

DELAYED TOPPING CLOSE

SUCKERING BEST PRACTICE

Experiments made at the Experiment Station indicate that, consider ing both yield and quality, toppn followed by close suckering give the most profitable results with bur indicate that, consider the most profitable results with bur-ley tobadeo, opping was delayed un-til all the plants had bloomed and a few pods had developed on the seed heads. Suckers were kept closely pulled until harvest time.

The color and body of White Bur-

leaf are influenced greatly by ley leaf are influenced greatly by the practices followed in handling the crop after the flower buds ap-pear. The practice usually followed in the past was to top the plants as soon as the button showed, leaving 14 to 20 leaves, deperfing upon the vigor of the plant, weather condi-tions and the like. Suckers were kept

vigor of the plant, weather conditions and the like. Suckers were kept pulled closely. This method of hand ling, still followed by many growers tends to cause the development of large, thick leaves which give heavy yields but which may not be very colory, especially in certain seasons and on some kinds of soil.

Higher topping usually results in the production of thinner, brighter leaf of less size and weight. Allowing suckers to grow a large size before pulling has the same tendency. In recent years, suckering practices intended primarily to reduce labor have been extensively adopted. Unquestionably these practices of the reduce yields, but give higher quality of leaf. It is the opion of many growers that the reduced cost of production and the higher prices received for the leaf more than compensate for the reduction in yield. It is probably impossible to obtain the highest quality of leaf from the highest quality of leaf and the same time. The leaves with heavy, body necessary for heavy yield, do not curre as bright as thin leaves.
