THE BRITISH DISASTERS IN THE CRIMEA.
The topic of absorbing interest now, in England, is the deplorable condition of the British army in the Crimea. It will be remembered by those who have paid any attention to the course of events connected with the Eastern war, that when the expedition to the Crimea was first projected and talked of, it was generally believed, in the British army, that that measure would result in the most lamentable disaster. The correspondence of the London Journals, were filled with the most gloomy forebodings, which were attributed to the inept and inefficient manner in which the war, up to that period, had been prosecuted. These gloomy apprehensions, which subsequent events have shown to have been too generally regarded as the signs of the British troops. On the other hand there were, perhaps, a more optimistic or better informed body of troops, than those who were to follow them under their command. The fears that were entertained of the success of the expedition, were founded upon a knowledge of the inherent and ineradicable defects in the original organization of the army—their lack of regular active service in the field to fully clothe.

The brilliant events, however, which the Crimea campaign opened, had the effect of allaying the gloomy forebodings which were the result of the conditions that had been seen. The fighting and successful series of the Alma, which it filled the British people at home with admiration and enthusiasm, inspired the army itself with unabated confidence in its progress, and undiminished faith in its leaders and its Commander-in-Chief. From the rapid and spirited manner in which the comparatively new regiments of the English carried the cannon-crowned heights of the Alma and drove the Russians before them, it was generally expected that the whole campaign would prove a series of victories and triumphal marches—Sebastopol, it was thought, only awaited the appearance of the British bayonets upon the surrounding heights to open its gates and pull down its flag.

This illusion continued for some time, but with the commencement of serious operations of the siege it began to fade, and shortly after the destructive battle of Inkermann it nearly vanished. While the British army, under the spirit of the British have steadily declined, the strength of the besieged has steadily increased, from the first opening of the trenches. Their fortifications have been rendered more impregnable, their number has been increased by constant reinforcements, their courage and spirit has steadily risen in the face of danger and death. In the British camp, starvation and disease and suffering in every form have been the order of the day, and the British have lostered the strength and elevated the courage of the defenders. These facts are now notorious, and the whole British press in its clamorous, and vindictive in its ravings, denounce the commander-in-chief of the British army as a great calamity overtaken a nation as a disgrace befalling it.

We presume that it is not to be doubted that the outbreak of suffering which has befallen the army has been principally caused by mismanagement. But it may be said whether this is solely to be attributed to the incapacity of the Commander-in-Chief. The great derangement appears to proceed from the Commander and Chief's Staff, and the misfortune under which the army suffers are principally caused by inefficient situation to the comfort and health of the troops. And it may be doubted, whether Lord Raglan is solely responsible for the mismanagement which has proved to be so fatal. The ultimate control and regulation of these things is with the Government at home, and we presume that the fault lies as much with the ministry as with Lord Raglan, and proceeds from the mismanagement of the military establishment. It is said by those who ought to know, that under that organization, no such thing as any decision is possible, and in military operations the want of these qualities is always fatal.

THE BRITISH DISASTERS IN THE CRIMEA.
"Are all you out of your wits?" The *N. York Herald and Tribune* of the 23rd reached this city on Saturday the 27th, and on the succeeding day the numbers for several days prior to the 23rd. Among our exchanges received on Monday the 27th, was the *National Intelligencer* of the 10th of January.

Letters from the east, for our merchants seldom reach this city of late in less than five or six days. It is not until the 27th, that letters from Covington, only 65 miles distant, and with a daily stageboat mail, (when the weather and water permit) between this point and Cincinnati, has been as long as 7 days—a delay in this institution and a proof of serious inconvenience.

The *Louisville Journal* last week, reached this city as follows: Monday's paper on Wednesday morning, Tuesday's, Wednesday's and Thursday's papers on Friday, and Friday's and Saturday's papers on Sunday morning. The Journal publishes the certificate of the Louisville Postmaster that they were mailed in due time.
