These colonies, however, consisted of soldiers only, they having from them but very few women. In consequence of which an imperial order was issued enjoining the different authorities of Volhynia, Podolia, and Ukraine to apply to the administrators of the colony...

The administrators set about executing this order, but on the report getting abroad in some of the villages, the women and young girls took to flight, and sought a refuge in the midst of the forests, and of the deserts.

The Emperor, on thinking that a resistance announced with so much resolution and energy might be attended with serious disorders, addressed a report to the Government, who forthwith sent several detachments of troops, with a direction to put the order in execution.

On several occasions the peasants armed with rapiers and with sticks, sustained a furious contest with the soldiers, but they were obliged in the end to yield to numbers, some were killed, others imprisoned, and decreed to be put to death.

On their arrival at the camp they underwent an indecent examination, after the manner of the military recruits, in order to ascertain whether they had any venereal and other infirmities. The best looking among them, in different costumes, dressed after the manner of the Tyrolese, the Spaniards, and the English, were distributed in the various farms of the military colony.

The country people have presented a petition to the Emperor, supplicating for the return of those unfortunate females, and which has been very respectfully by the Marshals of their districts. It is not known what the result will be, but the general opinion is that the women will be obliged to marry to the soldiers of the colonies.

It was thus under the reign of Catherine II. that Potemkin, after the devastation of the Crimea, transported thirty numerous detachments from different Russian regiments, and in order to complete the project of colonization, ordered a levy of young females, who were drawn from the different provinces and given as wives to the new colonies.
