

THE CHILD FELL.

Bilver of Wood Entered Mouth and Penetrated To the Brain.

Covington, Ky., Nov. 7.—Ralph Lipp, the two-year-old son of Elliott Lipp, of No. 312 Banklick street, met with an accident that will likely prove fatal. The child, carrying a small silver of wood, was running across the room. He tripped and fell, the piece of wood entering his mouth, and, striking the roof, penetrating to the brain. The screams of the child attracted the attention of the mother, who was in an adjoining room. When she reached her babe's side she found he child almost lifeless. The mother pulled the piece of wood from the mouth of the little one and sent for a physician. The child was in a critical condition late Monday night.

AWARDED DAMAGES.

Mrs. Pink Head Gets \$15,000 For the Death of Her Husband.

Faducah, Ky., Nov. 7.—Two years ago Pink Head was assassinated in his yard in Hickman county. A few days before Cheathan Hodge had killed his brother, Robt Hodge, by accident near the Head place. Hodge moved here recently, and Mrs. Pink Head came here and sued him for \$20,000 damages for being responsible for her husband's assassination. She alleged he also killed his brother, mistaking him for her husband. Monday a jury awarded \$15,000. Hodge was not prosecuted for the alleged offense.

THE BALL BROTHERS.

No Immediate Developments in Their Case Expected.

Middlesboro, Ky., Nov. 7.—The city and surrounding territory were quiet Monday night and no immediate developments in the case of the Ball brothers are expected. The return of the last of the possessor effectively disproves the rumor that any of the party which pursued the Ball faction were wounded. Whether any of the Ball partisans were wounded is not known. The Ball brothers and their friends have evidently escaped for the time being into the mountains of Virginia and Tennessee.

Used Oil To Start Fire.

Monticello, Ky., Nov. 7.—At Oil Valley, this county, Mrs. Arthur Massengill undertook to start the breakfast fire by pouring crude oil into the stove. An explosion followed, burning her so that she died in a few hours. Her husband and sister-in-law were probably fatally burned.

Deputy Sheriff Scott Dies.

Nicholasville, Ky., Nov. 7.—J. G. Scott, deputy sheriff and democratic nominee for sheriff for the ensuing term, died suddenly after several days' illness. His place on the ticket will be taken by his deputy, R. Z. Mearns, who will run in the interest of Mrs. Scott.

Missed Train and Loses Vote.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 7.—Being forced to spend Sunday in the mountains at Eastern Kentucky and thereby lost his vote in New York was the predicament in which E. E. Snodgrass, the noted eastern turfing and oil man, found himself. He missed his train.

New Kentucky Postmasters.

Washington, Nov. 7.—Fourth class postmasters were appointed as follows: Kentucky—Hackle, Garrard county, Willis M. Jones, shaver, Jefferson county, Pauline Brown, Union, Clay county, Ollie Hayre, Wallerstown, Madison county, Jasper N. Ogo.

Petition in Bankruptcy.

Gainesville, Ky., Nov. 7.—I. N. Hunt & Son filed a petition in bankruptcy at Louisville. Liabilities, \$672; assets, \$111. The four members of the firm individually filed bankruptcy petitions, their combined liabilities being \$18,311 and available assets \$3,700.

Death of Col. J. Smith Hurt.

Mt. Sterling, Ky., Nov. 7.—Col. J. Smith Hurt died here after a brief illness. He was 80 years old and widely known over the state. Col. Hurt was the organizer of the 24th Kentucky regiment during the civil war and a Mexican soldier.

Shot in Self-Defense.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 7.—William King, of Boston, who was arrested several days ago charged with shooting and wounding C. W. Scott, was dismissed by Magistrate Graves, it being shown that the shooting was done in self-defense.

Post Office Clerk Arrested.

Owensboro, Ky., Nov. 7.—Henry Morton, night mailing clerk at the post office here, has been arrested on the charge of removing valuables from letters. He was held to answer to the federal grand jury in bond of \$1,000.

Beckham Goes Home To Vote.

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 7.—Gov. Beckham left for his home at Bardonia to vote in the election. All the other state officers and clerks are absent on the same mission, and the statehouse is practically deserted.

Police Chief Kills Man.

Richmond, Ky., Nov. 7.—An old friend of long standing terminated when George Alcorn was instantly killed by Sidney Stacey, chief of police of Richmond. Stacey was shot twice and will die.

A post office has been established at Honeygrove, Christian county, Ky., with Edward H. Harned as the postmaster.

Russia Not Standing Still.

Even while the czar's rescript fast-tracking a national assembly was in preparation the Russian people were busy picking up prominent names for the coming struggle. The former in the Bund among the victors was Professor Paul N. Anshov, author of "Russia and Its Future," the strongest book of recent years upon the political problems of the empire.

The author divides the czar's domain in Europe into "two Russias, one quite different from the other: the one that of Leo Tolstol, the other that of Plavie. The former is the Russia of our intellectuals and of the people. The latter is official Russia. One is the Russia of the future, as dreamed of by members of the liberal professions; the other an anachronism, deeply rooted in the past and fastened to the present by an omnipotent bureaucracy. The one spells liberty; the other despotism."

Free is one of the scathing passages of the book which in his very hour of victory brought its author under the ban of the autocracy. Incisive one of Hans Anderson's fairy tale incidents of the wonderful cities which the emperor would see and how it little by little, "The emperor has nothing on," Professor Milonovk makes this application:

"That it is with Russia. Serious men for the last few years have seen a state whose whose beauty was clear only to a few courtiers and a few millionaires of money wanting under the burden of the cost, have recognized the need of a child in Andersen's tale to tell the emperor the truth as to the state of the weavers of the robe are made. This is the way."

The professor's book is not sensational or pessimistic. Russian, the author says, is in process of change. Russian autocracy is the survival of the fittest, but is not in political terms, it is the survival of the fittest. The second achievement of the liberal reform program, the first being the emancipation of the serfs. The political freedom sought is stated by the professor as follows:

Political representation and guarantee of freedom of belief and speech, of association and of political conviction. The free press, a strict regime of law and the free exercise of justice, which justice has received an arbitrary character of extraordinary tribunals and a judicial despotism, and a free and independent and constitutional system. There is no general opinion as to the kind of representative government that may be found. The spirit of the time was to be found in the one named by the liberals of 1877, in the one named by the radicals of 1891, in the one named by the socialists of 1905 and a similar chamber legislature.

The professor finds in the past history of Russia a law of progress, and that, that law, he believes, political reform is inevitable. Russia can move and does move.

Forestry.

The government bureau of forestry reports that land owners, lumbermen, stockmen and miners are beginning to see that conservative forest management means dollars and cents directly to the industries of this country. Not very long ago many people of the land regarded our forest experts and outsiders who interested themselves in forest preservation as meddling men whose ideas were wholly impractical. Now eleven states have some form of forest administration, and several colleges are making forestry a special line of study.

The annual waste by forest fires in this country is estimated at \$4,000,000, a small sum in comparison with the annual product, but nevertheless worth thinking about. To a great extent the loss is due to lack of scientific efforts to preserve the timber. It is generally admitted that unless the destruction of forests shall be arrested a timber famine in the future is inevitable. In the past five years there has been a large gain in the popular acceptance and application of the principles which govern the proper care and use of wood lands.

Up to the present no 1000 dollars have been raised by the public and the chances are that only a few may be struck, says the Philadelphia Record. Their scarcity would in a few years boost the value of the coins to collectors, just as the scarcity of 1864 dollars has made them worth from 10,000 and upward to numismatists.

Another treasure seeking party is working on the island of Manilla to recover \$10,000,000 or thereabouts which is supposed to have been buried there at some time by pirates. It is a mystery where those early pirates got all the money they are said to have buried at various places.
