## JURY LISTS FOR JUNE TERM ARE GIVEN OUT HERE

None Have Served During Past Four Years; No Women On Juries

The list of those available for jury and grand jury service has been drawn for the June term of the Rowan Circuit Court which meets on the third Monday in June, which this year is June 20.

Jury Commissioners this year are Lester Blair, Dr. H. L. Wilson and Jerry Fletcher. The outstanding feature of the jury this term is the fact that in the entire list there is no man who has served on a jury within the last four years. Many of them have never before seen jury service.

Another feature is the fact that in the entire list there is no woman named. On all juries of the past several years, since women have been accepted for jury service, every jury in Rowan County has had at least one woman, sometimes more.

Since the entire list this term has no women named, it would appear that this term there will be none on either the Grand or Petit juries.

## Combs Discusses Economic Ills

Lamenting the fact that ninety five per cent of the wealth in the United States is owned by five per cent of the people and that ninety per cent of one percent of the people pay ninety two percent of the income tax, Rev. G. H. Combs, in speaking at the baccalaureate services at the Morehead State Teachers College Sunday morning told packed auditorium of graduates and visitors that unless the economic system centered around the idea of personal gain is subordinated it will be damaged.

"Less than one tenth of the people that are unemployed and starving in the United States overthrow Rome," he speaker said, and raised his hand with the parody, "History will repeat itself." People of New York are starving, while in other sections of the country wheat is being burned for fuel, seven millions of people are unemployed, the farmer is broke, and millions of acres of farm land are lying idle, Combs said, and continued by emphasizing the belief that the entire economic system needs a drastic change.

## CLEARFIELD BOY DISAPPEARS ON MONDAY NIGHT

Volney Skaggs Disappears On Monday Evening; Not Seen Since

The mysterious disappearance of Volney Skaggs of Clearfield Monday night is causing a great deal of concern to his parents and his brothers and sisters. The boy left home Monday night at about 8:00 o'clock and has not been seen or heard of since that time. At the time he left home he had just made arrangements with his brother, William Skaggs, to help him with a science course he has been taking in the training school at the Morehead State Teachers College in preparation for the examinations which came this week. When his brother went to look for him he had gone. A search failed to disclose his whereabouts. The search was continued until mid-night and taken up again about 3:00 a. m. since then it has been carried on without stop.

The only trace that has been found to date is the statement by Arthur Hanson that he saw him sitting on the bridge across Triplett creek at about the time Twenty Four ran on the C. & O. Monday night. That would be about 10:00 p. m.

His parents and the family are naturally distracted over his disappearance. They hesitate to believe that anything serious has happened to him and discount the rumor of suicide that has been circulating. So far as they know, he showed no signs of gloom and was entire happy when he talked to his brother just a few moments before he left his home to be seen no more up to the present.

Police in neighboring cities have been asked to keep a lookout for the boy, who answers to the following general description:

Volney Skaggs is aged 16 years. He is about 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighs about 155 pounds. He has dark brown, almost black hair, blue eyes and heavy eyebrows. He had just had a fresh haircut. He was dressed in a white shirt, grey trousers and wore black slipshoes, size 8. He combs his hair straight back in a pompadour.

Any information about this boy will be greatly appreciated by his parents and his brothers and sisters. Anyone who has any trace of him will be conferring a great favor on the police. If you have any such information to William Skaggs at the home of Roe Mastin in Clearfield.

## To Let Contract On Wrigley Road

Plans for obtaining the right-of-way for the new highway extending from Waggoners store in Rowan County to Wrigley are making satisfactory progress according to members of the fiscal court who have been working for several days getting the documents signed up. All ready all but five land owners have agreed to donate the land necessary and the right-of-way for the proposed highway. Four of these men are non residents and two of these are expected to sign up without any trouble or delay. Two of the non-residents will have condemnation proceedings filed against them at once and immediate action is expected on these cases. The one local land owner is expected to sign without any trouble.

The contract for the new highway is advertised in this issue of the News to be let on June 29. Work is expected to start as soon thereafter as possible.

Governor Laffoon to Speak  
 Governor Raby Laffoon will be at Junior Week at University the principal speaker at the annual Junior Week at the University of Kentucky June 7-11. He will address the 500 club boys and girls and 100 local leaders and county and home agents in memorial hall Thursday morning, June 9.

Boys and girls from three-fourths of the counties in the state will attend Junior Week. They will be delegates from local clubs, and represent the 23,000 club members in the state.
