WHEREAS, residents, citizens and property owners in Tolliver addition and adjacent contiguous sections near present corporate limits of City of Morehead, Kentucky, have petitioned for an annexation.

WHEREAS, it appearing to Board of City Council of said city, that the petitioners represent a majority of property owners in the area.

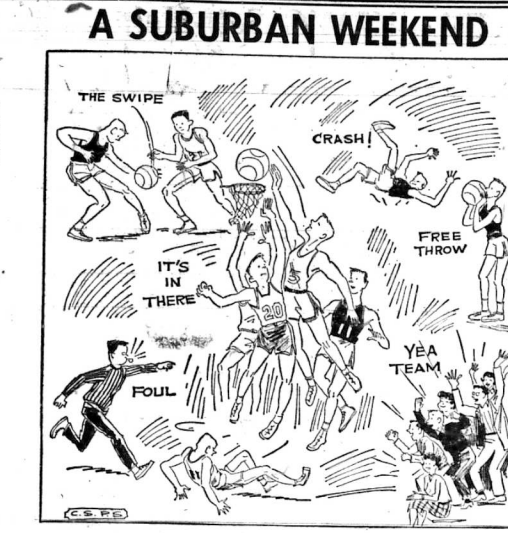

Ordinarily you couldn't pay a Morehead fan to watch Eastern Kentucky State College well in any kind of an endeavor. However, Saturday night, Eastern's most fervent support must necessarily come from Eagle partisans. Because Eastern is probably Morehead's last hope for being Conference basketball title.

Coach Jim Beechford's Maroons will lead the league's Eastern Tennessee, at Johnson City Saturday, and if the in-and-out Richmond crew can take the measure of the Buccaneers, it will mean that Morehead will earn at least a tie for the OVC title and a shot in the NCAA playoffs early next month. Actually, East Tennessee has two more contests — both at home where they've won 14 straight — but one is against injury riddled Middle Tennessee, a team which is not expected to throw much of a roadblock into the Buccaneers' path. So, it apparently is up to Eastern to determine whether or not arch-rival Morehead moves on to Evanston, Ill. Mar. 11 against the nation's second-ranked team, Loyola of Chicago. Actually, Eastern brought about this sad state of affairs Tuesday night by bombing Morehead's almost out of the Richmond gym, 101-84, after running up even bigger margins at several points in the contest. A win for Morehead — which was never in the books after the Maroons came out "shootin' hot" — would have clinched at least a tie for the title by the Eagles. East Tennessee, which was withstanding a late Western Kentucky rally to edge Ed Diddle's Hilltoppers, 80-79, never got started against Eastern, a team which they had handed easily two weeks ago at the Morehead Fieldhouse.

# Several Methods Suitable For Tobacco Bed 'Burning'

By Adrian M. Razor

As soon as the ground starts thawing and getting into condition, many of us are going to be thinking about sterilizing and sowing tobacco plant beds. For that reason, let's consider some of the means available to us of sterilizing plant beds other than burning. Some, of course, will burn because we have plenty of material available to do the job. Others, who do not have a source of material for burning, might want to consider use of chemicals or gas. Probably the best method, other than burning, is the use of methyl bromide gas. The bed should be plowed two or three weeks ahead of time and should be disked and raked immediately before putting on the material. Be sure the soil is finely pulverized and just about as moist as it can be safely worked. The soil temperature should be 50 degrees or warmer. Cover the bed with gas-proof cover and seal the edges with soil. Then release one pound of methyl bromide gas for 100 square feet, into shallow pans or trough using a specially designed applicator. Bed is treated in the spring may be seeded as soon as the cover is removed. The cover should be left on 24-48 hours, then removed and seeded.

You use hot methyl bromide, whereby you hold the container in a bucket containing five gallons or more water at a temperature at 150-160 degrees, the cover can be removed in 4-6 hours. Be sure to observe all precautions on the container since the gas is poisonous if breathed.

Among the drenches that may be used are Mylone and Yapan. Mylone is used at the rate of 15 bed. Application is made by hand, or with a small garden or lawn fertilizer spreader. Even distribution is necessary. Following application use enough water to penetrate the soil to a depth of two inches. Wait at least three weeks before seeding. At seeding time rake the plant bed area lightly to break the crust.

When using Yapan the ground should be broken and thoroughly disked about four weeks before treatment. Soil temperature should be 50 degrees or higher. If the ground appears to be dry, an application of water will take a few days before treatment. Be sure to disk and rake eliminating as many clods as possible, raking the remaining ones off of the bed. Put two gallons of Yapan in 100 to 125 gallons of water. Stir and sprinkle over 100 square yards of bed. Follow immediately with 100 gallons of water to seal the material in the soil. You can use a power pump or a sprifling can and enough solution should be used to penetrate the soil two-and-one-half to three inches. When treating in the spring, wait three weeks or longer after you have disked and Yapan before seeding. It is desirable to rake the plant bed area lightly to break the crust one week before seeding. Follow precautions on the container.

### Lawns

Does your lawn look as good as you would like it? If your grass stand is getting thin, sow the fourth lb. to one lb. of the best bluegrass seed. Also, lack of fertility often limits the amount of grass. Put on about 15 pounds of a fertilizer such as 5-10-10 or 10-10-10 per 1,000 square feet. Also, if you haven't limed in the last seven or eight years, it may be that you need to put on some ground limestone; a soil test will tell whether you need it and how much.

will be on the Little Sandy, near the Carter-Elliott counties line. President Kennedy is expected to place adequate funds in the budget to be submitted to the present Congress for advanced design and engineering. Perkins thought construction can be completed before 1970.

Under date of Feb. 4, 1963, James N. Barnes, Acting District Engineer, Army Corps of Engineers, Huntington, W. Va., wrote the following letter to Congressman Perkins —

"I refer to your letter of 4 December 1962 and to our reply of the 10 December 1962 concerning the relocation of the Grayson Reservoir dam site.

"You were informed in the referenced letter that the Grayson Reservoir dam site, located on the Little Sandy River 48.5 miles above its mouth, had been moved

2.7 miles upstream to exclude the Big Sinking Creek drainage basin because of possible reservoir leakage through the divide separating Little Sinking Creek and Big Sinking Creek, and damage claims for clay deposits located in the Big Sinking Creek area.

"Since the exclusion of the Big Sinking Creek drainage basin would reduce the controlled drainage area by about 15 percent, it is considered that further study on the siting of the project is necessary to assure that all factors bearing on the matter be given full consideration. Final decision on the location is expected to be made in the next few months. You will be kept informed of further developments in this matter."

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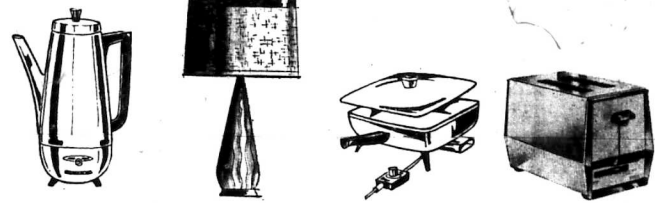

## Task Force To Survey State Correctional Institutions

Gov. Bert Combs has appointed an 11-man task force on corrections to take a look at Kentucky's penal system and make specific recommendations of ways in which the work of rehabilitation of prisoners can be improved.

Setting a deadline of Oct. 15, the governor asked the group to come up with short-range "specific program recommendations" which could be considered by the next General Assembly and also to develop a recommendation on the feasibility of a permanent statutory body which could devise itself to long-range study and advisory functions for the corrections program.

But the governor stressed that he wants the task force to focus its attention on "those things which need to be done and can be done and should not be deferred further in anticipation of the creation of a permanent body."

In indicating to the group that he would like to receive interim recommendations which could be carried out in his own term of office, Combs stated that he would favor any solutions to relieve the overcrowded conditions at the institutions. "I have already directed the probation and parole authorities to take the steps necessary to speed up the processing and release of those persons found to be deserving of parole. Nevertheless we need the additional construction of forest camps and farm dormitories."

force are Maubert R. "Mike" Miles, Madisonville, Hopkins County, commonwealth attorney and president of the Kentucky Commonwealth Attorneys Association, and James L. Patton, state assistant superintendent of public instruction for vocational instruction.

"It is my hope that this task force can serve a crucial need in assisting in the development of new program directions for rehabilitating the social offender for a productive and respected status in his community," the governor said.

Taking note of the dramatic developments in social and medical sciences in recent years, the governor said, "We have not kept current in the application of new

knowledge to the solution of this age-old social problem. Human life is the earth's most precious possession, and yet we often find ourselves more concerned with the life and mineral resources than with this erosion of human life itself."

Combs pledged the task force members full cooperation of the State Department of Corrections and all other agencies of state government.

**Insurance Hike Decision Is Due By Mid-March**

Special Deputy Insurance Commissioner James W. Sites will make a recommendation by mid-March on upholding or revoking a recent statewide increase in automobile liability insurance rates.

Sites, a Louisville attorney, was named a special deputy commissioner to conduct public hearings on the rate increase which was approved by the State Department of Insurance Jan. 24. The rate increase affecting 95 member companies of the Bureau of Casualty Underwriters, ranges from 2 1/2 per cent in Eastern Kentucky to 14 1/2 per cent in the Louisville area.

The companies involved wrote about one-third of all automobile insurance sold in Kentucky.

During the hearing attorneys for the Louisville Automobile Club challenged the rate increase. The insurance companies contend rising claim costs, especially in the Louisville area, make the rate hike necessary.

Sites, after considering the evidence introduced at the hearing, will make his recommendation on action to be taken to Acting Insurance Commissioner J. Elliott Flanery.

**Needly Aid Down During January**

Kentucky recipients of public assistance funds received \$5,699,364 during January, Commissioner Earle V. Powell of the State Department of Economic Security has announced.

The figure is a decrease of \$61,295 under the amount distributed last month but nearly \$21,600 more than the same period last year.

The needy aged received \$2,869,809, an average payment of \$41.11 to more than 69,000 recipients; about 21,000 families in the aid to dependent children category received checks averaging \$88.02; a statewide total of \$1,941,441; needy blind recipients got

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# Grayson And Cave Run Reservoirs Seem Assured

## Installation To Be Near Elliott, Carter Line; Costs Are Estimated Four Counties, Rowan, Bath, Menifee, Morgan Are In Licking Project

The largest expenditure by the federal government, or any agency, or private business, in Carter County's history lies in the immediate future. This is the Grayson Reservoir on Little Sandy River. Cost estimates are about \$14 million.

**Congressman Works For Appropriation**

Congressman Carl D. Perkins has spearheaded the project. He said in Washington today: "Fish Trap Reservoir (in Pike County) is assured, with adequate appropriations to continue its construction. The projects with highest priority now in my district are Grayson Reservoir and Cave Run Reservoir."

Greenup County should benefit almost as much as Carter since the dam site is near the Carter-Greenup counties line. Construction may start next year. Perkins said Grayson Reservoir is as

Cave Run Dam - the \$24 to \$30 million project proposed in 1937 - is virtually certain to be constructed, Congressman Carl D. Perkins said today from his office in Washington.

Louisville Army Engineers have released maps of the dam site and basin along with factual material. They estimate the cost at \$20,470,131, but this could be more if the earthen fill is higher.

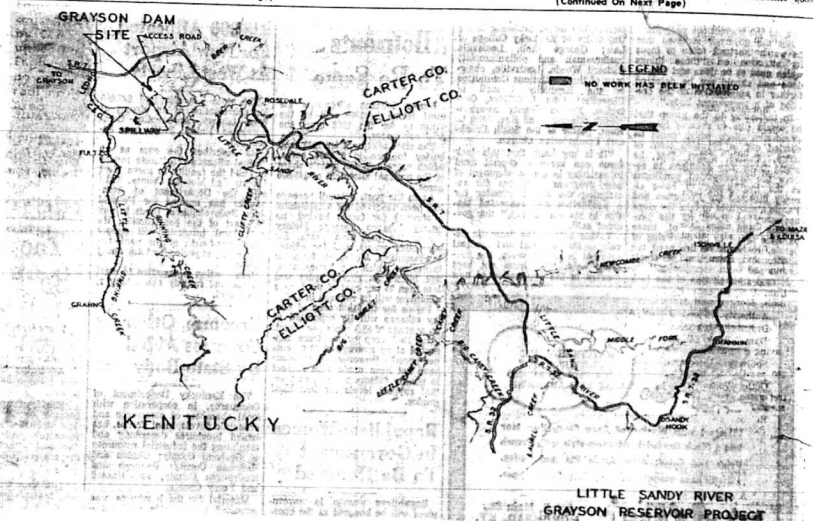
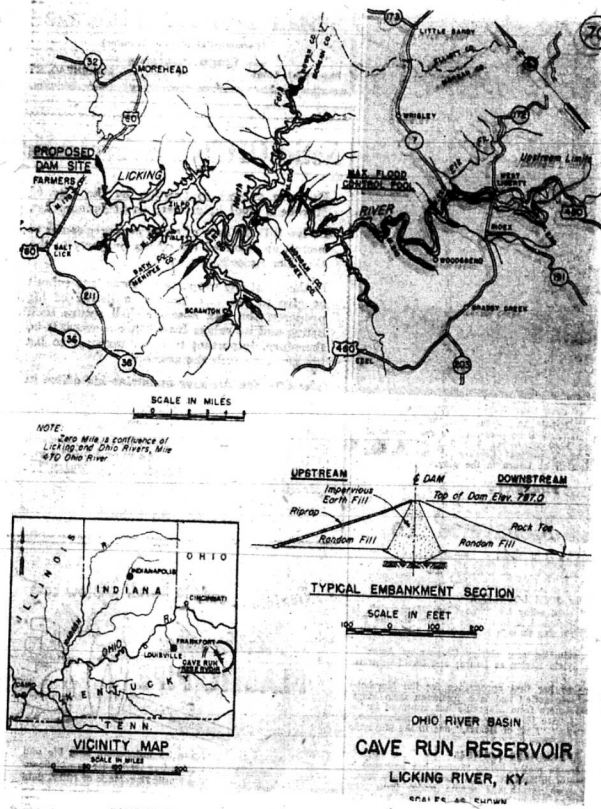
Cave Run Dam will be about three miles north of Farmers on the Bath-Rowan counties line. It is on Licking River.

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### PINPOINTING LOCATION OF CAVE RUN RESERVOIR

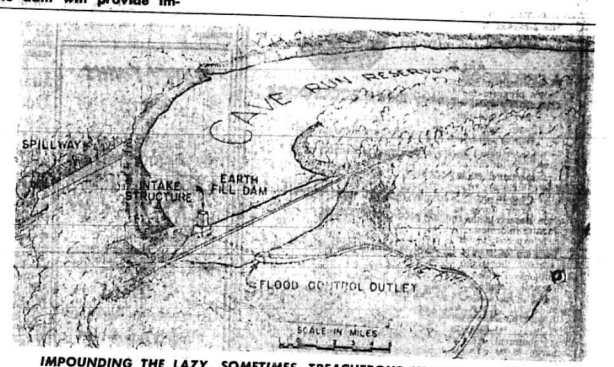
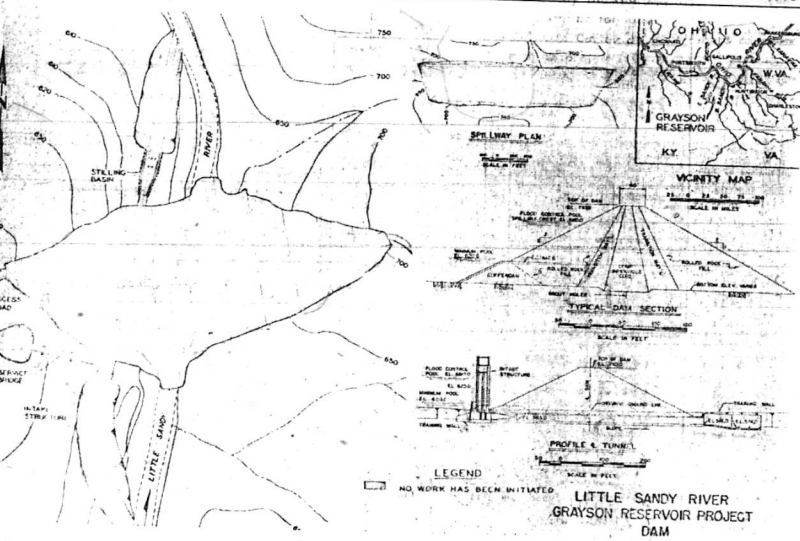
Cave Run Reservoir at the Bath-Rowan counties line, will be three miles south of Farmers, and the same distance from the C&O Railroad, and also near Interstate 64 and an airport, and 10 miles from Morehead. Preliminary estimates place the cost at almost \$25 million. It has strong endorsement from the last two governors, Kentucky's U.S. sena-

tors and Congressman Carl D. Perkins. Dams on Licking were first proposed in 1937, but sidetracked because of opposition to the high dam at Falmouth, and by World War II and the Korean Conflict. Cave Run Reservoir was divorced last year from all other proposed dams on the Licking River.

Greenup, Carter and Elliott counties will be the beneficiaries when Grayson Reservoir is built. The dam site is in Carter County, near the Elliott line. Waters of Little Sandy River will be backed to near Sandy Hook. Engineering is well advanced on this project, and a construction appropriation from Congress is foreseen by Congressman Carl D. Perkins. Grayson Reservoir is under the Huntington division of the Army Corps of Engineers. A group of Carter County civic leaders proposed Grayson Reservoir several years ago, but no real progress was achieved until the past four years. Area businessmen believe the dam will provide im-

mediate and future employment, and future industry. They also eye an increase in tourist business, as well as recreation for people in Northeastern Kentucky, including industrialized Ashland and Southeastern Ohio. The government usually leases sites for boat docks, private cottages, etc., along the basin. Grayson Reservoir is one of the projects in the long range planning for impounding tributaries of the Ohio River for flood control. The Grayson project will cost almost \$14 million. Generally about five years is required to construct such dams as this.

## JFK, Perkins Push For Reservoirs In East Kentucky

Seventh District Congressman Carl D. Perkins has often said: "Eastern Kentucky has one great asset, an abundance of water."

President Kennedy recently said in a California speech that the future of America lies in conserving reservoirs in depressed areas.

As a result of the Kennedy policy, and the Perkins initiative, and tenure in Congress, two major reservoirs are about to come to this part of Kentucky - Grayson Reservoir in Carter County, and Cave Run at the Rowan-Bath counties line, 10 miles west of Morehead. Engineering and design are well advanced on both. Grayson Reservoir is probably about a year ahead of

Cave Run. Congressman Perkins and Senators John Sherman Cooper and Thurston Morton have insisted on projects and give an economic shot in the arm to Northeastern Kentucky.

No opposition has been evidenced against Grayson, but some farmers in the Licking basin oppose Cave Run. A survey was conducted concerning this opposition. Both the Grayson Reservoir and Cave Run basin up with favorable benefit-cost ratios. This is a compromise where the benefits are weighed against the costs. Cave Run, at its present height (on the drawing board) will cost about \$25 million, and Grayson Reservoir about \$15 million.

to the four county area in 1964.

In 1957 Army Engineers proposed a series of dams on Licking, Rowan and Covington waters, and further removed from the "high" dams in this overall Licking program was at proposed water works lower-level averages of bluegrass land. Both the Army Corps of Engineers disapproved because the project would be a preliminary engineering plan. Perkins said the project is his own, and Congressman Perkins has pushed for construction.

## Strong Governmental Emphasis

The Cave Run project has been endorsed by former Governor A. B. Chandler, Governor Bert Combs and Senators Cooper and Thurston Morton.

The project is unusual in that Army Engineers have asked for "loan money" that Perkins says would provide Perkins with necessary construction funds in addition to advanced design.

"As matters now stand, the Reservoir in Carter County is proposed as a year ahead of Cave Run, although the latter is first proposed.

Perkins said the President intended to push programs, like Cave Run, in areas with high unemployment.

The district office at Morehead, which serves counties of the area, had the highest unemployment of anyplace in the nation during one quarter of 1961, according to testimony at the Washington hearing.

## Recreation For Morehead College

Morehead State College President Airon Doran has been a strong supporter of the project. The dam site will be about 10 miles from the college.

"It has been repeatedly pointed out in the hearings that the industrial developments: (2) contain no large buildings that would have to be torn down, (3) contain no large residential areas; (4) no utilities, above or below ground, with low tax (5) most of the land is already owned by the Cumberland National Bank; and (6) no major highways, etc., are in the basin.

Cave Run will be strategically located for industry and tourists. It is three miles from the C&O Railroad and near Interstate 64. An airport is also about three miles from the site.

The Corps of Engineers at Louisville has released maps of the site, an basin, and the following summarized data as of last June 30:

Location of Dam: On Licking River about three miles upstream from U.S. 60 near Farmers Reservoir will be located in Rowan, Bath, Morgan and Menifee counties.

Authority: Flood Control Act of 1956 and 1958.

Drainage Area Controlled: 825 square miles.

Dam: Rock fill having a crest length of about 3,400 feet and having a maximum height of 120 feet above stream bed.

Spillway: Uncontrolled spillway with a crest at elevation 760 m.s.l. located on the left abutment of the dam.

Intake Works: A 30-inch diameter gate tower with three 6.5 x 13.0 foot gates and a 17" diameter circular conduit through the embankment.

Relocations: Portions of Kentucky State Routes 801, 835, and 1274.

sure, barring a war or a sharp decline in the national economy. The Grayson Reservoir will back waters on Little Sandy into Elliott County almost to the mouth of the Homestead. Goals is acquisition of land in the basin that will be overflooded.

## Aid To Depressed Area

Perkins said immediate construction is in the plans of President Kennedy's program for depressed areas.

Grayson Reservoir will provide:

- 1. Provide jobs during construction.
- 2. Create maintenance employment after it is finished.
- 3. Provide recreation equal to any community, or area.

Attract new industry as ample water is a major inducement in many types of manufacturing.

Transportation facilities in the area are considered excellent — interstate highways, north-south and east-west roads, railroads, and the Ohio River.

The Army Corps of Engineers, Huntington, in charge of the Grayson Reservoir survey and construction today released the following factual information about the project for which the present Congress is expected to make an appropriation:

Location of Dam: Carter County, on Little Sandy River; 48.2 miles above the mouth of the Little Sandy River.

Authority: Flood Control Act of July 14, 1960, Public No. 86-645, Eighty-sixth Congress, 2d Session.

Dam: Type rock fill with central impervious core, maximum height 130 feet, top length 1,189 feet, toe width 550 feet (plus-min) feet.

Spillway: Uncontrolled, broad-crested, saddle spillway at left (west) abutment, crest elevation 680, length of crest 224 feet, design discharge 85,000 c.f.s. with surcharge of 25 feet and freeboard of 5 feet.

Outlet Works: Intake structure with three sluiceways controlled by 6' x 13' gates and discharging through a 16" x 16" horseshoe tunnel through the left abutment. A 36-inch pipe bypassing the sluiceways provides low-flow control.

Other Structures: None.

Relocations: 5 1/2 miles of State Route 7, 4.8 miles of secondary roads, 212 miles of power lines, 4 miles of telephone lines, 3.7 miles of gas line, and moving 2 cemeteries of about 60 graves.

This increase was accomplished despite the loss of all weight-tax revenue from coal trucks, said Acting Motor Transportation Commissioner Ben M. Combs.

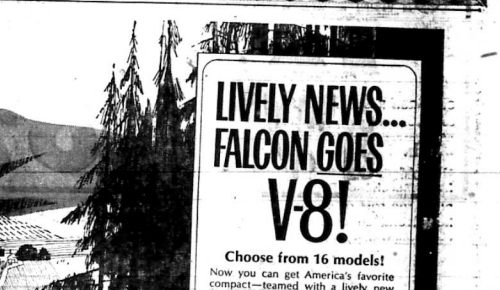
1962 Legislature exempted from Kentucky's truck weight tax motor trucks utilized to transport coal from a mine to a railroad or tipples.

Combs said increased enforcement activities in other areas and increased receipts from other taxes accounted for the overall increase in revenue.



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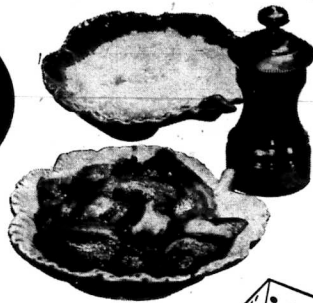

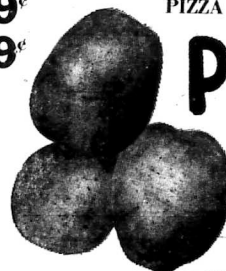
