NEW BANK.

The subject before our Legislature which cems to be exciting the greatest degree of interest throughout the State, is the proposi-tion introduced into the lower House, by Mr. Calhoon, of Meade, to establish an addition al bank, with a capital of \$3,000,000, and with eleven branches. It is proposed in the bill that the mother bank shall be located at Harrodsburg, and that the State shall invest its portion of the Surplus revenue as capi-tal in the the said bank, a very small portion of which is to be subscribed by individual

It is extremely doubtful whether the bill will pass—and the policy of the measure to our minds is still more doubtful. It is said however that the new Bank has a great many friends, and has created for itself a powerful party. The projectors of it have recom-mended it to the members from a great many of the counties in the State, whose citizens thought that their claims had been overlooked by the Bank of Kentucky and the Northern Bank, by locating ten of the branches; Flemingsburg comes in for a branch; Mt. Sterling for another, and various other towns in the State.

The fact of the branches being located by the bill has this effect, that the members fro the counties in which branches are located, will be fearful of voting against it, lest they should be encountered with the powerful ar-gument: "How dare you vote against a measure which has such a direct tendency to benefit your citizens, your county and your immediate section of country." This we fear is an argument, which few of them will have firmness to resist.
