## Lodged in Co. Bastile.

But little more than a week ago the people of Olive Hill awoke to hear the startling intelligence that the town of J. Stamper & Co. had been broken into and Robert Blankenship, an honored and respected citizen, who was sleeping in the store, had been seriously wounded. The righteous indignation of an enraged people at once became apparent, and immediate steps were taken to apprehend and capture the guilty parties. These efforts were soon successful and six suspects were safely housed in the bastille of our town. On Monday, Aug. 6th, these were given a hearing with the following results: Two, Frank and Harvey Collins, stood trial and were held for the grand jury, bail being fixed at \$500 and \$1,000 respectively. Two others, Mart Collins and Harrison Burton, waived examination and were held for the grand jury, bail being fixed at \$1,000 and \$250 respectively, while the other two were released. As none of them who were held to await the action of

the grand jury could furnish the required bail, they were committed to the county jail at Grayson. There is still one of the ring-leaders at large, but it is confidently expected that it is a question of only a short time until he, too, shall be taken care of. It is generally believed that the cause of so much stealing in our community has been removed and when it comes to trial, if the jury does not prove to be a "farce," Carter county will not be bothered by this set for a number of years. Much credit is due to the law-abiding element of our town and community for the active interest and assistance so cheerfully rendered. The fight for the protection of the home and society has begun. The beginning of the end is in sight. Which side are you on? Will you uphold the officers and encourage them, or will you, like a coward, close up tight as a clam and say nothing because, "It might hurt your business?"
