River Postman

It is probable that London has the distinction of being the only port where the ships lying at anchor are privileged to have their letters delivered to them by river postmen. It being customary at other ports for the postman to apply personally for their letters before the ship is docked. The Thames is divided into two postal districts, each under the control of a boatman, who delivers letters and parcels every morning in a craft which resembles a fishing boat more than anything else. Of these districts the first extends from the Custom House to Limehouse and the second from Limehouse to Blackwall. The river postman airtight on their rounds usually at eight o'clock every morning, and, needless to say, there is only one delivery a day. The mail bags may include as many as five hundred letters, but this number is largely increased about Christmas time. As he glides from ship to ship, the postman calls out: "Any there and hand me the letters attached to a boathook to the waiting crew. It takes only from four to five hours to deliver the mail, so that the postman does not waste much time in foul weather, however, it takes considerably longer, owing to the difficulties of finding the vessels when the weather is so rough, or of steering between the large vessels as they lie at anchor.

Emperor With Gift of Troops

The emperor of Austria is one of the most accomplished linguists in Europe. It is told of him that at one of a great military review he addressed five different regiments—German, Italian, Hungarian, Bohemian and Wallachian—back in its own tongue, and Hungary will never forget how, 67 years ago, the youthful Archduke Francis Joseph, when installing the emperor of Prussia, electrified his audience by addressing it in pure Magyar, a tongue no other archduke has ever been thought to learn. They agreed from their seats, vied their avowals in a frenzy of enthusiasm, and almost lifted the roof with their applause of his display. The emperor speaks both English and French, and is greatly adorned with his own tongue—Westminster Gazette.

BRUTAL PRACTICE OF BULL BAITING

Said to have originated in Turkey. In its decline by the Britons. "The brutal practice of baiting bulls, which had undergone the sanction of a barbarous legislature," said the poet laureate of all the Pascoquas in the latter night, "took its rise in Turkey, in Stanchard, where, according to a memorial custom, a bull was given by the prior to the minister. After undergoing the torture of having his horns cut off, and being trotted to the very stumps and his nostrils filled with pepper, his body was to be treated with soap and he was turned out in that pitiable state, and if the bull was taken or held long enough to pull off some of his hair, he was to be tied to the stake and baited. If the baiting master was the most inhumane and useful of the animal creation, he was to be savage man, by priests and doctors, in too many periods, now and then, they high pretensions, equity and justice, in especially, with the respect to mankind. The columnar corner of animals form a case which offers to Nature herself has born the public contribution in the construction of the bull baiting, and to witness the combats of either that that an act of legitimate industry, if it be the profit of the sufferer, it is to be considered. Queer Japan. In "More Queer Things About Japan," Douglass Sladen says: "Perhaps one of the severest of etiquettes in Japan is that of smiling. When you have lived in that land of smiles you will learn in time that when you can understand a Japanese smile you may hope to understand the people. A laughter-in-law must always remain smiling face to her mother-in-law; the servant must smile when his mistress dismisses him. But the news of a death must be told with laughter. Laughter is reserved for very special occasions and has no relation to joy; smiles are used on every occasion to conceal real feelings; they are not always significant of pleasure. "No wants has the Japanese," the same writer continues. "He can live in his clothes without a tent; he can live on rice or off of the sea; and is so accustomed to carrying heavy weights and running long distances that he can be his own commissariat and even his own soldier. As England turned its foot soldiers into mounted infantry, so the Japanese can turn their riksha-boys, of whom there are 50,000 in Tokyo alone, into unmounted cavalry. Their courage is wonderful. The Japanese does not fear death in any form. If the Japanese are somewhat lax as regards their religion, they are not any rate believers in dualities. The writer says: "Personal cleanliness is a virtue which all Japanese servants possess. It is no unusual thing for a Japanese servant to apologize to a mistress for not having had time to bath more than three times that day."

"THOU" AND "YOU."

The St. Petersburg discarded workmen who have triumphantly secured the right to be addressed as "you" instead of "thou," have once more illustrated the importance of this Constitutional nicety. The only safe rule for the Englishman abroad is to stick to "you" in French or German. "Tu" is not "thou," or "du" is not "thou," and the world imp's a deliberate intention to insult. A patronizing assumption of indisputable superiority to the person addressed, or such familiarity as is proper only between boys, parents and children, and intimate friends.
