A veteran journalist and The New York Times editor will visit Morehead State University on Tuesday, March 7.

Leonard M. "Len" Apcar, editor in chief of the Times' Web edition, will present "Civic Engagement in the Digital Age," at 7 p.m. in Button Auditorium. Earlier in the day, he will meet with several MSU students.

He joined the newspaper in 1991 as assistant business and financial editor. Since then he has also served as an enterprise editor, assignment editor and chief of correspondents.

During that period, he covered the automobile industry in Detroit, Congress, tax and budget, labor issues in Washington, D.C. and banking, savings and loans and the Southwest economy in Dallas.

Apcar earned a bachelor's degree in political science from Claremont McKenna College, Claremont, Calif. in 1975, and received a master's degree in journalism from the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism in 1976.

He serves on the advisory board of The Media Center at the American Press Institute and the board of directors of the Online News Association. Additionally, he is president of the board of trustees of the Scarsdale Library.

Establishing the RAD program on campus has been well received, according to Capt. Barker. "We believe this is one of the most pro-active programs we have brought to the University community.

Recently Morehead Mayor Brad Collins signed a proclamation declaring March as Sexual Assault Awareness Month. Gathering for the announcement were members of the Community/Campus Sexual Assault Task Force, including representatives from DOVES of Gateway, Pathways Inc., and Gateway Children's Advocacy Center, and MSU personnel from the Division of Student Life, Office of Counseling and Health Services, and

Students prepare for Ecuador trip

A group of Morehead State University students will enjoy spring break in Ecuador as they take part in the class AGR 399, "Andean Culture."

The MSU students will join Dr. Adam Kantrovich, assistant professor of <u>agricultural education</u>, and students from Western Kentucky University in order to expand their educational opportunities.

The course involves both an on-campus and an approximately two-week trip to Ecuador along with mandatory preand post class meetings.

Various marketing and production sites will be visited while in Ecuador as well as meeting with producers and leaders in agriculture.

According to Dr. Kantrovich, objectives to be obtained are: compare cultural variables between Ecuador and the U.S.; distinguish similarities and differences in U.S. and Ecuadorians trade policies; experience living in another culture; compare educational systems; and defend economic and political issues related to the world situation. The students can use the knowledge they learned to help them succeed in their chosen field of study.

Morehead State students scheduled to take part in the trip during the week of March 20-24 are: Kevin Lawson, **East Bernstadt** senior; Jo Ann Gripshover, **Salt Lick** senior; Maggie Duncan-Rogers, **Olive Hill** graduate student; Asa N. Madden, **Olive Hill** senior; and James Nick Craft, **Gallipolis**, **Ohio**, sophomore.

"I teach this class to introduce knowledge about international concepts. By traveling to Ecuador, the students learn about various aspects of this Latin American country found on the South American continent."

"Once they learn about some of the Ecuadorian culture and history, they begin to compare it to ours. This includes everything from food, clothing, shelter, education, politics, religion and economics," said Dr. Kantrovich.

Some of the locations that the group may visit are: Quito (capital), Otavalo, Cotacachi, Cayambe, Ambato, Banos, Puyo (jungle), Riobamba, Chambo and Pillero.

"We discuss many things in class prior to our trip, most of which will not sink in until we are in Ecuador on our travels. We will use our time in Ecuador for cultural emersion," he said.

Dr. Kantrovich says he tries to give students an opportunity to see many things that most tourists would not see on their travels. The group spends much of their time with local individuals, in their establishments, markets, businesses and homes.

The MSU students also visit some of the tourist attractions that Ecuador is famous for, including a National Park on the Equator where the students will be able to stand on the Northern and Southern Hemisphere at the same time; some of the 400-500 year old churches in Colonial Quito; an Indian Wears Market in Otavalo; and the Andes (at altitudes from 7,000 - 13,000 feet or more) to the jungle.

"This is not meant to be a relaxing time, but it will be an enjoyable, exciting, mentally and physically stimulating educational adventure for the students during their spring semester break," said Dr. Kantrovich. "There will be those

times on this trip that may tug at the heart of the students when they realize how a great deal of the population, adults and children, live and work."

Some insurance agencies offer discounts to persons completing the course. Motorcycles and helmets are furnished for each student. The course is a minimum of 15 hours. All classes meet on Friday from 6 to 10 p.m., and Saturday and Sundays, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

All classroom and skills hours must be attended in order to successfully complete course requirements.

The class is also free to one Kentuckian 16 and 17 years of age who meets certain requirements. Some restrictions do apply and prior parental signatures must be submitted before class participation is allowed. Registration is for the BRC (beginning) class is \$110 per person and \$60 for the ERC (refresher) class. Class size is limited to 12 students per class.

Professor will address U.S. Senate Committee

A Morehead State University faculty member, Dr. Paul Steele, has been asked by the U.S. Senate Committee on Indian Affairs to appear at a hearing in Washington, D.C. on March 15. The Committee, chaired by Arizona Sen. John McCain, will be addressing the Indian Child Protection and Family Violence Prevention Act Amendments of 2005.

Dr. Steele is associate professor of sociology and director of the Center for Justice Studies in MSU's Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy.

He has vast research and practical experience working with several agencies including the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency, the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention, the Office of Child Abuse and Neglect, and the National Children's Advocacy Center. The professor has been asked to limit his spoken testimony in order for the committee to ask questions, but his written testimony can be of any length, and will appear in its entirety in the hearing record.

Prior to coming to Morehead State, Dr. Steele was a professor at the University of New Mexico, where he also served as director of the New Mexico Criminal Justice Statistical Analysis Center. He also was a senior associate of the Institute for Social Research and a distinguished visiting scholar at Cornell University. In 2002, he was a recipient of the University of New Mexico's Gunter Starkey Awards for Teaching Excellence.

Dr. Steele is known for his strong belief and impressive track record in combining research with teaching, allowing students to gain practical, real world experience that blends well with their text readings.

Severe Weather Alert

An extremely dangerous weather situation is developing for Eastern Kentucky for this afternoon and evening, according to information received by the Morehead State University Police Department from the National Weather Service.

The official statement said that "severe thunderstorms are expected to move across the area with the possibility of isolated strong tornadoes, large hail, damaging straight line winds, and flash flooding also will be possible.

Isolated thunderstorms were expected to begin moving into Eastern Kentucky after 1 p.m. EST. The thunderstorms will become more widespread during the late afternoon, with a solid line of strong to severe storms forecast between 7 p.m. and midnight. Some of the isolated storms in advance of the main line of thunderstorms will be capable of producing strong, very damaging tornadoes.

Damaging straight line winds will be the main threat with the line of storms this evening, but isolated tornadoes will remain a threat.

A strong cold front is expected to move east of the area by midnight, bringing the threat of severe weather to an end."

MSU Police has urged everyone to take extreme caution in their movements and seek shelter immediately. "You need to monitor weather conditions on the radio or television and stay abreast the weather situation," said MSU Police Chief Joseph S. Cline. "Conditions can become very dangerous in a very short period of time."

- Do not leave messages indicating when you will be away or when you expect to return. Follow the safety in numbers rule when going out at night and arrange to go with friends/roommates. It is a good practice to scan your surroundings whether walking on campus, traveling by automobile or enjoying a shopping excursion.
- Do not leave valuables or property (purses, backpacks, books, personal identification, etc.) visible in or around the office or living area.

CPE approves tuition rates for MSU, KCTCS, UK

The Council on Postsecondary Education Friday (March 24) approved 2006-07 tuition and fee rates for Morehead State University, the Kentucky Community and Technical College System, and the University of Kentucky. The CPE will consider tuition and fee proposals from the remaining public universities at its April 5 meeting.

The Council approved a new tuition policy in January that provides a structured process for ensuring balance between the desire to maintain affordability for Kentucky's students and the need to provide sufficient revenue to reach the goals of the Public Agenda.

The policy establishes maximum parameters for undergraduate tuition and fee rates. The parameters are linked to state general fund appropriation levels, median family income, market factors and a student affordability measure.

At Morehead State University, full-time, resident undergraduate students will pay \$4,870 annually, a \$550 annual increase. This rate is \$45 less than the maximum allowed by the policy. The per credit hour rate for Morehead State was set at \$205 for part-time students.

MSU's non-resident undergraduate tuition was set at \$12,950 annually, 2.65 times the rate charged for residents. MSU officials plan to request an exception to the non-resident rate for students in contiguous counties and selected urban areas.

At KCTCS, undergraduate resident students taking 15 credit hours a semester will be charged \$3,270 annually, an increase of \$330--the maximum allowed by the Council's tuition policy. The per credit hour rate for resident undergraduate students will increase from \$98 to \$109 this fall.

At UK, annual rates for full-time, resident undergraduates will increase from \$5,812 to \$6,510 for lower-division students, an increase of \$698. Tuition for upper-division students will increase from \$4,980 to \$6,698, an increase of \$718 over two semesters. These increases are \$180 less than the maximum allowed by the tuition policy.
