## Location and Climate

Morehead is located in the valley of Triplett Creek on the Louisville division of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad midway between Lexington and Ashland at the junction of the Morehead and North Fork Railroad with the Chesapeake and Ohio. It is surrounded by wooded mountains which present some of the most beautiful scenery to be found anywhere. It has a low death rate, and for many years has been free from epidemics, facts which attest the healthfulness of the climate.

## Rooming and Boarding Facilities

**Allie Young Hall** is a fireproof building and affords rooms on the campus for one hundred and forty-five women. It is beautifully equipped with modern conveniences. The rooms are furnished with electric ceiling lamps and study lamps, metal dressers and beds, rugs, study table, and chairs. On each of the three floors are baths with showers and tubs. The parlors are large and elegantly furnished.

**Fields Hall**, a dormitory for women now in use, will be open for the summer School. It will accommodate one hundred and sixty-five women. This building is of fireproof construction, and will be furnished similarly to Allie Young Hall.

**Thompson Hall**, now occupied by men is a modern dormitory furnished with all modern conveniences. This building will be open to summer students.

## Room Rent

All rooms on the campus are provided with necessary furniture, heat, light, towels, sheets, and pillow-cases. Sheets, pillow-cases, and towels are laundered free of charge to the students. Each student is expected to furnish his own blankets. Room rent for each student in the dormitory is \$6.00 per month, two in a room. Rooms and board may be had in town at slightly higher rates than those on the campus.

## The Cafeteria

The school operates a cafeteria which is maintained exclusively for the benefit of the students. No attempt is made to make more than its operating expenses. Therefore, meals may be obtained at as low a cost as is commensurate with good food, well cooked. Board in the cafeteria usually runs from \$3.00 to \$3.50 per week.

## Fees

**ENTRANCE FEE:** Each student is required to pay an entrance fee of \$2.00 per term. **TUITION IS FREE TO ALL STUDENTS.**

**MEDICAL FEE:** All students who board either in town or in the dormitories are charged a medical fee of \$.50 for each term. This secures medical attention from the school physician free of any other charge.

**DEPOSIT:** A general deposit of \$3.00 is required of all students to cover any possible damage to school property, or books taken from the library and not returned. This deposit is returned at the end of the term less any damage that may be assessed against a student.
