

RHEA MAY LEAD 30,000

G.O.P. SLATE IS FAVORED; KING SWOPE PICKED

With King Swope setting the pace, Republicans are expected to nominate the entire slate endorsed in convention, at Saturday's primary.

Swope, candidate for Governor, is a top-heavy choice, although Sam Hurst is attempting to make a fight of it. Bingham, the other candidate is out of the running entirely. Swope has the endorsement of 114 of Kentucky's 120 counties, and will probably receive 80 percent of the total G. O. P. vote cast.

J. J. Kavanaugh, who was endorsed in the convention is expected to win on the first ballot, in the race for Lieutenant-Governor.

The Republicans slated Daniel W. Davies of Newport for Attorney General and Joseph Martin Edmuntson for Clerk of the Court "Appellate." No one was endorsed for Railroad Commissioner of this District (The Third) and 11 candidates are fighting for the nomination.

"I'LL WIN IN 1st PRIMARY" DECLARES CHANDLER

"I'm going to win," said Gov. A. B. Chandler announced this week as he drew almost to the close of a speaking tour that has carried him into 115 of Kentucky's 120 counties.

"They (Rhea and Gov. Laffoon) wanted a run-off primary and we're

going to give it to them," Chandler said, adding: "We're going to run off with the nomination for me in the first primary next Saturday."

Chandler has lambasted the sales tax on every front in his campaign.

Kentucky is about to have a good old-fashioned primary.

All has not gone well in the ranks of the Democratic party, and although the rooster crows loud in the opening race, the donkey never his braying for November.

The Democrats are in the spotlight. The Republicans have arrayed themselves in the role of silent critics.

All might be well within the Democratic ranks today but two men—Thomas S. Rhea and Happy Chandler want to be "head" man. Saturday the voters will decide who shall play the leading role in the drama. Even at that there is a chance that the underdog might gain the spotlight in a run-off primary, for the new law provides that unless one candidate receives a clear majority of all votes cast, the two highest shall engage in a run-off primary.

Mr. and Mrs. Voter will probably have the opportunity for a reserved seat at another performance that will be staged September 7.

Today, Thomas S. Rhea, apparently holds the advantage if the calculations of unbiased political observers may be taken as an indication.

It is Rhea against the field!

Mr. Rhea, who has been a leading man in many a political campaign during the past 30 years, should carry the state from 20,000 to 40,000, on the basis of predicted returns gathered by several large daily newspapers.

Happy Chandler claims a majority in the first primary, but it is generally conceded that the best he can do in combining the powerful Rhea organization is a run-off.

Thomas S. Rhea will be pronounced for Governor of Kentucky at the Democratic Statewide Primary next Saturday, August 3, and he will be elected Governor in November, according to Judge Earl C. Clements, State Campaign manager for Mr. Rhea, in a statement released to the press today.

Judge Clements predicted that Mr. Rhea would be indicated by every Congressional district in the state, except one, and in that district he would receive a 50-50 break. He estimated

Mr. Caudill was conceded as possibly the strongest man running on the Democratic ticket for the post. He had an especially large following in Rowan, Powell and Bath Counties.

On the Republican ticket for State Senator the race is between Mr. A. P. Billington and S. M. Driskill both of Morehead. Both have conducted an unbiased and harmonious campaign.

HUDDLESTON SAYS HE WILL GET MAJORITY OF VOTES

Declaring a vote for Rhea or Chandler in the August 3 primary would mean a vote for King Swope, Republican aspirant, Elam Huddleston candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor rests his case with the Democratic voters.

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FACTS Concerning Saturday's Primary Over Kentucky

1. FIRST PRIMARY, as provided for by the legislature at a special call of the Lieutenant-Governor.

2. If any one candidate for Governor does not receive a majority of all votes cast, a run-off primary between the 2 highest will be held Saturday, September 7th.

3. THE FAVORITES: King Swope, endorsed by nearly a hundred county organizations, is a top-heavy favorite to carry the Republican banner. All prognosticators say that Swope will have an easy race, despite claims of Sam Hurst, an opponent, that he will be nominated.

TOM RHEA, administration choice, will carry the state by 20,000 plurality over his nearest opponent, A. B. Chandler, most writers agree, but this will not be sufficient to nominate him on the first ballot.

5. SIXTY-ONE Democrats and TWENTY-EIGHT Republicans are seeking state offices. In District 2 races are being held.

6. All whiskey stores and liquor-dispensing houses must close their doors at midnight Friday until 4:00 o'clock Saturday.

7. THE SALES TAX is the outworn enemy of the campaign. Rhea favors a modified sales tax, and Chandler an outright repeal.

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LOCATION CREW STARTS SURVEY

A location crew of highway engineers arrived here this week from Bourbon County to begin surveys on 2 proposed routes for a road from Morehead to the Lewis County line, to connect there with a highway already constructed into Vanceburg.

The first survey will probably be made along the route of what is known as the Holly road, beginning at U. S. 60 between Morehead and Gates. The other survey starts at the Flemingsburg road.

Highway officials said the new road will be constructed along the line that will accommodate the most people, with distance and cost of construction also taken into consideration.

This road has been under speculation for some time, but the building of Allie Young Highway temporarily halted it for lack of funds.

CONTINUE LARRY FROSE

The senate lobby committee learned Tuesday that Reed O'Connor, former law partner of President Roosevelt and brother of John T. O'Connor (D. N. Y.), was paid \$25,000 for legal advice by the Associated Gas and Electric Company. At the time the committee received "misleading" reports showing the cost of A. G. E.'s fight against the administration's utility bill and its abolition for "necessity" holding companies had amounted to \$751,000. The company originally reported an outlay of \$100,000 in a statement filed with the Federal Reserve Bank.

WOOTON ASSAILS CHANDLER, REA

Attorney General Bailey P. Wooton, speaking at a Democratic caucus for governor, has taken aim at the Democratic candidates to run for office in public office. He declared that neither Gov. A. E. Chandler nor Van Hise could defend the Republican position in the November election because neither of the defeated factions will support the winner.

Wooton declared that Chandler supported a bill advocating sales tax in 1930. He said the Venetian candidate was elected lieutenant governor on a sales tax platform and would be a sales tax man now were it not for the election of Ben Johnson. He said that Ben Johnson was not opposed to a sales tax until he and Hise fell out over the highway department and until the late Senator Alvin W. Young and Laffoon became at odds of the appointment to the state racing commission.

The attorney general deplored the present administration for wanting public funds. He declared that he would advocate a plan, when he became governor, to make the county treasurer of each county collector of all taxes and would thereby save the citizens of Kentucky nearly \$2,000,000. He said that under this system it costs the state \$4,000,000 to collect the taxes which he said it would cost only one million under his system.

COMPARE VALUE OF FARM LAND

Comparison of the number of farms, acreage and value in Rowan county in 1935 and in 1930 is contained in preliminary tabulations of reports from the 1935 Census of Agriculture for Kentucky, released by the Bureau of the Census, and just received by the Louisville District office of the Department of Commerce.

The report shows that in this county in 1935 there were 1,617 farms as compared with 1,581 in 1930; number of acres in these farms in 1935 is 131,000 compared with 130,311 in 1930. Value of farms in this county in 1935 is given as \$1,297,511 compared with \$2,023,647 in 1930.

For the entire state of Kentucky the 1935 figures show 278,500 farms as compared with 286,600 farms in 1930; containing 20,000, 510 acres in 1935 as against 19,627,296 acres in 1930. The value of Kentucky farms in 1935 had decreased by \$229,080,200 as compared with a valuation of \$71,469,622 in 1930.

Three hundred and fifty Rowan Countyans heard Thomas S. Rhea, candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, characterize Lt. Gov. A. B.
