Morehead State Public Radio is distributing 50 Midland AM/FM Weather Alert Radios to 18 primary counties that includes Bath, Breathitt, Carter, Elliott, Estill, Fleming, Lee, Lewis, Martin, Mason, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, Nicholas, Owsley, Powell, Rowan and Wolfe.

"It's our goal at Morehead State Public Radio to inform our listeners about impending weather and to protect the families in the communities we serve. We hope the weather radios will be used at key locations in our primary service region to supplement the national emergency alert system to further protect our listeners," said Paul Hitchcock, MSPR general manager.

The radios are being presented to public officials and placed in public buildings such as schools, health clinics, libraries and first responder facilities. MSPR also will distribute informational brochures on emergency preparedness from the Ready America project provided by the Federal Emergency Management Association (FEMA).

The radios utilize Specific Area Message Encoding (S.A.M.E.) technology, which allows the radios to be programmed to receive only those warnings that apply to local counties. Operated by AC or emergency battery, the radios can be programmed for up to 30 counties and features AM/FM tuning, color coded alert lights and several alarm functions.

MSPR purchased the radios through a Rural Listener Access Incentive Grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

Drs. Zargari, Wogoman receive CTE grant

Morehead State University's Dr. Ahmad Zargari, chair of the Department of Industrial and Engineering Technology, and Dr. Joyce Wogoman, coordinator and assistant professor of career and technical education in the department, have been awarded a math CTE grant from the Kentucky Education Cabinet.

The grant also is supported by the U.S. Department of Education.

For the 2008-09 year, the grant's program will invite automotive, business and mathematics teachers to continue to or begin to participate in activities to improve the integration of academics into curriculum of the career and technical education programs.

Career and technical education teachers and math teachers will collaborate to identify and enhance academic content in career and technical education programs.

"Teachers will develop curriculum maps and lesson plans that incorporate a high level of math skills to be used during the 2008-09 academic year," said Dr. Gerald Demoss, dean of the College of Science and Technology.

According to a study published by the National Research Center for Career and Technical Education, the research showed that a CTE curriculum enhanced with mathematics can raise students' math test scores.

During CTE training, teachers are learning to work together. "Many times academic and CTE teachers are teaching the same concepts but calling them different things; we are trying to help them understand each others' language," said Dr. Wogoman.

A major tenet of the training is helping teachers understand what others are teaching. The anticipated end result of the project is that career and technical education students' math knowledge and skill will increase because of the teachers' training.

College transition programs helping, Andrews tells lawmakers

Partnerships between local school districts and universities are having a positive effect on graduation rates and college readiness, educators told lawmakers in Frankfort Monday.

Morehead State University President Wayne D. Andrews detailed several of his institution's initiatives for members of the Subcommittee on Elementary and Postsecondary Education. "Too many high school students show up on our doorstep with math deficiencies," he said. "It's nobody's fault and it's everyone's responsibility to correct."

MSU educates 70 percent of all teachers in its 22-county service region, Andrews said, so a key focus is making sure teachers are prepared to enter the classroom. Among the programs being tried is one that focuses the College of Education on teaching skills while content areas are taught within respective academic departments. Among the goals, Andrews said, is that teachers would be better able to prepare their students for college coursework in that content area. "We're committed to producing top-notch P-12 classroom teachers," he said.

Forty percent of the university's entering students have to take remedial coursework in one subject or another, Andrews said. "Parents are frustrated because they're borrowing money to pay for these classes, which don't count toward a degree," he said.

Sen. Jack Westwood, R-Crescent Spring, said the college dropout rate could be a result of a less-rigorous high school curriculum. "I suspect part of the problem is that so many high school students are not prepared adequately," he said.

Estill County Superintendent Bert Hensley added that even for students academically prepared for college, the financial burden comes as a shock. Too many parents, he said, are not aware of the rising costs of a college education, and fail to plan ahead.

Tim Bobrowski, principal of Breathitt County's Sebastian Middle School, said he takes his students on field trips to at least one college campus each year to give them a firsthand look at the goals they can achieve.

Kentucky Space's Balloon-1 set to go Monday, July 14

The Kentucky Space Consortium will launch its first edge of space science mission named Balloon-1, a high altitude balloon carrying a scientific payload designed and built by college students from Kentucky, on Monday, July 14.

The experiment will be launched from Bowling Green and is expected to reach an altitude of 100,000 feet (nearly 20 miles). At this altitude, the science experiment will reach the upper regions of the Earth's stratosphere, where intense interactions among radiative, dynamical, and chemical processes are studied by scientists to better understand the Earth's atmosphere and climate.

Current MSU student enrolled in the Kentucky Space program:

Jason Smathers of Mt. Sterling; Jessamyn Delgado, Bardwell; and Marc Beck, Owensboro (Badsoden Germany).

The primary science payloads carried includes a magnetometer and an inertial measurement unit, or IMU, which is the main component of inertial guidance systems used in air and spacecraft, including guided missiles.

These instruments will record valuable data at the edge of space for attitude control and determination respectively and will aid in the design of future Kentucky Space orbital satellites.

Each of these two sensors will be connected to a logger circuit to record the serial data on an SD card for later processing. Future Kentucky Space missions involving orbital spacecraft will use passive attitude determination and control (ADC) systems utilizing torque coils that can be activated from Earth to adjust the spacecraft's orientation by "pushing" off of the Earth's magnetic field. This experiment will provide the team valuable data that quantifies the field strength of the magnetic field at the edge of space to facilitate the design of ADC systems.

Custom-built components of the payload include an MSP430 processor interface for a GPS receiver, instruments for temperature and pressure measurements, and a downlink radio. The collected data will

be stored on an SD card, and transmitted over VHF for live tracking and recovery by mobile Earth stations operated by the students.

The experiment includes a continuous-wave radio beacon built by the students to facilitate tracking of the system.

The payload also will include a set of cameras, allowing the students to stitch photos and create panoramic photos of the curvature of the earth. One of the cameras will video the entire flight, viewing the Bluegrass from the edge of space.

Public hearing set on improving KY 32 in Rowan and Elliott counties

Dozens of Morehead State University students and employees commute to campus on KY 32 through Rowan and Elliott counties.

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet is in a study to find out what, if anything, should be done to improve that highway.

State engineers and consultants want ideas on how to make the KY 32 drive a better one and will have a KY 32 Alternatives Study meeting on Thursday, July 31, from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Elliottville Baptist Church Meeting Facility at 8100 Hogtown Hill Road (KY 32).

The purpose of the meeting is to provide information about the project and to solicit ideas, concerns and opinions from the public that will help the Transportation Cabinet make decisions about the design of future improvements to the roadway.

It will be an "open format" meeting, which means public access to handouts and maps that outline the project study area and that describe potential environmental, community, traffic and engineering impacts. Also, officials will be available in the exhibit area to answer questions and listen to comments from area residents, business owners and highway users.

"That's why these public meetings are so important." said Deanna Miller, planning engineer for Department of Highways District 9. "We have traffic crash data, measurements of the roadway and maps of the terrain. Now we need data from the most important source - those who drive the roadway and use it every day."

For those unable to attend the July 31 meeting, various maps showing the project study area will be available for viewing from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. for 15 days after the meeting at the Kentucky Department of Highways District 9 office at 822 Elizaville Ave., in Flemingsburg.

"It's our goal at Morehead State Public Radio to inform our listeners about impending weather and to protect the families in the communities we serve. We hope the weather radios will be used at key locations in our primary service region to supplement the national emergency alert system to further protect our listeners," said Paul Hitchcock, MSPR general manager.

The radios are being presented to public officials and placed in public buildings such as schools, health clinics, libraries and first responder facilities. MSPR also will distribute informational brochures on emergency preparedness from the Ready America project provided by the Federal Emergency Management Association (FEMA).

The radios utilize Specific Area Message Encoding (S.A.M.E.) technology, which allows the radios to be programmed to receive only those warnings that apply to local counties. Operated by AC or emergency battery, the

radios can be programmed for up to 30 counties and features AM/FM tuning, color coded alert lights and several alarm functions.

MSPR purchased the radios through a Rural Listener Access Incentive Grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.
