George Evans of Maine has been in Congress hitherto so long that we cannot remember who was his predecessor in the Senate. From 1829 to 1841, Mr. Evans represented the noble Whig District of Kennebec in the House with marked ability and steadily increasing usefulness.

In addition to the details given in our last, we annex the following items of information, for which we are indebted to Mr. Martin, who arrived on the Harmonious Walker.

The American forces at Saltillo would be between 5000 and 6000 men. In addition to the two batteries named above, the 32 and 42nd Regts. of Artillery.

The number of troops left at Monterey does not exceed 800 men, but the citadel which is held by them, and there is no route by which the Mexicans can approach the city with artillery, save by Saltillo.

Military Institute. General Assembly will be opened for the reception of Pupils on the 1st of March, 1817.

A Preparatory Department is organized in connection with the Institute, in which boys of any age are taken, and are subjected to the same Military discipline.

The Academic Year will be divided into two Sessions of twenty weeks each. The first commencing on the 1st of Monday in October, and the second on the first Monday in March.

Applicants for admission, on paying the charge of the institute, and presenting a certificate of good moral character, will be admitted to the classes as follows: First, on paying fifty dollars, and upon satisfactory passing the next examination thereafter, will be entitled to a warrant of office as Cadets in the Army.
