Resolved, That we will most cordially assist in the election of a Convention to be held at Mayslick, on the 15th day of March next, and use all honorable means to promote the election of the nominees of the same.

Resolved, That a nation's thanks and, and this meeting do hereby tender to our distinguished officers and brave soldiers comprising our gallant army in Mexico, whose indomitable courage and perseverance overcame the most formidable opposition.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting we hold it to be our duty to every man and every man, to matter how distinguished or lofty his position, when aspiring for the office of President of the United States, to be a man of the people.
