INSECT PESTS

PLANT LICE. On early cabbage, lice were destructive, this year. This was particularly true where shipped plants were used. The reason was that, where these "frost-proof" slips were grown, the winter was exceptionally mild, enabling the lice to breed and multiply all the season thru, and the plants came heavily infested with lice in all stages. Worse, was this, that from the early planted plants the lice spread to early maturing early kale, radishes, turnips, and making the trouble normal to the season, really serious. A way to cut down louse damage is to dip all "frost proof" plants in a tobacco solution of twice the strength used for spraying. A good plan is to follow this procedure whether the lice are observed or not.
