#### THE COMPRADOR IN CHINA.

Through These Agents the Chinese Transact Business.

American firms dealing in the Far East must acquaint themselves with a number of unusual business methods, among them the comprador system, which has its highest development in China. Business houses deal with the Chinese through a Chinese agent known as the comprador. For years the system has developed, however, until now practically all the business of foreigners with Chinese is done through agents of this sort, whether it be in buying or selling, in loaning or in borrowing money. In many firms the comprador is a partner; in many instances he is in reality the owner of the business, furnishes the capital, manages it and uses the name of a foreigner to secure foreign protection from the many abuses which obtain in commercial circles. The real comprador is a caabler, handles all money received by a firm and makes all payments, in many foreign business houses bills are paid by the representative of the business office in an order on the comprador of the firm, and this order is banked as a bank or check draft.

Under the Chinese method a comprador who brought a dealer patronage would receive a certain percentage of the profits of all sales made to the comprador's firm. Following out the same principle the comprador receives a percentage of the wages paid all Chinese employes. Formerly this system of commission was carried on without the knowledge or at least without the consent of the business firm, and in many cases it is in vogue at present. Gradually, however, things have so developed that this percentage is recognized as a means of paying the comprador a portion of his salary.

The comprador of a tea firm, for instance, will receive a certain commission, as wages, on each box of tea the firm buys. One firm pays 50 cents Mexican (about 23 cents gold) to its comprador for every chest of tea he buys for the firm in the tea season. Silk firms pay on the basis of a certain sum for each unit of silk bought.

A higher price is therefore paid for the goods bought than the situation warrants, and all the subsequent transactions in that commodity are based upon the inflated value for which the consumer in due time must pay. The comprador of a foreign bank, for example, has charge of loans to Chinese. Generally he is responsible to the bank for such loans and, at all events, his approval is necessary for a Chinese to negotiate a loan with the bank. Security may be offered. The result is that advantage is often taken of the distress of a Chinese borrower, and by reason of his being forced to secure money within a certain time upon a loan he is compelled by the comprador to pay so large a commission or so great a rate of interest over and above that paid to the bank that the transaction is little better than ordinary highway robbery.

No one but the comprador secures benefit from the system under such circumstances.

## MY FRIEND THE COLLIE.

Many Commendable Points About This Fine Animal.

The rough-coated Scotch Collie is one of the most popular dogs among canine fanciers and breeders in England and America, writes A. D. Burhans in Recreation Magazine. The columns of any dog journal bristle with business announcements of breeders. Suburban, urban and country folks are learning of the true value of usefulness of this noble animal. He is a friend and crony as well as a watchdog.

The most points about a Collie is his head and expression, as breeders call it. A dog with an elegant coat and general Collie form, but without a good head, is not worth much, according to the fanciers. The head is moderately wide and skull flat, with a clean cut mouth and rather lengthily over all. Ears want to be carried low and when the dog is on foot they want to be elevated well up, yet the tips should tip over even and gracefully. In coat he must be very heavy and long. The fall about his neck must be long and beautiful. Collies are either golden black and white or tri-color, i. e., black, with white and tan markings on the head, neck, breast and ears. The sable and white Collie are the most popular in this country, as well as in their native land because of their beauty and docility. The white markings to be valuable must be a full, wide collar, white tip of tail, blaze in the face, white markings on the legs and breast. The more perfect these markings, other qualities being good in proportion, the more valuable the animal.

I have been impressed greatly during my few years' experience with Collies, with their extreme intelligence. Having kept and bred fox-hounds and pointers, previously, makes me love the Collie the more. Nothing that has come to my notice concerning either the fox or terrier or pointer has been disadvantageous to them. There is an indefinable something that fascinates one to own a Collie, and all others. He loves to play, and he is a blood character. He can so attach himself to you that nothing would ever let you part from him.

Any breeder or dog fancier loves his Collie best, the warm corner in the heart is reserved for him. Why? Because he out-works him. He will stand a cuffing nor a kick a sharp word or rebuke is more than enough to correct him. It may be his tender heart that makes him so affectionate. The time to get a Collie is when he is eight months old. If he is much older it takes too long to win him.

A few words on general care: In all favorable weather, wash the dog once each week. Feed him twice daily of cooked food. Do not keep him too fat. Good muscular condition and a smart, alert Collie are not the result of too much feed. Once a week give half a teaspoonful of powdered sulphur in a pan with some milk. It keeps his blood in fine condition. Use a medicinal animal soap when washing him. Disinfect the kennel with crude carbolic acid once a month in fall and winter, and during the unfavorable weather, dust him through all his dens with a solution of disinfectant. It is a good method of keeping his skin clean and free of insects after contact with other dogs. Have him clipped in summer if convenient, and let him get on the water and sun. He will love the water and it will be a sin to leave him home.

**Program and Programer.** Our boys and girls have noticed, of course, that the dropping of the "e" from the word "programmer" is "program." This is not so much in obedience to the demands of the so-called "phonetic reform," as it is a matter of conformity in spelling words that have the termination "gram." The word comes regularly from the Greek "programma," and really means "program," but the advocates of the shorter form say that if we write "diagram," "telegram," "epigram," etc., we might as well write "diagram," especially as the final "e" is not sounded. But you should not fall into the incorrect pronunciation that many people do. The accent is on the first syllable, of course, but the "gram" is distinctly sounded like "gram."

**The Famous Hanging Gardens.** Every one, young and old, has heard of the Hanging Gardens of Babylon, and many persons, perhaps, know how they were constructed. They were about four acres in extent, and were built on a base supported by pillars. They rose in terraces to a height of 200 feet, and it is said that they looked, from a distance, like a great pyramid covered with plants. Strange to say, they owed their existence to the whim of a woman, Queen Amytis, who grew tired of the plains of Babylon, and desired to see the hills of her native Media, that her husband, King Nebuchadnezzar, had the gardens built to please her.

**The Lion's Mouth.** The use of the lion's mouth as the vent of a fountain is quite common, so much so that it cannot possibly be considered accidental. As a matter of fact, the custom came to us from the Egyptians, who adopted it because the usual haunts of the Nile takes place when the sun is in the constellation Leo, the Lion. The situation is too obvious to need pointing out.

**LUCY'S TERRIBLE NIGHT.**

How a Disobedient Little Girl was Taught a Lesson.

"Just let me read this one page," Lucy used to say regularly every night, when it was time to go to bed. At last father got tired of it, and one night, when she begged to read "just that one page," as usual, he said: "All right. Go ahead, and be sure to go to bed when you have done." Then he sent the other children to bed, and went away himself, with mother. Of course, Lucy did not stop when she had read "that one page," but she kept right on until she read herself to sleep. **Making Pencils.**

Lead pencils, so called, are made of graphite, one of the forms in which carbon occurs in nature. There is no lead at all in graphite, and the misnomer is probably due to the fact that, previous to the use of graphite for pencil making, common lead was used.

Graphite is not sufficiently free from sand and other foreign substances to be used without preparation. To cleanse it, therefore, it is generally ground fine, then washed until it is pure, and forced into solid blocks by means of great hydraulic pressure.

The blocks thus formed are sawn into plates about one-sixteenth of an inch in thickness, and these plates are cut across, so as to form them into small four-sided sticks. The next thing necessary is to lacquer the sticks in a case of wood. The wooden case serves a two-fold purpose—it is a protection from breakage and it keeps the graphite from soiling the hands.

Wood for the cases is first sawn into thin boards about half the thickness of the intended pencils. The boards are then cut into small pieces about ten inches in length and six inches in width, which are placed in the cutting and smoothing machines and

cut into straight square sticks, each having a groove on one surface.

This machine consists principally of two circular saws. One saw is very thin, and is so set that it will cut entirely through the board, the other saw revolving within one-eighth of an inch of it, is so set that it will cut only a half square groove in the wood. The little sticks of prepared graphite are then laid in these grooves and covered with a similar piece of wood, though not grooved. They are then ready for the workman who is called the "fastener-up." He glues the inner faces of the two pieces of wood, presses them together and puts them aside to dry. When dry they are passed through the "rounding" machine, dressed with a semicircular smoothing plane, cut at the ends, polished and they are ready for the market.

**The Flow of Maple Sap.**

Some persons believe that the sap of the maple tree—from which, you know, maple sugar is made—flows only when there are frosty nights followed by warm days. It is true that the flow is most abundant then, but the reason being that the approach of spring produces the natural condition necessary for the tree's absorption of water from the earth, and that the movement of the sap is accelerated when it is subjected to a sudden change from a cool to a warm temperature. The flow of the sap, however, does not depend on these conditions.
