BLACK CREEK, March 10, 1836.

Dear Brother: An express arrived at this place 12 o'clock last night, bringing that Ocala intelligence from General Jessup, that the war is in reality closed. The Indians have given up: have surrendered. All the Chiefs, but Ocala, have come in, and have consented to removal.

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PUBLIC MEETING.

At a very large and respectable meeting of the citizens of Fleming County held at the court house in Flemingsburg on Monday the 27th March 1837, to take into consideration the propriety of requesting the Bank of Louisville to establish a branch at Flemingsburg.

On motion of Thomas Porter, Esq., Col. DANIEL MORGAN was called to the chair and L. D. Stockton, Jr. appointed secretary. The object of the meeting having been explained, on motion of Dr. Andrew Pearce the following persons a committee to draw up resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting, viz: T. Porter, J. C. Lee, T. T. Summers, T. Throp, D. K. Stockton, A. McGowan, W. W. Blair, John Heddlson, Jas. Stuart, J. G. Hicks, Wm. Cassidy, S. C. Pearce, Saml. Mers, F. A. Andrews and Jesse Summers.

The Committee having retired for a short time returned and reported the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted. 1. Resolved, That we highly approve of the act passed by the last General Assembly entitled "An act to vest in profitable stock the Surplus Revenue of the United States required to be deposited with Kentucky," believing, as we do, that it will put to rest the wild schemes for new banks and afford sufficient banking capital for the business of the State.

2. Resolved, That FLEMINGSBURG, in our opinion, is the most eligible place for the location of a branch of the Bank of Louisville, north of the Kentucky river. 3. Resolved, That a location at FLEMINGSBURG would accommodate a large scope of good country and a greater number of enterprising drawers and traders, than any other point North of the Kentucky river.

4. Resolved, That, in our opinion, a branch located at FLEMINGSBURG would be judiciously managed both for the interests of the country and the stockholders. 5. Resolved, That, in our opinion, this community and the adjacent counties would have more confidence in, and be better pleased with, FLEMINGSBURG for the location of a branch bank than any other place in this section of the state; this place having had two banks both of which were so managed as to acquire confidence and give general satisfaction.

6. Resolved, That we will do all in our power to sustain and promote the interests of a branch bank located at FLEMINGSBURG. 7. Resolved, That Daniel Morgan, John Andrews, Thomas Porter, Martin P. Marshall, Dorsey K. Stockton, Franklin A. Andrews, W. W. Blair, Abram McGowan, John Donaldson, John W. Stockwell, A. A. Cavan, Thomas Throp, John Heddlson, L. W. Andrews, Samuel C. Pearce, John T. Walker, Thos. T. Summers, and Hiram T. Pearce, be appointed a committee to go to Louisville, and present the claims of FLEMINGSBURG for a branch bank to the President and Directors of the Bank of Louisville.

8. Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be signed by the chairman and secretary and sent to the newspapers for publication. DANIEL MORGAN, Chm. L. D. STOCKTON, Jr. Sec'y.
