

## MSU, Russell Independent signs STARS Academy agreement

Morehead State University and the Russell Independent School System recently signed a Memorandum of Agreement for a new collaborative and cooperative Pilot Program to be called MSU's STARS Academy. This is an acronym for "Strategically Targeting the Advancement of Russell Students in a Pre-Professional Academy."

Selected Russell High School junior and senior students, who meet established eligibility requirements, can now elect to take dual credit courses in biology, math, chemistry and history. A student can take two courses per year and earn up to eight credit hours per year.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for the students to begin a high quality college experience while in their home environment," said Dr. Susan Compton, superintendent of Russell Schools.

The courses are free of tuition from MSU and various other expenses are assumed by the Russell Independent School System.

Dr. Gerald DeMoss, dean of the College of Science and Technology, indicated a future schedule of courses to be offered in the pilot program will be determined in a collaborative effort between MSU and the school system.

MSU President Wayne D. Andrews expressed his desire to see the program become a positive influence in keeping our energetic and talented students in the area to help serve the future needs of our region and state.

## Excellence in Civic Engagement award winners honored

For the third year, Morehead State University partnered with the Morehead-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce to recognize outstanding community members dedicated to making Rowan County a better place to live through their service to the community or a community organization.

The awards were given Wednesday, Sept. 17 at the Morehead Conference Center as part of MSU's fourth annual Constitution Days celebration. Winners received a plaque and the non-profit agency of their choice received a \$100 honorarium underwritten by the MSU Center for Regional Engagement.

Dr. David Rudy, associate provost for regional engagement and dean of the Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy, said "Recognizing members of both the MSU community as well as the Rowan County community is both vital and necessary. This year's awards were exceptionally competitive and illustrate the good work and commitment of Morehead citizens and MSU students."

Initially, nine categories were developed, including two new categories recognizing an elementary or middle school student and a high school student. Other categories included awards for a community member, community organization, community business, MSU student, MSU faculty or staff member, MSU student organization, and MSU service learning class. However, it quickly became apparent that a 10th category was needed.

"This year we received more nominations than ever before," said Randy Manis, an AmeriCorps VISTA member who served on the selection committee. "Based on the strength of the applicants, the selection committee recognized the need for a new category-that of Rowan County Schools Teacher."

Six community awards were given recognizing some of Rowan County's finest citizens. Brothers Charlie and Larry Whelan of McBrayer Elementary School won the "Elementary or Middle School Student" award for their work educating others about multiple sclerosis and raising money for research. Jared Stacy won the "High School Student" award for his extensive work with other students at Rowan County Senior High School to inform others about the genocide in Darfur. Joe Rowe, executive director of the Morehead Habitat for Humanity, was recognized as the "Community Member" for his leadership in providing affordable housing. The People's Clinic was the "Community Organization" winner for offering free and affordable health care to community members. The "Community Business" recipient was Good Shepherd Printing for providing family-friendly service and supporting area nonprofit organizations. Lisa Brown of Rowan County Middle School was named as the "Rowan County Schools Teacher" award recipient. Brown is retiring after 27 years of teaching.

Four awards were presented to Morehead State University recipients. Amanda Romito won the "MSU Student" award for her work with the Girl Scouts and Adult Learning Center. Denise Watkins, assistant professor of theatre, was the "MSU Faculty/Staff" recipient for coordinating a program for delinquent youth titled "Theatre in Diversion." The brothers of Pi Kappa Phi received the "MSU Student Organization" award for their work with Horizon Village and Push America. Dr. June Grice, assistant professor of music, was recognized as the "Excellence in Partnership for a MSU Service Learning Class." Her music education students facilitate monthly parent-child enrichment activities for clients at the Adult Learning Center.

## Student Civic Engagement grant recipients announced

As part of Morehead State University's Constitution Days celebration, the Center for Regional Engagement sponsored a grant competition for students wanting to undertake projects fostering civic engagement on campus or in the region. The recipients were recognized at the main stage program for Constitution Days at the Morehead Conference Center on Wednesday, Sept. 17.

Eight proposals were submitted to the selection committee and four were chosen to receive funding. Projects that fostered any aspect of civic engagement were considered including research, applied research, outreach and community service.

"The proposals represent very worthwhile projects and demonstrate the creativity and commitment of some of Morehead State University's finest students," said Dr. David Rudy, associate provost for regional engagement and dean of the Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy.

The top prize, one \$400 grant, was awarded to Kyle Burnett and his classmates in the "Public Relations Principles" course. Their project with the MSU Adult Learning Center is titled "Rowan County Reads." The team will use their funds to implement monthly after-school activities for clients and their children.

Three other teams received grants of \$200 each. Daren Colegrove and his team are collaborating on a project with the Community Recycling Center titled "Green Halloween." Their grant money will be used to promote a three-day recycling event. Casey Hufford and his team will use their grant to assist the Leadership Development Program in preparing for the Rodburn Elementary School Fall Festival. Amanda Romito will use her funding to buy art supplies and rent space for a project titled "Egg-stravaganza Event," a joint venture with the Girl Scouts of Kentucky's Wilderness Road Council.

## Three to be inducted into Alumni Hall of Fame

Three alumni will be honored in a special ceremony which will be held during Morehead State University's Homecoming 2008, set for Thursday through Saturday, Oct. 16-18.

New members will be inducted into the Hall of Fame on Friday, Oct. 17, at 7 p.m. in the Crager Room of the Adron Doran University Center. Tickets are \$18 per person.

Entering the Alumni Hall of Fame will be:

George Kerr graduated from MSU in 1962 with a Bachelor of Science degree in mathematics and physics. He received a Master of Science degree in physics in 1965 from North Carolina University and a Ph.D. degree in Physics in 1971 from University of Tennessee.

From 1964 to 2000, Kerr worked as a health physicist at Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL), and from 2000 to 2008 he was a self-employed health physics consultant, involving primarily government funded projects. He recently joined the staff of Oak Ridge Associated Universities (ORAU) as a senior health physicist.

In March, Kerr completed 35 years of service and was reappointed for another two-year term as a U.S. consultant for radiation dosimetry and radiation shielding to the Atomic Bomb Casualty Commission (ABCC), now the Radiation Effects Research Foundation (RERF) in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Japan. The medical follow-up studies of the RERF are supported equally by the Japanese government through its Ministry of Health, Labor and Welfare and the U.S. Government through the National Academy of Sciences under contract with the Department of Energy (DOE).

He served as the coordinator for the research carried out by a Joint Working Group that consisted of 20 U.S. and Japanese members plus an additional 60 contributing associate members from the U.S., Japan, and Europe. Kerr also was the coeditor of a 1,000 page, two-volume report on the basis for DS02.

In 2006, he was presented the Special Achievement Award by the United States Department of Energy in recognition of his outstanding service as the coordinator of the United States Working Group on the Reassessment of A-Bomb Dosimetry.

He is a member of Sigma Phi Sigma, the Health Physics Society and the International Radiation Protection Society. He also authored more than 150 book chapters, technical reports, and open literature publications in technical journals such as Health Physics, Radiation Research, Nuclear Safety, Physical Reviews, Reviews of Scientific Instruments, and Journal of Applied Physics.

Kerr and his wife, Sarah, currently reside in Knoxville, Tenn.

Joyce LeMaster, a 1954 graduate of Breckinridge Training School, is a two-time MSU graduate where she received her Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees. She also completed graduate studies at Miami University and postgraduate studies at Indiana University. She is a member of Delta Zeta Sorority, Phi Delta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi honor fraternities.

In 1961, LeMaster joined the Morehead State University faculty and retired in 1997. Following her retirement, she returned on a 4-year contract to teach one semester per school year. Aside from working with students in the classroom, she has also enjoyed authoring numerous professional papers, reviewing books for academic journals as well as for state and local newspapers. Her research and publications have been chosen for inclusion in the Annual Report of Research and Creative Productions by MSU faculty for 12 years, since its inception in 1980 until her retirement.

Throughout her career, she has received several awards, including the first annual Distinguished Faculty Service Award presented by MSU in 1992. She was nominated in 1994 and in 1995 for the MSU Distinguished Teacher Award. In 1992 and again in 1993, she was a nominee for the Advocates for Higher Education ACORN Teaching Award.

She also was elected to four three-year terms on the Faculty Senate and was elected to the Senate Executive Committee.

LeMaster served on many University search committees, tenure and promotion committees, and Presidential Inaugural Committees along with service on state boards, including the Kentucky Humanities Council Board of Directors, the Board of the Kentucky Mansions Preservation Society, the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs, and the Executive Board of the Democratic Women's Club of Kentucky. She is a charter member of Morehead Rotary Club International and a past president of the MSU Alumni Association.

She is currently the co-owner of JBL Properties and serving on the Morehead-Rowan County Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, the Morehead-Rowan County Regional Airport Board of Directors, the State Parliamentarian for the Kentucky Federation of Women's Club of Kentucky, a member of the Performing Arts Trio with Jay Flippin and Doug Adams, and a member of the MSU Honorary Degree Committee and the MSU Gala Committee. She recently returned from the Democratic National Convention where she served as an alternate delegate for Kentucky.

LeMaster and her husband, Jim, reside in Morehead.

Lisa Palas graduated from Morehead State University in 1972 with a Bachelor of Music degree and 1974 with a masters degree in Higher Education with an emphasis in music. She is a member of Delta Gamma Sorority. In the field of education, she has held the positions of assistant to the director of admissions and assistant director of admissions at MSU and academic counselor for intercollegiate athletics at the University of Louisville.

In the field of entertainment, she was the first director for the Kentucky State Fair Youth Talent Contest. She moved to Nashville in 1981 where she worked for the Nashville Songwriters Association, International and MCA Records (promoting artists that included Reba McEntire, George Strait and the Oak Ridge Boys) before signing her first

songwriting deal with Alabama Band Music in 1984. She also has been a staff songwriter for Warner-Chappell Music and Rondor International (now part of Universal Music) and her own company, The Music Palas.

Recognition for her songs include ASCAP awards for major radio airplay and "Best Contemporary Ballad of 1985" for "There's No Way" recorded by Alabama. Other credits include #1 chart records and songs recorded in country, urban /R&B and inspirational/gospel genres.

Her songs have been recorded by many artists including Alabama, Oak Ridge Boys, Reba McEntire and Randy Travis. Palas' songs have been included in feature films.

Her own recording of her song "Smiley Pete" will be released in 2008 on CD as part of the book "Smiley Pete, Magnificent Moocher" written by Kentucky author, Margaret Price.

A lifetime member of the Nashville Songwriters Association International, she has served on their Board of Directors for 17 years. She helps new writers learn the craft as an NSAI workshop adviser, on the coaching staff at Songu.com and instructor for songwriting camps and classes.

Her volunteer work includes the Upper Room Prayer Center prayer line in Nashville; Habitat for Humanity; and most recently, Polk Senior Games - the Senior Olympics in Lakeland, Fla. She wrote and recorded the theme song and radio jingle for the 2008 Games and performed at events including the Closing Ceremonies. Palas currently resides in Lakeland, Fla.

## Baccalaureate Nursing Program had 96 percent pass rate on NCLEX exam

Morehead State University's May 2008 graduates of the Baccalaureate Nursing Program have achieved a 96 percent pass rate on the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses.

Entry into the practice of nursing in the United States is regulated by the licensing authorities within each jurisdiction of the national council. The Kentucky Board of Nursing (KBN) is the licensing authority for this state.

To ensure public protection, the KBN requires a candidate for licensure to pass an examination that measures the competencies needed to perform safely and effectively as a newly-licensed, entry-level registered nurse.

The Kentucky Board of Nursing monitors the performance of each program of nursing to review the performance compared with the outcome achievement measure of an 85 percent pass rate.

MSU's May graduates achieved above the outcome measure for Kentucky and have exhibited superior accomplishments. "Achievement of successful learning outcomes is a positive reflection of the teaching-learning partnership that exists between faculty, staff and students," said Dr. Erla Mowbray, chair of MSU's Department of Nursing.

Several nursing programs, which combine general education with professional nursing theory and clinical education, are available at MSU. Each program has a selective admission procedure and enrollment is limited.

## Former professor and coach, Dr. Nolan Fowler dies

He instructed history at MSU from 1943 until 1962.

He is survived by his daughter, Elaine and her husband Dr. Michael Palencia; grandson Andrew, granddaughter, Dr. Rachel Palencia Harper, her husband, Jeff Harper, and one great grandson, Michael Harper; and his wife, Janet Marks Fowler.

## Jones receives USDA grant

MSU's successful proposal for this grant, a project to fund the implementation of online distance learning pods, was one of 143 eligible applications in the 2008 fiscal year.

"This Distance Learning and Telemedicine grant is specifically designed to meet the educational and health care needs of rural America through the use of advanced telecommunication technologies," said Jones, project director for the grant.

The grant proposal is to place rich-media, synchronous learning workstations at the West Liberty, Jackson and Prestonsburg campuses of MSU. In addition, a synchronous, online learning tool such as Elluminate or Wimba will be implemented to these stations.

"The learning tool selected will provide capabilities for real-time advising, peer-to-peer collaboration and integration of synchronous content into the Blackboard course management system," said Jones. As part of the project, a Helix server with network attached storage (NAS) will provide for storage and streaming of media, podcasts and other services.

An ad hoc faculty committee is currently working on the selection of an online learning tool and the planning of a pilot project in the spring semester using the new technologies.

## Environmental Education Center to provide workshop

Morehead State University's Environmental Education Center has been named a City Partner for Flying WILD and will soon hold a facilitator training workshop on campus.

Flying WILD is a national bird education program from the Council for Environmental Education (CEE), which provides programs and services across the country that promote responsible stewardship of natural resources.

As a City Partner for Flying WILD, MSU's Environmental Education Center and Flying WILD facilitators will train 200 educators, both formally and informally during a three-year period. MSU will offer this training to individuals within its service region as well as in the areas of Louisville, Cincinnati and Huntington, W.Va.

A Flying WILD facilitator workshop will be held on Saturday, Oct. 25 from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. in 243 Lappin Hall on the campus.

The facilitator's training is designed for those who would like to train other educators, both formally and informally. The fee for participating in the workshop is \$10. Refreshments and lunch will be provided.

Flying WILD introduces middle school students to bird conservation through standards-based classroom activities and environmental stewardship projects. Flying WILD encourages schools to work closely with conservation organizations, community groups and businesses involved with birds to implement school bird festivals and bird conservation projects. These festivals are events in which students take a leading role in teaching their classmates and community about migratory birds.

"Flying WILD is truly a unique environmental education program. It not only teaches great hands-on activities that work well with a variety of audiences using many different subject areas, it also really brings the knowledge home by incorporating a service learning aspect, such as the planning and organization of a birding festival with students," said Amanda Patrick, educator with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service at Wolf Creek Fish Hatchery. "Few programs not only teach and call to action, but Flying WILD does," she said.

Lauren Dowell, special educator from Warren County and recent Flying WILD workshop participant, said "I had the best time at the training! Not only did I come away with great ideas for my classroom and the materials to pull it all together, the networking I experienced has prompted me to collaborate with other teachers."

MSU's Environmental Education Center is part of the Kentucky University Partnership for Environmental Education, a partnership of all the state universities. Kentucky is the only state to have an environmental education center at every public institution.

MSU's center provides funding for supplies and equipment to ensure that all preservice teachers at MSU may receive some training in environmental education. The MSU Environmental Education Center also performs outreach and research. Staff and faculty of the center are certified in Project WET, Aquatic WILD, Project Learning

Tree, Food, Land and People, Population Connection, WOW! Wonders of Wetlands and POW! Planning of Wetlands.

Funding for Flying WILD comes from the Center for Environmental Education, the MSU Center for Regional Engagement and the Kentucky Environmental Education Council.

## MSU receives \$10.1 million GEAR UP grant

Morehead State University has been awarded its largest federal grant in history - \$10.1 million - to continue helping middle and high school students in Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin, Morgan and Pike counties to prepare for college.

MSU's Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy received the grant from the U.S. Department of Education for another phase of its GEAR UP project. Funded at \$1,684,000 for the first year, the grant is anticipated for a six-year period.

The grant will be matched dollar-for-dollar by the various partners involved in the project, bringing the total expected amount of funding for the project to \$20,208,000.

The major focus will be mathematics and science. Beginning in the seventh grade, GEAR UP students participate in such activities as tutoring, mentoring, financial aid, college preparation workshops, college visits, career exploration and summer enrichment programs. The goals and objectives are based on a high need for both family and academic support mechanisms and will focus on student development, teacher/curriculum development, and parent development clusters with a special emphasis on parental awareness and involvement.

The highly competitive GEAR UP award will help project partners serve over 2,000 students in the first year alone, and by year six the project anticipates to serve and make a significant impact on more than 12,000 students in the six-county project service area.

Emergency Medical Technicians provide vital services to those that require immediate medical attention. The technicians then must transport the sick or injured to a medical facility.

The 146-hour EMT training course focuses on following proper medical protocols and guidelines, providing appropriate emergency care and transporting the patient. All emergency treatment is carried out under the medical direction of physicians.

Two sections of the Pharmacy Technician Certification Program are also being offered. One section now underway meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30 until 9:30 p.m. in 31 Allie Young Hall.

The second section of the pharmacy technician program is currently underway in Maysville. The course meets Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6:30 until 9 p.m. at the Housing Authority of Maysville, in the Amo Peters Building.

The fee for the Pharmacy Technician Certification Program is \$999. This comprehensive course will prepare students to enter the pharmacy field and to take the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board's PTCB national exam.

Course content includes medical terminology specific to the pharmacy, reading and interpreting prescriptions and defining drugs by generic and brand names. Students will learn dosage calculations, IV flow rates, drug compounding, dose conversions, dispensing of prescriptions, inventory control and billing and reimbursement.

## President Andrews named to higher education task force

Morehead State University President Wayne D. Andrews has been named to the President's Advisory Committee of Gov. Steve Beshear's Higher Education Work Group.

Gov. Beshear announced the formation of the Higher Education Work Group and signed an Executive Order authorizing its creation Tuesday during a press conference at the State Capitol in Frankfort.

"I am pleased to accept the governor's appointment to this important committee," Dr. Andrews said.

"Access to college is a vital issue in this state and we must find new ways to enroll more Kentuckians of all ages."

The work group is a broad-based, bi-partisan group composed of business leaders, higher education policy experts, key legislators and senior administration officials.

"It's my belief that no person in this state with the drive and ability to succeed should be denied access to a college education because he or she can't afford it," Gov. Beshear said. "Yet because of cost, the door of opportunity is closed or beyond reach for too many of our children."

Gov. Beshear said the Higher Education Work Group will be co-chaired by business leaders Mira Ball of Lexington and Pete Mahurin of Bowling Green.

Dr. Andrews' committee will be asked to provide guidance, suggestions and ideas to the work group.

The group will be tasked with producing two reports with recommendations for Gov. Beshear. The first, due in January 2009, will among other things look at ways to reduce costs associated with college.

"We can't be content with baby steps when other places are taking giant strides, not when we're trying to compete with these states in the global marketplace," Gov. Beshear said. "Rather, we must pursue new solutions to old challenges. We need dramatic and focused strategies that lead to transformational and enduring change. Today, in the critical area of building tomorrow's workforce, we begin our important work."

Sophomores, juniors, seniors, postbaccalaureates and graduate students can register on Thursday, Nov. 13. Freshmen and new transfer students will register on Friday, Nov. 14.

Students also will be able to view and pay their bill online via WebAdvisor. Those who are registered for the spring semester will receive monthly e-billing statements via their assigned MSU e-mail account. It is important for students to check their MSU e-mail account on a regular basis. Account balances are due in full one week prior to the start of classes, Jan. 5 for the spring term.

Although MSU does not offer a deferred payment plan, students may take advantage of a different option to pay their bill at a later date, while at the same time, confirming that they will be attending classes.

If any student is unable to pay his or her full balance prior to the deadline, he or she may complete an online Statement of Intent, which explains payment requirements. The statement must be completed by Jan. 5 to prevent a student's class schedule from being cancelled. This also applies to any student who receives financial aid or scholarships, or whose college expenses are being paid by an outside agency.

MSU offers online bachelor's degree "completer" programs designed primarily for graduates of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS). These programs allow KCTCS graduates to earn bachelor's degrees while continuing to meet work and family obligations without traveling long distances. Courses are offered via the Internet, providing busy adults the opportunity to complete class work at a time and place convenient to them.

## Kentucky Space to have satellite on NASA mission

Kentucky Space on Tuesday announced that its first orbital satellite, KySat-1, has been selected by NASA to fly on a mission projected for launch in mid-2009.

"The launch opportunity for KySat-1 is an incredible opportunity," said Dr. Ben Malphrus, Morehead State University professor of space science and director of the Space Science Center. "Its success will give our program viability and excite the next generation of students coming to MSU to study space science."

The selection of KySat-1 comes after a rigorous national review process by the NASA Launch Services Program of the Flight Projects Office at Kennedy Space Center. Satellites from the University of Colorado and Montana State University also were chosen for the mission.

"This highly innovative Kentucky effort is the epitome of the talent that lies within our state," said Gov. Steve Beshear. "The Commonwealth has been, and will continue to be, aggressive in its pursuit of technological and knowledge-driven economic opportunities."

KySat-1, the first satellite ever built in Kentucky, is a cube shaped pico-class satellite powered by solar energy, weighs 1 kg and measures 10cm on a side. Once KySat's on-board computers confirm its release into orbit, Kentucky Space ground controllers in Kentucky will operate the satellite for the duration of its expected 18-24 month mission. After proper operation is confirmed, KySat-1 will be made available to K-12 students throughout Kentucky, and the world, to allow them to issue select commands to the satellite and download the data received.

Kentucky has invested approximately \$850,000 over the last three years on this research and development of this project.

KySat is a joint enterprise involving public organizations, colleges, universities and private companies in a student-led initiative for the design, launch and on-orbit operation of small satellites to promote science, technology, engineering, innovation and education.

In addition to MSU, its members are: the University of Kentucky, University of Louisville, Western Kentucky University, Murray State University, the Kentucky Space Grant Consortium, Belcan, the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education, Kentucky Science and Engineering Foundation, Kentucky Science and Technology Corporation (managing partner), and the Kentucky Community and Technical College System.

The KySat team includes students, faculty, and staff from the six participating university systems. MSU team members are: Dr. Malphrus, Jeff Kruth, space science antenna engineer; Michael Combs, telescope operations engineer; and students Jason Smathers of Mt. Sterling; Jessamyn Delgado of Bardwell; Jennifer Carter of Olive Hill; Marc Beck of Owensboro and Badsoden, Germany; and Prabhakara Rao Eluru of Visakhapatnam, India. A historic first for the program and for Kentucky, this is the first time NASA will launch university built satellites into orbit.

The recommendations made by the launch panel and the NASA Flight Projects Office are being forwarded to NASA Headquarters for final approval and designation of the primary NASA mission. This announcement is expected as soon as December. The KYSat-1 team has been asked to be prepared for a June 2009 launch.

## Jackson, Rust to be inducted into Athletic Hall of Fame

Two individuals who made outstanding contributions to Eagle athletics will be inducted into the Morehead State University Athletic Hall of Fame during the MSU-Valparaiso football game on Saturday, Nov. 1.

The game kicks off at 1 p.m. EST, and the newest members of the Hall of Fame will be honored at halftime.

The newest members of the Hall of Fame are Willie "Hobo" Jackson (basketball) and Lauren Mackey Rust (volleyball).

Jackson was a three-year starter and letterman (1966-69) for the Eagles at a time when freshmen were not eligible to play varsity competition. He is commonly regarded as one of the most outstanding athletes to ever play basketball for the Blue and Gold. MSU's record during his three varsity years was 46-26, and the Eagles were Ohio Valley Conference co-champions his senior season.

He scored 1,049 points and still ranks 23rd on MSU's all-time scoring list. His 16.9 point average in 1968-69 was tops on the squad. Jackson had 793 career rebounds and still ranks ninth on MSU's all-time rebound list.

Jackson and three other natives of Birmingham, Ala., Lamar Green, Bruce King and Howard Smith, were among the early African-American basketball players at MSU and in the OVC. They were known as the "Birmingham Four" and led Eagle basketball to much success in the 1960's.

Rust is one of the most honored volleyball student-athletes in the history of Eagle volleyball. She was a four-year starter and letterwinner (1995-98) who earned First Team All-Ohio Valley Conference honors three times, Second Team All-OVC once and All-OVC Tournament once. Rust is the all-time conference leader in kills and ranks in the top 25 all-time nationally in that category.

She holds MSU career and single-season records for kills in total attacks and led the team in those categories for four consecutive seasons. Rust was an Academic All-District selection and was one of 30 student-athletes to be selected for the NCAA's National Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.
