37th Annual Appalachian Holiday Arts and Crafts Fair Dec. 2

Downtown Morehead, Inc. and the <u>Kentucky Folk Art Center (KFAC)</u> present the 37th Annual Appalachian Holiday Arts and Crafts Fair on Saturday, Dec. 2, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. at the Laughlin Health Building.

More than 100 juried artisans will be at the event, offering a variety of handcrafted wood items, ceramics, homemade baked goods, jewelry, and more. Food vendors will be located outside the venue.

"The fair is an opportunity for customers to purchase original artisan handcrafted work directly from the artist or vendor," said Tammy Stone, KFAC administrative coordinator.

Admission to the fair is \$3, and children 12 and under are admitted for free.

The Kentucky Folk Art Center (KFAC) at Morehead State University houses a permanent collection of nearly 1,400 pieces of self-taught art. Dozens of works from the collection are displayed on a rotating basis in the center's first-floor gallery. 
The Appalachian Book Worms December Book Club Meeting


Student-Curated 'Reflection of Life' Art Exhibit Opens November 15th





Morehead State Students Participate in Model UN Conference

Morehead State University students participated in the 44th Annual Model United Nations Conference held Nov. 2-4 at the University of Louisville. Sponsored by the Indiana Consortium of International Programs, the event brought students from six universities in Kentucky and Indiana to simulate the United Nations Security Council.

Bishop won first place as the top member of his council meeting and the top diplomat, based on votes by fellow council members. Walden won the third-place award in his council.

Issues discussed over the three-day event included:

- The Israeli-Palestinian conflict
- Russia-Ukraine war
- Haiti
- The peacekeeping situation in Niger

The students had a particular responsibility given to all Model UN meetings on how countries should address the plight of Internally Displaced Persons.

"This is a great opportunity for our students to learn more about conflict across the world and how countries try to work together to solve it," said Dr. Jason M. Adkins, co-advisor to Model UN and assistant professor of political science. "I am also proud of the hard work the students put in, and it showed with the awards two of them came home with."

Dr. James Masterson, chair of the Department of History, Philosophy, Politics, Global Studies and Legal Studies and associate professor of political science, also served as co-advisor.


"Model events like UN and EU provide students in all majors in our department with active learning opportunities to engage with students from other universities to work towards the common interests found among the nations they represent," Masterson said. "After studying deeply about their assigned country students are well equipped to work their negotiating tactics and diplomatic skills to draft resolutions that can be passed within the framework of the particular institution. All of the student delegates have found these activities enjoyable and worthy of their time."

Morehead State University also plans to participate in the Model European Union meeting from April 13 to April 15 at Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana.

Bluegrass Diversion Returns to WMKY

After more than a decade, a listener favorite returns to WMKY (90.3FM). Focusing on new and classic bluegrass, old-time, and traditional music, "Bluegrass Diversion" can be heard on Saturdays at 10 a.m.

First launched in 1984, Lisa Lally (Class of 1986) was the creator and host of the original "Bluegrass Diversion" program, followed by John Skaggs (Class of 1990) and the late Sandy Knipp, who hosted the program for 20 years.

The new host of "Bluegrass Diversion" is John Ryster (Class of 2013,) a multi-instrumentalist, luthier, teacher, and music historian. Ryster came to Morehead State University in 2008 for the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music program and graduated with a bachelor's degree in construction management.

"Music is a big part of my life," said Ryster. "I currently play in a string band called Hogtown, which consists of myself, Thomas Albert, and Nick Lloyd. I also host the Elliott County Fiddlers Convention in Sandy Hook, Kentucky, during the second weekend in July."

"Bluegrass Diversion" on Morehead State Public Radio (MSPR) is WMKY's weekly showcase of bluegrass music, spotlighting music news, concerts and festivals, interviews, in-studio guests, and listener requests.

"I hope listeners enjoy my program as a continuation of the work Sandy Knipp, Tony Pence (Class of 2012), Michelle Wallace, and Jesse Wells (Class of 2007) did before me on WMKY," said Ryster. "I hope to highlight the wealth of local bluegrass talent in our area, as well as traditional bluegrass, national performers, and the classic traditional, old-time sounds for a true diversion in bluegrass music."

Besides being an accomplished musician, Ryster is a luthier who builds custom Appalachian violins at his home in Hogtown Ridge in Rowan County, Kentucky. A 2023 Appy Award winner for Best Luthier, Ryster is a master instructor with the Kentucky Arts Council's Folk and Traditional Arts Apprenticeship Project.

"I learned to build instruments from Tommy Case of Georgetown through the Kentucky Arts Council apprenticeship. I love it, and I've been busy building them for folks ever since," said Ryster. "Musicians from all over own my violins, including Tyler Childers, Sarah Pirkle, and Pete Thompson."

Ryser says he understands that bluegrass music has a long and strong tradition in Appalachian culture.

"We're like a family," said Ryster. "Bluegrass and traditional music are vital parts of our culture in eastern Kentucky. It's important to have a program on WMKY to showcase this music. The fact that it's on a public radio station is even better because we're free to play the real stuff!"

Morehead State Students Earn National Theatre Recognition

Several Morehead State University theatre students received awards and nominations from the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (KCACTF).

Heather Fannin, a senior theatre major from Morehead, received the Outstanding Directing Award from the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (KCACTF) Region 4. The KCACTF recognized her for her direction in the MSU theatre production "The Women of Lockerbie."

Written by Deborah B. Brevoort, "The Women of Lockerbie" is the true story of Pan Am Flight 103, shot down over Lockerbie, Scotland, in 1987. The play follows the women of Lockerbie as she clashes with the U.S. government for the right to clean and return the personal belongings of the passengers to their families.

Fannin said after registering the show for the festival, a respondent for the festival comes to see your performance and provides feedback. After the show closed, Octavia Biggs, director of Morehead State's Little Theatre Company and Fannin's mentor, revealed her nomination for the Outstanding Directing Award. The only thing that shocked her more than getting nominated was receiving the award as the winner.

"I was completely overtaken with emotion," Fannin said. "I was so proud of not only the work I had accomplished but all of the efforts the actors did to make this possible. To put so much passion and love into something and to watch others recognize my work is an amazing feeling."

In addition to Fannin's recognition, other MSU theatre students received nominations by KCACTF for their work in "The Women and Lockerbie." Hadley Pierce (junior theatre education major, Paducah) and Summer Little (junior theatre education major, Hi Hat) both earned nominations for the Irene Ryan

Acting Award, while Natalie Shoemaker (sophomore theatre education major, Winchester) received recognition for her role as state manager of the production.

All these students are eligible to attend the KCACTF Region 4 conference in Albany, Georgia, in February 2024. They will compete against other college students within the seven states in our region. Should they choose to move forward, they could potentially compete for a place at the national competition at The Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., and receive a substantial scholarship.

"I am so honored to be able to be recognized with two very talented and hardworking actors. They have continuously put in so much time and effort into our department, and it does not go unnoticed," Fannin said. "And for Natalie Shoemaker, who was my stage manager and is also nominated, we worked very closely during this entire process and were continuously devoted to putting on the best possible production in the best environment for everyone. I cannot wait to see what life has in store for these talented women."

Dr. James Masterson Publishes New Article on Environmental Policy

Dr. James R. Masterson, associate professor of political science at Morehead State, published a coauthored article in Asian Survey, a University of California Press publication.

Masterson co-authored the article with Jingwen Wu, a Ph.D. student at the University of Kentucky. It examines the effectiveness of public policy in incentivizing developing nations to prioritize environmental regulation with a specific focus on China's most recent environmental policy, the Ecological Environmental Protection Plan.

The study finds evidence of air quality improvements following the implementation of the policy. It also found more significant enhancements in air quality in the cities most affected by the institutional changes of the policy.

"This research shows that well-crafted public policy can improve air quality, providing crucial insights for policymakers and scholars alike," Masterson said. "Policymakers, climate researchers, and public policy students will benefit from the article's contribution to the field of air quality policy in general and China's attempts to clean up its air in particular."

Access to the full article is available for free until October 28.

Spartman Skaggs Pride Scholarship Fund Established

The Morehead State University Foundation announced the establishment of the Spartman Skaggs Pride Scholarship, a fund to assist MSU LGBTQ+ students in affording their education.

Larry "Aaron" Skaggs (Class of 1996, 1998) established the scholarship in his estate plans to honor his husband of 28 years, Barry Spartman (Class of 2003). Spartman was a library specialist at Camden-Carroll Library at MSU when he passed away in 2022 at 49. He began a 31-year career at the library as a workstudy student when he was 18 after graduating from Elkhorn City High School.

Skaggs, a native of Elliott County, was the first in his immediate family to earn a college degree. He graduated high school as a salutatorian in 1993 and earned MSU's prestigious Presidential Scholarship. Skaggs met Spartman at MSU while earning an associate degree in radiologic sciences. He continued his education at Kettering College of Medical Arts with a specialty in Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI).

Skaggs returned to complete his bachelor's degree in 1998. He became a top MRI educator at Siemens Healthcare in Erlangen, Germany, and received many awards and accolades for his dedication and contributions.

Scholarship recipients must be full-time students identifying as LGBTQ+ and reside in either Elliott County or Pike County. They must also have a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or above and major in radiologic or library sciences.

"Aaron hopes this scholarship will inspire LGBTQ+ students from his and Barry's hometowns to pursue their educational dreams and realize their full potential," said Allison Caudill (Class of 2005, 2009), executive director of alumni relations and development. "This scholarship was created in honor of Aaron and Barry, their love for each other, and in appreciation of their education."

At Morehead State University, 95% of students receive some form of financial aid. The MSU Foundation is instrumental in assisting with scholarship support. The Foundation's endowment, valued at over \$70 million, manages nearly 600 funds to support MSU students.




