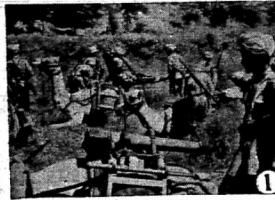
Hoot Mon! Real Bagpipe Playin' Honors Carnegie

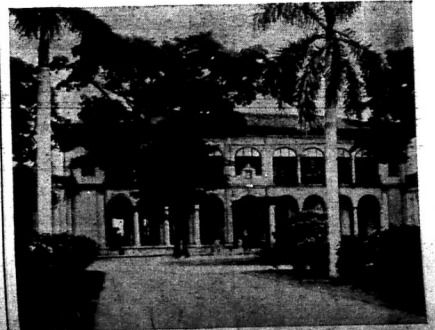

Will Cut Fancy Figures in Olympics



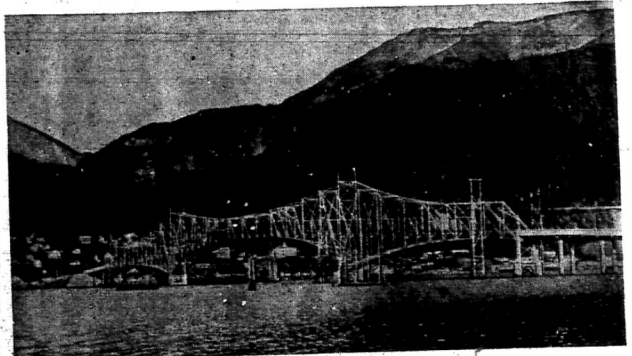

A Supreme Highway From Coast To Coast

Impetus has been given to the proposal of the Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce for a coast to coast super highway by a recent address on national planning by Secretary of the Interior Ickes, in which he proposed such a trans-continental route as a means of creating direct and indirect employment in large numbers. It is estimated that the cost of such a non-intersection highway would be between \$300,000,000 and \$400,000,000; that it would create 200,000 jobs over a period of two years, and spread the work among possibly 300 separate construction crews, each building ten miles of road.

These super-highways like the trans-oceanic commercial air flights, have long been a subject for the Sunday magazines, illustrated by highly imaginative drawings and sketches, but their day surely approaches. Already they are being built over comparatively short stretches in order to make motoring safer where congestion is a problem. We are still building toll bridges and other self liquidating public works, and the proposal to charge \$1 or less for each 100 miles of passenger car driving, thus to pay for the construction, seems reasonable enough. Pleasure cars would be charged on a car-mile basis and trucks on a ton-mile basis.

The plans as developed by the Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce provide for a highway stretching roughly between New York and San Francisco, with Y's leading to important points like Los Angeles, Chicago and Washington. Four lanes would lead in each direction, two for slow and two for fast traffic, the east and west avenues being separated by a wide central strip. In this strip would be gasoline, water oil, telephone and electric lines, and additional income might derive from these services and from refreshment and service concessions.

ANNA KARENINA IS COZY FEATURE

Greta Garbo refuses to be fluffed by any lingual barriers.

Ten years ago she came to America, a stranger in a strange land and without a whit of knowledge of America's language. She studied English laboriously and before she appeared in her first talking picture "Anna Christie," a skeptical world believed Garbo was through in American films. Then came "Anna Christie," with slogans emblazoning the sky—"Garbo Talks!"

Although Garbo talked, she talked with a dainty accent. Yet she would not be discouraged. She continued to study the new language until—"The Painted Veil"—she had almost completely eradicated any evidence of a foreign accent.

And now another lingual problem recently confronted the Swedish star. In her latest Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer picture, "Anna Karenina," opening Wednesday at the Cozy Theatre, she speaks perfect English—but the host of Russian names offer another obstacle.

The names of the characters are purely Russian. They had to be spoken as true Russians speak them. Thus Greta Garbo returned to school once to master lingual barriers—to learn to speak Russian names with the same doggedness that Hired her to stardom, and studied under two teachers, Nathalie Buchnal, former member of Russia's "Battalion of Death," and Count Andrey Tolstoy, who inherits his name and title from Russia's great literary genius.

State, National And Foreign

EVANSVILLE, Ind.—Mrs. Raynal Welty, 30, who was burned Tuesday night when she rescued her 9-year-old son, Raynal, Jr., from flames that had trapped him in his room at their home near Wheatcraft, Webster County, Kentucky, died in the Wellborn-Walker Hospital here shortly after the boy had succumbed.

Awakened by the boy's cries, Mr. Welty found the way to the lad's room blocked by flames, and rushed outside to enter the room by a window. Mrs. Welty meanwhile became aroused and ran into the boy's room. She dragged him to safety, but both were so severely burned that physicians said they could not recover.

MAYSVILLE, Ky.—Following closely upon the approval of the federal government Monday of the Forest Avenue-East Third street viaduct project here in which the federal government allotted \$255,000 was the approval of a WPA project here of a new concrete bridge spanning Limestone creek on East second and street near Bridge.

Word of the approval of the latter project was received late Friday by M. R. Hirschfeld, local project officer, from E. D. Collins, Lexington assistant district director.

Work on the structure, which will cost approximately \$25,000, will begin in two weeks Hirschfeld said.

GALT, Ontario.—The first 1935 visit of Santa Claus to this city resulted in a tragedy when a crowded stairway in a store collapsed. Six children and a woman were seriously injured. Many others suffered minor hurts.

LAWRENCEBURG, Ky.—Erastus Riley, 80, burned to death early this week when his home near Birdie was destroyed by fire.

A neighbor plunged into the flames and dragged the aged man out, but he succumbed a few moments later. Officials investigated a rumor that the 80-year-old Riley received information that he had received money in a real estate deal last week.

HENDERSON, Ky.—Three persons were killed in the collision of

two automobiles on U. S. Highway 41, three miles south of Henderson Friday.

The dead are: Peter Konsler, 52, farmer of Henderson county and his wife, Mrs. Annie Konsler, 50, occupants of a southbound car and James Carney, 49, fireman of Evansville, Ind., driver of the northbound car which figured in the collision. The three were killed instantly.

Sunday. The church is now doing some of the best work in its long history. Next Sunday is expected to be one of the big days in the history of the church.

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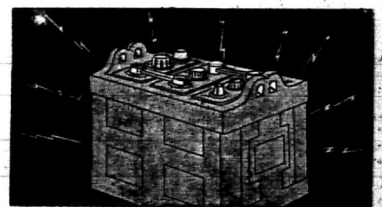

BURLEY AND DARK TOBACCO CONTRACTS GREATLY SIMPLIFIED

The new Burley, fire-cured, and dark-leaf-cured tobacco contracts for 1936-1939 are much simpler than the contracts now in effect, according to a statement from the AAA. The simplicity of the new contract is expected to decrease the number of suspensions and to reduce the delay in making payments. It also will reduce the amount of work and the expense of preparing and handling contracts.

Although the new contract covers the four-year period, 1936-1939, it is flexible so that growers who sign up have the opportunity of terminating their contracts at the end of any contract year by notifying the county agent's office not later than November 1 of each year. The contract also provides that the Secretary of Agriculture may suspend operations of the contracts for any year or may terminate them at the end of each year.

The 1936-1939 contract is printed on the front and back of one sheet of paper. In addition to the operator's name and the description of the farm, the contract contains only two figures, the base acreage and the base production. The operator is required to sign only once. It is not necessary under the new con-

tract to obtain signatures showing the consent of all persons who may have an interest in the land. The person who operates the farm signs as operator and payment will be made hereafter only after the operator has compiled for the year.

The contract does not contain any data or option for calculating the base, since these calculations are made on a separate summary prepared in accordance with the procedure set forth in administrative rulings, before the new contract is signed by the producer.

The new contract provides that the contract signer shall name a substitute payee, when the contract is signed, to whom payment will be made in case of the operator's death, legal incompetency, or disappearance after full performance of the provisions of the contract with respect to any year. This provision will reduce the necessity for the execution of court orders, letters of administration, and similar authorizations which caused considerable inconvenience in connection with payment under the present contract.

Another provision which greatly simplifies the new contract is an administrative ruling to the effect that if there is any change in the

legal status of the operator under the new contract after the contract has been accepted by the Secretary the contract will be terminated, and a new contract may be executed for the new persons operating the farm, or parts of the farm. This takes care of cases where the operator dies, becomes incompetent, abandons the farm, sells or rents all or any part of the farm, or adds more land to the farm. Any of these changes under the old contract required suspension of the contract until a form was executed to furnish proof of the change in legal status of the contract so that the contract might be modified and continued by the new person. Such changes under the new contract will be handled by terminating the contract and executing a new one.

Contracts are now being printed and should be available for signing in December.

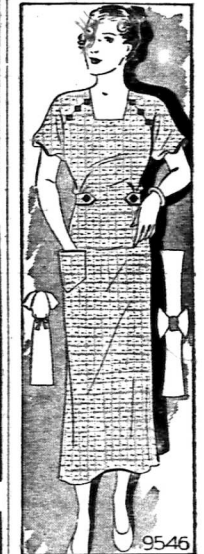

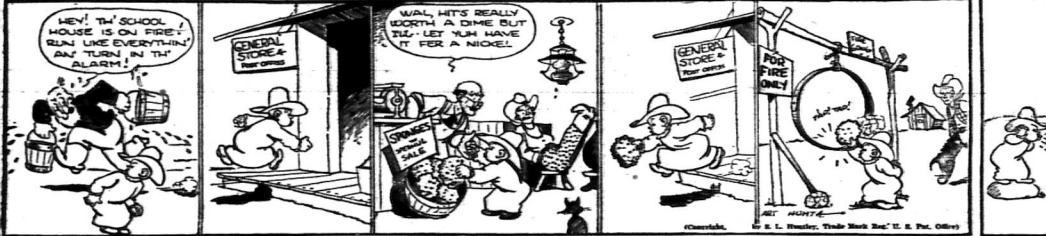

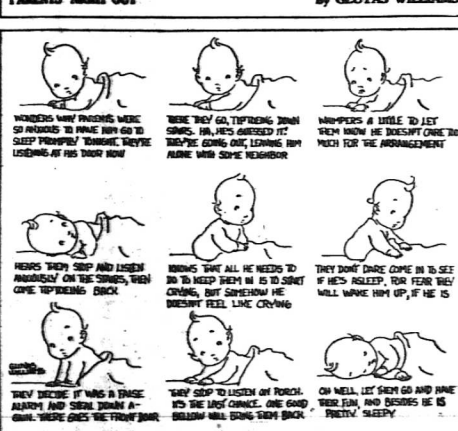
