

#### Where's The Power

Looking out the window today provides an unusual sight. Trees are covered with ice. Snow and sleet are falling in heavy blankets. Everyone passing by has hats pulled down and ear muffs at work.

The radio and newspaper are full of ails about flood warnings and power outages. The electrical power at the church was out for Sunday's service.

In the balance of power, Mother Nature seems to be showing her great strength.

I can't help remembering the biblical story of another place and another time. Jesus was in a boat with some of His disciples and a storm approached. No snow or ice, but a storm at sea in a small boat certainly reveals the balance of power between mother nature and the occupants of the boat.



# Pastor's Pen

Obviously, God's ways are not our ways yet. One of the most beautiful passages in the Old Testament makes this apparent: "...they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." (Is 2:4)

Isaiah and his people were not strangers to war. Looking back over human history, war has almost been a part of the human condition. Today we just turn on the television and we can bring smart bombs and laser guided missiles right into our homes: better technology, same old war.

If this war and its suffering has taught us anything perhaps it is that we must be more vigilant about keeping the peace. When the shooting slows and peace appears, let us all pray and work to insure that the peace is not as temporary as this current war. Let us pray that the ground in Iraq which has been hallowed by so much blood and destruction can yield a beginning of peace in that part of the world. Let us pray the might of America can be as influential and effective in making peace as it can be in making

war. Let us pray that we are closer to Isaiah's vision and not further away.

Isaiah had many words from God. Other words for us to heed are:

"...for thus says the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel."(Is 30:15)

In returning and rest you shall be saved, in quietness and in trust shall be your strength.

Let us pray our current war is the beginning of a lasting peace.



#### **New Electrical System**

As many of you know we are having the electrical system completely reworked in our Church. A new 800 Amp service and distribution panel plus 3 new sub panels have been installed. Many of the old circuits will be abandoned. New dimmers for the sanctuary lighting will be installed in the right rear seating area along with controls to lower the chandeliers for maintenance. The second controls are to be relocated in the balcony. New safety/exit lights will be installed where required by code and all attic wiring is being replaced. More outlets will be placed in the kitchen and fellowship hall. The new result will be a

much safer building with more load capacity (and fewer blinking lights).

The total project will be just short of \$40,000. The board has decided to use \$15,000 from Living Memorial and borrow up to \$25,000. In order to repay the loan we all need to begin chipping in to our **Capital Fund**. This doesn't need to be done all at once, but we would like to have it paid in 2 years time. If we all make regular gifts to this fund, each according to his or her ability, we can do this with no real strain on anyone. This Church has done much larger projects in the past so this should be a piece of cake for us.



.Answered Prayer

Do you ever have a prayer answered? I mean answered with a clear "Yes!" Shortly ago there was a situation for which I was praying. A perfect outcome, in my opinion, seemed improbable yet possible. Well, let me tell you, to most people it really wasn't a big deal but everything fit together perfectly. It was one of those -"Thank You, Lord" moments.


Money and the Church






I don't talk about money as much as I probably should. On the other hand, it is such a joy to see the church prosper and be responsive to God's call and claim on every part of us.

And I will do my small part to make that future come true.





## Capital Fund Rewiring Project

Just a few words as a reminder and an update on the rewiring of the church. We have ended the first quarter of the repayment cycle, and have paid \$246.33 in interest on the note at the People's Bank. 



If you haven't been fishing for folks for awhile, it's time to get your line wet.




#### 2004 Budget

It's that time again! Fortunately, we have gotten through another year, and it is past time to prepare the budget for the coming year. If things go as planned, we will mail a proposed budget to you sometime in November. David Perkins and Glenn Johnston have taken the bull by the horns and are going to collect the data from the chairs of the committees and put it into budget form. By the way, the opportunity is still open for someone to take over the chair of stewardship.

Now a few words about how time affects the value of our gifts. If the cost of things is increasing at the rate of 2% per year, each dollar you gave five years ago is worth only \$.91 this year. Inflation has grown the cost of that \$1 five years ago to \$1.10. We are creatures of habit, even when we give to the church. So, please consider the affect of inflation on your giving, and if you have been giving a fixed amount over a few years, you are supporting the budget a little less each year. If we all give at our ability to give level, this congregation will have few or no problems with its finances.

#### Rowan County Storybook Christmas






Please don't underestimate the importance of you taking your place in the pew on Sunday mornings. It really matters to us all.





#### **Christmas Travelers**

Christmas recalls the story of travelers propelled by the unhurried rhythm of their animals:

We three kings of Orient are

Bearing gifts we traverse afar,

Field and fountain, moor and mountain,

Following yonder star.

Why did these wisemen undertake such a journey?

A tall astronomer, advisor to the Persian king, springs from his midnight vigil in the palace courtyard. "Casper, come! Look along the rod I've sighted toward the constellation of the Jews." Now they follow the shining star till it rests over a simple Bethlehem home. At early dawn neighbors gather to watch the richly-robed travelers dismount. Joseph meets them at the door.

"We've come to see the child, the King." The wise men fall before the Babe, faces to the floor, royal counselors doing homage, worshipping the Christ child. Outside, their servants unload weighty chests from the camels and set gifts before the King. Heavy fragrances of frankincense and myrrh mingle to fill the room as one by one the boxes are opened.

A touch of the boy-child's tiny fingers, a final longing look, and the men rise to go. Camel bells soon fade in the brisk morning air.

We, too, travel at Christmas, visiting family and friends. Yet, like the wisemen, the most important journey we make these heetic holidays is to draw nigh Jesus himself with the gift of our hearts.
