## REPUBLICAN CONVENTION SATURDAY

### Endorse President Hoover And Vice-President Chas. Curtis Candidates For Re-election In November

The Republican County Convention was held at the court house on Saturday of last week, with a good attendance. The convention was called to order by Dr. A. F. Ellington acting as temporary chairman of the gathering. Dr. Ellington was confirmed as permanent chairman by a majority of one vote over Harlan Powers. The convention was said to have been one of the most harmonious in years.

The following resolutions were presented to the convention by the resolutions committee composed of J. L. Nickell, J. H. Powers, C. C. Croswait, H. C. Lewis and J. A. Allen and were unanimously adopted.

At a meeting of the Republicans of Rowan county, Kentucky, in Mass Convention assembled on the 23rd day of April 1932, the following resolutions were adopted:

FIRST: That this mass meeting of Republicans endorse the call of the National, State and District Republican Conventions and name as delegates to said State and District Conventions the Republicans whose names are set out on the list attached hereto, to represent said county at said District and State Conventions, and to cast the delegates vote of said county upon all questions arising at said Conventions.

SECOND: That this Mass Convention hereby endorses the Administration of President Hoover and instructs its delegates to the District and State Conventions to endorse and support the candidates for re-election of President Herbert Hoover and Vice President Charles Curtis; and said delegates are hereby instructed in their election of district delegates to the Republican National Convention and delegates in the state at large, to instruct said delegates and alternates to the National Convention, to vote for Honorable Herbert Hoover as president, Charles Curtis as the Republican nominee, respectively, for President and Vice-President, and for Mrs. Sallie A. Hert and J. Matt Chilton as the Kentucky members of the Republican National Committee.

THIRD: Said delegates are further instructed in their election of members of the Republican State Central Committee to vote for Robert W. Hunter, as chairman of the Republican State Central Committee.

FOURTH: Delegates are further instructed to vote for Thomas S. Yates of Grayson, Carter county, Kentucky for Chairman of the 8th Congressional District and said delegates are instructed to use all honorable means to secure his election at Mt. Sterling, Kentucky on April 24 at the District Convention; and said delegates are to vote for him as long as his name is before the convention and to vote as a unit on all questions of organization. The following delegates and alternates were elected to represent Rowan county at the District and State Conventions:

## Jas. Hayes Dies Hayes Crossing

James R. Hayes, aged 64 years, died Sunday, April 24 at his home at Hayes Crossing. Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:00 p. m. from the home and burial was made in the family cemetery nearby.

Mr. Hayes has been a business man of Morehead, having been connected with the Consolidated Hardware Company for a number of years until ill-health forced him to retire about two years ago. Since that time his health has been failing gradually. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Thelma French of Huntington, W. Va., and by one grandson, Billy French. He is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. E. E. Maggard of Morehead, Misses Nan and Lou Hayes of Hayes Crossing, and by four brothers, Niel and Douglas of Morehead, John of Russell and Drew Hayes of Carter county.

## Marion Davies At Cozy Theatre

Marion Davies will be seen at the Cozy theater in "Polly of the Circus," a romantic story of the marriage of a circus star to a small-town minister. Wednesday and Thursday, May 4, 5. This Miss Davies' first talkie since "Five and Ten" is of particular importance, since it brings her to the screen in the most dramatic characterization of her screen career and marks the first appearance opposite her of Clark Gable, the most popular leading man in films.

The play is based on the play by Margaret Mayo, produced some years ago on Broadway with great success and also made into a silent picture. It is a quaint love story told against a flamboyant circus background and replete with spectacle and drama. The plot concerns a circus aerialist who is annoyed at the crusading activities of a small-town minister. She falls during the act and is taken to his house to recover. They fall in love, and in the face of opposition from important clergymen they are married and the resultant unfeeling of the minister clouds their marital happiness. The circus girl then plans a desperate sacrifice to reunite the minister and his church.

## Joe Smith Has Fractured Skull

Joe Smith was seriously if not fatally injured Monday night when his car skidded on the wet road at the east edge of Morehead, striking a concrete pillar on the bridge and fracturing his skull. He suffered a concussion of the brain, a broken arm and minor cuts and bruises. The injured boy was hurried to St. Joseph's Hospital in Lexington in the Holcomb ambulance where he was given immediate attention and where an operation was performed to remove the pressure from his brain. But very little hope is held out for his recovery.

While no one saw the accident when it occurred, an examination of the road and the condition of the car led to the theory that Smith had suddenly decided to make the turn from the highway, to pass up the boulevard in front of Joyce Memorial Stadium. He had evidently applied his brakes and skidded around the front left door of the car striking the concrete pillar with terrific force, driving the pillar through the door and into the forehead of the driver. The car was hanging by its roof over the pillar. A portion of the wing of the concrete culvert had been knocked down by the force of the blow.

## Airplane Forced Down By Rain Here

Morehead citizens were provided with a thrill Sunday, and with a welcome visitor for three days when an army airplane, driven by Lieut. enant Sutherland made a forced landing Sunday morning in a field just east of Morehead. Lieut. Sutherland was on his way from Asheville North Carolina to the army air field in Michigan, when dense fog and rain forced him down. E. J. Richards, owner and manager of the Home Oil Company, who is a Reserve Corp officer in the air division, attempted to clear the high

way so that the birdman might land on the pavement. Lieut. Sutherland however failed to get the signal and dropped down in a muddy field across the railroad. The bad weather of Monday and Tuesday prevented his taking off until Wednesday morning. Lieut. Sutherland took off in fine shape about 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, looped a complete loop in the air and headed toward Cincinnati where he will stop.

## Another Car Is Stolen; Burned

And still it goes on and Morehead is beginning to get an unsavory reputation as a center for car' thefts, due apparently entirely to the childlike confidence of citizens who leave their keys in their automobiles in the belief that the local people will do no wrong. But somebody does as Gray Jones discovered Tuesday morning when he went to his garage just west of Morehead, on the Midland Trail, only to find that his car a Chevrolet coach had been taken out and driven blithely away by some unknown and undisciplined thief. Mr. Jones immediately notified the police and search revealed that the car had been driven to the "horse-shoe" curve on Garvin ridge, near Olive Hill, where it had been maliciously covered with gasoline and oil, pushed into the ditch and set on fire, where it was left to burn.

Mr. Jones put his car in the garage Monday night and presumably left the key in it thinking it was safe. It proved to be otherwise.

## Boy Reports Stealing Bonds

A story that is regarded by many as the bragging of a boy in the toils of the law, is going the rounds having originated in the county jail here, and having been the result of an alleged confession made to Jailor S. S. Bowling by Glenn English, the sixteen year old boy who stole the Kentucky Telephone Company truck last week and who is at present lodged in the local jail. If the story is true, young English is undoubtedly a desperate criminal; if it is not true, he is certainly a candidate for Lowell Thomas' Tall Story Club or any local Ananias Club.

English's tale is in substance that he escaped recently from the reform story at Moundville, W. Va. where he was serving a sentence for automobile theft. He stated that he had \$42,000 worth of government bonds hidden at the home of James Unrue of 1847 Third avenue, Huntington, W. Va. He confessed, according to officers that he had cached the bond in Unrue's home several months ago and that he had found the bonds in two grips in a traveling man's car at Wayne, W. Va. He said he had picked up a ride with the salesman

## SUMMER TERM FROM JUNE 6 TO AUGUST 26

### New Courses And Teachers On Summer School Faculty Give Broader Opportunity

On Monday, June 6, three days after the close of the regular school term, summer school will officially open. From all indications the session this year will be the most successful summer term in the history of the institution. Advance registration reports indicate that the enrollment will be much heavier than in preceding years. New courses are being given, and the summer school teaching staff is being enlarged. There will be two six weeks terms, the first from June 6 to July 15, the second from July 18 to August 26.

- Second Summer Term
- July 18, Monday: Register for second summer term.
- July 19, Tuesday: Entrance examinations held.
- July 19, Tuesday: Fee charged for late entrance, (\$1 per day).
- July 20, Wednesday: Last day to register for full load.
- July 20, Wednesday: Fee charged for changing schedules.
- July 23, Saturday: Last day to register for credit.
- July 26, Thursday: Students whose credits are not on file will be dropped.
- August 26, Friday: Term closes—commencement.

There will be two new instructors in the education department: Mr. C. V. Snapp, superintendent of schools at Jenkins, Kentucky and Mr. Paul Boyd of Carrollton, Kentucky. New teachers will probably be elected for other departments if the enrollment is heavy enough to demand it.

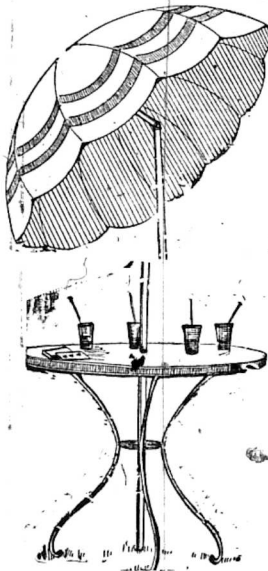
