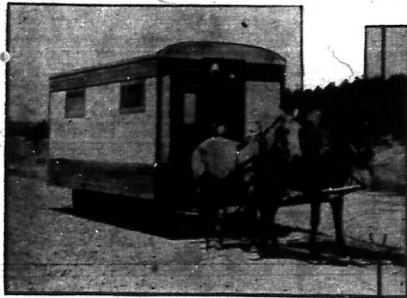

He Gets Paid for Living in a Fog



The more befogged Paul R. Williford of Hollywood, Calif., gets, the more money he makes. the Matanuska valley, Alaska. Lieut. L. J. Hunt of the navy was named second in command.

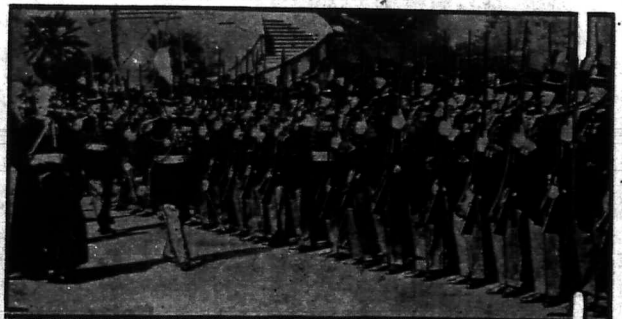

Fine Gift Awaits the President



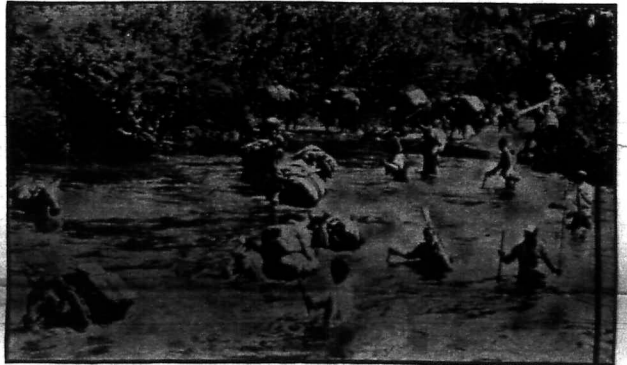

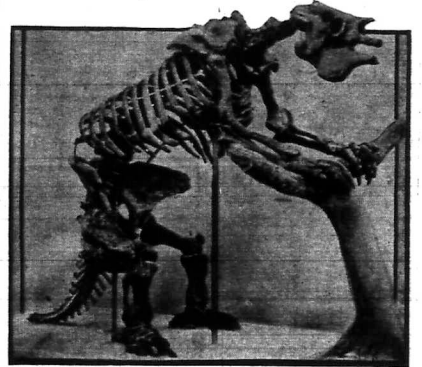

LISTS GRASSES FOR MAKING OF PASTURES

In a recent radio talk on pasture making, Dr. E. N. Fergusa of the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture recommended bluegrass, either alone or in mixtures, for soil that can be properly treated. Farmers who understand orchard grass may find it of value in mixtures for permanent pasture. It used with legumes, orchard grass without other grasses, makes a permanent pasture of high carrying capacity.

Redtop should be included in mixtures for all but the most fertile soils; for wet soils it is easily the most dependable common pasture grass.

Timothy, because of its usual low seed cost excellent palatability, ease of getting a stand, and fairly wide soil adaptability, may well be included in all soils/mixtures for pasture.

For soils that are naturally fertile or that can be properly treated, a mixture of adapted red clover, if recommended, Alfalfa may be included where bluegrass seed is not to be saved.

On poor soil that cannot be treated, the annual lespedeza probably should constitute the little legume portion of the mixture. A little hop clover may be used.

A good seedbed should be prepared and most seeds sowed with one to three tons of limestone to the acre. Superphosphate also should be applied to all except the very best soils.

Soil grasses, erect orchard grass in late August during September or early October, and the legumes in the spring. In all cases, use seed so that they will become covered lightly.

DIARY OF THOMPSON BARRED PEORIA, Ill. —The lurid diary of Gerald Thompson was barred from evidence late Tuesday and the defense rested in his trial for catching and slaying pretty Mildred Hallmark, 19, cafeteria hostess.

Probably that the diary—which authorities said gave detailed accounts of attacks upon 16 other girls—would be introduced had resulted in a jammed courtroom as spectators fought to get to the hearing.

The defense, seeking to prove the youthful toolmaker was insane, asked that the little black book be admitted to bear out contentions of witnesses that Thompson was a sexual maniac.

State's Attorney Edwin Champion objected on the grounds that it was immaterial and "merely an account of sexual depravity." Judge Joseph Daily sustained the objection and Champion's started calling rebuttal witnesses with prospects that the case soon would reach the stage of final argument.

GRAND COMEDY IN FIRST SAVO FILM OFFERING

Out of the superbly fine blend of comedy, romance and pathos that distinguishes "Once in a Blue Moon," the second picture written, directed and produced by Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur, emerges a new comedy star of the first cinematic magnitude. He is Jimmy Savo who plays the leading role in this richly satisfying and watchable picture which starts on Sunday at the Cozy Theatre.

"Once in a Blue Moon" was written especially for Savo and presents him as an itinerant player who drives his horse and wagon theater from village to village in rural Russia, giving performances for the peasants. Savo uses his troupe of players in the confusion of the revolution and changes on a family of Russian Aristocrats who pretend that they are performers in order to effect an escape in his wagon.

En route to France Savo falls in love with the youngest of his refugees, a little princess, who sees in Savo only a funny man who is kind to her. The story of the unrequited love of this little clown is one of beauty and pathos which Savo brings with rare ardency.

The comedy of the film runs thick and fast as Savo probably the greatest pantomimist since Charles Chaplin, exhibits his almost inexhaustible bag of tricks. There is intense excitement, too, as a host of adoring children come to the rescue of their beloved clown and effect his escape from the revolutionary soldiers.

339 Students At U. K. Can Earn \$15 monthly

Three hundred and thirty-nine students at the University of Kentucky will be enabled fifteen dollars each month during 1935-36 school year through the National Youth Administration. Dr. T. T. Jones, dean of men at the University has just announced. The amount if aid allotted the University is based on the enrollment as of October 15, 1934, and 12 percent of that number is given the maintenance. The aid is for men and women as of that date also is followed in the division of jobs with the result that the aid at the University of Kentucky will go to 256 men and 115 women. Applicants for the N. Y. A. job will be received beginning Monday. Dr. Jones will handle the allotment.

Southeastern railroads complained their transports are smothered daily by hobos shuttling from one Federal transient camp to another in search of easily-pained board and room.

WASHINGTON: Many small Kentucky Works progress projects, calling for a total expenditure of \$1,941,699 of Federal funds, were announced today as having been given final approval by President Roosevelt. They are in addition to previously-approved projects in part comprising the huge Kentucky Work Relief Programme now getting into full swing.

BERLIN: Rumblings of what may be a new surge of "State enemies" in the Nazi Reich were sounded today by Paul Joseph Goebbels, Minister for Propaganda and Public Enlightenment.

As the minister issued his warning, speculation was aroused by announcement of the resignation of Paymaster Field Marshal August Von Mackensen from honorary membership in the steel helmet organization of the group of war veterans against whom the "state enemies" has recently been turned.

The general's letter of resignation indicated the Steel Helmet organization soon may cease to exist.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.: A hint that the American Federation of Labor would start a drive to purge its unions of Communist influence came Sunday night from William Green, president.

While the federation's executive council was assembling here for the third of its quarterly meetings, Green in a statement said that he considered "in all probability" would deal vigorously and most directly with the Communist developments in the fur workers' union.

WASHINGTON: A drive to get a world army of 50,000,000 men and women in a campaign against war was announced today by the Women International League for Peace and Freedom.

The campaign will be opened on September 6, birthday of Jane Addams founder of the League. The league said, "a mandate from the people to their governments to end war will be launched with simultaneous meetings throughout the world."

ATLANTA: A county policeman, piloting his own plane Sunday led to the capture of a Negro sought as a hit-and-run driver Kenneth Grant who is injured fatally by an automobile in Cass Park. Dags were unable to pick up a secret.

County Policeman Albert Dodd was off duty, but volunteered his services. Flying low over a wooded section Dodd spotted a negro hideout. He circled and dipped until other officers arrived and arrested the man. A charge of murder was placed against the Negro.

NOVED FARM LEADERS TO HONOR KENTUCKY EXPERIMENT STATION

Dr. W. E. Hamford of the Missouri College of Agriculture, one of the nation's great educators and agricultural leaders, has been selected to make the principal address at the celebration on September 25 of the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station.

Another speaker will be Senator Perry Gaines of Carrollton, one of Kentucky's best known agricultural leaders.

Plans are being made to bring together a large number of distinguished Kentuckians, scientists, educators, prominent farmers, agricultural leaders and other persons interested in the agricultural development of the state.

The Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station was founded in 1885 by Dr. M. A. Sewell, who was one of the noted scientists of his day. He was followed as director by Dr. Joseph Kastle, and then the present director, Thomas P. Cooper.

NO MORE will U. S. be caught unprepared for ravages of DUST

Three-fourths of all the farm land used for clean-fitted crops in the United States is subject to erosion and damage from dust storms, according to the Department of Agriculture. The loss is estimated at \$40,000,000 a year. Erosion destroys 3,000,000,000 tons of soil—enough to fill a freight train that would encircle the world 37 times at the equator—every year.

During the next ten years the forest service will plant 3,500,000,000 trees in hundreds of narrow strips, each a hundred feet wide and a mile apart, in an effort to stop wind erosion.

Educational programs and other aids are being given to farmers throughout the country to aid them in combating the great, thirsty, yellow plague of dust.

In the area where the TVA operates work is being pushed rapidly forward, as shown below, to plant Virginia seedlings which, when grown, will give battle to the dust storms.
