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General Information

Highlights

- In Fall 2010 MSU enrolled 8,842 students.
- First-time students' average composite ACT score was 21.6, up from 21.4 in Fall 2009.
- MSU retained 67.1% of its first-time freshmen from Fall 2009 to Fall 2010. MSUs adjusted Fall to Fall Retention Rate for all undergraduates was 72%.
- First-time freshmen headcount was 1,180, a 6.34% decrease from Fall 2009 first-time freshman enrollment (1,260).
- Seventy-three percent of undergraduates (5,430 of 7,399) enrolled full-time compared to 21% of graduate students (303 of 1,443). The 21% represents a 2% increase over the previous year.
- Women outnumbered men at the University, accounting for 61% of undergraduates, 64% of graduate enrollment, or 62% of enrollment overall.
- Sixty-eight percent of undergraduates are age 18-24; 7% are below 18 and 25% are 25 and older.
- Forty-nine percent of graduates are age 25-34; 15% are below 25 and 36% are above 34.
- The mean age of undergraduates was 24 years (minimum 14 years, maximum 75 years) compared to 33 years for graduate students (minimum 21 years, maximum 67 years).
- Eighty-five percent of enrollees originated from Kentucky; 61% originated from MSU's 22-county Service Region.
- Minorities (including international students) represented 7.7% of University enrollment overall (up from 6.7% in Fall 2009).
- First-time historically underrepresented minorities (African-American, Hispanic, American-Indian, Native Alaskan, Pacific-Islander) grew by 25 students, from 58 in Fall 2009 to 83 in Fall 2010.
- MSU conferred 1,452 first degrees in 2009-2010; 158 Associate, 926 Bachelor,

and 368 Master/Specialist. An additional 26 second degrees were conferred in 2009-2010, all Bachelor degrees.

- Residence halls housed 2,124 students in Fall 2010 (an 88.3% occupancy rate).
- Approximately 67% of MSU's alumni reside in Kentucky.
- MSU's 374 full-time and 88 part-time faculty taught 2,300 courses in Fall 2010.
- In addition to faculty, MSU employed 802 full-time and 353 part-time staff (including 112 graduate assistants).
- The University's opening budget for 2010-2011 was \$129,205,000.

MSU at a Glance

Morehead State University aspires to be the best public university in the south! The primary objective of the University is to meet the educational needs of Eastern Kentucky while striving to constantly improve the quality of its public service, economic development, and applied research programs. Located in the foothills of the Daniel Boone National Forest, the nearly 500 acre main campus lies within the city limits of Morehead, Kentucky. Beyond the city, the University's real estate holdings include the Derrickson Agricultural complex and the Eagle Trace public golf course. In addition to the main campus, classes are conducted at 5 regional campuses, located in Ashland, Jackson, Mt. Sterling, Prestonsburg and West Liberty, as well as a variety of other off-campus locations. In addition to traditional face-to-face instruction, the University offers a number of distance learning courses via the internet and throughout the region via interactive compressed video.

The University is governed by the 11 member Board of Regents including eight citizens appointed by the governor and three seats held by elected faculty, staff and student representatives. Management of the institution is vested primarily in five divisions: Academic Affairs (which includes 4 academic colleges: Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences; Business and Public Affairs; Education; Science and Technology); Administration and Fiscal Services; Planning and Budgets; Student Life; and University Advancement.

Morehead State University is committed to achieving academic excellence through the development, delivery, and maintenance of superior academic programs. MSU is accredited as a comprehensive university offering a wide variety of undergraduate, graduate, and pre-professional programs in a collegial and open environment. MSU actively offers 143 undergraduate degree “programs” (*major area of study* plus with *actual* degree, i.e., *Space Science Area, Bachelor of Science*), including 12 associate level degrees and 131 baccalaureate level degrees, as well as 21 pre-professional programs. There were 70 graduate degree programs and an education specialist program in 5 specialty areas as well as 36 graduate non-degree programs designed especially for professional educators. Included in the 70 graduate degree

programs, are a master's degree in social work and two cooperative doctoral programs, all with the University of Kentucky, available on the MSU campus. MSU offers students a 17:1 student/faculty ratio, allowing for a more personalized educational experience, and has been recognized as one of the top public universities in the South in numerous editions of "America's Best Colleges" by U.S. News & World Report.

MSU and the surrounding area offer students an engaging educational experience both in and out of the classroom! Constantly seeking improvement and new opportunities for student learning, MSU built the Equine Health Education Center and the Space Science Center, through a partnership with NASA and the Center for Health Education and Research (CHER), through a partnership with St. Claire Regional Medical Center and the University of Kentucky. The CHER building was completed and opened in fall 2010. In addition, a new \$30 million Student Recreation Center was built and is scheduled to open in August, 2011. MSU's most recent acquisition includes the former Rowan County Public Library which is being renovated for use by the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music.

Housing facilities include space for over 2,700 students in traditional residence halls, suites, and apartments. In addition to academics, students have the opportunity to join more than 100 clubs and organizations or participate in a variety of student activities. Athletically, the University sponsors 11 intercollegiate sports for men and women in accordance with the regulations of the Ohio Valley Conference, the Pioneer Football League, and Division I of the NCAA. MSU also supports an intramural program involving both team and individual sports.

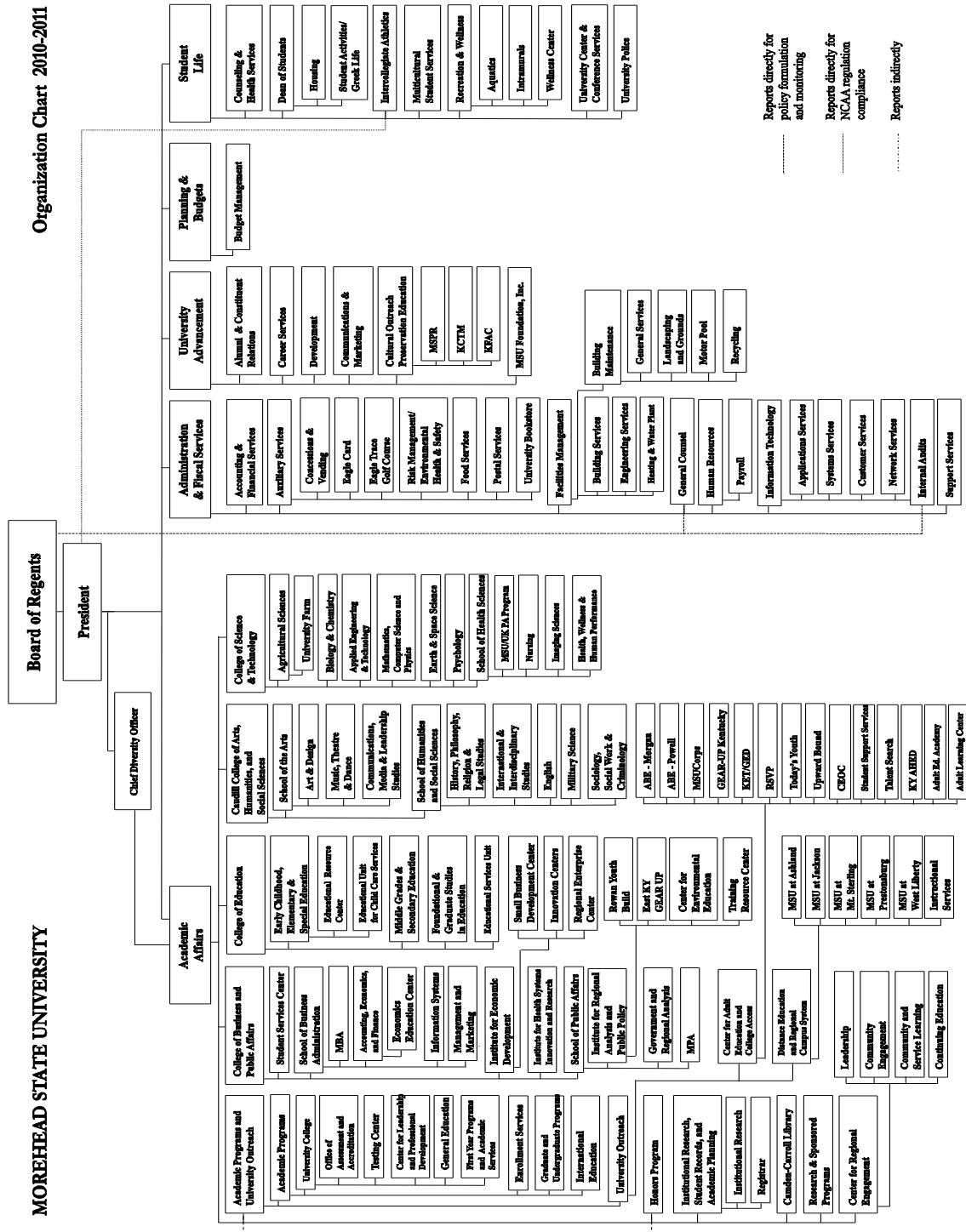

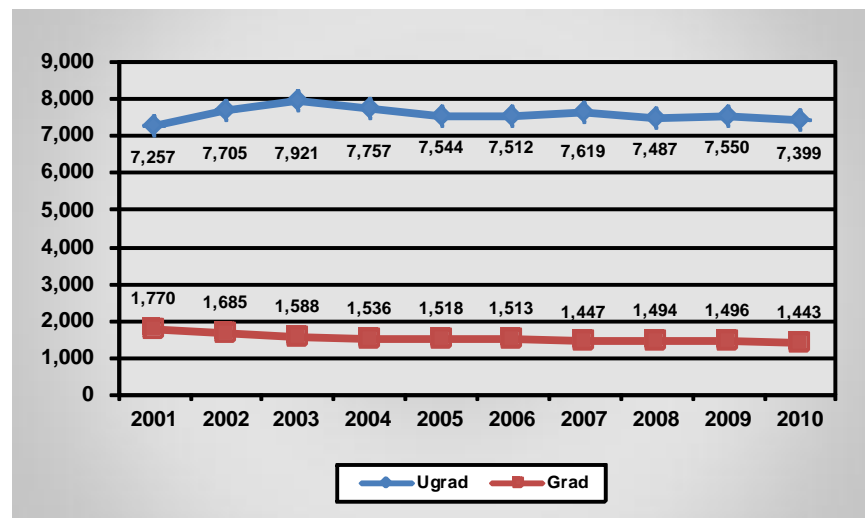

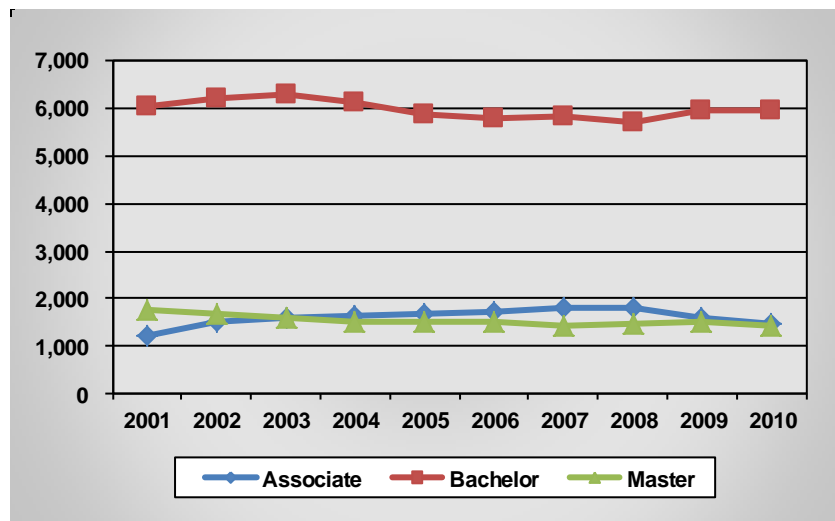
Line Graph 3.1 Ten-Year Trends: Fall Headcount, Credit Hours, and FTE by Graduate/Undergraduate

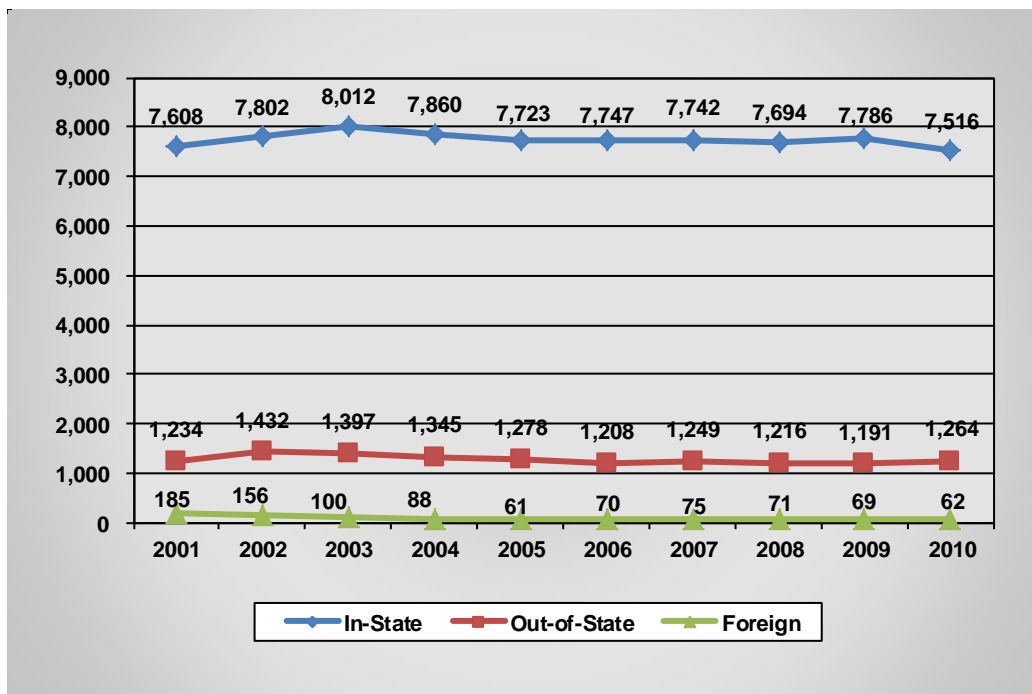

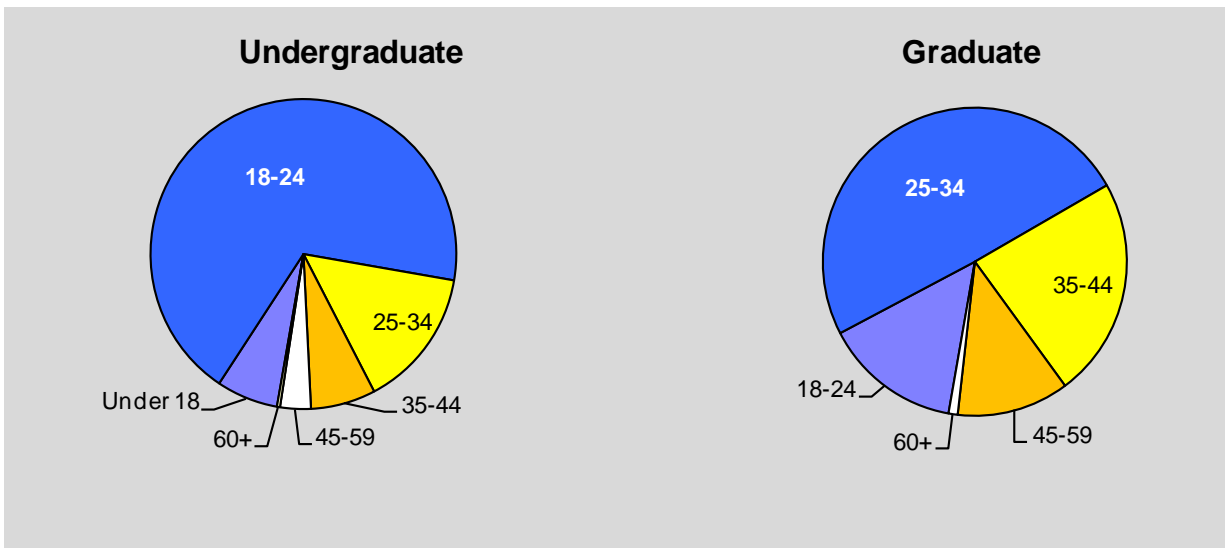

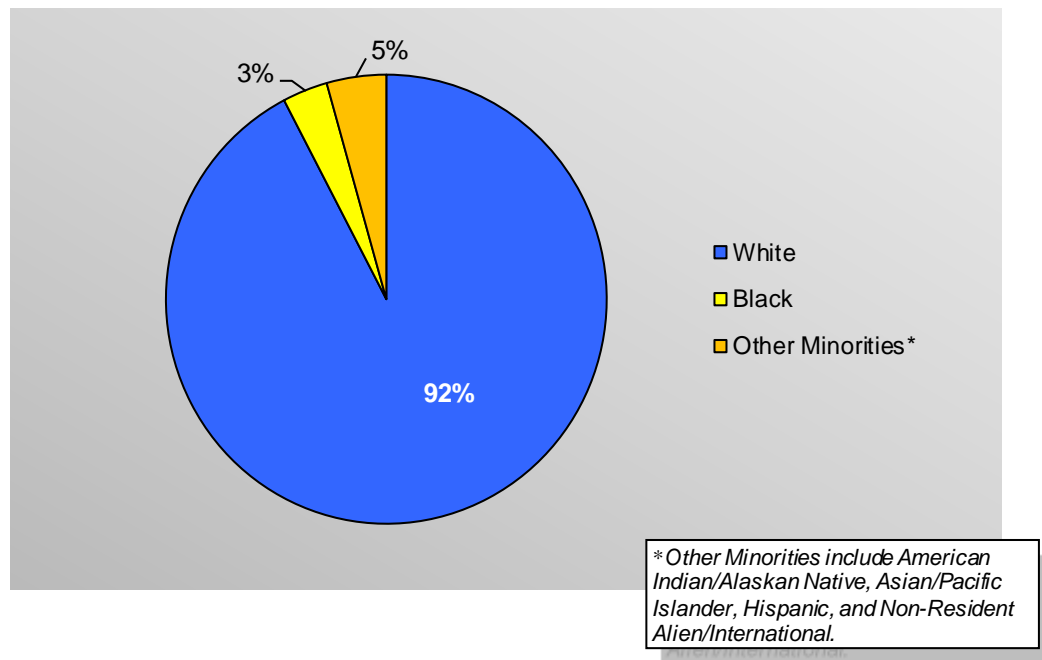

Pie Chart 3.9 Headcount by Gender and Ethnicity



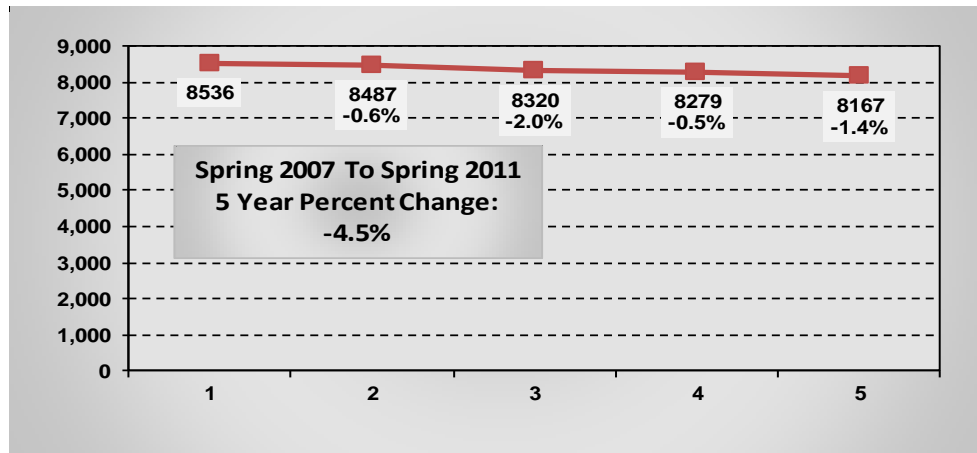

Line Graph 3.11 Five-Year Trends: Spring Headcount, Credit Hours and FTE by Classification

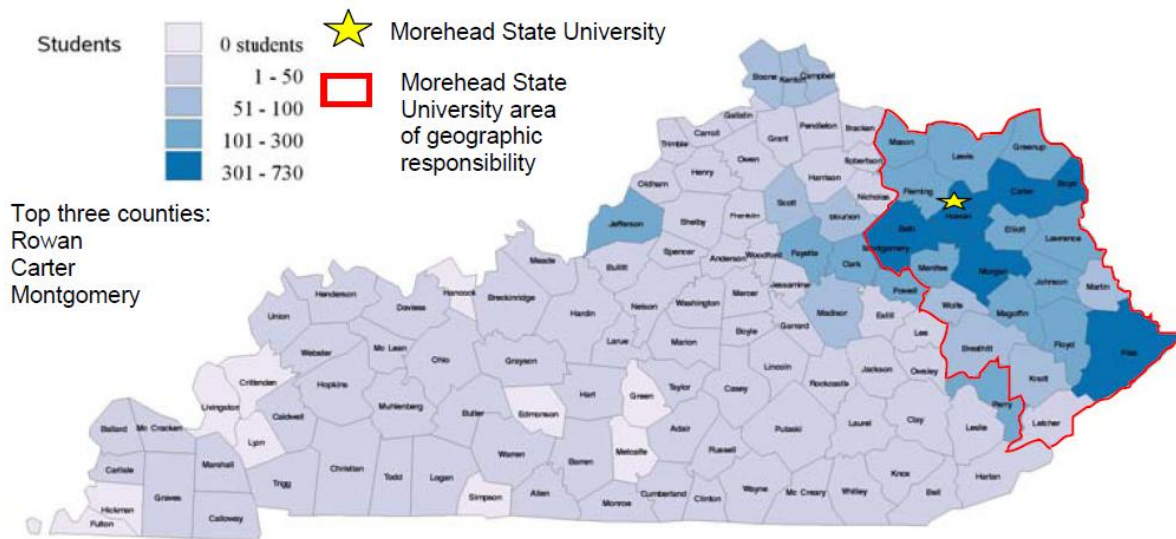

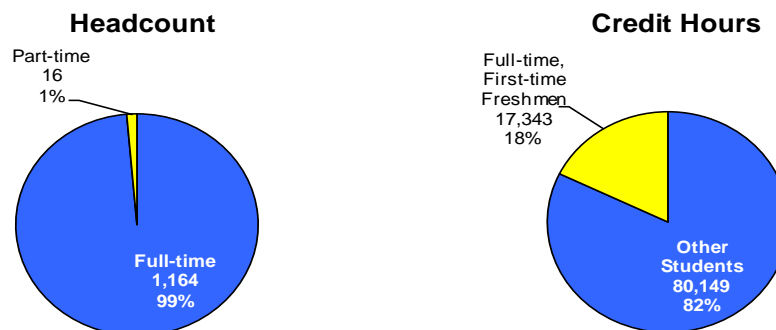

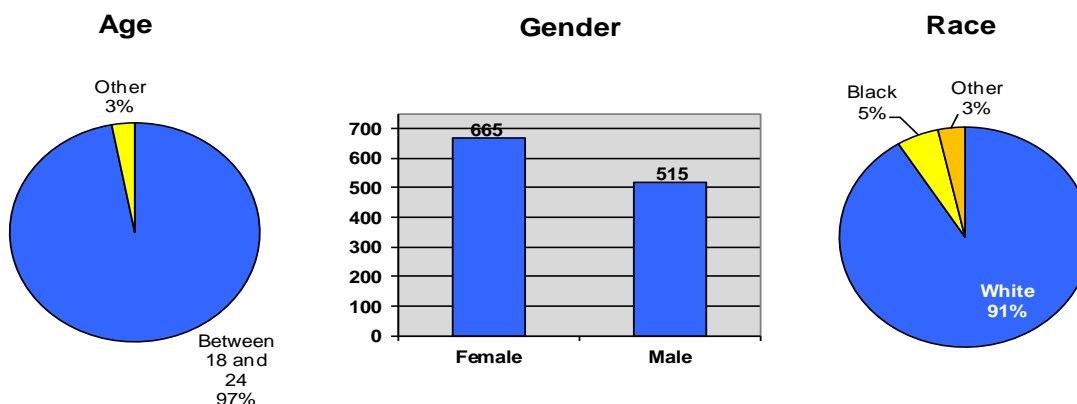
Pie Chart 4.6 First-Time Freshmen Headcount and Credit Hours by FT/PT Status

Ninety-nine percent (1,164 of 1,180) of Fall 2010 first-time freshmen were full-time students. This group accounted for about 18% (17,343) of the University's total credit hour production (97,492). In order of degree intent, 1,088 (92%) were baccalaureate seekers followed by 92 (8%) associate seekers.

The majority (1,147 or 97%) of MSU Fall 2010 first-time freshmen were of "traditional" age, that is, between 18 and 24 years of age, and more than half (56%) were female. About 91% (1,075) were white, whereas blacks accounted for 64% (64 of 105) of non-whites and about 5% of Fall 2010 first-time freshmen enrollment overall.



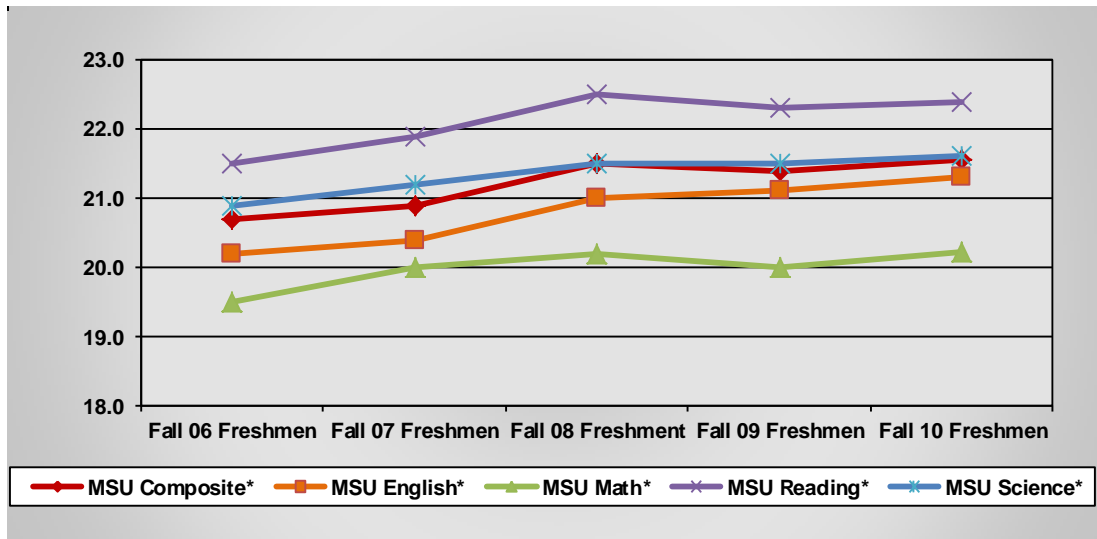
A little less than half (633 of 1,180) of first-time freshmen originated in MSU's 22-county service region and an additional 27% (316) came from the remaining counties throughout the Commonwealth. Overall, 80% of first-time freshmen were Kentucky residents compared to 76% Kentucky residency in the total Fall 2009 student population.

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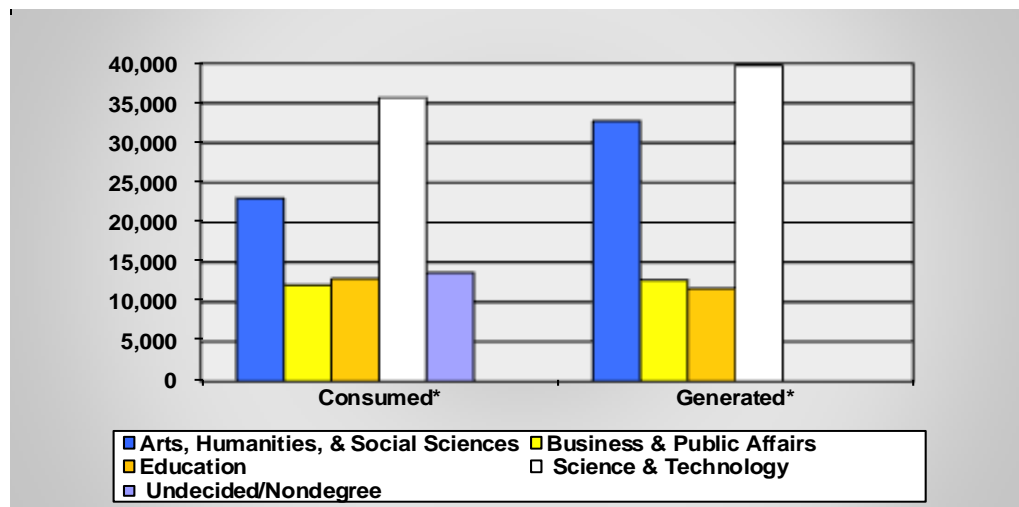

The difference between credit hours "consumed" by majors within a given college and credit hours "generated" by faculty teaching within a given college characterize that college's general academic service profile. For example, Education majors consumed 12,915 credit hours in Fall 2010 whereas Education faculty taught classes which generated 11,698 credit hours during the same semester. The number of credit hours consumed by Education majors in excess of credit hours generated by Education faculty characterizes the College of Education as an academic service "consumer" in Fall 2010.

In order to obtain a general program area overview of enrollments, the Council on Postsecondary Education prepares trend tables displaying comparative fall enrollments by CIP (Classification of Instructional Programs) Area. That is, the 6-digit CIP codes for specific program first majors are collapsed to 2-digit codes and enrollments in all majors beginning with the 2-digits are summed. For example, under CIP code 13 (Education), enrollments in 15 specific 6 digit CIP codes have been summed showing MSU's Fall 2010 enrollment in Education programs to be 1,541. This technique allows for quick overview of predominate areas of enrollment at MSU (as in this table) and for other institutions across the Commonwealth and Nation.

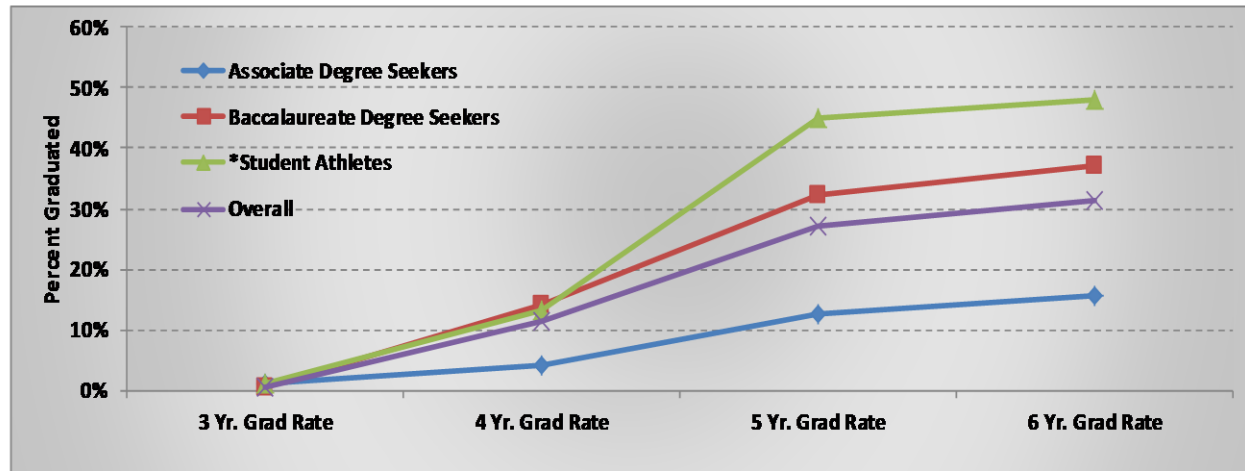

Pie Chart 10.4.Fall FT Instructional Faculty by Rank and Gender

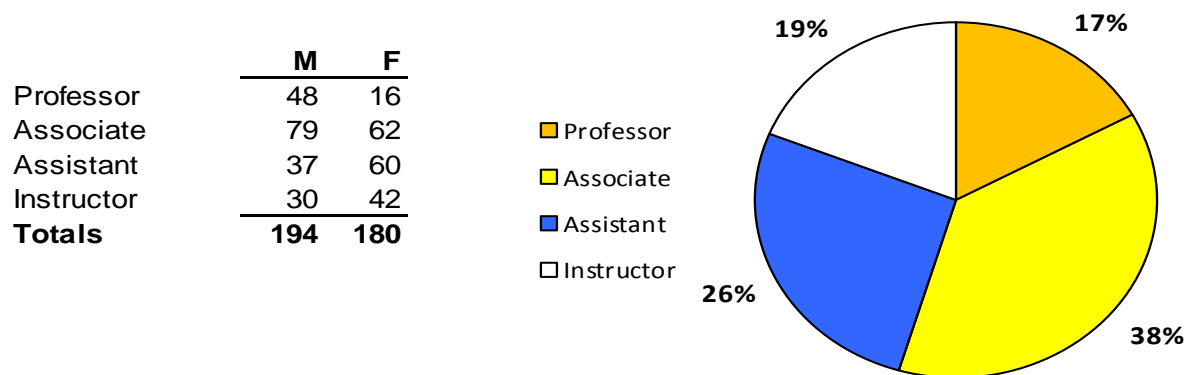


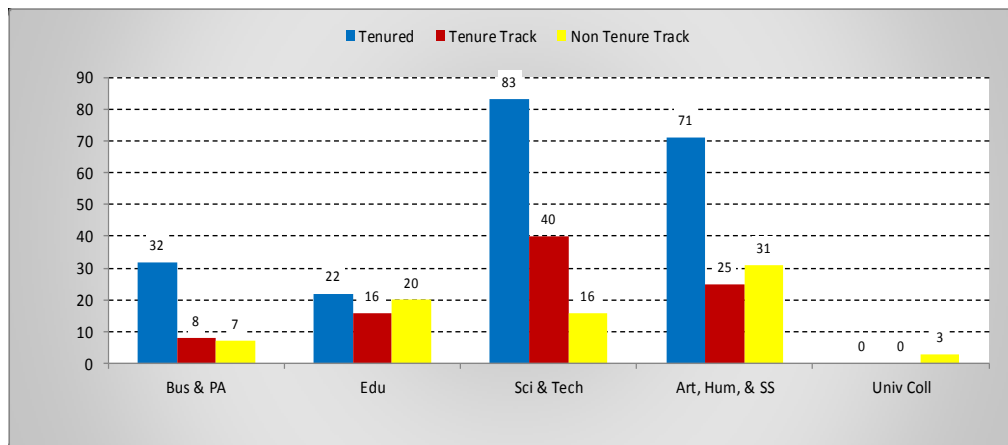

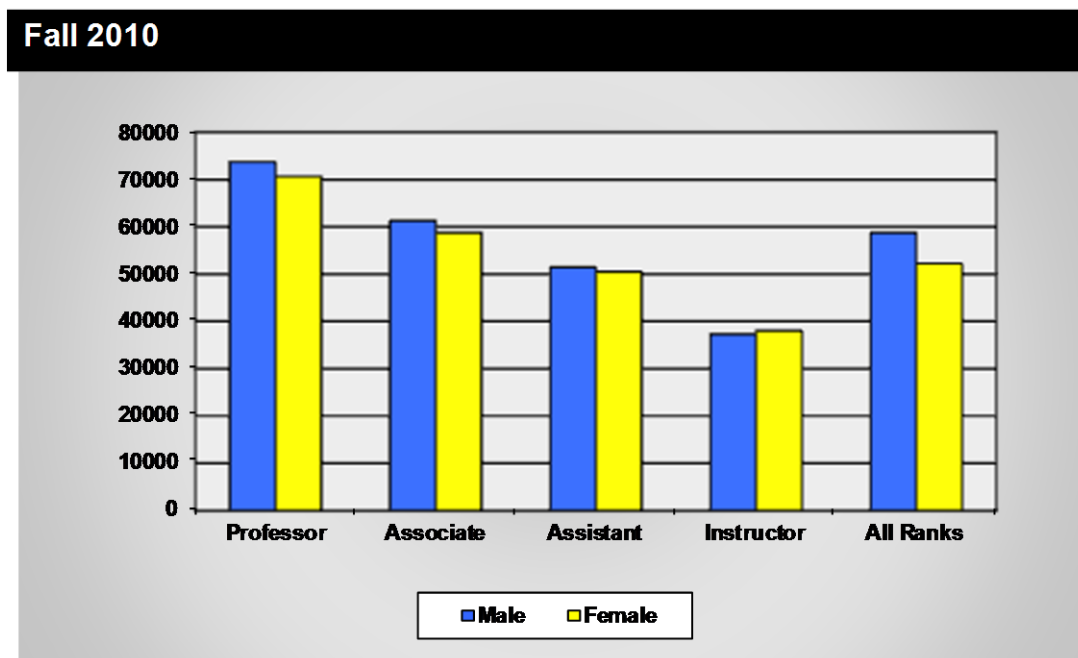

AAUP/IPEDS and Faculty Salary Comparison

IPEDS (Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System) full-time faculty is identified by the National Center for Education Statistics definition:

Those members of the instruction/research staff who are employed full-time (as defined by the institution) and whose major (more than 50%) regular assignment is instruction, including those with release time for research. Also included in this category are:

- * Full-time instructional faculty on sabbatical leave
- * Full-time replacements for instructional faculty on leave without pay
- * Chairs of departments (if they have no other administrative title and hold a full-time faculty rank)

Both AAUP (American Association of University Professors) and IPEDS collect and report average faculty salaries and compensation (salaries plus other benefits) annually. As an option, institutions may forward their mandatory IPEDS faculty surveys to AAUP rather than prepare a separate AAUP-sponsored survey. AAUP publishes an “Annual Report on the Economic Status of the Profession” in the March-April issue of its bulletin, *Academe*. The next page shows a table displaying average faculty salaries by rank for MSU’s Fall 2010 benchmark institutions. Faculty salary averages and respective numbers at each rank have been taken from the AAUP data reported in *Academe*, March/April 2011, when available.

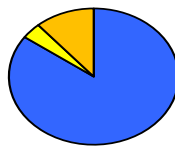

Table/Pie 11.1 Five-Year Trends: Camden-Carroll Library Holdings by Type

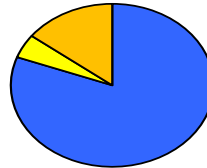

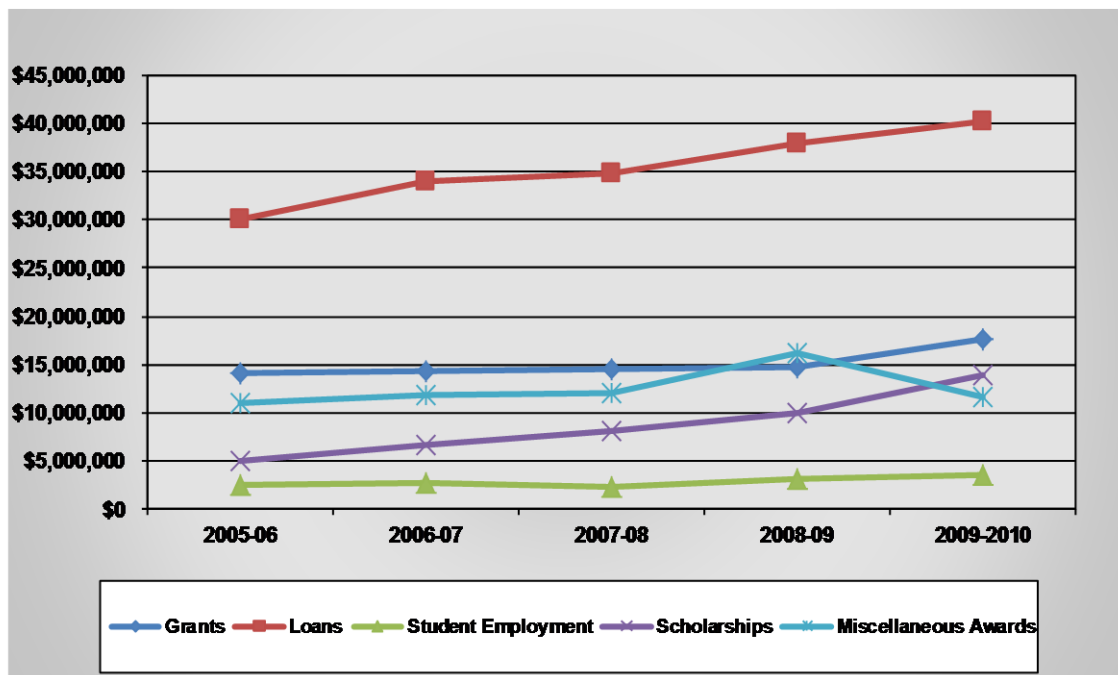

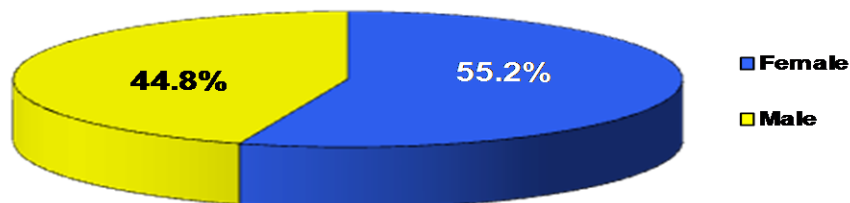

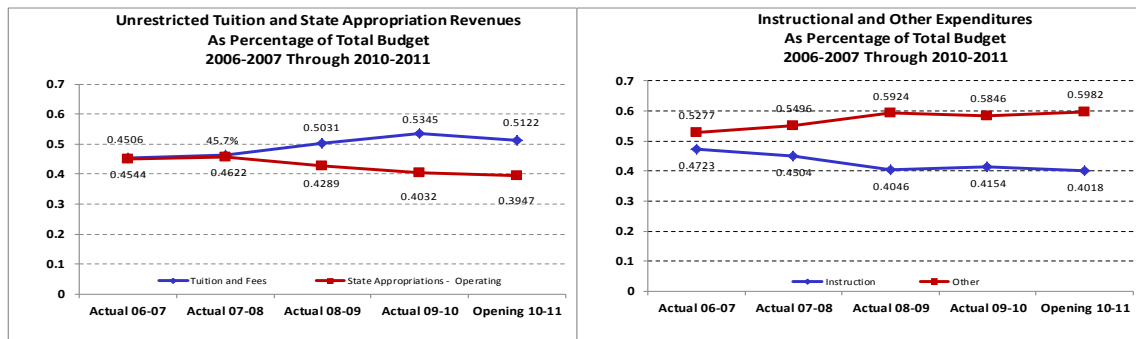

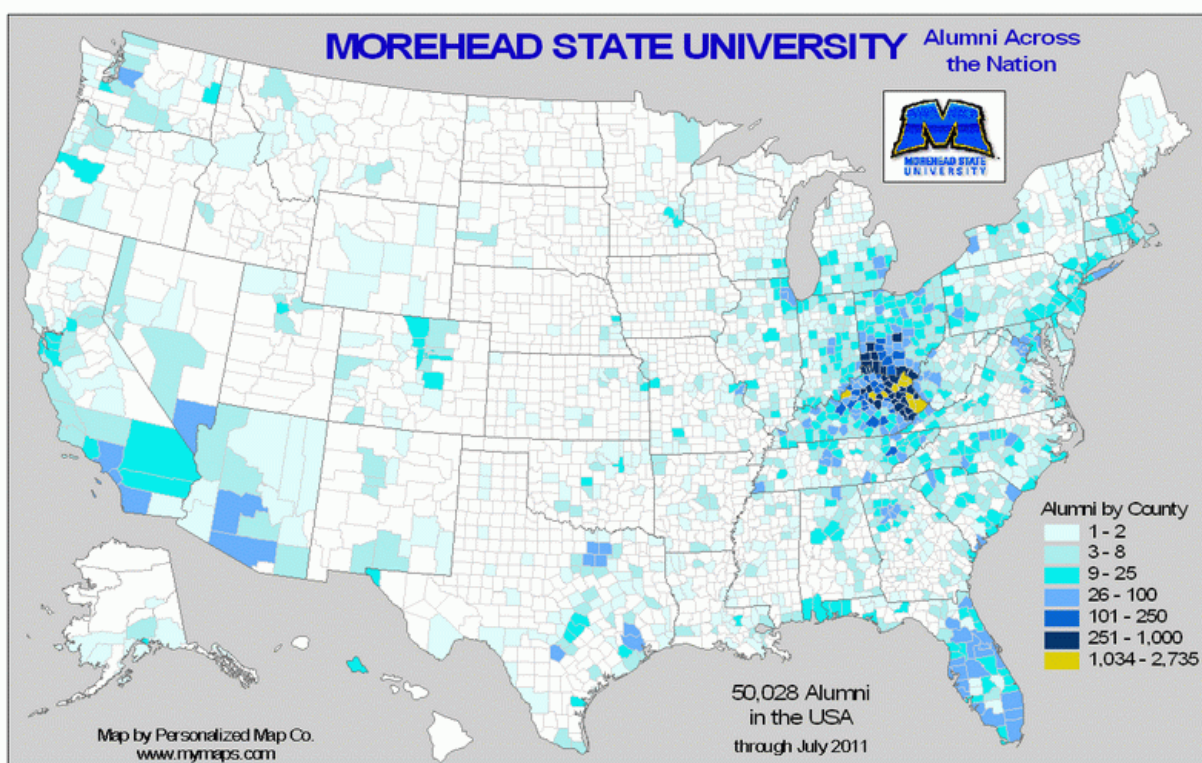

12.4 Map of Alumni by State of Residency

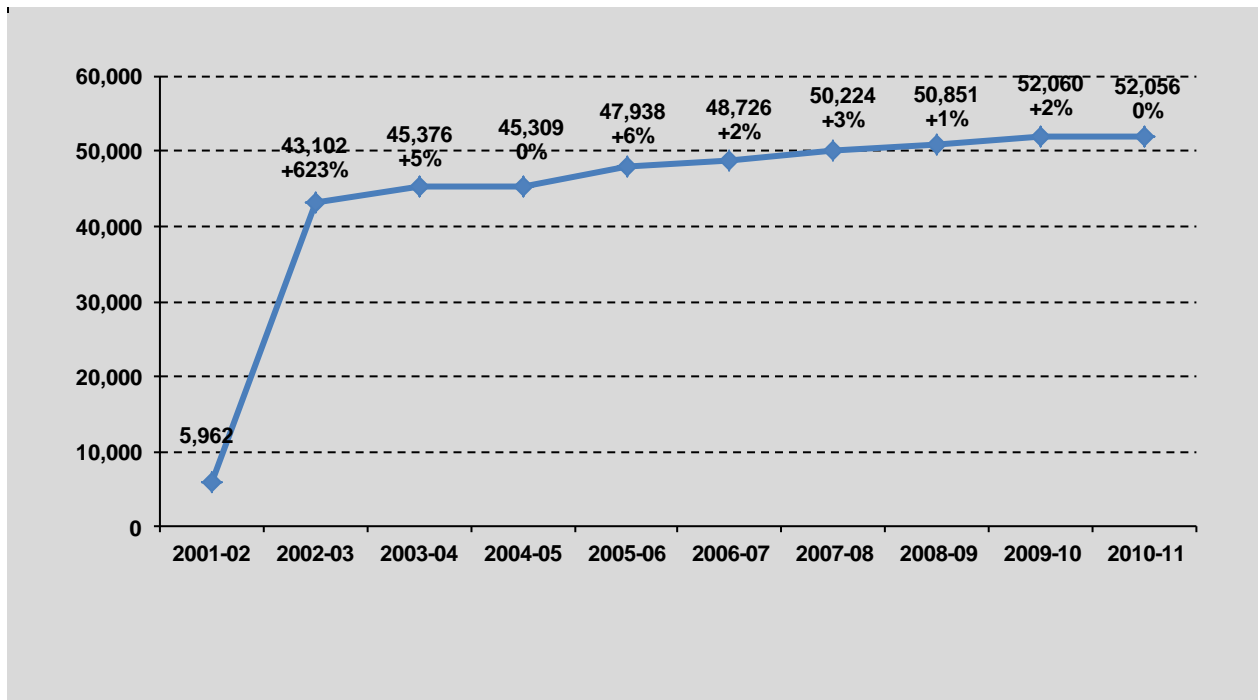

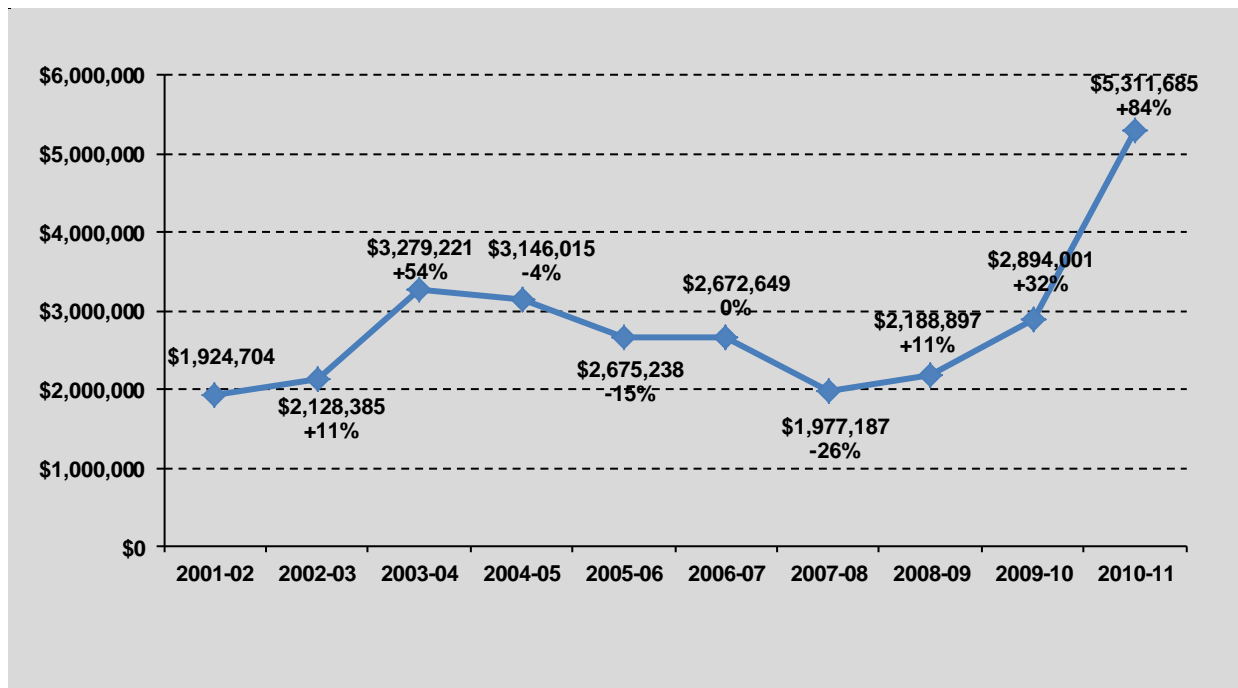
12.5 Active Membership with Year to Year Percent Change: 2001-2002 through 2010-2011

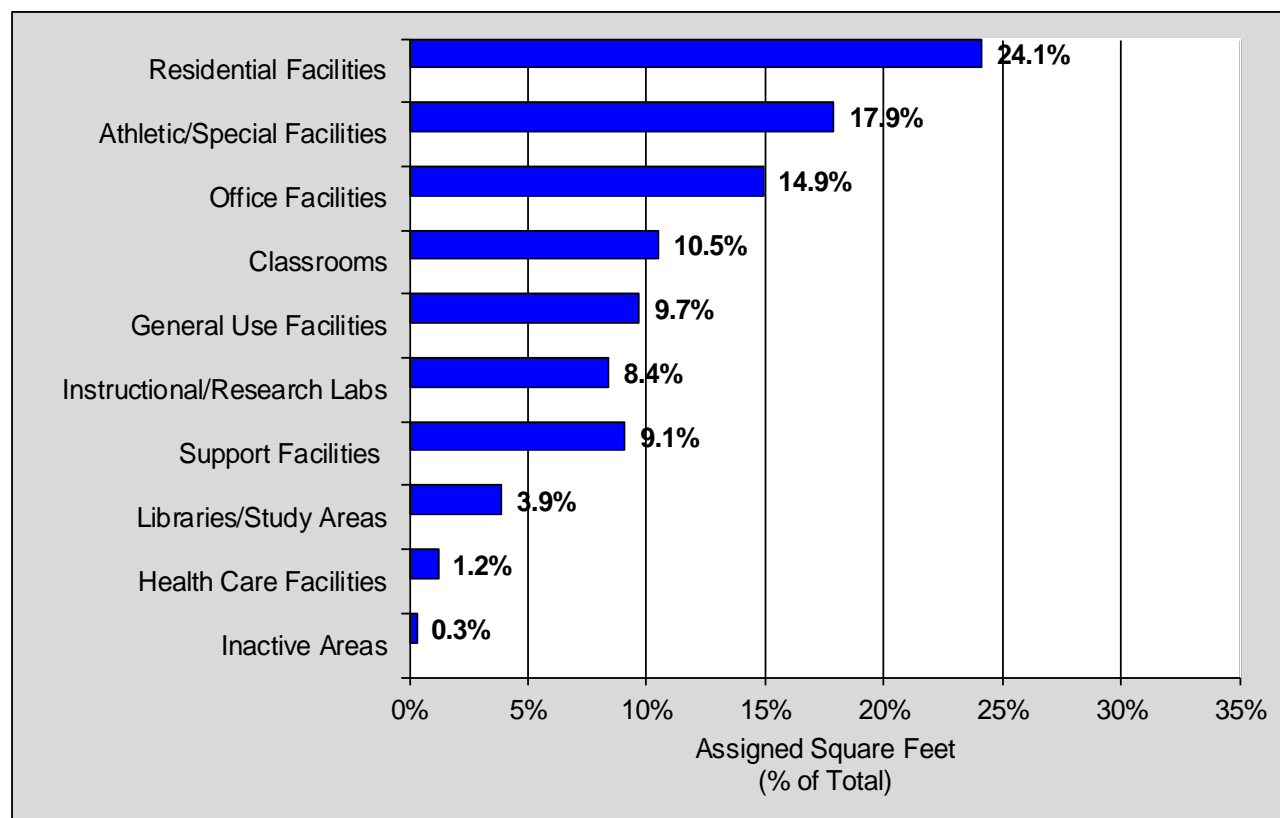
