What makes up SGA?

SGA is comprised of three separate interrelated bodies: the executive branch, the legislative branch and the judicial branch.

• **The Executive Branch** consists of six elected officials who serve on the executive committee. Elections for each position are held every spring.

• **The Legislative Branch**, student Congress, includes representatives who are chosen from each class and various organizations throughout the university. Elections for student Congress are held each fall.

• **The Judicial Branch** serves as the student court. Its members are appointed by the president and approved by student Congress.

How do YOU get involved?

SGA supports and encourages student involvement by operating on a committee system. This enables students other than Congress members to participate at meetings or on committees. If you are interested in serving on a committee just fill out the information card on the back of this brochure and either bring it to the SGA Office or mail it to us.

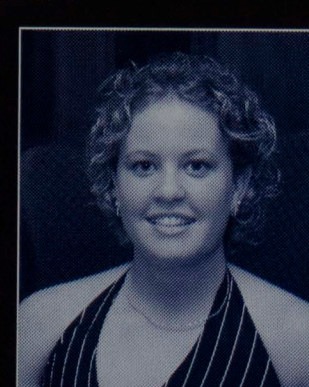

SGA president puts focus on students

Newly elected SGA President Rob Dickerson says he plans to change the way SGA affects students by allowing students to affect SGA.

Dickerson, a senior business management major, says he plans to restructure the way SGA works.

"In the past, SGA has served as a programming board, but its real job is to, essentially, minister to the students," he says.

Dickerson says he wants to focus SGA's efforts on dealing more with student issues - something he says hasn't been done in the last few years.

"If it wasn't for the students, we (SGA) wouldn't have a job," he says.

Dickerson says SGA is in a transition stage this year.

"We're basically redirecting our time and efforts," he says.

The position of vice president for programming was recently eliminated from the SGA roster and a vice president of campus involvement was added.

Elizabeth Fuell will serve as vice president for campus involvement next year.

Along with Dickerson and Fuell, Brian Martin will serve as executive vice president, Jody Abdon will serve as vice president of administration, Abby Liggett will serve as vice president of finance and Jerome Stephens will serve as president of public relations.

Dickerson says he has met with the other officers five times since their election last Tuesday and they have already discussed strategies to improve student relations.

In addition, the new officers have been attending leadership conferences.

Dickerson says SGA will experience many changes during the next year.

"We will be tackling internal issues of SGA before we make any external issues that will affect the entire campus," he says.

Dickerson says, first, he and fellow officers will work on improving SGA's image.

"Overall, SGA has a negative image because of its lack of attention to student issues and we plan to work on the student body and the administration," he said.

By encouraging more student feedback, Dickerson says he hopes to make SGA serve as a stronger link between the student body and the administration.

Plans being discussed include holding more student forums.

Dickerson says he hopes to continue the student/administration forums but also wants to schedule forums each semester where students and SGA interact.

Dickerson says each student on campus should realize he or she is represented on the SGA Congress by at least one person, whether his or her representative is a resident advisor or academic department representative.

In all, nearly 50 student representatives make up the SGA Congress.

Dickerson says the role of the Congress members is to relay information discussed during SGA meetings to the students they represent and vice versa.

"If I don't accomplish any more than this, I want Congress members to be more accessible to students they represent," he says.

I would like Congress members to give out their phone numbers and contact students who have comments so students won't have to always make the first move.

Dickerson wants SGA members to go to students to find out where problems exist on campus.

Dickerson says he will be working with SGA Congress during the entire summer to establish goals and to develop strategic plans for improving student relations.

"When the next school year starts, we plan to get right to work," he says.

Dickerson, a Mignon Tower residence advisor, also serves as a Student Alumni Ambassador, the student regent of the MSU Board of Regents, is a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon and a member of the Academic Integrity Committee.

Dickerson and the five other new officers will be sworn into office May 3 at the SGA banquet.

Next semester, SGA will meet each Wednesday at 5 p.m. in the Riggie Room on the second floor of ADUC.

Morehead State University's Student Government Association recently gained a new leader.

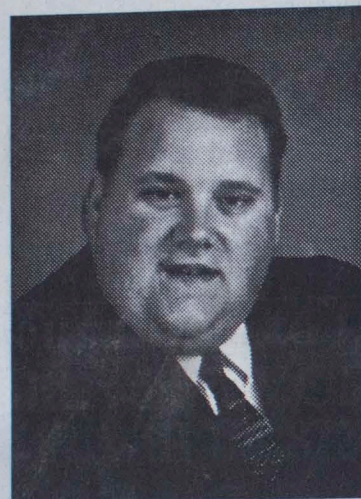
Brian S. Martin, a senior history and computer information systems major, is the new president, and will serve as the student member on the University's Board of Regents.

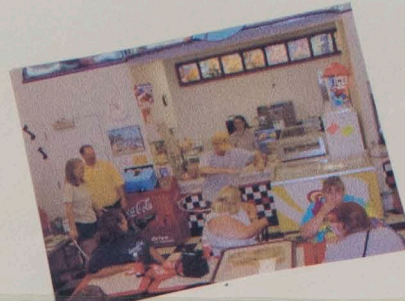

Eaglin said students will experience as 8 percent increase in their tuition prices, an extra \$109 per semester. Residence Hall prices will also increase \$80 per semester.

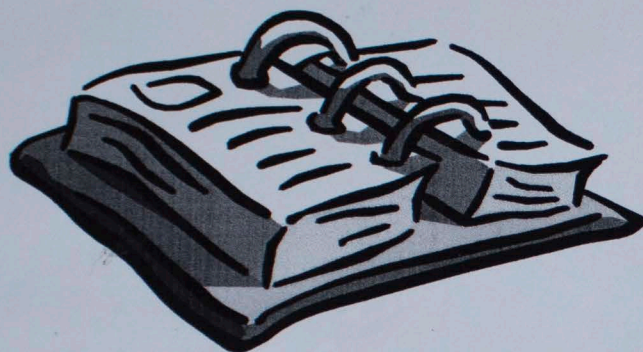

Students address printing issues at last SGA meeting

The growing campus concerns regarding the newly instituted pay printing system were addressed by Information Technology officials at last week's Student Government Association meeting.

Beth Patrick, assistant vice president of Information Technology, and Gary Van Meter, director of Information Technology, were on hand to answer questions involving the new pay printing.

Many students questioned why the system was implemented.

MSU has been studying campus printing for two years, and decided to put this system in place to reduce the waste of paper, Patrick said.

Universities that have imple-

mented similar systems have witnessed a 50 percent drop in their printing volume. MSU is showing similar numbers, according to Patrick.

MSU is not the only state school to have instituted a printing system.

Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University and the University of Kentucky have similar systems which charge users 10 cents per copy. The University of Louisville charges five cents for black and white copies and 60 cents for color copies, but are preparing to increase their rates, according to Patrick.

Information Technology officials attempted to make it clear that MSU is not trying to make

money from this new system.

"Our goal is to break even," Patrick said.

The current charges of 10 cents and \$1 may not be permanent as once thought.

According to Patrick, there is a possibility that prices may lower slightly after the university sees how the system is working out.

Van Meter ended the discussion by adding that a network upgrade, new and upgraded safety phones, and campus computer replacements are projects currently in the works by Information Technology.

Tuition will increase eight percent for fall

Eaglin says hike necessary to meet budget requirements

MSU President Ronald Eaglin announced at last week's Student Government Association meeting that students will see an 8 percent increase in tuition next fall.

Vice President of Student Life Mike Mincey said the increase was the result of a recommendation from the Council on Post-Secondary Education that students should be

paying at least 37 percent of the university's budget.

Eaglin said it is one of the largest increases, collectively, since he has been president.

"Unfortunately, I just don't see any way around it," he said. "As your president, it is my job to keep the price as low as I can, and I think we've done that."

One student wanted to know what benefits students would receive from

this increase.

"None," Eaglin said. "This 8 percent will help us cover the bills. Paying \$1 more will not get you \$1."

With the increase, in-state students will pay \$108 more per semester for tuition. Mincey said students currently pay \$1,355 each semester.

Out-of-state students will see a tuition increase of \$100 per semester.

Those students with an out-of-state waiver will see a \$100 increase and those without a waiver will see a \$288 increase.

Tuition for out-of-state students is currently \$3,602.

"When bad things happen, it happens everywhere - not just at one place," Eaglin said.

Eastern Kentucky University

families don't want to pay high costs for tuition.

"I put four kids through college,

Eaglin said the university might have to cut out some services in the future, because of things happening at the state level.

"I don't know which services would be cut, if any, and I wish I had that answer for you," he said. "Some services may not have to be cut at all - it is just a possibility."

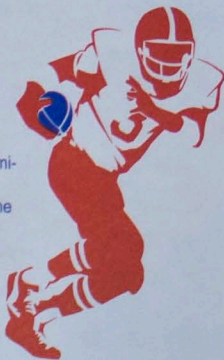
The Family Fund

Campus groups in dispute over coffee house designations

A heated discussion at last week's Student Government Association meeting created concern for some students active in the English Department's Coffee House.

Ten representatives from various academic departments involved with the Coffee House were present to discuss the naming of the SGA and Student Activities Council coffee house series.

Mick Parsons, a graduate student and participant in the English Department's Coffee House, expressed his concerns about the naming of the SGA and SAC coffee house series.

"We've been doing our Coffee House for about 10 years now, and people saw the posters for the SGA

and SAC coffee house and were totally confused," Parsons said.

Parsons explained the English Department's Coffee House is an open forum where anyone can come and participate for free.

"There tends to be a lot of poetry and non-fiction, but it is not restricted to that," he said. "We basically let anyone do and say what they want."

Parsons also said he attended the SGA and SAC coffee house series last spring and two people were thrown off stage for censored violations.

"These people were really offended," he said.

SGA President Brian Martin said, "You have to take the audience into consideration. Those two people were asked nicely to leave."

In a telephone interview Tuesday, Parsons said, "I think the SGA had the best intentions and they are within their rights.

"Our main concern is that we've been doing this for a long time and it's the name, really. We take it seriously and are very passionate about it. At least respect those of us who have been doing this," he said.

Teresa Johnson, SGA Congress member and former SGA president, said Professors George Eklund and Liz Mandrell (advisors for the English Department's Coffee House) were contacted by former SGA congress members about the naming of the SGA coffee house series.

"They said they fully supported

it and the name as long as it wasn't on the same night," Johnson said.

But Parsons said the two advisors were not contacted.

Eklund and Mandrell could not be reached for comment.

Some SGA members told the English Department representatives they should advertise their coffee house more.

"We don't have quite the budget for advertising you (the SGA) do," Parsons said.

He added, "I felt the SGA and SAC coffee house last semester was an unsafe, hostile environment, just like this room is."

Martin said the representatives could ask SGA for money, if they were an organization.

Stew Nantell, SGA Congress member and Residence Hall Association president, expressed dismay about Wednesday's meeting.

"I'm personally ashamed of the SGA on how we treated these people today," he said.

Parsons said he thought having people representing the English Department Coffee House at the meeting helped make known the concern.

"I left the meeting not feeling that optimistic, but we can't do anything about it because SGA and SAC have already spent the money for this semester," he said.

Martin said the SGA has already spent the money for posters and advertisements for the SGA/SAC

coffee house series this fall.

The English Department's Coffee House is held every other Tuesday from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. in the ADUC Grill.

The SGA and SAC coffee house series meets three Wednesdays in November.

Parsons said, "I'm hoping to get together with the Alternative Lifestyle Student Organization and the Visual Arts Guild to get money from the SGA next semester. I'll definitely go back to their meetings. I'm taking the SGA at their word."

2001 was a great year, Dr. Eaglin says



Commentary by President Ronald G. Eaglin

Calendar year 2001 saw the hard work of Morehead State University faculty and staff result in a near-record enrollment, our best retention ever and approval of three new academic programs.

We were highly gratified when a statewide survey showed that our young alumni consistently ranked us among the best public universities in Kentucky. We embarked on a new mission to coordinate the training of adult education professionals across the state.

We applauded 19 of 19 veterinary technology students who passed the national licensure exam and we saluted their professor who was named Kentucky's Veterinarian of the Year. We helped more students succeed academically than at any time in our history and, perhaps most importantly, we paused as an academic community to reaffirm our moral values after the September 11 attacks on America.

We received our first federal funds for the Space Science Center and acquired more campus property for parking and green space. We finished the Breckinridge Hall renovation and expansion project and started work on new student apartments near Eagle Lake and on a new home for MSU at Prestonsburg.

We welcomed our largest freshman class in history and bid farewell to President Emeritus Adre Doran whose legendary life ended at 92 years. We recognized our proud past and expressed our strong confidence in the future with the launching of our "Pride and Promise" strategic plan for 2001-2006.

We selected an experienced, respected educator to continue our tradition of training great teachers and to lead our exciting initiatives to improve teacher education and to work even closer with our colleagues in the public schools.

We joined hands with a dozen other universities to collaborate in research on common educational and economic problems in the Appalachian region. We worked with a county school

district to provide an isolated area with a public radio station based at a high school.

We counseled more than 450 small business owners and helped them raise \$2.2 million in venture capital and create 100 new jobs in the process. We maintained our professional accreditation by the National Association of Schools of Music and hailed one of our music graduates as the state's high school teacher of the year.

We established the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music and appointed one of our own award-winning Bluegrass music alumni as its first full-time leader. We received more gifts than ever before from active and retired faculty and staff members.

We further strengthened our Army ROTC program by exceeding our goal for the number of newly commissioned officers. We created new, state-of-the-art classroom and laboratory facilities for radiologic science and started a residential honors and leadership college for top students.

We opened a new support center for multicultural student services and widened our international student enrollment to embrace 37 other nations. We found new leadership for the English Language Center and other programs in international education.

We restructured academic administration and acknowledged the criticality of fund raising by creating a new vice presidency for that function. We provided full-time staff legal counsel and hired our first full-time marketing executive. We provided statewide leadership in educating college students about the dangers of binge drinking.

We had a successful first season in the Pioneer Football League, our women's volleyball squad won the top three individual awards in the Ohio Valley Conference and our all-female cheerleading squad won a national championship.

Yes, by any measure, we had a great year in 2001.

A Successful Year for the Legislative Committee

After years of being known as a "glorified programming board," SGA became more of a true student government this year. One reason for this was the restructuring of the standing committee system that took place prior to last fall by the current Executive Committee. As a result, for example, the old Legislative and Fiscal Affairs Committee (LFAC) was broken up into two separate committees: Legislative and Fiscal Affairs. The newly created Legislative Committee was given the purpose of writing proposals and serving as the Election Committee of SGA. It was the latter part that the committee put most of its time and effort into helping improve and enhance student government.

One of the goals the committee set at the beginning of the year was to revise the election rules and procedures for both Executive Branch and Congressional elections. The committee believed that many of the rules and procedures were archaic and outdated and needed to be rewritten and updated for today's technological changes such as the new online election system. They received congressional approval for that and have Executive Officer elections earlier in the Spring Semester to allow more time for officer transition. In a recent positive move, they also had congress approve dates for the Congressional Election season in the fall. Dates were made for candidate registration, meeting, campaign opportunities for candidates, and the online election, which will be a week earlier than in the past to allow for more effective organization of the new congress.

While the committee had great success serving as the Election Committee, they also felt they could have done more, when it came to attendance and effectiveness of parliamentary procedure at meetings. They hope the next Legislative Committee will build more on what they have accomplished this year.

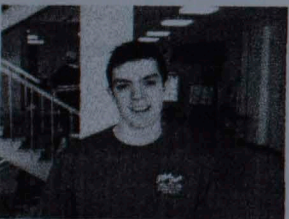

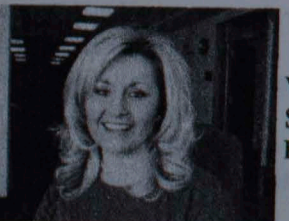
