THE PASTOR'S PEN.....

We are officially in the season of winter....beginning with THE WINTER SOLSTICE in late December when the northern hemisphere of Planet Earth is leaning farthest from the sun. The days are short and cold, the nights longer and colder. It is a time when many animals hibernate.....become inactive to sleep the winter away. I heard a man say once, that if you hate winter, take a 90 day note at the bank, about the first day of December, and you will be surprised how quickly Spring will come.

THE PASTOR'S PEN.....

When our ancestors sought to recreate the New Testament Church in the mid 19th century of the Christian Era, they made the scriptures the central focus of the Church's authority and worship. The phrase.....NO CREED BUT CHRIST, NO BOOK BUT THE BIBLE was a cry for people to look to Jesus, the Lord of scripture. the model for the as THE KINGDOM OF establishment of GOD on earth. In the past 25 years, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) preachers have been using THE LECTIONARY, a table of scriptures designed to introduce the main themes of Scripture through four readings each Sunday. The Lectionary recycles ever three years and is an excellent tool for the promotion of BIBLICAL LITERACY.

During the month of May, THE ACTS OF THE APOSTLES, and THE GOSPEL OF JOHN are featured readings along with a Psalm each Sunday and various readings from the Epistles of I Peter, and I Corinthians. May I suggest that in preparation for Worship, each one read one of the these works a week. It will only take a few minutes a day, and it will enhance your worship and your knowledge of Holy Scripture.

My preaching plan, together with Scripture Readings for the month of May, is as follows.....

May 5 The Lectionary Readings are: Psalms 31:1-5, 15-16; Acts 7:55-60; I Peter 2:2-10. The Sermon Subject will be, THE END OF FAITH and the text for the Sermon is, John 14:1-14,

May 12 The Lectionary Readings are Psalms 46:8-29; Acts 17:22-31; I Peter 3:13-22. The Sermon Subject will be, RESOURCING LIFE and the text for the Sermon is, John 14:15-21.

May 19 The Lectionary Readings are Psalms 68:1-10, 32-35; Acts 1:6-14; I Peter 4:12-14; 5:6-11. The Sermon Subject is, John 17:1-11.

May 26 The Lectionary Readings are Psalms 104:24-34,35b; Acts 2:1-21; John 7:37-39. The Sermon Subject will be, THE NECESSITY OF SPIRIT and the text for the Sermon is, I Corinthians 12:3b-13.

You are a great congregation to stand before and preach, because of your interest and your thoughtful attention to Worship. I hope that this PREVIEW OF

PREACHING for May, will make your worship more meaningful and that you will have time to become acquainted with the Scriptures to be used in May.

HOW OUR LEGISLATORS VOTED

The 1996 Kentucky Legislature has approved legislation which will allow citizens to carry a concealed weapon.....repealing a century old law banning such behavior. According to INTERCOM (a publication of the Kentucky Council of Churches), both Representative John Will Stacy and Senator Walter Blevins voted in favor of this bill.

After the information of the BOB TROT investigation and conviction of a host of Kentucky law makers...a effort was made to establish Legislative Ethics that would keep them from being "for sale" to the highest bidder, and keep them concerned to serve the people of Kentucky who elected them to office. In the last Legislature, major portions of the Ethic Law were repealed. Again, both Representative Stacy and Senator Blevins voted to repeal the Ethics Law that might have prevented big money from buying future meetings of the Kentucky Legislature.

Both the Kentucky Council of Churches and your minister think that you should have this information.





THE PASTOR'S PEN.....

Our society is continually adjusting the role definitions that bind us together. The lyrics of a favorite hymn by the poet, William P. Merrill have been changed in our new Chalice Hymnal. We grew up singing, RISE UP, O MEN OF GOD, but now we sing, RISE UP, O SAINTS OF GOD. Same tune....same intent....but obvious effort to play down the masculine gender.

In June, we set aside a day to celebrate the role of the father in the modern family. This role faces a confusion of reactions. Sometimes it seems that the masculine role is one of which to be ashamed. Males are accused of warring, of sending the sons of earth into battles where they are cruelly maimed or killed. They are accused of using females to satisfy their lusts. They are often depicted as tyrants who molest and rape and destroy the world.

On the other side of the coin, if a male child is gentle and tender and a bit effeminate, the culture calls him "a fag", a mis-fit, and unacceptable part of the human race. Is it any wonder that the struggle for "gender identification is so difficult today?

I would call you as would-be-Christians today, to help the men of these times, determine their role. Good Fathers are made, not born.... Good Fathers are encouraged by the community to be both brave and gentle, hard working and playful, wise and willing to be themselves. The current film, THE BIRD CAGE is a travesty....a mockery of the masculine role in society today.

Let us not be ashamed to encourage the boy children of our time to treasure their gender...to be brave, strong, tender and gentle....that they may fulfill their role in the culture today. And let us sing once more with gusto....

RISE UP, O MEN OF GOD!



THE PASTOR'S PEN......

Across the ages, humankind has been at it's best, when it has been able to see "the larger picture". "One World"! Some years ago, Alden Hatch wrote a treatise on freedom and titled it, THE GREAT CHARTER, and I am copying a part of that for my PASTOR'S PEN, this month.

"The Japanese were a sideshow. Roosevelt's mind the really serious danger lay in the Nazi surge toward world domination. In the last days of 1940, the peril was growing graver. England, the last fortress of democracy in Europe, was being mercilessly battered. Her cities were blazing infernos; her shipping was and being decimated; she was rapidly approaching bankruptcy. The day that she could no long pay for food and munitions from us would see the end of freedom in Europe, and the beginning of the end of democracy in all the world.

Roosevelt saw that he must lead the American people one step further. On December 29, in a Fireside Chat, he painted the picture in all its somber terror, and called on America to be THE GREAT ARSENAL OF DEMOCRACY.

But merely to be against something was not enough. America must have a positive program. In the Fireside Chat, the President had described the world the Nazis desired; a week later in his annual address to Congress he pictured the world that America could look forward to, founded on four essential freedoms; THE FIRST IS THE FREEDOM OF SPEECH AND EXPRESSION —EVERYWHERE IN THE WORLD.
THE SECOND IS FREEDOM OF EVERY PERSON TO WORSHIP GOD IN HIS OWN WAY—EVERYWHERE IN THE WORLD.
THE THIRD IS FREEDOM FROM WANT.......
EVERYWHERE IN THE WORLD.

THE FOURTH IS FREEDOM FROM FEAR.....EVERYWHERE IN THE WORLD.

That speech showed truly great leadership for it crystallized the aspirations of free men---everywhere in the world. (Copied from NATION UNDER GOD, A Religious Patriotic Anthology, edited by Frances Brentano and found on pages 328, 329.)

So it is today that we must take this message seriously. We can not countenance "the burning of African American Churches", or the retreat behind barbed wire to deny responsibility for the whole people, even when paying a fair share of taxes.

Perhaps the best description of who we are as a people is set forth in THE PLEDGE ALLEGIANCE the American OF to Flag....ONE NATION. UNDER GOD. INDIVISIBLE. WITH LIBERTY AND JUSTICE FOR ALL. To such an end we must live as responsible Christians in America today, and encourage our fellow human beings to live in the same way. GOD BLESS AMERICA!



"AMERICA THE BEAUTIFUL"

On July 4, 1895, "America the Beautiful" was published in The Congregationalist, a church publication. In 1996, the unofficial national anthem of the United States is 101 years old. Few songs have become so ingrained in the fabric of society as this anthem. Every person who grew up in the country became familiar with its stirring words in childhood, and now the first familiar strains strike chords of recognition that resonate with feelings of pride and belonging.

The words were written by Katherine Lee Bates, a professor at Wellesley College. While on tour of the country, Bates climbed Pike's Peak. After viewing the magnificent landscape below, she expressed her feelings in the poem entitled "America the Beautiful." The words were combined with music composed by Samuel Augusta Ward. In 1885 the song came to life. In the same year the words and music were published by the Bryan and Taylor Company in a volume entitled FAMOUS SONGS AND THOSE WHO MADE THEM, compiled by Silas G. Pratt.

In 1996 Americans everywhere celebrate the birth of their nation. Independence Day is the most important holiday of the summer with traditional family picnics and time for every sort of recreation. The celebration is a tradition which began with the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. John Adams, one of the Declaration signers and a future president said: "It will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival....It pught to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, bells, bonfires and illuminations from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward for everymore."

And so it is. But in 1996, showing our love of country is more important than ever before. My history professor at Point Park College in Pittsburgh, Pa., Colonel Suster, a Colonel in the Czechoslovakian Army in WW II, always closed his class with "Remember, the USA isn't perfect, but it's the best there is. So, please We should hold onto it and protect it." practice and exhibit our patriotism. It is not something to be ashamed of. Our country and its government and laws are not perfect. Not by a long shot. But spend some time in any other country in the world and it won't take long t. discover that, with all its imperfections, it is the best there is. We need to demonstrate our love of country and teach it to our children. If we do not teach love of country, our children might never appreciate the freedoms they have.

Attend parades, salute the flag, and tell stories about how you and other members of your family defended our country.

Let's celebrate summer on the Fourth of July, but celebrate with safely, and show our patriotism with unabashed pride!

In the first of two creation stories in GENESIS, God created humankind with the admonition, BE FRUITFUL AND MULTIPLY, AND FILL THE EARTH AND SUBDUE IT; AND HAVE DOMINION OVER THE FISH OF THE SEA AND OVER THE BIRDS OF THE AIR AND OVER EVERY LIVING THING THAT MOVES ON THE EARTH. ----Genesis 1:28. The labor of creation was not finished, at the end of seven days in the Genesis Account of Creation.

Nicholas Berdyaev, a 20th century philosopher, saw the creation as unfolding from that original moment of creation and declared; CREATIVENESS IN THE WORLD IS, AS IT WERE, THE EIGHT DAY OF CREATION.

So, God, who did the original "work of creation", assigned that continuing work....that effort to discover THE PROMISED LAND for our Jewish ancestors and THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN for the followers of Jesus....God assigned that work to human beings in every age.

In the light of a continuing creation, there has been a need for "a labor force". Early on, some people made slaves of other people, so as not to have to expend themselves in "labor force". it took a civil war to eliminate the curse of slavery in an agrarian society, and an industrial revolution to eliminate slavery in an urban setting. It was not strange then, that in 1869, four years after the Civil War, Americans chose to set aside the first Monday in September to celebrate the opportunity and the ability to be a part of the labor force of a "free country"

Remember, as you have enjoyed a Holiday in September, celebrating LABOR, that God has sent us forth, everyone, to fill the earth, and subdue it, till it becomes a home for humankind. And

as you reflect on the opportunity to labor, remember also the need of God's Church for LABOR-ERS IN THE VINEYARD where the harvest is plentiful, and the laborers are few. God has a job for you in the Church today, and September is a grand time to accept employment in The Kingdom of God that is being developed in this, THE EIGHTH DAY OF CREATION! I can think of no better way to bring this column to a close than to share with you these poetic words from the pen of C.K. Ober, who admonishes us......

- GO LABOR ON, SPEND AND BE SPENT, THY JOY TO DO THE FATHER'S WILL;
- GO LABOR ON, "IIS NOT FOR NAUGHT; THE EARTHLY LOSS IS HEAVENLY GAIN;
- MEN, HEED THEE, LOVE THEE, PRAISE THEE NOT,
 THE MASTER PRAISES. WHAT ARE MEN?
- GO LABOR ON WHILE YET 'TIS DAY; THE WORLD'S DARK NIGHT IS HASTENING ON.
- SPEED, SPEED THY WORK, CAST SLOTH AWAY. IT IS NOT THUS THAT SOULS ARE WON.

September is the beginning of the church's program year. The measure of a church is what it does for others....how it reaches out in the name of Jesus to the least and the lost on the planet earth. The Outreach of the Church is the result of human hands, taking up the cross of Jesus Christ, and bearing it into the Kingdom of Heaven in the here and now. The Church does not enslave people...it cries out for volunteer labors who will

The CWF is sponsoring this breakfast and would love to see everyone at the Book Sale - Bake Sale - Breakfast.. If you have books to donate - bring them to the church the week of September 16. Bring baked items after Wednesday, September 18.

Each box should contain study and play materials which are particular to the bible story you chose. There should be learning tools for children from five to ten or eleven years of age. This means you will need a story book and activities suitable for young children as well as for older children. You may find when you are through that there are three or four books in your box, all on the same story, each on a different age level. That is good.

Start your box by first reading the scripture passage which tells the story you have chosen. You may want to read it again in one of the children's bibles which are in the Grote class room off the Fellowship Hall. Try to think of ways this story could be "play-acted" out. If you were going to play "let's pretend" with a child, what kinds of props would you like to have?

You may wish to include in your box:

*felt board characters; people, trees, the temple, animals (we have a felt board in the budget)

*puppets; finger puppets, sock puppets, felt of fabric puppets; paper puppets on wooden sticks

*costumes; is a king or queen an important character? a shepherd? children love to play "dress up"

*props; what is in the story? need a bag of coins? how about some lamb's wool?

*word activities and coloring pages; there are several activity books in the Grote class room, or you may find some in your shopping, cut out the originals from the books and place them and some copies in a folder in the box, children can get their own and the teacher can make new ones when the supply is used up (crayons and markers will be in the class room, you don't need to get them)

*books, books; we have some in the Grote class room, check to see what we already have to you put in your box

*a video of your story; many book stores have videos of particular stories, also, Diann has access to ordering videos from several publishers, we already have some in the Grote class room

*audio cassets; you may find audio casssets with a story and songs for your story

*craft instructions; you may find books with crafts to make which go along with your story, be careful to choose things which require items commonly found in a Sunday School class room, make the instructions simple and be sure to include any drawings showing how to make something, place the instructions on a file folder so they won't get lost

I am sure there are many things I have not listed which you may want to use in your box. Keep in mind the children will be using and re-using each box over and over. If it is practice, you can label the items with the story name so they will always get back in the correct box.

Thank you for agreeing to "Adopt A Box". The Education Committee hopes you have fun creating these learning tools for our children.

THE PASTOR'S PEN......

In the Old Testament Book of ECCLESI-ASTES, there is a vision of "times" and of "seasons". The third chapter begins: FOR EVERYTHING THERE IS A SEASON, AND A TIME FOR EVERY MATTER UNDER THE HEAVEN. (Ecclesiastes 3:1). We are beginning to look toward Christmas...a favorite season every year.....a season that has too much direction from THE SECULAR WORLD and not enough from THE SPIRITUAL WORLD in which the season has its truest meaning. Let me then discuss with you in this article, the Christian Season as it takes its form in the Church Calendar.

The Church begins the celebration of the birth of Jesus with ADVENT.....which has to do with the anticipated coming of Jesus. The season of ADVENT begins December 1 and continues through December 24. This has been, traditionally in the Church Year, a time for penitence...a time for preparing our hearts and minds for the gift of God's Son, Jesus, to the world.

The Church Calendar runs on into the Hallmark Calendar and the merchants cry concerning gift items. So it is, in 1996, that the Secular World starts promoting Christian Gifts the first of November. When our children were little, we had a rule that Christmas records could not be played at our house until the evening of Thanksgiving. We wanted to preserve the sanctity of the season, but now the secular world takes over the season much earlier, and sadly, it has little or no place for God's gift of the only begotten Son, who comes to save and sanctify a world that is lost.

The Season of Advent that extends from December 1 to December 24 is a time for preparing our hearts....our individual lives...to be a place wherein Jesus can be born and can live and from which He can bring the world into the Kingdom of Heaven.

Christmas begins for the Church on December 25 and lasts for twelve days....till January 6, when the Season of Epiphany begins. At the end of the 12 days of Christmas, the Church across the centuries has celebrated the coming of the WISE MEN from the EAST...and Epiphany...an appearance of God to All people, for the redemption of All people and for their inclusion to THE KINGDOM OF GOD in the here and now.

It is not my purpose to despise gift giving. It is my purpose to encourage you to pursue the gift of God in the person of Jesus whom the Church celebrates in the seasons of ADVENT, CHRISTMAS, AND EPIPHANY. May God's blessings be upon us in these Holy Seasons of the Church Year.





FROM DIANN'S DESK

The Education Committee, some veteran teachers, and myself have been in conversation about ways we can rebuild our children's Christian Education Program. Some of the hindrances to our program have been; small class numbers (one or two active children per age group), low and erratic attendance, and teacher frustration.

We have a plan! All is not lost! We are looking at a format which would use learning centers, much like the public school system uses with young children. We would create Story Boxes which would contain learning tools such as hand or finger puppets, felt board characters, character dress up clothes, dry erase boards with word search puzzles inked on them, and any other tool our imaginations (and yours) can think up. Each box would contain items surrounding one Bible story. For instance, a Story Box on the Creation Story may have felt board characters of animals, trees, Adam, Eve, a snake. It may also have some clay for making creatures/ people. It could have a story book on the creation in it. The box may also contain a word search for older children. You get the picture! A child could pull out the Story Box on the Creation Story and re-tell the story through these mediums. This kind of activity has been. called "Godly Play".

Dianna Reynolds told me she sat down and wrote out 40 different Bible stories which could be taught in this manner! The advantages to our

situation for this kind of structure I think are obvious. We could have a wide age range of children in one class. therefore eliminating classes with only one child in them. Children who come irregularly would be easily included because each Sunday's lesson would not build on the lesson before. Two teachers could easily manage a class with multiple learning stations. Each child would do "Godly Play" with a story of their own choosing under the leadership of the two teachers.


We believe Christian

You'll be hearing more about "Godly Play" soon. We are planning to fully enact the project in September. Be thinking of your favorite story of our Faith and what a Story Box would look like for that narrative. There is a place for all our church members in this exciting project.
