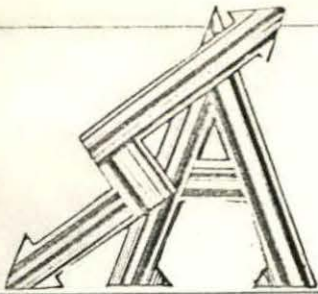

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A JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing and directing a comprehensive study on the feasibility of establishing a professional school of veterinary medicine in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

WHEREAS, there is currently no school of veterinary medicine within the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, those opting to enter the profession of veterinary medicine have been forced to seek training in other states; and

WHEREAS, those students receiving degrees have sometimes not returned to the Commonwealth of Kentucky to practice veterinary medicine; and

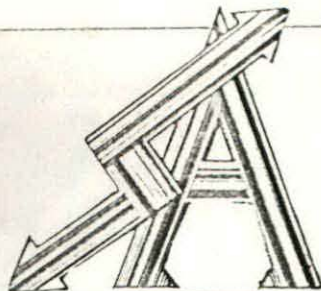
WHEREAS, the equine industry continues to be a major economic industry for Kentucky;

NOW, THEREFORE,

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the Kentucky Intercollegiate State Legislature:

Section 1. That the Council on Higher Education, with the assistance of the Legislative Research Commission conduct a comprehensive study on the feasibility of establishing a professional school of veterinary medicine in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to accomplish the study. Any amount remaining shall revert back to the General Fund. The study shall begin not later than August 1, 1986 and the report shall be submitted to the General Assembly no later than July 1, 1987.

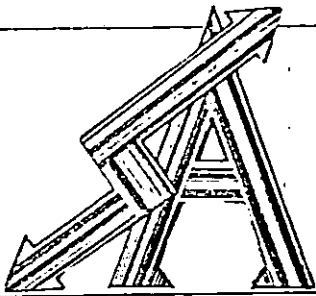

An ACT relating to the repeal of KRS Section 510.100.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Kentucky Intercollegiate State Legislature:

Section 1. KRS 510.100 is repealed in its entirety:

~~KRS-510.100.---Sodomy-in-the-fourth-degree.--(1)-A-person-is-guilty of-sodomy-in-the-fourth-degree-when-he-engages-in-deviate-sexual intercourse-with-another-person-of-the-same-sex.--~~
~~(2)-Notwithstanding-the-provisions-of-KRS-510.020,-consent-of-the other-person-shall-not-be-defense-under-this-section,-nor-shall lack-of-consent-of-the-other-person-be-an-element-of-this-offense.~~
~~(3)-Sodomy-in-the-fourth-degree-is-a-class-A-misdemeanor.~~

: An ACT to amend KRS 164.475.

Be it hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the Kentucky Intercollegiate Student Legislature:

Section 1. KRS 164.475 is amended to read as follows:

KRS 164.475 Allocation of enrollment positions by state schools of [~~medicine and dentistry~~] medicine, dentistry, and law-Competitive selection of entering class medical, dental, or law students.

(1) The board or trustees of the state colleges and universities offering degree programs in medicine or dentistry shall allocate [~~seventy-percent-(70%)~~] sixty five percent (65%) of the enrollment positions for the entering class each year, equally among each congressional district as determined by the last decennial federal census to determine that district's proportion of the positions for each district to those applicants who are legal residents in that congressional district.

(2) Fifteen percent (15%) of the remaining positions shall be allocated to the state at large and assigned to applicants who are legal residents at any place within the state of Kentucky.

(3) Any qualified legal resident shall have a preference in securing an assignment to a position when comparable to a nonresident.

(4) The total number of nonresident assigned positions to a medical, dental, or law school shall not exceed [~~fifteen-percent (15%)~~] twenty percent (20%) of the total entering class enrollment positions assigned for any school year.

(5) The selection of entering class medical, dental or law students shall be accomplished competitively with due consideration being given scholastic standings, recommendations of the pre-professional advisory committees of the various schools where the applicants pursue the pre-professional academic program, and their performance on any required admission test, and any other procedures that deal fairly with the applicant group as a whole.

STUDENT ASSOCIATION
Fall Election Rules
1985

The following are rules by which the campaigning will be governed. Should there be any violations of them, then action may be taken against the individual concerned.

- A. Student Association Congress members must be elected by the full-time undergraduate and graduate student body at Morehead State University.
- B. Any candidate for the SA congress must meet the qualifications set forth in the Student Association Constitution.
- C. In order for a student to vote in the election, he must be a full-time student at Morehead State University and must present his valid ID card at the polls on election day or at the Office of University Center and Student Activities when obtaining an Absentee ballot.
- D. Should the student be off-campus during the hours of an election, the student may vote by absentee ballot, which may be obtained from the Office of University Center and Student Activities prior to the election. Procedures for absentee voting are outlined below.
 1. The student may obtain an absentee ballot within three business days preceding the election day.
 2. The student shall request and complete the ballot at the Office of University Center and Student Activities in the ADUC during normal business hours.
 3. Upon completion, the ballot shall be sealed, placed in the envelope provided, and left at the Office of University Center and Student Activities. All absentee ballots shall be opened and tabulated at 3:00 p.m. on the day of the election. The results of the absentee votes shall be announced immediately following the close of the polls.
- E. The polls will be open during the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on the days designated at ADUC.
- F. There will be no campaigning within fifty feet of the polls.
- G. There shall be no campaigning inside ADUC on election day.
- H. All political advertising should be put on bulletin boards which are designated for general use and/or other areas designated by the Student Association. There will be a limit of one (1) poster per candidate per SA board, not to exceed 16 inches by 24 inches. No campaigning materials will be allowed in classrooms, on trashcans, departmental bulletin boards, utility poles, buildings, doors, trees, or other places deemed inappropriate by the executive committee. If any candidate questions whether a board is departmental or not the head of the department must be consulted.

Campaign signs may be displayed on the automobiles of the candidate's supporters with the approval of the registrant of the auto. No campaign literature is to be placed on any door within the residence halls or married housing at any time. Window space in a residence hall room may be used by the occupants of the room with the understanding that said occupants be responsible for this privilege. Candidates must ask permission of residence hall directors to use lobby bulletin boards.

- I. No adhesive backed campaign materials shall be used.
- J. The Student Association logo may not be used on any campaign material.
- K. Campaign rallies will be held only with the knowledge of the Executive Committee and the permission of the Office of University Center and Student Activities.
- L. Campaigning will not be permitted before Friday, August 30, 1985 at 7:00 a.m.
- M. Any candidate's campaign material may be removed only by the candidate himself, his campaign manager, or a designated representative. On election day, a designated representative of the Legislative Action Committee will remove all of the campaign material in ADUC.
- N. Any person voting or attempting to vote more than once will be brought before the Student Court.
- O. All posted campaign materials must be removed the day after the election.
- P. Each candidate may list a campaign chairman and the telephone number of the campaign chairman.
- Q. Political activities such as meetings, rallies, parades, conferences, speeches, information booths, necessitating physical arrangements should be scheduled through the Office of University Center and Student Activities.
- R. Activities such as conferences and parades should not interfere with the regular academic schedule of the University.
- S. All campaign literature distributed through the University Post Office mail boxes must carry appropriate postage and be properly addressed with the name and correct box number as well as the name of the sender. No stuffing of the mail boxes in the residence halls is permitted.
- T. No under-the-door distribution of material in residence halls and in married housing will be permitted for the elections.
- U. Political banners are to be displayed only during approved rallies or parades, and only with the approval of the Executive Committee and the Office of University Center and Student Activities.
- V. No sound systems (electrical or battery amplification) are to be used without the permission of the Office of University Center and Student Activities.
- W. Any campaign speech or formal discussion to be held in a residence hall must be scheduled through the hall director. This type of activity must be confined to the lobby.
- X. The name of the person (candidate or campaign chairman) responsible for preparing the campaign material must appear on the material.

Example: Paid for and/or prepared by John Doe, Candidate or
 Paid for and/or prepared by Susie Smith, Campaign Chairman for John Doe.

PFBC (paid for by candidate) may be an acceptable abbreviation on cards and brochures

- Y. A candidate is responsible for all campaign materials and activities relating to his candidacy; therefore, he should approve all activities related to his candidacy that are conducted by his campaign chairman or supporters.
- Z. No Candidate may name, or in any way refer to his opponent in any campaign literature, unless physical proof (such as documents, papers, signatures, etc.) of all statements made in the literature can be documented.
- AA. A person accused of violating an election regulation may, at the discretion of the Student Court, have a hearing before the Student Court. Any charges against a candidate or his campaign shall be registered in writing with the Executive Committee.

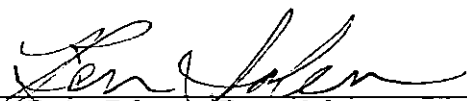

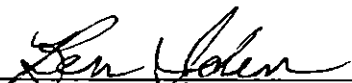

I have given much thought to a projected shortfall in SA funds of \$8,640 for the year and wish to make the following points:

1. The total budget of the Student Association is \$120,000. This is broken down as follows:

Based on an enrollment driven formula of \$30.00 per semester activity fee, with one-half to athletics and one-half to Student Association, an amount of \$30.00 per year is given to the Student Association for each full-time student based on the semester average. The amount of \$120,000 then is based on an average of 4,000 students per semester ($4,000 \times \$30 = \$120,000$).

The University released figures show 4,171 full-time students enrolled for the Fall Semester 1985 as of September 6, 1985, and printed in the Morehead News on September 10, 1985. This would indicate a need for 3,829 full-time students to be enrolled in the Spring Semester 1986 to average 4,000 students per semester.

The figure of \$8,640 shortfall would indicate 576 full-time students decrease over the 4,000 average or 288 full-time students under 4,000 per semester. My figures indicate that this would project us having only 3,253 full-time students in the Spring Semester as follows:

Fall 1985 - 4,171 students x \$15	= \$ 62,565
Spring 1986 - 3,253 students x \$15	= 48,795
Project Shortfall	<u>8,640</u>
	<u>\$120,000</u>

I truly question the ability to justifiably explain an amount of \$8,640 being cut from the SA budget when elementary math shows the \$120,000 to be based on an average semester enrollment of 4,000 full-time students.

During an approximate 18 month period a few years ago, the University was required to undergo major budget cuts three times. In each of these cuts, it was determined that the cuts would be made, leaving intact, the Student Association budget.

We instituted a policy some years ago that the SA budget would be based on an estimated enrollment. If the enrollment was over the estimate, the University received the additional funds. If the enrollment was less than the estimate, the University found other available funds. Most semesters we exceeded enrollment over estimate.

I suggest that we not appear to single-out one area in the University when many other areas in the University may also have budgets based on an enrollment driven basis at least to some degree.

I, therefore, recommend that you take necessary steps to retain the SA budget as originally approved.

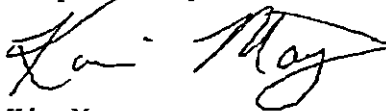

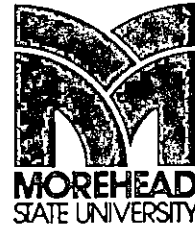

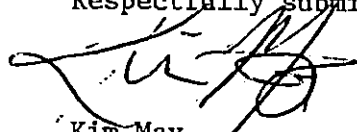

OLD AMENDMENT:

ARTICLE XII: AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. PROCEDURE: AMENDMENTS AND CHANGES TO THIS CONSTITUTION MAY BE PROPOSED BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF CONGRESS OR BY A PETITION SIGNED BY NOT LESS THAN TEN PERCENT OF THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION. AN AMENDMENT SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE WHEN RATIFIED BY A TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY OF THOSE VOTING IN A CAMPUS-WIDE ELECTION, AND WHEN APPROVED BY THE STUDENT LIFE COMMITTEE AND THE BOARD OF REGENTS.

ARTICLE XII: AMENDMENTS.

SECTION 1. PROCEDURE: AMENDMENTS AND CHANGES TO THIS CONSTITUTION MAY BE VOTED ON BY THREE-FOURTH'S MAJORITY OF THE ^{Members of} ~~TOTAL~~ STUDENT CONGRESS ~~THAT IS PRESENT~~. AN AMENDMENT SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE WHEN APPROVED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS.

WHAT THE LEGISLATIVE ACTION COMMITTEE HAS DONE TO THIS AMENDMENT IN DISCUSSION DURING THE MEETINGS ARE THE FOLLOWING:

1. REMOVE THE CAMPUS-WIDE ELECTIONS WHEN AMENDMENTS ARE BEING VOTED ON FOR RATIFICATION.
 - A. WE WOULD SAVE STUDENT GOVERNMENT AND THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION \$200 FOR THE MACHINES BEING BROUGHT DOWN AND VOTE ON CHANGES IN THE CONSTITUTION.
 - B. TURNOUT FOR STUDENT ELECTIONS ARE QUITE LOW; ONLY ABOUT 10% OF THE STUDENT BODY COMES OUT TO VOTE.
 - C. LESS THAN 1% EVEN LOOKS AT THE EAGLE OR AT THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT CONGRESS.
2. TO APPROVE AN AMENDMENT, A THREE-FOURTH'S MAJORITY VOTE OF ^{TOTAL} ~~THOSE~~ MEMBERS OF ~~CONGRESS~~ PRESENT. ^{STUDENT} ~~THE~~
3. REMOVAL OF THE STUDENT LIFE COMMITTEE.

New Business. The motion to allot \$1650.00 for mailboxes in the dormitories. A friendly amendment was accepted to increase the allotment for up to \$2000.00. It was passed.

The motion was made to accept Mike Norton and Rebecca Hubbard as representative to Congress. After discussion, this motion was accepted.

Adjournment motion was made by Todd Stewart and seconded by Duane Osborne. The meeting adjourned at 6:05 p.m.

BE IT PROPOSED:

Amendments and changes to this Constitution may be proposed by a majority vote of Congress or by a petition signed by not less than five (5) percent of the Student Association.

An amendment shall become effective when ratified by a three-fourths (3/4) majority of the total Student Congress, and when approved by the Student Life Committee and the Board of Regents.

Carlos Cassidy made the motion that we accept Amy Holton as the Assistant Attorney General for the Student Court. Lee Emmons seconded. Motion carried.

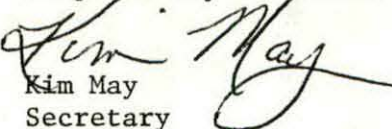

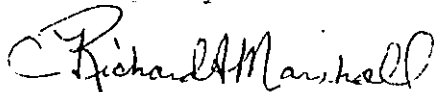
