

FOREIGN NEWS.—The steam ship Royal William, from Liverpool, arrived in New York on the 10th inst. bringing news 20 days later than that received by previous arrivals.

PENNSYLVANIA ELECTION.—The election took place in this State for Governor members of Congress and members of the Legislature, on the second Tuesday of October.

Philadelphia has given Riner, the Whig candidate for Governor, a majority of 4,047 votes over his Van Buren competitor, Mr. Porter.

Delaware county has given Riner a majority of 488, and given large majorities for the Whig ticket throughout.

Allegany county has given a majority of 1500 for Riner. Washington county has given a majority of 100 for Riner.

Franklin county is reported to have given Riner a majority of 400. Riner's majority in Somerset is between 700 and 800.

Orzo Election.—A decided and alarming change in favor of Van Burenism, is shown by the returns from this state, yet we do not despair of electing our candidate for Governor, the present efficient incumbent, Joseph Vance.

It is in this opinion by the intelligent editor of the Cincinnati Whig. He says—"The returns from the election in this State still continue to come in quite unfavorable for the Whigs—but we do not entirely despair of having elected our Governor."

So far as returns have come to hand in relation to the Legislative election, it is by no means certain that the Whigs have lost their ascendancy in the Legislature.

We would, at this moment, rather take Vance's chance of being elected, than Shannon's. The Whigs have elected their whole ticket in Warren, Greene and Clark.
