Monday, Feb. 11, "The Little Rock Nine," 10 a.m. On Sept. 25, 1957, nine black students entered racially segregated Central High School in Little Rock, Ark. Their goal was to receive the same quality education afforded their white counterparts. Using radio drama and interview, host donnie I. betts profiles these extraordinary students and in the process examines why they succeeded where others did not. Thursday, Feb. 14, " Autobiography of a Hero: The Story of Dorrie Miller," 10 a.m. In this autobiography producer and host donnie I. betts uses radio drama to share the remarkable story of a remarkable sailor. Miller joined the Navy in 1939

with dreams of becoming a gunner. Miller was the first African American to be awarded the Navy Cross, the Navy's second highest honor.

Monday, Feb. 18, "The Undisc overed Explorer: Imagining York," 10 a.m. Exploring the making of an American myth, the hour-long audio documentary, narrated by Danny Glover, is a production of Oregon Public Broadcasting. Through a rich weave of music, interviews, performance and dramatic readings, this program tells the story of York, William Clark's slave and the only African American member of the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

Thursday, Feb. 21, " **Swingtime," 10 a.m.** During the 1930s and 1940s, many black schools in the U.S. fielded traveling swing bands to keep their doors open during the Depression. Narrator Tonea Stewart profiles three of the era's most famous bands in

"Swingtime," an hour-long showcase of the Bama State Collegians, the Prairie View Co-eds and the International Sweethearts of Rhythm.

Monday, Feb. 25, "The Last Letter Home," 10 a.m. The show is a poignant retelling in radio drama and interview of the experience during World War II of the 332nd fighter group, also known as the Tuskegee Airmen. Producer and host donnie I. betts recreates this powerful tale through the fictionalized writing of a fighter pilot, who in a letter to his mother, describes how he hopes to drop "Mein Kampf" on Hitler's office in Berlin as the U.S. bombs the city. The show also features an interview with retired Lt. Col. John Mosley, a very real member of the Tuskegee Airmen, as well as period music by the award-winning composer Joe Bonner.

Thursday, Feb. 28, "Memories of the Movement," 10

a.m. The years of the Civil Rights Movement are counted among the most volatile yet vibrant times in American history. The people and events that shaped this period range from charismatic preachers and actors to students and domestic workers. Introduced and narrated by Tavis Smiley, this powerful special features the poignant, humorous, unheard, or little known stories and anecdotes from living civil rights icons like actors Harry Belafonte and Ruby Dee, preachers like Rev. Jesse Jackson and Rev. Amos Brown, editor emeritus of "Ebony" magazine Lerone Bennett Jr., folk singer Odetta, Asian activist Yuri Kochiyama and a host of others.

Professor receives equipment grant

A Morehead State University science faculty member has been given a grant that will allow her and her students to do some serious stargazing.

Dr. Jennifer Birriel, associate professor of physics, will use monies recently awarded from a research fund to purchase astronomical equipment. Specifically, the equipment will be used with existing MSU telescopes to perform, from a campus lab in Lappin Hall, spectroscopic and photometric monitoring of variable stars.

"What we really want to do as astronomers is look at stars over time," Dr. Birriel said. "We tend to think that stars are eternal and that they don't change, but each star is in fact born from a cloud of cosmic gas and dust, grows old and eventually dies. As a star goes through this aging process, it will pass through one or more stages of instability, in which its light output will vary with time."

From a prior grant, Dr. Birriel obtained a 10-inch telescope and other monitoring equipment to use in stellar observations. Her new grant of nearly \$1,700, from the

Theodore Dunham Jr. Grant for Research in Astronomy from the Fund for Astrophysical Research Inc. (FAR), will pay for enhancements such as filters and a flat fielder for digital astronomy images.

"What I will have now is equipment that will help me track and document changes in the light output of stars," she said.

Dr. Birriel and student researchers will be able to observe changes in a star's light that can gauge its approximate size and temperature if it is a pulsating kind of star.

On the other hand, she explained, if the star is part of an eclipsing binary, observations of the changes in light output can be used to determine the size of their mutual orbit, the orbital period and the relative diameters of the two stars.

One of her goals in using the new equipment is to "ignite the interests of students in science research by offering them an opportunity to do real science without having to travel off the University campus." This is the second FAR grant awarded to Dr. Birriel - she received her first grant in December 2001.

On MSU's faculty since 2001, Dr. Birriel is a contributing editor for Mercury Magazine, the bi-monthly publication of the Astronomical Society of the Pacific. Her quarterly column is called "The Astronomer's Notebook."

She holds a doctorate and a master's degree in physics from the University of Pittsburgh. She earned a bachelor's degree, also in physics, from the University of Missouri at Kansas City.

MSU to reduce number of sponsored intercollegiate sports

Morehead State University Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Brian Hutchinson today (Feb. 8) announced that, beginning with the 2008-09 school year, Morehead State will sponsor 16 intercollegiate sports, down from 18 currently.

Women's golf, already led by Head Coach Stephanie Barker, will field its first competitive team since 1984. The men's and women's rifle programs will be consolidated into a mixed team and the institution will no longer sponsor men's and women's indoor track and field. Outdoor track and field will remain.

It is the first realignment of intercollegiate sports at MSU since women's soccer was added in 1998. Hutchinson also announced that MSU will add NCAA women's bowling and equestrian programs within the next 4-6 years.

"This realignment is the culmination of a well-considered, thoughtful process that began nearly two years ago," Hutchinson stated. "We were aided by Alden and Associates, a consulting firm which studied our Title IX compliance measures."

He continued:

"Ultimately, we have to consider how many sports we can sponsor with adequate financial resources, how we manage them within the context of Title IX compliance, and how can we offer the best experience possible for our student-athletes. We feel these steps lead us in that direction."

Hutchinson added that the plan was endorsed by MSU's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee and approved by President Wayne D. Andrews.

"This new direction for our athletics program comes at an opportune time when we are engaged in a careful review of all aspects of the institutional budget," said President Andrews. "Refocusing resources

for improved efficiency and effectiveness in any program is a positive step. In athletics, as well as academics, we want to be the best we can afford to be."

Cadets Adam Barlow, **Shelbyville**, **Ind**.; Lucy Bowen, **Morehead**; Jacob Chocholous, **Springboro**, **Ohio**; and Robert McWhorter, **Morehead**; have been designated DMG by the Army Cadet Command at Fort Monroe, Va.

The national ranking system, called the "order of merit" list, is a combination of accomplishments from their college careers. The top 20 percent nationally are awarded the title of DMG.

This year MSU has four of eight cadets in the 2008 senior class listed as DMG for a rate of 50 percent, the highest in Kentucky and Ohio.

Every cadet is rated on a point system based on activities completed during the last three years. A number of factors go into an accession packet and all 4,099 cadets nationwide are ranked according to the number of points they achieve.

Cadets are judged on grade point average (40 percent), leadership and military skills performance (45 percent), which includes evaluations from Warrior Forge (summer training at Ft. Lewis, Wash.) and ranking among their platoon at Warrior Forge, physical fitness and extracurricular activities (15 percent).

Barlow, a 3.0 GPA government major, is Eagle Battalion executive officer. He is a member of Scabbard and Blade National Military Honors Society, Raider Company military organization, MSU Methodist Student Center Ministry Team, worship leader in his church and a member of the M5C band.

Bowen, a 4.0 GPA business management major, is the Eagle Battalion operations officer. She is a member of the Scabbard and Blade National Military Honors Society and Beta Gamma Sigma. She served more than nine years on active duty with the Army and achieved the rank of Staff Sergeant (P) prior to entering the ROTC program at MSU. She is the mother of 12-year old twins, Christopher and Charlie Murphy.

Chocholous, a 3.5 GPA communication production major, is Eagle Battalion assistant operations officer. He is a member of the Scabbard and Blade National Military Honors Society and a Bible study leader for the campus Crusade for Christ.

McWhorter, a 4.0 GPA business administration major, is commander of the Scabbard and Blade National Military Honors Society and a member of Beta Gamma Sigma. He is Eagle Battalion Commander and received the Warrior Ethos and Recondo awards at Warrior Forge. He is married to the former Heather Handshoe.

Cadets Barlow, Bowen, Chocholous and McWhorter, along with the other senior cadets, will be commissioned as Second Lieutenants during the May 2008 Commencement Ceremony at MSU.

Success Academy will begin in June

To better prepare its freshmen class, Morehead State University will host the 2008 Success Academy, June 23-July 25. The Academy is a five-week program of college instruction and tutoring for students admitted to the University who are in need of additional academic preparation.

The Academy will give students who need to brush up on math, reading or English skills a head start so they are better prepared for their first semester at MSU.

"The University is committed to helping students succeed in college. To do this, we're offering students who need a little extra help getting started a good program and a good value," said Dr. Dan Connell, associate provost academic outreach and support.

Participants will have the opportunity to enroll in two developmental courses, and a special College Success course that combines study skills, career planning, and Freshman Orientation.

Students who complete the academy will begin the Fall 2008 semester with nine (9) college credits completed, and more importantly, be better prepared for success in their freshman year.

High school seniors who have taken the ACT exam and scored below 18 on two or more of the mathematics, English, and reading sections (science not included) are eligible to participate.

Extensive tutoring and supplemental instruction will be provided during each class day, and also be available near student living areas during evening hours. The College Success Class will improve study skills, emphasize career development, and orient students to the programs, people and services at MSU.

The Success Academy will be located on MSU's Morehead campus. Students will live in residence halls and are subject to all university regulations. Residence assistants and tutor/peer counselors also will live in halls with students to provide academic support, programming, and administration of residence hall policies.

Guest speakers and other special activities will give participants a head start toward success when they begin college in the fall.

Students who are eligible for financial aid, and file early for summer aid (the deadline is June 15), may be able to lower the cost significantly. Enrollment is limited to 60.

'Can' your parking fines

Morehead State University's Student Government Association has teamed up with the University's police force on a unique project to collect food for the needy, while allowing students to "pay" parking tickets at the same time.

SGA has partnered with the MSU Police Department to sponsor a food drive that allows students to pay a portion of their parking fines with canned goods. The amount of the reduction depends on the number of food items the student donates.

A contribution of at least four cans of food will reduce a parking ticket by \$10. To get \$15 off a fine, a student may donate at least six cans of food. Nine cans or more will give a student a \$20 reduction on a ticket.

"I am really excited about the food drive," said Rebecka Hollon, Middletown, Ohio, junior and vice president for public relations for SGA. "I know as student government, it is our responsibility to help make the campus better for the students, and parking has been an issue on this campus since before I even got here."

There are certain conditions that apply. A minimum \$5 charge on any ticket will always be in effect, and the food donation/fine reduction plan is not valid toward tow charges. It also may not be applied to either disabled parking or fire lane parking violations.

All food collected will be donated to Christian Social Services in Rowan County for distribution to needy individuals and families. The drive will last through the spring semester.

If the project is a success, Hollon hopes that it can continue for additional semesters.

"To me, this food drive will not only help the students on this campus, but the community as well, which really is why we are here."

Oddis named KMEA 'Teacher of the Year'

Frank Oddis, associate professor of music and coordinator of Morehead State University's percussion program, has been given a top teaching honor from a professional organization.

Oddis was presented with the Kentucky Music Educators Association University Teacher of the Year award at the group's conference this month in Louisville. The award was presented to him at the 50th Annual Band Clinic Feb. 16 on campus.

On the MSU faculty since 1977, Oddis holds a master's degree in music performance from East Carolina University and a Bachelor of Music Education degree from MSU. He was honored in 2004 with the MSU Distinguished Creative Productions Award for his achievements and his contributions to the world of percussion.

"Professor Oddis is a devoted teacher and percussion artist who is thoroughly committed to professional excellence," said Dr. M. Scott McBride, professor and chair of the Department of Music. "Of his many achievements, perhaps the most important ones are those represented by the successes of his former students, who praise him as an effective mentor and professional role model."

The percussion ensembles at MSU are internationally recognized and have won three Percussive Arts Society national championships in marching percussion under Oddis' leadership. The University has hosted a Day of Marching Percussion for 16 years.

The percussion ensemble and steel band has toured in China and Brazil, performing at the Central Conservatory of Music, Beijing, the Beijing Concert Hall, and the Sala Sao Paulo concert hall in Sao Paulo, Brazil. Additionally, the ensemble has performed nationally at many venues including KMEA, PASIC (Percussive Arts Society), NABBA (North American Brass Band Association) and the Great Southern Percussion Festival.

Oddis' arrangements and compositions for percussion have been performed by university and high school percussion ensembles in the United States and abroad and are published by Drop 6 Publishing.

On campus, Oddis has performed with the MSU Faculty Jazz Quartet, including as an artist on its compact disc recording "Blue Duck Suit," adopted into the Kentucky Collection. He has worked as a freelance percussionist and drummer for many well-known jazz artists and national touring companies of Broadway productions.

He also has performed as a percussionist with the West Virginia Symphony Orchestra, and as a drumset artist for several of its annual Pops Series events.

His membership in the Kentuckiana Brass and Percussion Ensemble led to performances at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, the Music Educators National Conference and at the International Brassfest Professor.

Oddis has presented educational workshops and has served as an adjudicator for many organizations. He is a clinician and endorser of Ludwig drums, Sabian cymbals, and Vic Firth sticks and mallets.

Campus safety improvements at MSU

With a new semester underway, Morehead State University has added another component to its emergency notification protocol.

An outdoor, audible alert system which utilizes electronic tones and public address speakers has been installed and tested. It includes high powered amplifiers atop Cartmell and Ginger halls and is designed primarily to alert pedestrians on campus sidewalks and streets.

"Like other campuses, we have constant foot traffic and those individuals outdoors deserve to be notified in the same timely fashion as others who are indoors," said MSU President Wayne D. Andrews. "This gives us yet another means of warning our academic community of impending danger in weather or safety emergencies."

He also reported that MSU has prepared and distributed an emergency procedures handbook for all employees. In addition, the same information is available on the Web and on posters displayed in each classroom, laboratory and office.

"We are constantly reviewing our emergency communications procedures to protect the safety of our students, faculty, staff and visitors," Dr. Andrews added. "Our text messaging system has been in place for nearly two years and we continue to encourage members of our community to sign up."

In addition to the new outdoor, audible system, MSU also utilizes a number of other media strategies to communicate with its campus community. Depending upon the nature of the emergency, any or all of the following methods may be used:

- Cell phone text messaging with e-mail (<u>e2Campus</u>); Sign up is voluntary but strongly recommended.
- Mass e-mail to students and employees;
- Campus-wide voicemail;
- Postings on University Web site and portals;
- Radio, TV, and other media outlets, including Morehead State Public Radio;
- Campus cable television override announcements;
- Digital information system displays; and
- Printed notices in residence halls and administrative and academic buildings.

Dr. Banks to be honored during Founders Day

Dr. Marshall D. Banks, the first African American to earn athletically-related aid and coach at Morehead State University, will be honored by his Alma Mater at Founders Day as MSU's celebrates its 121 st birthday.

The 2008 Founders Day Award for University Service will be presented to the career educator during the annual Awards Luncheon on Tuesday, March 11. The ceremony begins at 11:30 a.m. in the Crager Room of the Adron Doran University Center. MSU was among the first non-traditionally black mid-southern institutions to accept a black student as a recruited student-athlete. Dr. Banks filled that role in the fall of 1958. He is a member of MSU's a lumni and athletic halls of fame and received an honorary doctoral degree.

A native of Ashland, Dr. Banks earned a bachelor's degree from MSU in 1962 and received his master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Established in 1978 by the Board of Regents, the Founders Day award is presented annually to recognize those who have given superior service to the University over the years. James H. Booth of Inez, MSU board chair, will make the presentation.

After teaching one year of high school, Dr. Banks returned to MSU to begin his college teaching career in 1965. He served as an instructor in the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation and also was the head track and cross country coach.

Dr. Banks has an extensive background of more than 40 years of teaching, student advising, research and grant writing, curriculum development and community service in the areas of health, physical education, and recreation.

A full professor, he has been on faculty at Howard University since 1978 where he also served as department chair for 20 years.

He currently is president of the Langston 21st Century Foundation, a non-profit organization devoted to providing boys and girls with opportunities to raise their self-confidence as well as academic performance through sports activities.

Dr. Banks was project administrator for the National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) for 15 years and received funded grants totaling \$900,000 to provide an annual summer sports and enrichment program for 400 inner city youth throughout the Washington, D.C. area.

He also is a founding board member of "Team Focus," a national, non-profit organization, founded by a Morehead State University graduate Mike Gottfried. Team Focus is devoted to improving the lives of young men without fathers.

Dr. Banks has an extensive publication record including more than 20 major journal publications and a book in the field of physical fitness and leisure studies.

At 4 p.m., Dr. Banks and special guests will lead a panel discussion.

Also during the luncheon program, new members will be inducted into the <u>Society of MSU Fellows and new Visionaries</u> will be honored. Dr. Clarenda Phillips and Carol Johnson will be recognized as Faculty/Staff Fundraisers of the Year. Andy Parker is the recipient of the 2008 Volunteer Fundraiser of the Year.

The day begins with the recognition of retired faculty and staff members, starting at 8:30 a.m., also in the Crager Room. President Wayne D. Andrews will offer congratulations to those retiring this year.

Deceased former faculty and staff members will be remembered at the <u>memorial brick dedication</u> beginning at 10:30 a.m. at the Little Bell Tower. The tolling of the bell will follow the reading of the names and years of service of the honorees.

Founders Day activities will continue after lunch with a dedication of the Dr. David T. Magrane Molecular Biology Laboratory in Lappin Hall at 2 p.m. In the Laughlin Health Building, the Larry Wilson University Bowling Lanes will be dedicated at 4 p.m.

Visitors attending Founders Day events are encouraged to park at the Academic-Athletic Center where a shuttle bus will carry them across campus with stops at the Little Bell Tower and ADUC.
