DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

This morning about half past 2 o'clock our citizens were aroused from their slumbers by the cry of fire, which was discovered to have broken out in the large double warehouse of Mr. John B. McIlvain, Commission Merchant, corner of 2nd and Wall streets, which with a considerable portion of its contents, was entirely consumed.

John B. McIlvain's loss, including warehouse and goods, \$90,000. Insured, \$60,000 half in the Lexington and half in the Columbus Ins. Co.

O. H. Davis, brick warehouse, \$2,500. No Insurance.

Conrad Plister, brick warehouse, \$2,000. No Insurance.

Duke & Moody, loss in tin and stove were broken by a \$500. No Insurance.

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From the City Gazette. Letter from Mexico—Herrera Elect—Santa Anna, &c.

The steamer Schuyling reached Cincinnati last evening, bringing us New Orleans papers of the 17th inst. The Steamship Company's vessel had arrived from Vera Cruz, where she sailed on the 1st of June. The news by this arrival is very definite.

Our account states that Santa Anna resigned the Presidency, and another man had been elected President. A third is as follows, which we copy from the N. O. Delta.

We have received El Arco Iris, from Vera Cruz, of the 20th and 31st May, and find in it two articles, in which the editors seem to believe (from correspondence shown from Puebla, dated the 27th), that Santa Anna had not only been deposed from the command of the army, but that he and Gen. Canizales had been arrested and were awaiting their trial at the capital; that Gen. Valenciano had, in consequence, been appointed as the chief of the military forces in Mexico; and that the peace party was proceeding to take the field.

From the Delta we also take the following: JALAPA, May 21, 1847. EDS. DELTA.—A train of 200 wagons arrived yesterday afternoon from Vera Cruz, and proceeded this morning, in company with Gen. Twiggs' division, towards Puebla.

The Arco Iris also learned through several persons at Vera Cruz, who received information from the interior, that the peace party in the capital were divided into two parties, one in favor of Santa Anna, and the other in favor of Herrera, who were the two prominent candidates for the Presidency.
