# \$10,000 FOR COURT HOUSE

## Olive Hill and Vicinity Will Donate That Amount for County Seat.

### A PROPOSITION THAT MAKE TAX-PAYERS THINK

#### A Large Majority of Carter County Voters Want a New Public Building, Here Is the Chance to Get One For a Mere Bagatelle!

Do the voters of Carter County want a new \$17,000 or \$18,000 Court House with an outlay of not one iota more than \$5,000 of the County funds, by erecting that building in Olive Hill? Or do they want to pay \$15,000 (with additional appropriations for grafters) for a \$10,000 or \$12,000 house on the present location. Mr. Taxpayer here is easily digested food for thought.

Olive Hill wants the Court House built in Olive Hill and her citizens are anxious to and will give \$10,000 toward defraying the expenses of erecting such a building. Jenabe Whitt told a TIMES reporter Saturday, that \$10,000 for \$1,000 was ready at any time for that purpose, and that check is as good as the gold and his word is his bond. A. J. Stamper, who owns the Stamper Hotel building and the Alpha Opera House building and has other large real estate and business interests in this part of the county, is another one who will come up with a large size check for the same purpose. R. A. Carpenter, a well-known capitalist, who has large holdings in the immediate vicinity, is eager to put up as much as the next man to help the good cause along. We could name fifty well-known men who have their hands on their pocket-books ready and anxious to empty their contents into the hat to raise the \$10,000. In a few minutes talk and investigation, the first of the week, we found the amount could be raised in one hour, in Olive Hill alone, for the purpose of changing the location of the Court House. These men are business men, whose integrity and honesty of purpose have never been questioned and who will raise the fund as they have signified their intentions to do. They know, as everyone in the county knows, that by locating the county seat in a good, live town, where hustle and vim are the watch words of its inhabitants, would enhance the value of every foot of ground and increase the volume of all business interest of whatever nature in the entire county. In fact it gives the county a prestige that cannot be reckoned in dollars and cents.

You tax payers, are told by Grayson people that if the building is erected without a vote, it will cost you nothing, as you are now paying all the taxes that can be levied upon you; that is, you are paying for it. Say we build a house at Grayson for \$15,000, where is that sum to come from, if not the pockets of the tax payers? There is \$15,000 that will not be spent in making roads better, safer bridges, better culverts, etc. It will simply be \$15,000 more on the debt of the county, which is now between \$12,000 and \$15,000, thereby increasing that same debt to \$30,000. By building a \$15,000 house in Olive Hill more than \$10,000 can be saved, why? Because we have the brick on the ground thereby saving hundreds of dollars in freight; the rock is here, tons of it and ready for use without loading it on cars, and hauling it on a jirkwater railroad; also the freight on lumber would be considerable lower to this point over one road, than to have to be shipped over two roads where one of these roads only run trains when the sun shines and never on Sunday. There are hundreds of ways where money could be saved by building in Olive Hill. By giving \$10,000 we come within the law in the matter in which Grayson cannot do. The law reads as follows: "No county, city, town, tax district or other municipality shall be authorized to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount exceeding, in any year, the income and revenue of such year."

In erecting a building in Grayson it would be a direct violation of the above law as quoted; because the sum of \$15,000 added to the expenses of that year, would exceed the revenue. But Olive Hill has overcome this obstacle by donating two thirds the entire amount necessary to build.

Has Grayson signified her intention to give anything toward erecting the proposed building, which she knows better than any one ought to be built. Not a sue markee has been offered by the loudest calamity howlers in that section. They have kept particularly quiet on that subject and are trying to rush the matter through the Fiscal Court and

hold up the county for a good round sum. There is not one good reason that Grayson can advance why the court house should be located there. If there is such a one we would like to know what it is.

Mr. W. L. Huff, a member of the Fiscal Court, who is enterprising enough and a sufficient good stiff back-bone to be in favor of a new Court House, in an article in a county paper, says in part:

"Does a Board of Trustees of our common schools go around and ask the people if they want a house built, when there is one to be built? No, they get together, levy a tax, build the house and then the people all agree that it is the very thing they should have done. So let us get together, make appropriations to build a Court House, and erect a modern and commodious temple of Justice, one that our children will look on with pride, and I will guarantee that there is not a man in the county who will kick against it; it would not increase our taxes one cent, but it would increase the value of our property ten fold to the amount it would take to build it."

"Or, if we have not the energy or the back bone to build, let us step out of the way and let others in who will do something. The people of Olive Hill would build a Court House at the snap of a finger (and snap it themselves.)

I live just as close to Olive Hill as to Grayson. I have more interests in Olive Hill than in Grayson. My only brother is located there. I have a daughter living there. I expect to buy property there in the near future—so if the people of this end of the county do not want to make any improvement, I propose to join in with the people who have no opinion to give in them."

"If the editor sees fit to publish this letter, I would like to hear from some, or all, of the other Magistrates on the subject. If they are for it, let them give their reasons; and if they are against it, say why."

Mr. Huff writes intelligently on the matter, and when he says Olive Hill would build a Court House at the snap of a finger and snap it themselves, he hit the nail on the head. Just give us the chance, Mr. Huff, and we will snap that finger so loud that it will be heard all over the village of Grayson and strike terror to the calamity howlers of that hamlet.

Every farmer, who has been approached on the subject says to the man, "Build that Court House in Olive Hill, where there is some enterprise and energy to the people. It is a better town and easier of access than the present location."

Olive Hill people must ginger up a little more and work a little harder and it will not be a little while before we reach the goal of our efforts.

### Guard Shoots Convict.

Penitentiary Guard Hayes Johnson, of Nelson county, Saturday shot Will J. Jackson, a Fayette county convict, in the thigh, after the latter had assaulted several other guards and was breaking for the cellhouse door. The shot brought him down, but is not serious. He was sent up on February 2 for 10 years for robbery.
