## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

### A GREETING

We take this occasion to extend to all the alumni, the student body, the future student body, and the friends of the Morehead State Normal School and Teachers' College, a most cordial greeting.

It is with pleasure that we announce that the enrollment is holding its own; the spirit of the student body is fine and wholesome; that the esprit de corps of the whole organization altogether escapes the average.

It is with pride that we announce that the professional rank of our teaching staff is constantly being raised. We now have five members of the faculty who have completed their doctorates. This is an increase of one over last semester. Last year among the four critic teachers in the Training School, there were two A. B. degrees, and two without degrees. This year, we have three A. M. degrees and one A. B. degree in the critic teaching staff. We are expecting to add another Ph.D. degree as the head of the English Department by the beginning of the second semester.

The school now has a trained librarian who has done a year and a half's work above her Bachelor degree. This work has been done in the best library schools of the country. The new librarian has also had practical experience as the head of large public libraries.

The new registrar is a credit to the institution. She has completed one year of graduate work, and has had much experience in the field.

The building program goes on apace. The contract has been let for the new library, which will have a capacity of 100,000 volumes. Plans are rapidly being completed for one of the best training school buildings in the nation. We are expecting to make the new Training School the very heart of the Teachers' College.

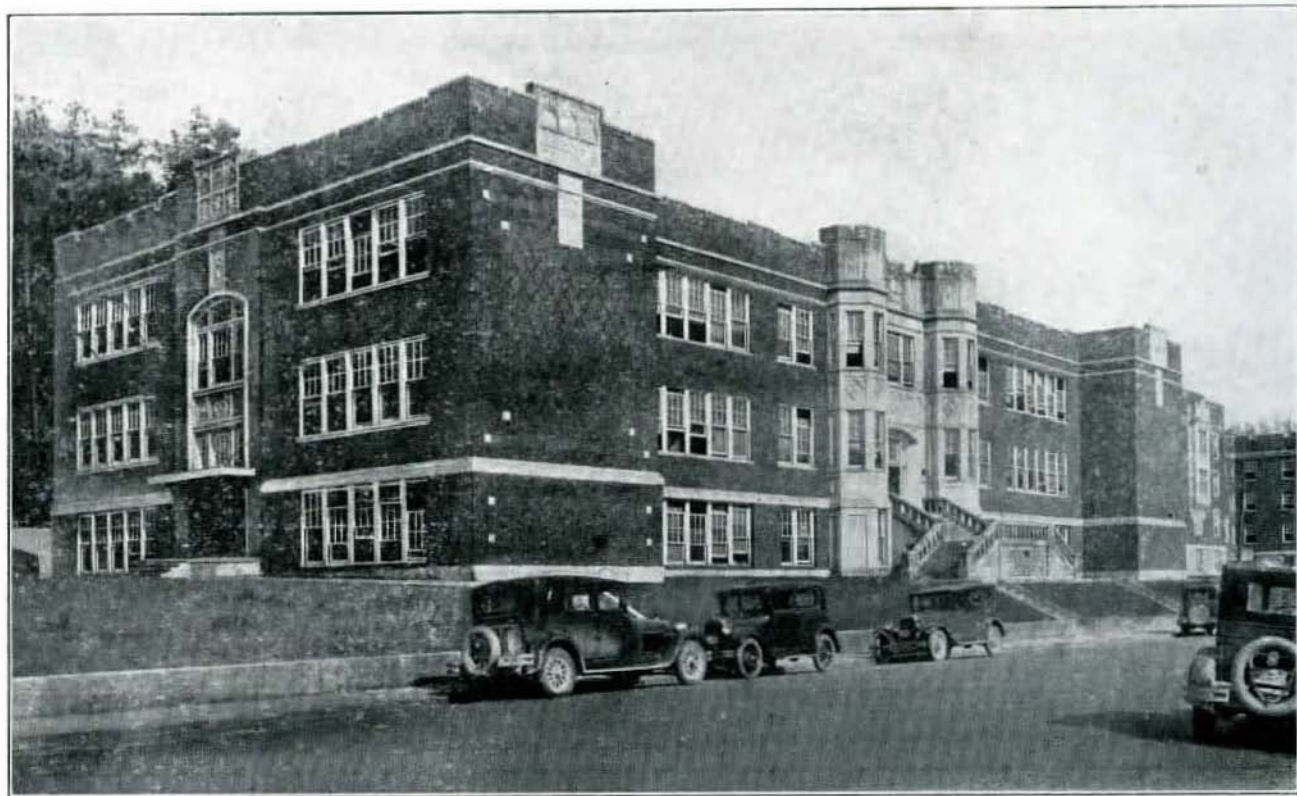

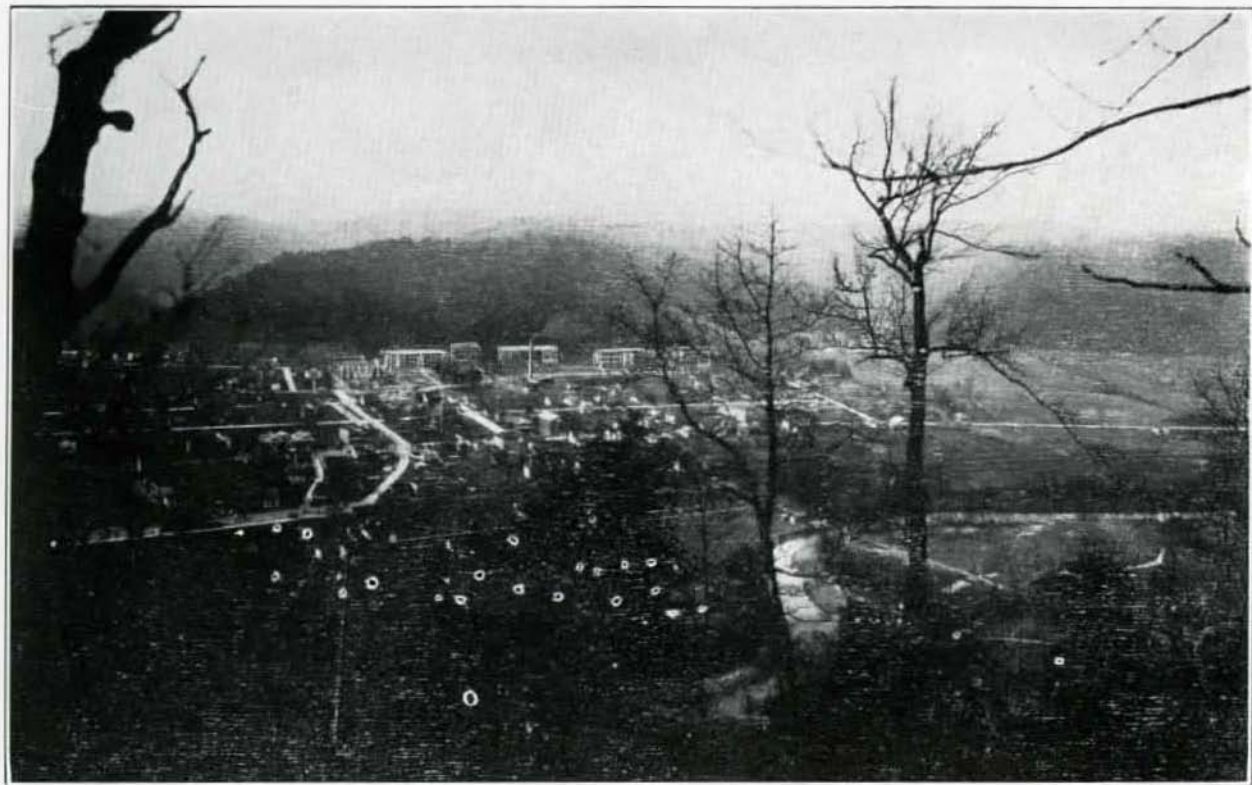

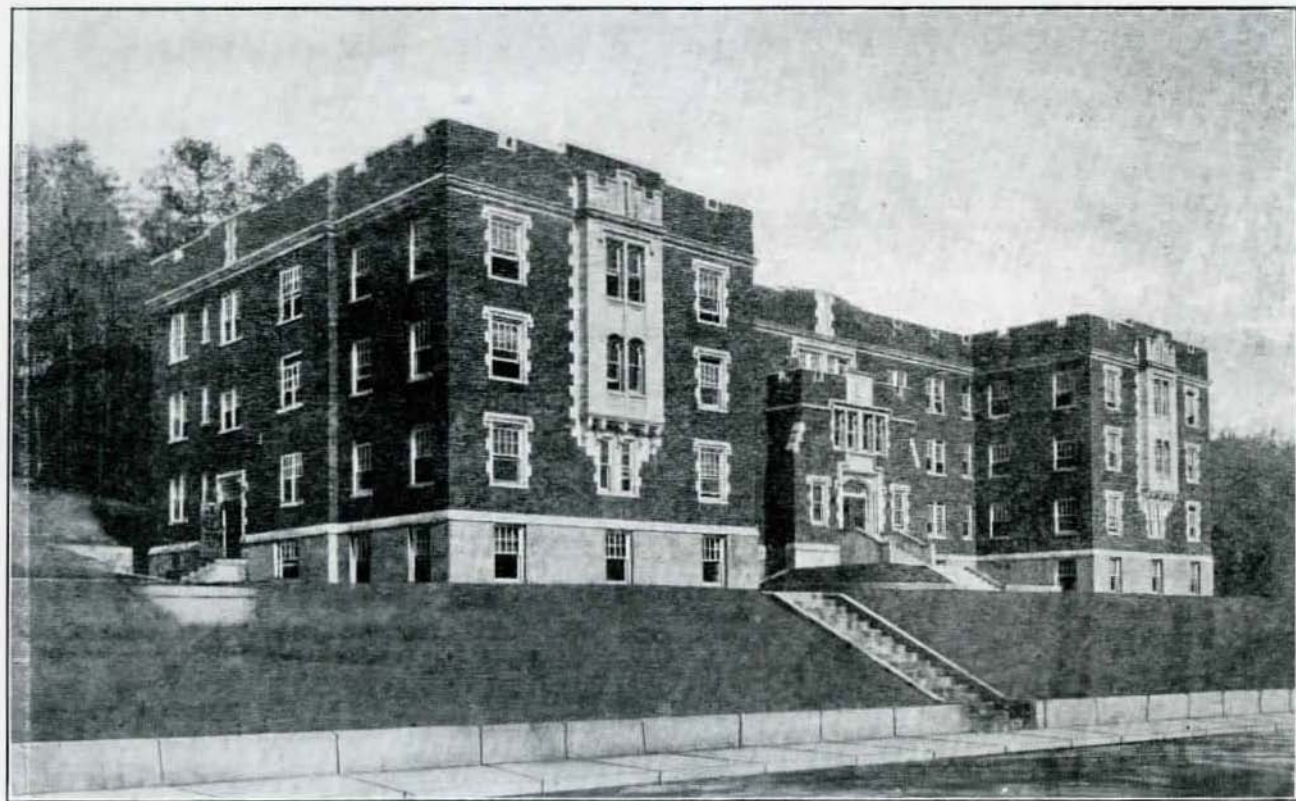
TEMPLES OF BRICK AND STONE

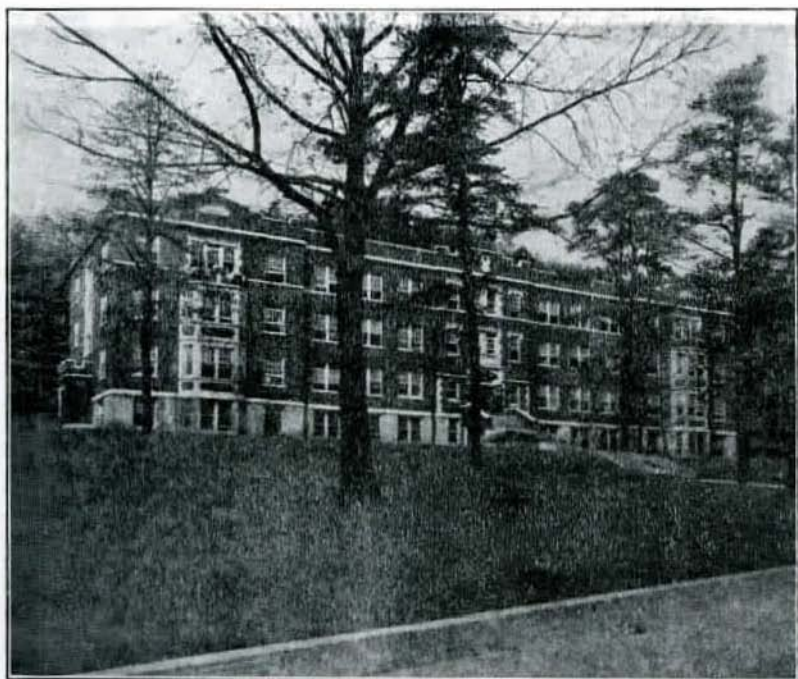


THOMPSON HALL—NEW DORMITORY FOR MEN

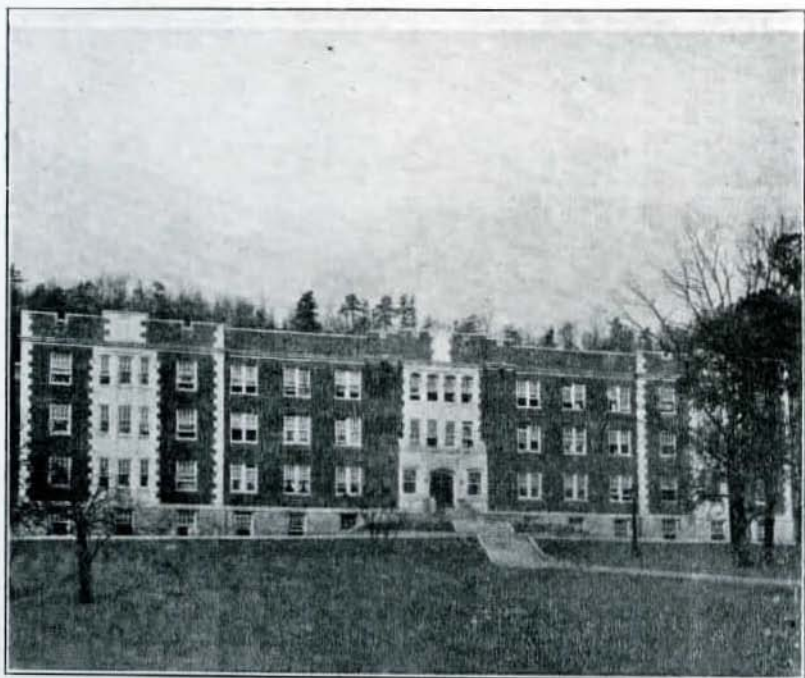

ORA EDITH FULLEN, Librarian

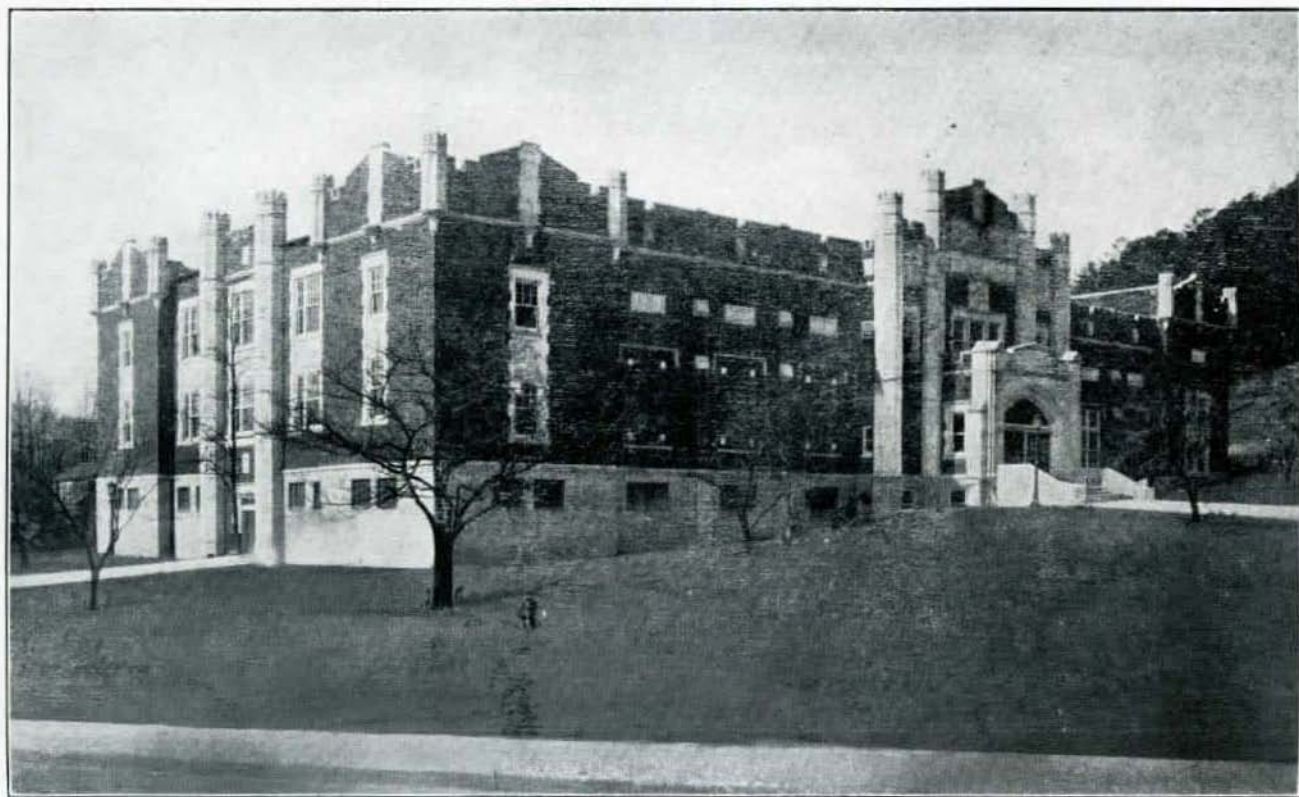
No one department of the Morehead Teachers' College has been more greatly strengthened this year than the library. The school has a new Librarian in the person of Miss Ora Edith Fullen. She has her Bachelor's degree from Kansas Wesleyan University, and has done a year and a half's graduate work in the library field at the University of Chicago and at Columbia. While at Columbia, she was employed as an assistant in the great Columbia Library. She has also had experience at Greenville, North Carolina, in public library work.

More than 3,000 new books have been added to the library this fall. The library is now taking more than 150 magazines and periodicals. With the coming of the new library building, with 100,000 volume capacity, this department of the school should mean more and more to the intellectual opportunities of the student body.

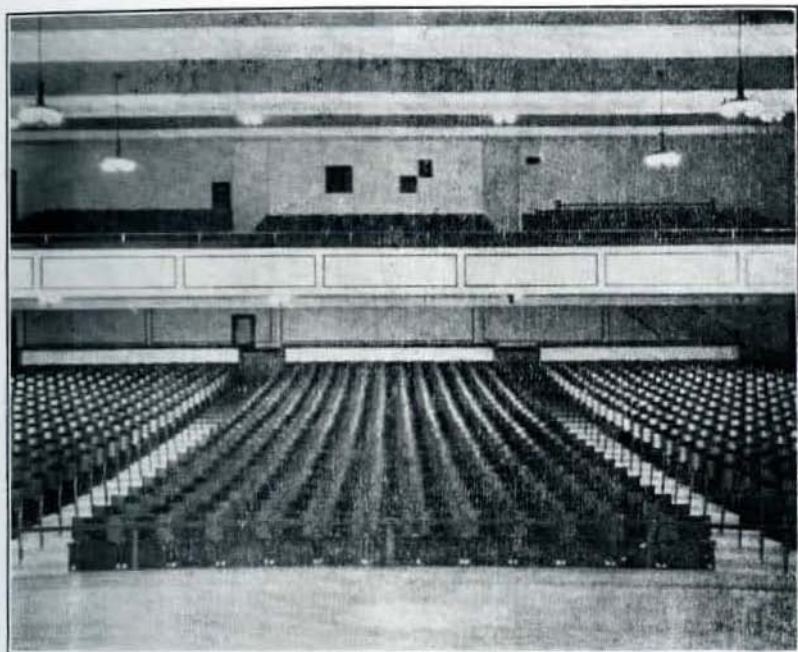

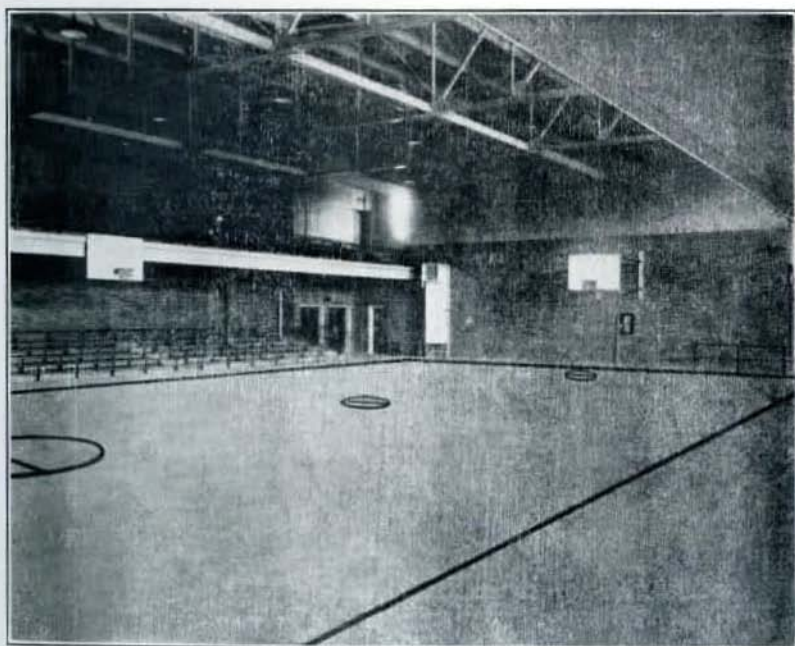

### INTERIOR OF AUDITORIUM

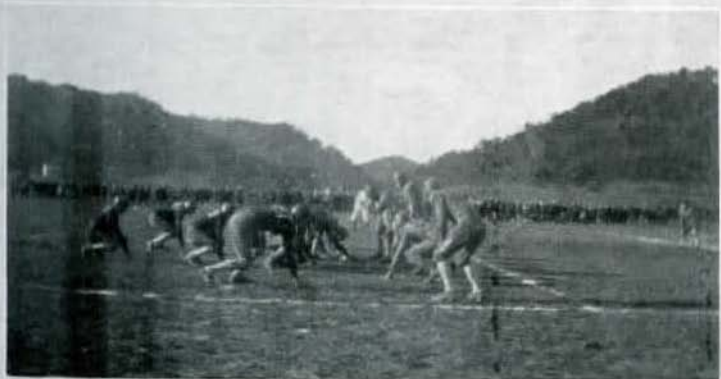

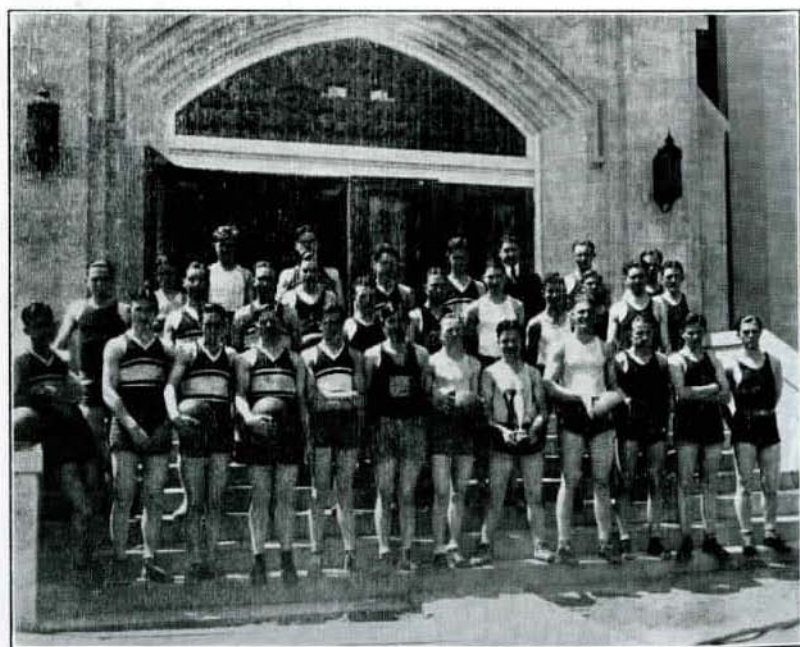

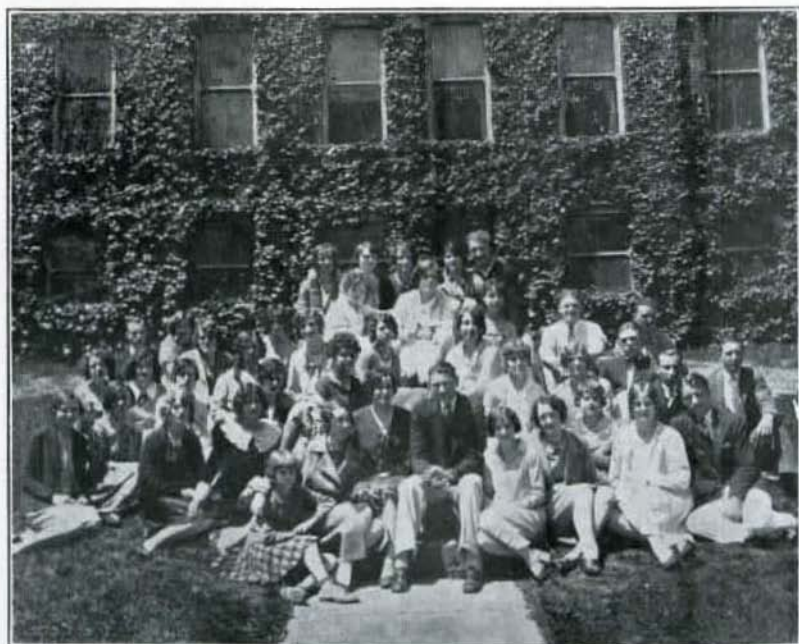

## RECENT ADDITIONS TO FACULTY AS HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS

### DEPARTMENT of MATHEMATICS

Dr. James G. Black, Head

Dr. James G. Black is the new head of our Mathematics Department. Dr. Black is a Kentuckian, having taken his Bachelor's degree at the University of Kentucky, and also his Master's. He completed his doctorate at the University of Michigan.

Dr. Black, also, has charge of the work in Physics, in addition to the work in pure mathematics. He has already made himself an enviable record as a good teacher, and is one of the most popular faculty members on the campus. It is often true that a mathematics department is shunned by the student body, because of the difficulty of the work and the coldness of the subject. However, the contrary can be said about the mathematics department at Morehead. Dr. Black introduces the human element into his teaching of mathematics and has made not only himself, but his department, popular.



### DEPARTMENT OF FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Dr. Helene M. Evers, Head

The Department of Foreign Languages has been very much stimulated this year by the acquisition of Dr. Helene M. Evers as head of the Department. Dr. Evers has an A. B. degree from Washington University, an A. M. from the University of Missouri, and a Ph. D. from Bryn Mawr. She brings a rich scholarship to this department.

It is the hope of this department to build up an interest in the study of foreign languages, in the conviction that nothing is more essential to real culture, and more necessary for the working equipment of the future American citizen, who will be confronted with international problems which his fathers have not been compelled to face.
