{total student credit hours})/12$.

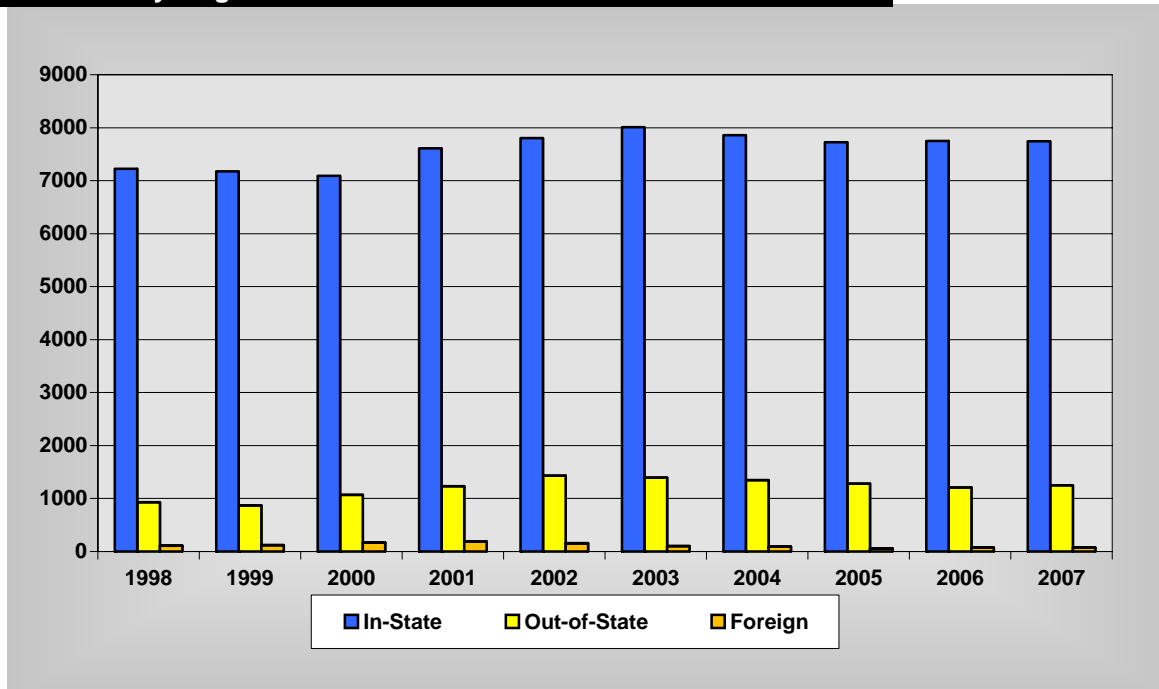

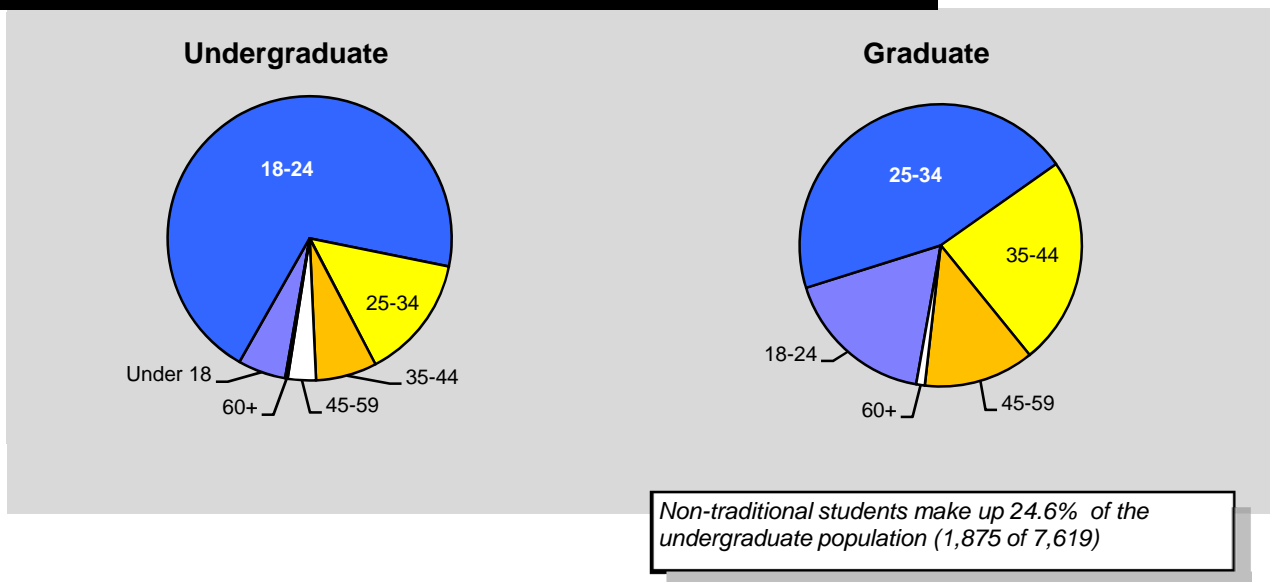

Enrollment by Age and Level



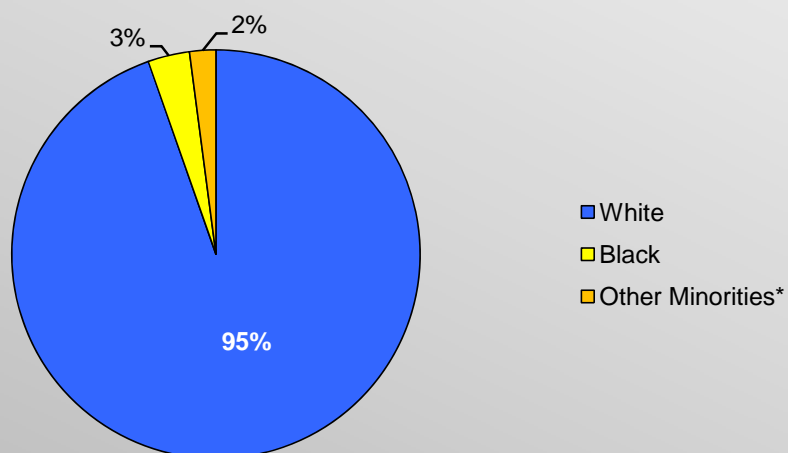

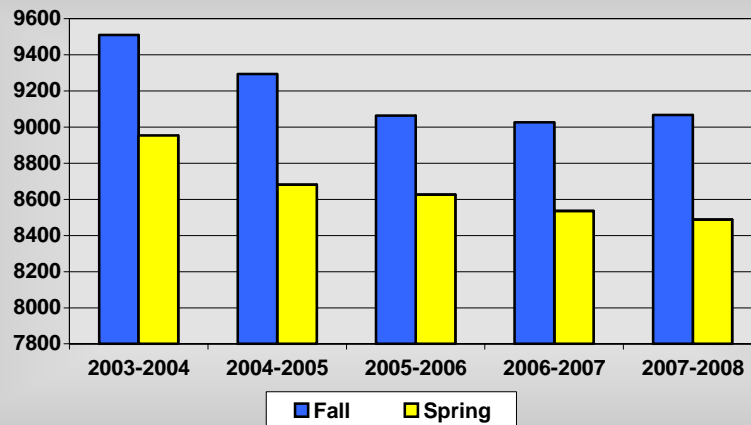

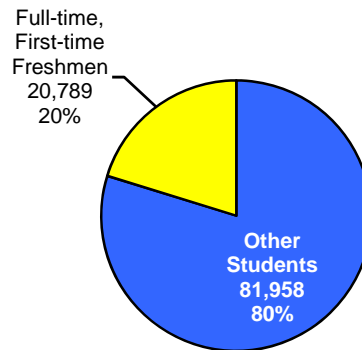
Highlights: First-Time Freshmen Fall 2007

Ninety-seven percent (1,373 of 1,409) of Fall 2007 first-time freshmen were full-time students. This group accounted for about 20% (20,789) of the University's total credit hour production (102,747). In order of degree intent, 1,139 (81%) were baccalaureate seekers followed by 270 (19%) associate seekers.

Headcount

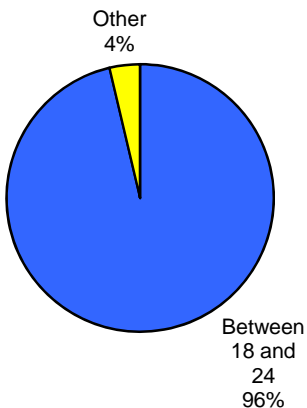

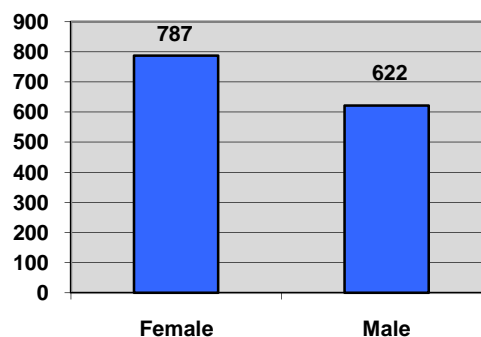


The majority (1,357 or 96%) of MSU Fall 2007 first-time freshmen were of "traditional" age, that is, between 18 and 24 years of age, and more than half (56%) were female. About 94% (1,327) were white, whereas blacks accounted for 71% (58 of 82) of non-whites and about 4% of Fall 2007 first-time freshmen enrollment overall.

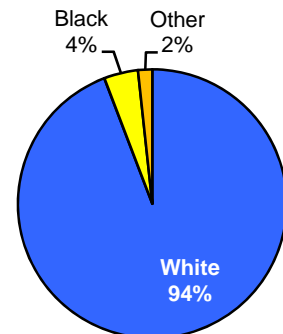

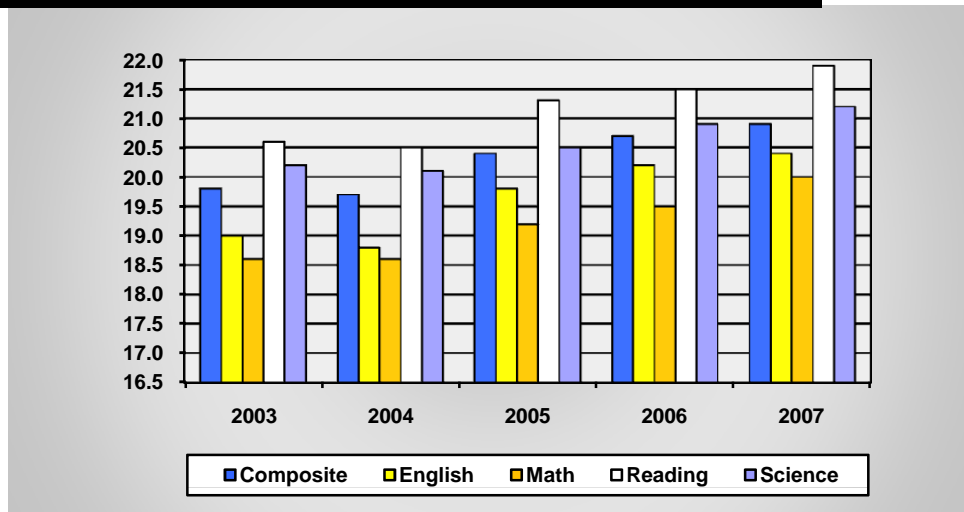

In Fall 2007, 81% (1,139) of first-time freshmen were seeking a bachelor's degree and 19% (270) were enrolled in associate level programs. 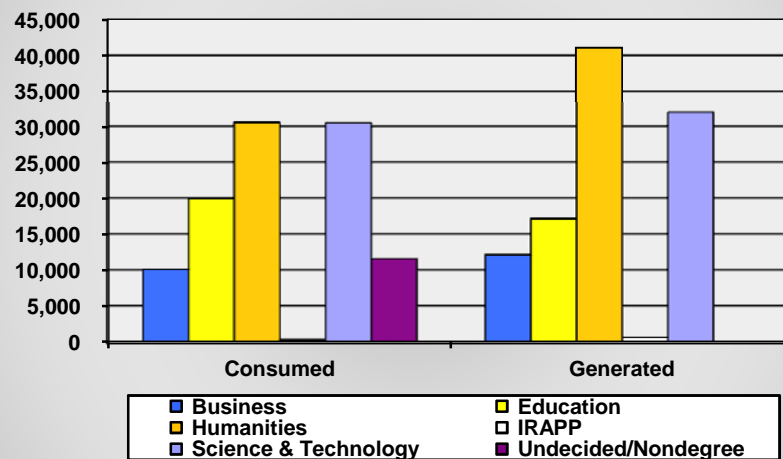

Credit Hours - "Consumed" and "Generated"

The difference between credit hours "consumed" by majors within a given college and credit hours "generated" by faculty teaching within a given college characterize that college's general academic service profile. For example, Education majors consumed 19,940 credit hours in Fall 2007 whereas Education faculty taught classes which generated 17,110 credit hours during the same semester. The number of credit hours consumed by Education majors in excess of credit hours generated by Education faculty characterizes the College of Education as an academic service "consumer" in Fall 2007. As expected, the College of Humanities generated the most course credit hours overall as well as the most credit hours in excess of majors' credit hours.

In order to obtain a general program area overview of enrollments, the Council on Postsecondary Education prepares trend tables displaying comparative fall enrollments by CIP (Classification of Instructional Programs) Area. That is, the 6-digit CIP codes for specific program majors are collapsed to 2-digit codes and enrollments in all majors beginning with the 2-digits are summed. For example, under CIP code 13 (Education), enrollments in 16 specific program major codes have been summed showing MSU's Fall 2007 enrollment in Education programs to be 1,657. The technique allows for quick overview of predominate areas of enrollment at MSU (as in this table) and for other institutions across the Commonwealth and Nation.

Distance Learning Courses Fall 2007

The Council on Postsecondary Education classifies distance learning courses by Provider Category (Institutional, KYVU) and by Primary Learning Mode of Delivery ("B" Internet/World Wide Web, "C" Interactive Video, "F" KET Telecast.)

In Fall 2007, Morehead State University reported 4,251 distance learning courses. The following table shows that for those 425 courses, the predominant modes of delivery were Interactive Video (211 courses) and Internet (208 courses). The remaining 6 courses were KET originated. Other sections of the table display total course enrollments and student credit hours generated by all distance learning courses in Fall 2007. In summary, distance learning courses accounted for about 13% of course enrollments (4,961 of 39,098) and 14% of student credit hours generated (14,376 of 102,747) overall.

For comparative purposes, Morehead State University's ACT Composite cut-off score for unconditional freshman admission in Fall 2006 was 14 with an Admissions Index (AI) of at least 400 (AI=high school GPA x 100), whereas the average ACT Composite score for MSU's Fall 2007 first-time freshmen was 20.9. In terms of institutional admissions selectivity, an average ACT Composite score of 20 would place MSU somewhere between Open (ACT 17-20) and Traditional (ACT 20-23) selectivity with retention rates between about 65.7% and 70.2%. MSU's Fall 2006 first-time freshman retention to Fall 2007 was 64.8%, slightly below the average Open selectivity institutions offering Bachelors and Masters degrees.

Morehead State University's comparative 3, 4, 5 and 6 year graduation rates table for various 2001-2002 degree-seeking cohorts indicates that about 33.5% of 2001-2002 baccalaureate seekers obtained bachelor degrees within 5 years. That finding is consistent with the American College Testing Program's Persistence-to-Degree Rates for Four-year Public Colleges by admission selectivity shown above illustrating public institutions offering Bachelors and Masters degrees with admissions selectivity somewhere between Open and Traditional reported 5-year graduation rates (31.9% and 35.8%, respectively).

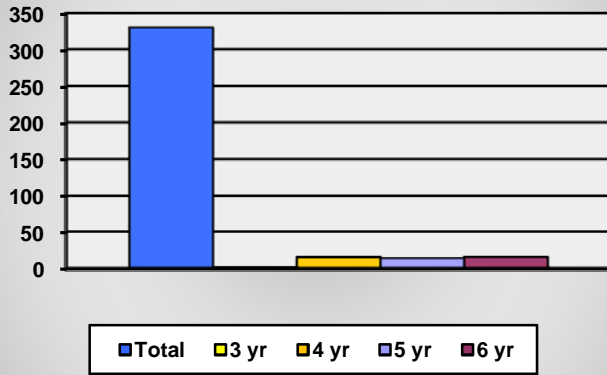

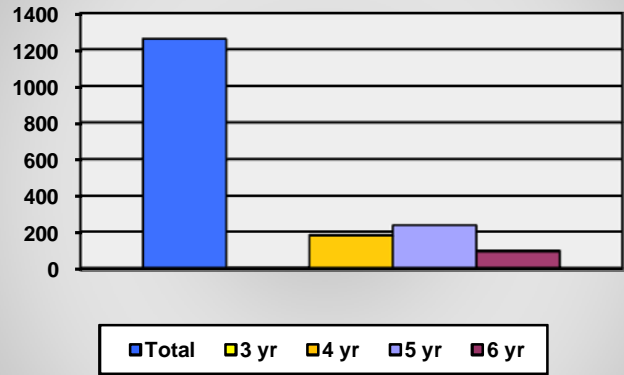

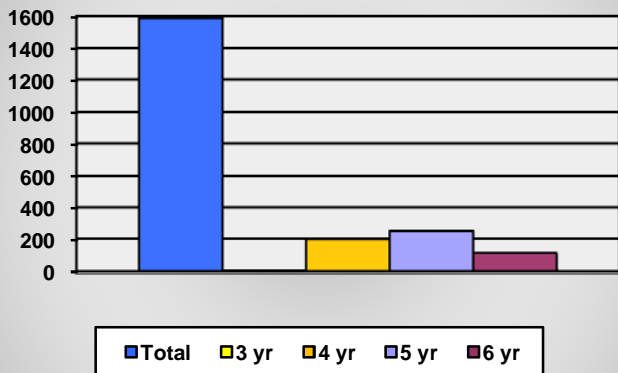

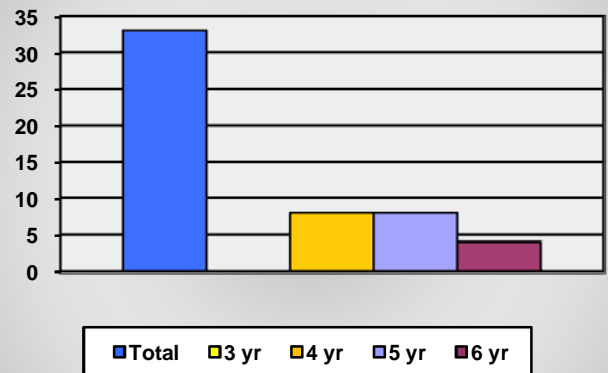

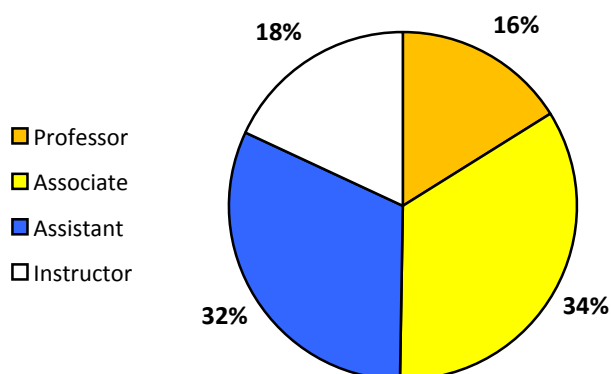

Five-Year Trends Instructional Faculty by Status, College, and Department 2003-2007

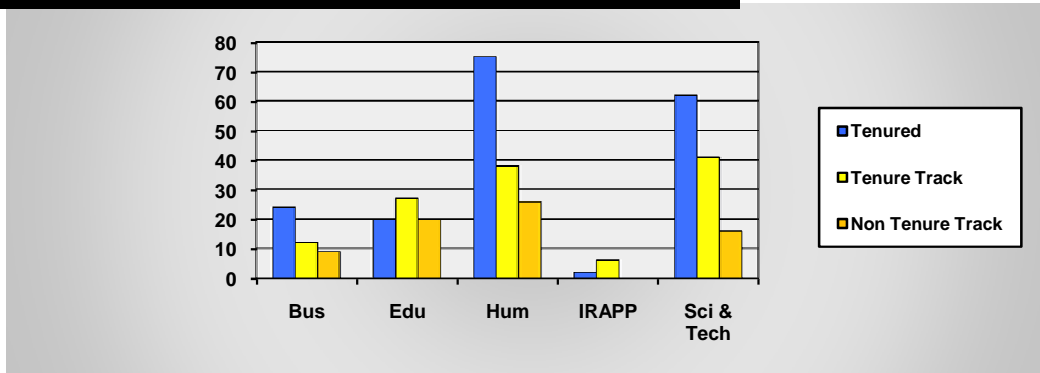

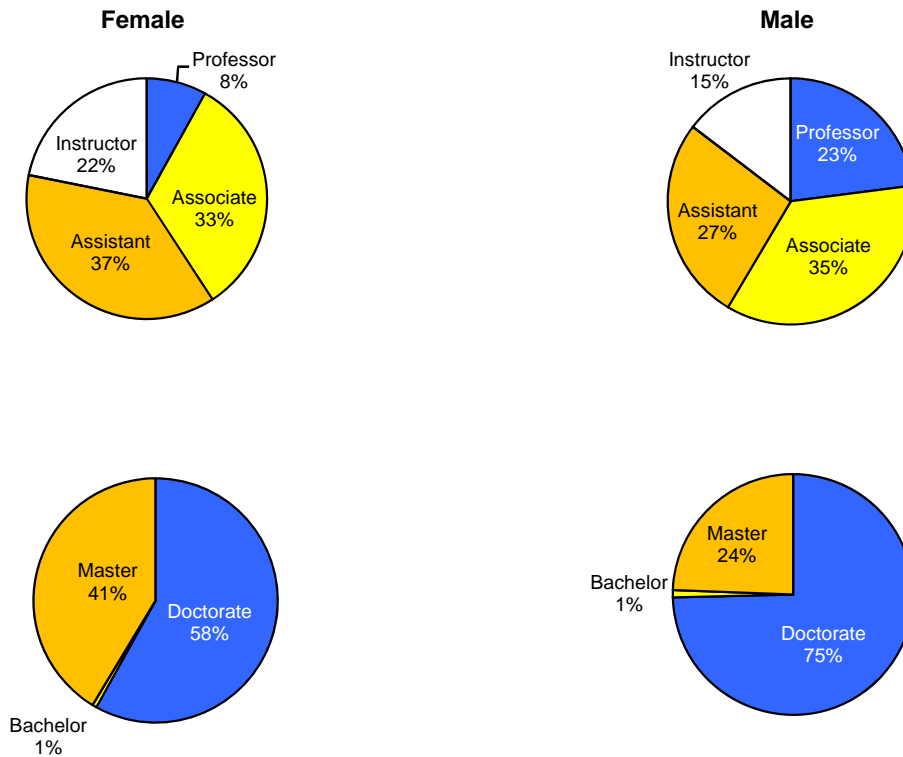

Full-time Faculty by Sex



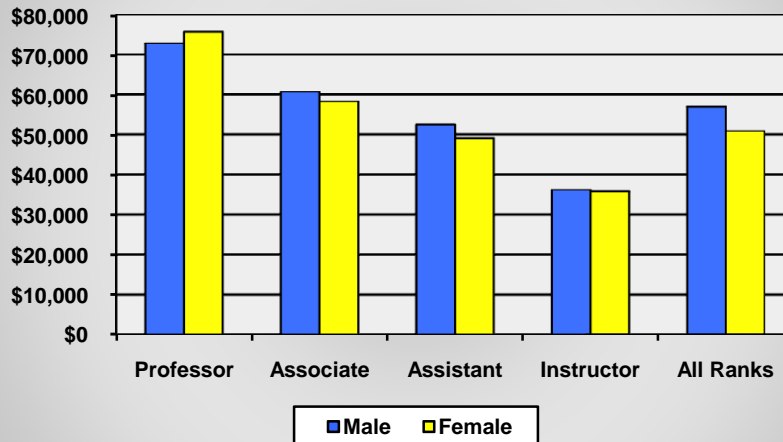

AAUP/IPEDS and Faculty Salary Comparisons

IPEDS (Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System) full-time faculty is identified by the National Center for Education Statistics definition:

Those members of the instruction/research staff who are employed full-time (as defined by the institution) and whose major (more than 50%) regular assignment is instruction, including those with release time for research. Also included in this category are:

- * Full-time instructional faculty on sabbatical leave
- * Full-time replacements for instructional faculty on leave without pay
- * Chairs of departments (if they have no other administrative title and hold a full-time faculty rank)

Both AAUP (American Association of University Professors) and IPEDS collect and report average faculty salaries and compensation (salaries plus other benefits) annually. As an option, institutions may forward their mandatory IPEDS faculty surveys to AAUP rather than prepare a separate AAUP-sponsored survey. AAUP publishes an "Annual Report on the Economic Status of the Profession" in the March-April issue of its bulletin, *Academe*. The next page shows a table displaying average faculty salaries by rank for MSU's Fall 2007 benchmark institutions. Faculty salary averages and respective numbers at each rank have been taken from the AAUP data reported in *Academe*, March/April 2008, when available.

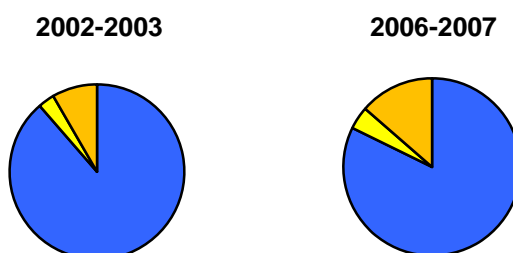

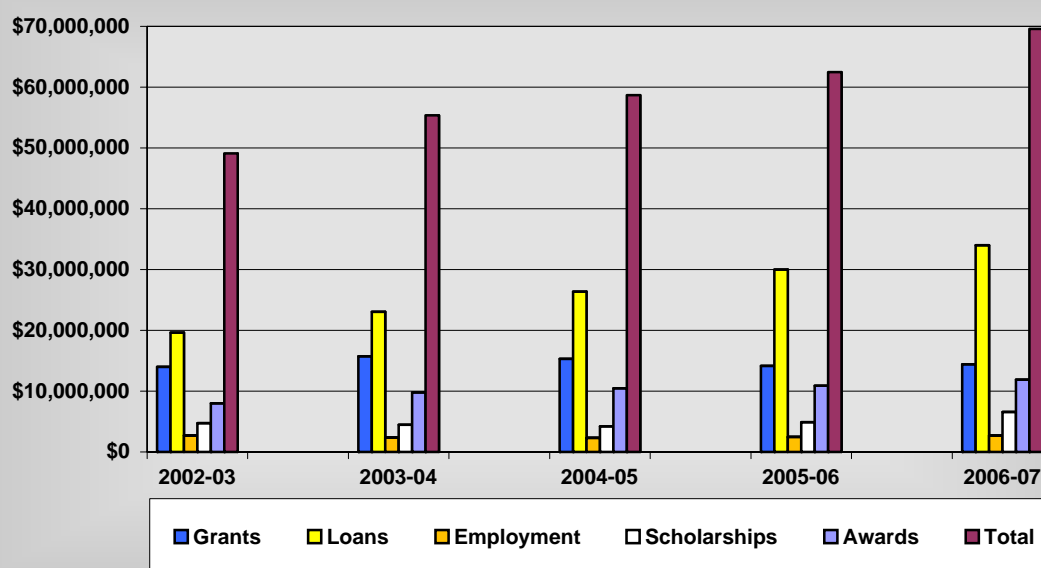

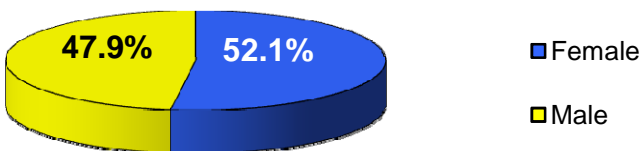

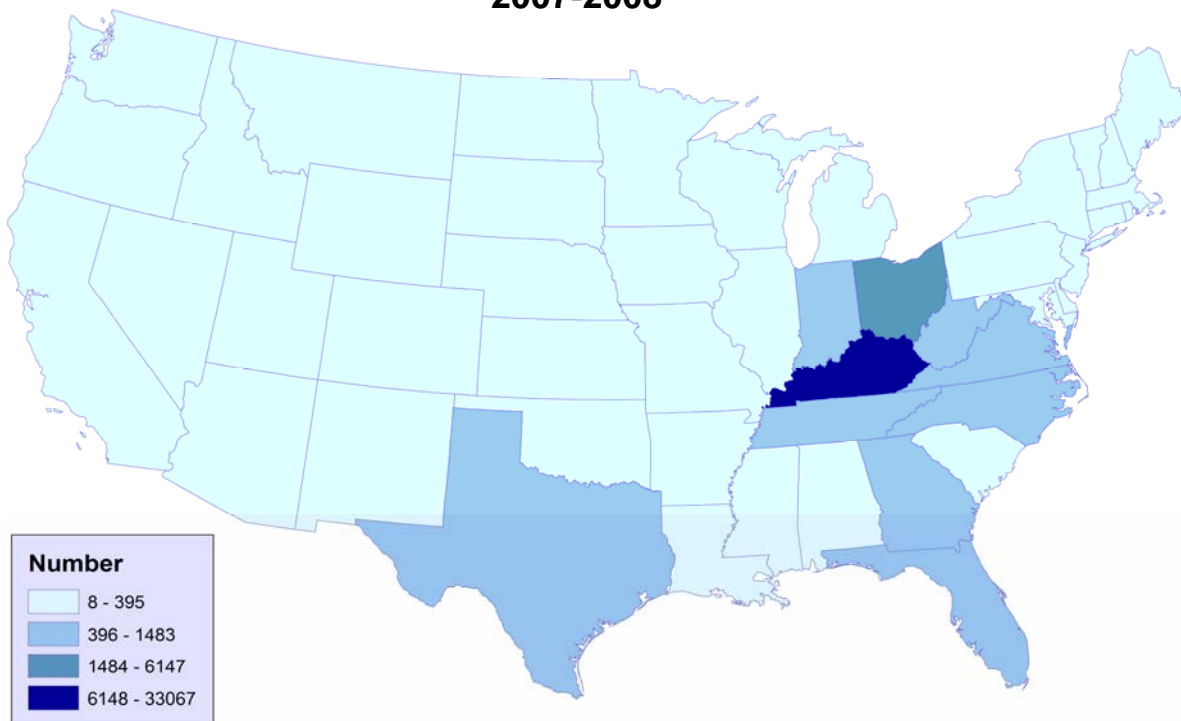

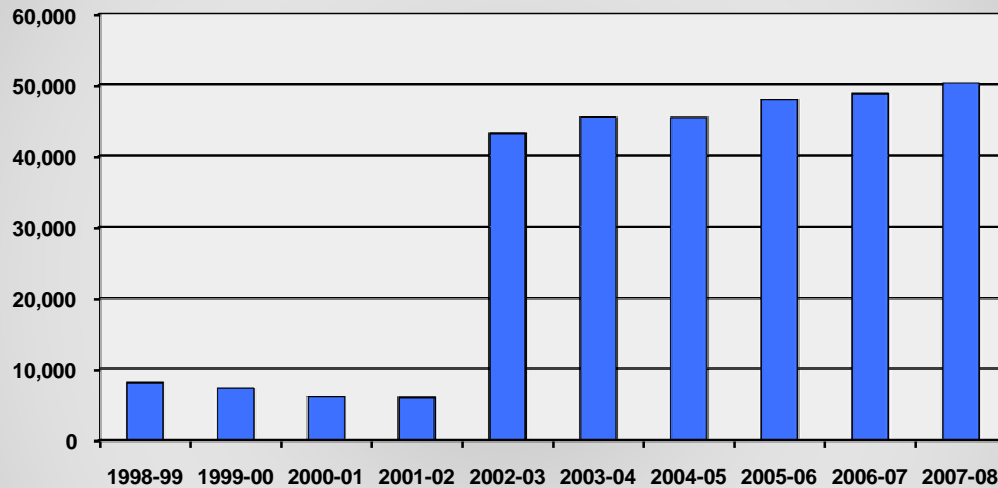

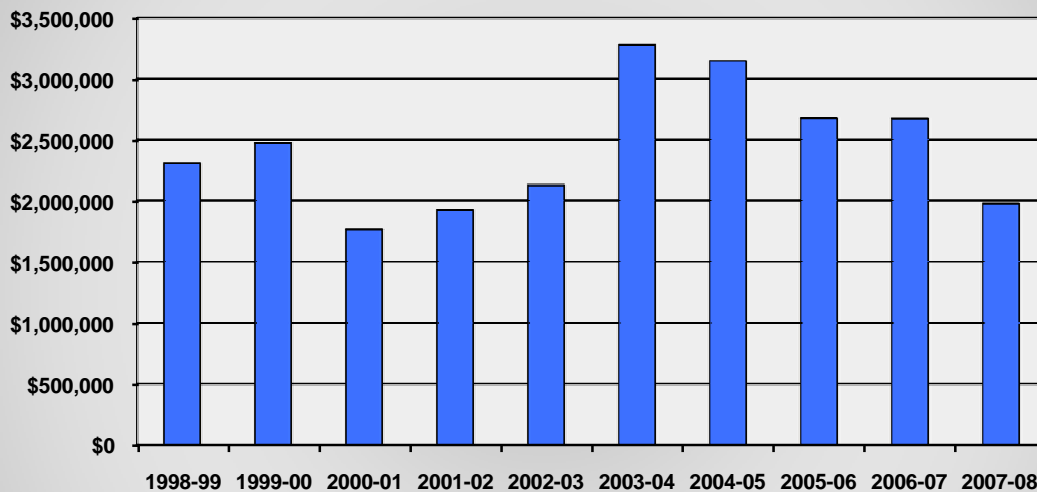

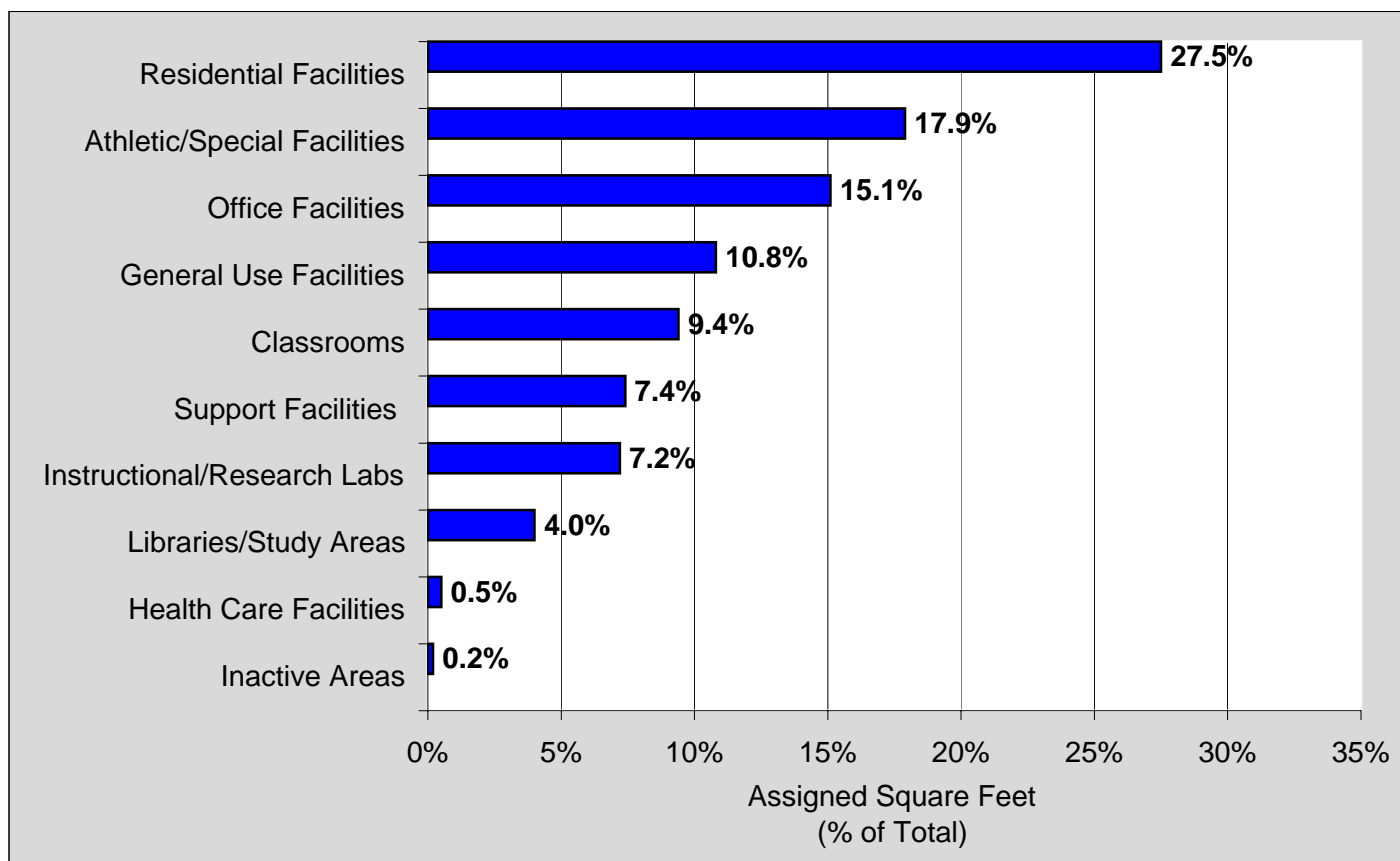
