The Unprecedented Period of Prosperity

That has paid its attentions so closely to Olive Hill is real more than remarkable. The many elements of progress mark a "Greater Olive Hill."

One could hardly take a look at East Main Street vicinity now and draw heavily enough on their imagination to picture it even the short length of two years' back without exaggerating its real appearance then, so far as buildings, streets, etc., are concerned. The fact is, less than two years ago found (to use a worse title) the Jordan Bottom to be simply a few acres of vacant ground and some parts, a small spot here and there, rather swampy like, none to materially injure the property or tending to decrease the value or make the whole an undesirable building lot. No concrete or any other kind of sidewalks would the passer-by have noticed. No fencing to mark the beginning or the termination of any lots. In fact to the passer-by, no judgment would have been prompted by the general view, to have been passed that within 5 years the ground would be "bedecked" with nice dwellings and other necessary improvements. But "such is life in a great city." To give honor to whom honor is due, we must put our Senator, W. B. Whit, in the lead for the rapid growth, or rather bound, that we have with pleasure witnessed in the Eastern portion of town for 2 years back.

WORK OF SENATOR WHITT

The Senator has built five real nice cottages, neatly finished and painted, on the Western section of the bottom that has been transformed into a resident suburb. Besides this he is now having erected, under contract of the Olive Hill Planning Mill Co., three more cottages a little deeper in the Eastern part and we understand intends to build several more at once. He hasn't stopped with merely a dwelling in which to live but looks to the utmost interest of the occupants. He has prepared good wells and has nice concrete sidewalks in front of all his property here and the entire length of the street running to Front from Main on his property front. It is fitting the dwellings with pump sinks and all other conveniences adaptable to them with the facilities offered.

WORK OF CAPITALIST

STAMPER AND OTHERS

Now we will just look over on Front and Railroad Streets. There you will see where another capitalist, A. J. Stamper, has the position as the central and most prominent figure. On these two streets, principally, a handsome pile of the fruits and realizations of his many years of business and industrial life has been invested to a profit to himself and to "add the touch that gives it favor" to the face of our prosperous and flourishing city of the fifth rank. It began to don this spectre appearance when N. D. Tabor built his brick and the People's Co-operative mercantile building was erected by U. S. G. Tabor. Both are nice and substantially constructed bricks of two and three stories height respectively. The former is now occupied by the builder with a capacious general merchandise stock and the latter by the Olive

Hill Hardware Co., carrying a stock of hardware and furniture to almost the limit of the capacity of the three stories.

Mr. Stamper, as we have often mentioned before, introduced the use of concrete blocks, for building purposes, into our city. At the same time, he erected out of this building material, a mercantile building, two story, on Cross Street, now occupied by the progressive clothiers and furnisiers: Cartee Bros. & Co., and who purchased the building from Mr. Stamper before it was completed, and Hotel Stamper on the corner of Front and Cross streets and now under very successful management.

The Hotel is a magnificent structure, erected on practical modern principles and stands defiance to all our buildings as regards size, being four story. Also about the same time he built, under contract, a three-story concrete block building, with a nice brick front, located on Cross street, for W. H. Scott & Co., who have a very large line of furniture and hardware on the ground floor, while the second story is occupied by the Big Sandy Telephone & Telegraph Co., and the third story is partitioned in suitable and convenient offices for rent. Then next this building on the same street we come to a nice one story brick, which was built, and for a length of time occupied by, Mr. Clarence B. Waring, but was recently purchased, and is now occupied by Armstrong Drug Co., with a large line of drugs and patents. On the corner of Cross and Main street, is the Whitt building, another handsome and modern two story brick mercantile and office building, built by L. C. Wilson shortly after the Cross street conflagration about 4 years ago. It is now occupied by W. S. Hicks & Son, general merchants, and M. D. Jordan's shoe store and numerous professional offices in the second story. Now we have come to the Jordan hardware store on Main St., built by now Senator Whit about 5 years ago and afterward sold together with his merchandise stock to the Portsmouth Harrison-Walker Co., who sold it to its present owner and occupant, Mr. Jordan. Back across Front street is the Olive Hill National Bank, in its two-story brick with offices on the second floor — is a graceful building. Now in the way of best buildings we have met the second largest building, of any kind, in our city. It is the most recent building of Mr. Stamper; of concrete blocks, 3 story, christened the "Alpha" House—the first and only opera house here. The 2 upper stories (or the opera place and the lower story occupied by the Olive Hill Mercantile Co., for general furnishings for both sexes, and the largest line of goods in the city.

Woman Suffrage Question Heavily Opposed.

In a lengthy missive from Mrs. Corbin to Woman Suffrage advocate for very plausible reasons. Contents of letter.

Mrs. Carolina F. Corbin, President of the Illinois Association opposed to the extension of the suffrage to women, has addressed a letter to Lessing Rosenthal, Chairman of the Committee on Municipal Suffrage of the Chicago Charter convention, in which she dwells on the relation of woman suffrage propaganda of revolutionary socialism, which she declares is the most active and strenuous foe of Christian civilization. Mrs. Corbin declares in her letter:

"Any economic scheme which puts woman on a utilitarian equality with men and makes her his competitor in the market places of the world to the destruction of her value as a home work-

er, which deprives her of that virtue alone which fits her for the duties of motherhood by abrogating marriage and encouraging promiscuous relations between the sexes, must expect to be judged according to its merit by the world at large."

Mrs. Corbin concludes her letter as follows: "We ask that you will remember your mothers, wives, the women of your homes and by your action protect them from the evil designs of socialism that you will guard them from forced participation in political strife and contention, whose atmosphere will tend to reduce them to the coarse and materialistic level of the socialistic conception of womanhood."—L. Post.

General Chas. H. Grosvenor, of Ohio, has won a national reputation for his accuracy of his political forecasts. He says that the next House of Representatives will have a good working majority. I have in my hand a list of 41 districts which were carried by the Democrats in the 58th Congress that were carried by the Republicans in the 59th. They are Delaware, Iowa, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, N. Carolina each 1; Indiana, New Jersey and Pennsylvania each 2; Ohio and California each 3; New York 6; Illinois 7, and Missouri, 8; total 41. One change was added by a contest in Missouri that made 42. In the present House we have 114 Republican majority.

In looking over these 42 I think it is fair to say the Republicans will carry 10 of them this year. Take 10 from 42 and you have 32 and that makes a change of 64 and leaves 50 majority. I have not allowed the republicans to carry any district they didn't carry in 1904 and it may be well said it is not likely they will carry very many but it is fair to say they are as likely to carry some districts that they lost in 1904 as that the Democrats will regain more than 32 of the districts they lost. Here appears a great majority of 50. How is the Democratic party to overcome that? Where can the basis be formed for a judgement of that character? I am quite aware the enthusiasm of the party about the close of the last session was equal to a result as great as that, but there is no such talk among Democrats today. I only hope every Republican
