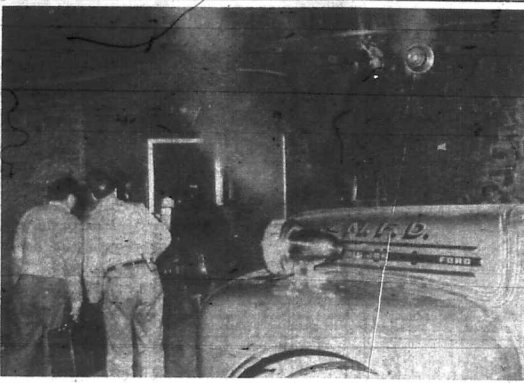

MSC Graduate Is Peace Corps Volunteer Robert J. Leupold, an alumnus of Morehead State College, has begun a two-year assignment as a Peace Corps Volunteer. He was one of 14 Peace Corps Volunteers to home leave before departing on January 1 for Indonesia. The Volunteers will join 17 other Peace Corps Volunteers in a physical education program. The Peace Corps was invited by the Indonesian Government to assist the Ministry of Sports on a national scale in the development and implementation of programs in physical education and sports competition. Ultimately, it is intended that through this effort the people of Indonesia will be toward adequate physical fitness training and the nation will be developing sports programs for both domestic and international competition. For three months these Volunteers trained at the University of Hawaii. They studied the Indonesian language, the history, customs and traditions of this Asian country, and American history and traditions. Nearly 7,000 Volunteers are now at work in 46 nations of Africa, Asia and Latin America. Requests for additional Volunteers are received daily. Registration For 2nd Semester At College Will Begin Saturday The second semester at Morehead State College will get underway Saturday at 8 a.m. with registration for night and Saturday classes. An orientation period for entering freshmen and transfer students will also be held on Saturday. Freshman registration is scheduled for Monday, and upperclassmen will register on Tuesday. Classes will begin on Wednesday, at 8 a.m. Freshmen will register from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Button gymnasium. Sophomores and juniors will register from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. the following day. Seniors will register from 7:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. Tuesday, marking the first time a registration period solely for seniors has been conducted in the MSC campus. Feb. 5 is the last day a student may register for credit. Dr. Afron Doran, president of Morehead State College, said that over 120 students who were not on the campus during the fall semester are expected to register for the second semester.

Burley Price Prop Raised To 58.9¢ The Agriculture Department announced Thursday a schedule of price supports for 1964 crop tobacco showing increases over last year's supports. The support for flue-cured, a major cigarette type, will average 57.2 cents a pound, compared with 56.6 cents for last year's crop. The support for burley, another cigarette type, will average 58.9 cents, compared with 58.3 cents last year. The 1964 supports compared with 1963 supports, respectively, for other types included Kentucky-Tennessee flue-cured, types 22-23, 40 cents and 9.6 cents and dark air-cured types 35-36, 35.5 cents and 35.2 cents. The supports for fire-cured types will be effective only if growers approve marketing quotas at an upcoming referendum. The department said the new supports represent an increase of about 1 percent over last year's levels. This increase is due, it said, to the increase in the prices of goods and services that farmers bought during the past three years, as compared with the 1963 prices they paid. Farm law re-

quires that tobacco supports be increased or decreased in line with corresponding changes in prices paid by farmers. Damage From Grease Fire Is Slight Fire Chief C. B. MSG Regents OK Bond Issue For Stadium, Library Work

Regents of Morehead State College last Wednesday approved a bid on \$1,500,000 for stadium and library work...

The regents accepted a National Science Foundation grant of \$67,548.50 and passed a regulation limiting admissions of out-of-state students to the upper one-half of their classes.

The \$67,548.50 grant will be used for two summer science institutes for high school biology teachers...

The rule limiting out-of-state students says: "A nonresident student who is a graduate of an accredited high school will be granted admission to Morehead State College if his high school transcript shows he has been graduated in the upper one-half of the senior class and has been recommended by a responsible school official as having educational promise."

The board of regents also ruled that a nonresident who has not graduated in the upper one-half of his class who wishes to attend summer school in 1964 at Morehead and make not less than a "C" on six hours of approved academic work, may be accepted for admission by the dean of the college at the fall term.

Internal Revenue Sets New Method On Auto Expense

Taxpayers who use their automobiles for business will have a simple, new method for figuring deductions this year.

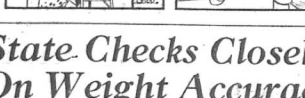
Interior Revenue Commissioner Mortimer Caplin said this week that from now on a taxpayer may use a standard rate of 19 cents a mile for the first 15,000 miles driven on business and seven cents a mile for greater distances.

Under the old method a taxpayer was required to file detailed records of gas and oil expenses, repairs, license tags, insurance and depreciation.

The new system may be used on returns filed for 1963, Caplin said.

Eagles Tackle Western Tonight, Tangle With Murray Saturday

Morehead's Eagles, currently leading the Ohio Valley Conference with a 3-0 mark, get back into the basketball wars this week after a two-day layoff for final examinations.

The Eagles' pit their spottiest conference marks on the line twice in three nights at Bowling Green and Murray, playing Western tonight (Friday) and Murray Saturday night.

"Western has a much finer team than their '63 record indicates," said Head Coach Bob Laughlin, "and they're going to beat some people who use OVC before the season is over."

"Just look at their 90-54 win over Middle Tennessee," added Laughlin. "Middle Tennessee has one of their finest teams in history and we were able to beat them by only five points at Murfreesboro. So you can see we will have our hands full for final examinations."

Laughlin pointed out Western's senior guard Darrel Carrier as one of the finest performers in the OVC. Carrier, who is second only to the Eagles' Harold Sargent in scoring in the OVC, is called by Laughlin "a great shooter who we will have trouble defending."

Laughlin also commented that the Eagles will be at a distinct disadvantage on the boards against both Western and Murray. "Western is big and rugged and completely dominated the boards against Tennessee Tech. They gave us fits on the boards so we'll really have to scrap to stay on the boards with Western."

"Murray was picked to win the conference in a pre-season poll," continued Laughlin, "and while they've lost two games — both on the road — they are still the team to beat."

Laughlin pointed to Murray's great size, shooting ability and experience and added that the Racers' top losers in the OVC were to the contender and both games could have gone either way.

"We have scouted both Western and Murray twice," said Laughlin.

Foxhound Fame Is Spreading Around World

Kentucky foxhounds are going around the world via Life Magazine and Paris Match, a French weekly news-pictorial magazine, as a result of the photographic know-how of Raimond Papp, Kentucky Department of Public Information photographer.

Papp, a survivor of the Hungarian uprising in 1956, came to this country in 1957 and joined the photographic staff of Public Information in 1961. He became a U. S. citizen in January 1963.

The full page picture of the pack of Walker hounds in the January 10 issue of Life shows the dogs setting out for the chase at dawn, each pair of eyes lit-up by the photographer's flashgun. The picture was taken last fall near Somerset at the annual hunt of the Kentucky Foxhunting Association.

Papp's work is frequently seen in travel literature prepared by the State Tourist and Travel Division. His photographs of Kentucky scenes and events have been exhibited in Canada, France, Germany and in several showings in this country.

MORE ON RAIL DISPUTE
After the six-month cooling off period and forced settlement of two issues, the railroad work rules dispute seems to be headed for another crisis. Secretary of Labor W. William Wirtz said the Federal Government is again stepping in to try to mediate the dispute, nearly five years old. If the issue is not settled by Feb. 25, a nationwide rail strike could be in.

KU Common Stock Approved For Big Board In February

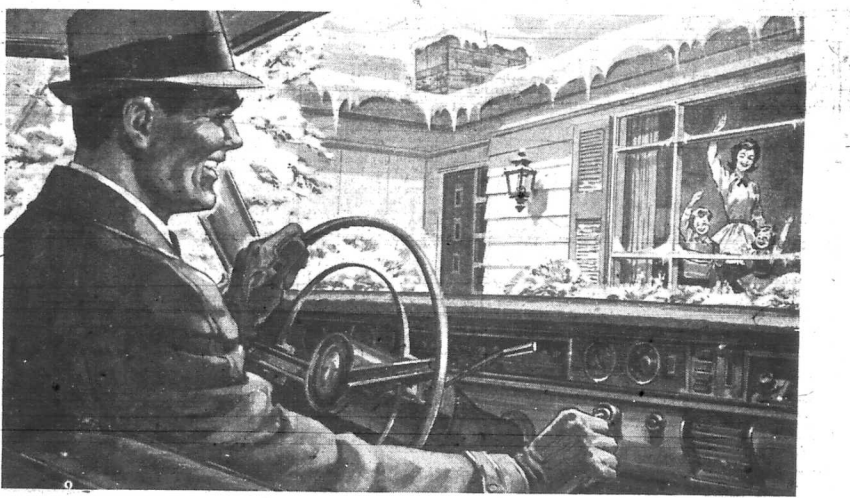

More Federal Aid Is Coming Into Kentucky — Breathitt

Gov. Edward G. Breathitt conferred for nearly two hours Friday with Secretary of Labor Wirtz and other officials and announced later Kentucky is getting more help.

Breathitt said the Farmers Home Administration is appropriating \$1 million to weatherproof their homes this winter.

In addition, representatives of the State Department of Education will meet soon with Labor Department officials here to work out an adult training program.

"It's primary goal will be to teach readings and writing," Breathitt said.

The governor also told the conference that his state budget, scheduled to be handed to the General Assembly on Feb. 10, will include something for an adult

training program. "It will be designed to help eliminate illiterates."

He discussed the probable need for a road bond issue in Kentucky and said he plans to ask the legislature to put such a proposal on the ballot next fall.

"I want to assure you that we are going to try to do everything we can," the governor continued. "When our budget is announced, you will feel that we've contributed our part and more."

Wirtz said he felt that "poverty and lack of education go hand in hand. I wish we could make education our number one industry."

At one point, Breathitt informed Ivan Nestingen, under-secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, that Kentucky will include in its budget an appropriation for aid

to children of unemployed parents. The state amount will be matched by federal funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

Breathitt did not disclose the amount he will seek for this purpose.

Bureau of Public Roads Administrator Frank Turner announced that the Appalachian Program calls for 2,150 miles of road construction in Kentucky and five other states.

Turner said it would go into effect as soon as it is approved by Congress.

After leaving the meeting, Breathitt called it a "fine, helpful one which gave us direction on how we could better prepare and present our state program to the federal government."

At this point, he continued, "the winter program for Kentucky exceeds \$20 million in federal funds."

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Breck Drops 4 Straight Cage Tilts

Breckinridge Training School absorbed four defeats during the past two weeks, dropping a 50-56 decision to Fairview, falling behind to Bath County, 73-60 and being to undefeated Camargo, 60-34.

Coach Paul Warinner's Eaglets played Fairview a relatively close first half, trailing by 29-23 at intermission. Then the roof fell in. Fairview tallied 30 points in the third quarter to Breck's eight, and took an overwhelming 69-33 lead, which they stretched to a final 96-36.

Spencer Mann led Breck scoring with 16 and Danny Cornett had eight.

Jenkins struck early, running up a 15-point margin in the first quarter and extending it in succeeding stanzas. Quarter scores were 23-8, 48-17, 63-27 and the final 96-36.

Mann again led the Eaglets, this time to 20 points. Cornett tossed in nine.

Dropping behind 17-3 in the first period, Breck managed to outscore Bath County during the remaining three quarters, but the cold first stanza sealed their fate. Quarter scores were 17-3, 32-21, 48-27 and the final 73-60.

Cornett topped all scorers with 30, while Norman Roberts chipped in with 15.

Camargo, rated ninth in the state, piled up lead of 14 points at the end of the first quarter and coasted from there.

Quarter scores were 18-4, 32-12, 53-24 and 60-28.

Cornett's 16 led the Eaglets. Roberts had 11.

Widows, Children Eligible For SS In Most Instances

More than 61,000 people in Kentucky are now receiving monthly Social Security benefits as survivors of deceased workers, according to the Social Security Administration district manager.

These beneficiaries include widows, children and dependent parents of deceased workers. Total of over four million dollars each month.

"The average American worker can count Social Security's survivor benefit protection as one of his most valuable economic assets," said Thompson. "It can mean as much as \$50.00 in benefits to his family in the event of his death."

Thompson said that with 91 million workers insured under Social Security, nine out of 10 young children and their mothers would qualify for monthly benefits if the family breadwinner died. The family benefits range from \$60 to \$254 monthly depending on the worker's average earnings under Social Security.

To illustrate the impact of survivor benefits, Thompson cited the benefits being paid to the surviving dependents of the men killed in the U.S.S. Thresher submarine disaster on Apr. 10, 1963. A total of 129 men lost their lives.

The Social Security Administration found that 86 of the men left survivors eligible for benefits. Monthly benefits are now being paid to 178 children and 69 widows.

Another 16 widows who do not have young children in their care will be eligible for monthly benefits at age 62. According to Thompson, the benefits payable to these survivors over the years are expected to exceed \$24 million.

"It's a good idea for every worker to find out what Social Security benefits would be payable in the event of his death," Thompson said. "Then he should be sure to tell his family to get in touch with the Social Security district office in the event of his death. We still find people who've lost out on benefits for months or even years because they didn't know benefits were payable."

Thompson said a booklet, "Your Social Security," is available free at the Social Security office. A copy of the booklet can be obtained by writing, phoning or visiting the office at 1816 Carter Avenue. The telephone number is 324-3165.

THE SOVIET NOTE
The Soviet Union delivered a long note to the United States and apparently every other country proposing the renunciation of force in all territorial disputes. The State Department said its information was that all countries, Communist and non-Communist, had received the Soviet proposal. The United States has traditionally been wary of all such proposals. Washington has maintained that it could not renounce the use of force in Europe as long as there existed a danger of aggression against West Berlin.

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Cigarette Makers Pinning Hope For Future On Filter-Types

The cigarette industry is pinning its hopes for the future on developing better filter cigarettes. This is an industry reaction to the U. S. P. Health Service report that cigarette smoking is harmful to health.

The 10-member panel that prepared the report made no specific findings on the value of smoking.

But Dr. Luther L. Terry, U. S. surgeon general under whose direction the report was prepared, said: "The development of better filters or more selective filters is a promising avenue for further development."

A cigarette industry spokesman said he didn't know of any new filters ready for immediate distribution but knows that "everybody in the industry is working on 10 kinds of filters."

"More likely than not there will be a number of new brands on the market by the end of the year, and the emphasis will be on charcoal activated filtration," he said.

Dr. Louis F. Fieser, professor of organic chemistry at Harvard University and a member of the surgeon general's committee, said he had suggested a charcoal filter cigarette.

He called the cigarette "a definite advance" but would not say that it is completely safe.

"A part of the problem," said Terry, "is whether the filter in addition to removing tar, nicotine or other elements of cigarette smoking might also lead to different and different amounts of radiation."

"Another difficulty is that we do not know all of the substances which different filters do or do not remove. Since we do not yet know all of the substances in tobacco smoke which have adverse health effects, a given filter might permit the selective passage of hazardous substances as well as selectively removing others."

Dr. James M. Hundley, assistant surgeon general, said when the report was issued that the committee had found "no evidence that will establish the fact that filters have had any effect in reducing the dangers."

Later, in an interview, he said it's also true that no evidence was found that they have not had such an effect.

Dr. Ernest L. Wynder, a pioneer in smoking research, held out hope that ultimate development of less harmful cigarettes is feasible.

He urged that the government, the tobacco industry and private researchers expand their studies with full speed to achieve that goal.

"Some elements of the tobacco industry have already made good progress in producing a safer cigarette," he said. He added that he thinks some of the filter cigarettes now available are relatively effective in reducing the hazard of lung cancer. He declined to name the brands.

Despite the recurrent health scares, cigarette sales have continued to rise. Mainly responsible was the consumer switch to filters.

"We believe in filter cigarettes and their future," said Morgan J. Warner, president of P. Lorillard Co., one of the big five cigarette manufacturers.

"What's more, the A. C. C. smoke" also believes in the point to which he buys enough filter-cigarettes to make them account for some 38 percent of all cigarette sales."

School Head Gets New 4 Year Pact

Rowan County School Superintendent Clifford Cassidy has been approved for another four-year term in that post, at an increase in salary.

Meeting Jan. 6, the Board of Education voted Cassidy a four-year contract, effective at the expiration of his present pact June 30, and hiked his pay from \$5,500 annually to \$7,400 a year. In addition, Cassidy receives \$500 a year as secretary to the Board of Education.

The superintendent will complete the second of two four-year contracts June 30. He became the administrative head of Rowan County Schools July 1, 1956, succeeding Mrs. Eunice Cecil, who has served two terms in the job.

A graduate of Morehead State College, Cassidy is a native of Martin County.

Members of the Board of Education are Ernest Blinn, chairman; Sam Litton Jr., vice chairman; Fred Calvert, Frank Haves and C. O. Cassill.

Cooperative Selling Hikes Price Brought By Beef Calves In State

Proof that cooperative selling of beef calves by Kentucky farmers can be seen in the figures that have been released which show that the Kentucky Feeder Calf Association sold 22,000 more calves in 1963 than they did in 1962 or a total of 58,368 calves in 32 sales in 1963. Total income from these sales was more than \$7 million, which represented a 45 percent increase in total dollars received in 1963 sales.

Calves who averaged \$22.64 hundredweight or \$120.15 a head. Average weight of calves was 531 pounds in 1963. Average price was \$2.88 a hundredweight less than that registered in 1962. However, in 1963 calves brought an average weight of only \$8 a head less than the 1962 because the 1963 calves had heavier average weights (about 27 pounds). This number represents quite a contrast between the 3,600 calves sold eight years ago and the 58,000 calves sold in 1963.

Intelligence of quality and quantity in getting high returns was brought out in the sales. By grading calves according to weight, quality, breed and sex and pooling like calves, the small producer received the same advantage as if he had a large volume of uniform calves. This is a key drawing card for good buyers. Highest prices were those paid for the larger size pens. It was noted that all districts were well attended by out-of-state and local buyers.

Burley Auctions Near The End With Price, Volume Above '63

Kentucky's burley auctions head into the home stretch ahead of last year's receipts and estimated volume. The State Department of Agriculture reported that a total of nearly \$282.5 million has been paid for Kentucky's burley tobacco through Friday. This compares with \$278 million for gross sales last year.

More than \$70 million pounds has been sold at an average price of \$60.02. Pre-season estimates put the crop at 461 million pounds. Resale of tobacco normally put sales at four to five percent above actual production.

The Federal-State Market News Service reported that volume slackened during the week as 19 of the 61 markets on the 8-state burley belt closed. Three Kentucky markets have plans to close in the next few weeks.

Gross sales for the past week on the belt totaled \$9,617,772 pounds and averaged \$37.44 a hundredweight. The average dropped \$1.76 under the previous week's and was the lowest of the season.

So far during the season, 686,124,541 pounds have passed over auction floors for an average of \$59.28 on the belt. For the comparable selling time last year 645,798,000 pounds averaged \$59.02.

Quality of offerings were lower during the week. Average price on Kentucky's

burley markets hit a season low Friday of \$57.91. Kentucky farmers were paid \$38,983,555 last week for 66,355,984 pounds of burley — an average of \$58.75 per hundred. The previous week, 59 million pounds were sold at an average of \$60.40 a hundred.

General Fund \$2.6 Million Estimates

State general fund revenue receipts for the first half of the current fiscal year were about \$2.6 million below the estimate for the period.

Revenue Commissioner James E. Luckett and Finance Commissioner L. Felix Joyner said, however, that more than \$2 million in income tax receipts, deposited in the first week in January, normally would have been handled in December.

General fund receipts totaled \$119,001,567 for the six-month period, about 1.6 percent higher than last year, but still lower than what the Revenue Department estimated.

Sales and use tax receipts, to totaling \$51,621,661, were slightly below the \$52 million estimate. But individual income taxes brought in \$21,578,626, well below the estimated \$24 million. Luckett and Joyner noted that income tax revenue still was about \$1 million low even if \$1.5 million figure is added to allow for a delay in processing. Income tax receipts were so low because of "record refunds and a larger carry-over in 1962 taxes into the current fiscal year," the commissioner said.

Record refunds, meantime, were slightly higher than the estimated \$45.8 million. The fund took in \$45,885,451.

Solon Raps FTC Label On Smokes

Rep. Harold D. Cooley, D-Ky., said Sunday the Federal Trade Commission has no legal authority to require that every package of cigarettes carry a warning that smoking is dangerous to health.

In a sharp rebuttal to proposals that would require the FTC to issue such a warning, Cooley said there is no conclusive evidence to support the contention that cigarette smoking is injurious to health. He called the FTC proposal "absurd and said, 'I think someone in the FTC must be emotionally disturbed.'"

Cooley, who comes from the nation's top tobacco-producing state and is chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, expressed his views to a newsman when asked about FTC proposals for danger warnings on cigarette packages. The FTC called a public hearing for Mar. 16 to consider prohibiting any cigarette advertising which claims smoking promotes "good health or physical well-being, that it is not a health hazard, or that one brand is less dangerous than another."

The agency's proposals are based on the recent federal report on smoking that linked cigarette with throat cancer and other afflictions. Cooley said he does not intend to appear at the FTC hearing and hoped to open hearings before his committee by mid-February on a resolution, as would the Tobacco Institute, all manufacturers of tobacco products and the general public. Cooley said the FTC's suggestion that cigarette advertising be required for cigarette packages then it might be equally possible for the FTC to require such labels on eggs and milk, which contribute to producing cholesterol which in turn is believed related to heart difficulties, or on whisky, which some people think is injurious to health.

"The FTC is supposed to protect people from false advertising," Cooley said. "I've never noticed any false advertising on cigarettes."

Smoking Report Is Believed No Cause For Panic — Butler

Wendell P. Butler, Kentucky's commissioner of agriculture, sees the U. S. Surgeon General's report on cigarette smoking as "no cause for panic, but a cause for concern" for Kentucky tobacco growers.

Citing the increase both in Kentucky burley prices and sales on the first day of marketing after the report was released, and the gains in tobacco issues on the stock market, Butler declared that "These are economic proofs to encourage those associated with our state's biggest cash crop."

Butler hopes the Federal Government "will move very carefully in regulations or legislation. We may have to make some adjustments — possibly changes in production and processing, for instance — but the surgeon general's report was based mostly on statistics already available."

"Most of the research in this country so far has been in private studies financed by the tobacco companies and by health agencies," he added. "I'd like to see more research done before any regulations are put into law."

"We have facilities right here in Kentucky for much study in the new Tobacco Research Center at the University of Kentucky," Butler declared.

Rosecoe Miller, London wholesale petroleum dealer, is the new chairman of the State Board of Education.

He was elected at the quarterly meeting here to serve until after the new fiscal year starts July 1.

An act of the 1962 State Legislature directed that the State board elect one of its own members as chairman, beginning with the first 1964 meeting.

Since 1954, the State superintendent of public instruction by law has been chairman. Dr. Harry M. Sparks, new State superintendent, presided until Miller's election.

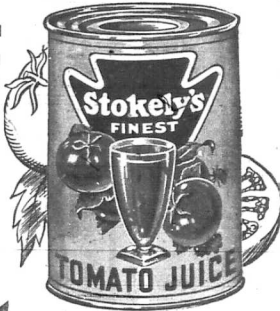

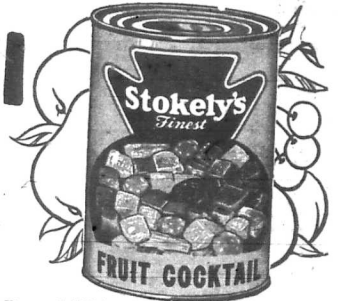

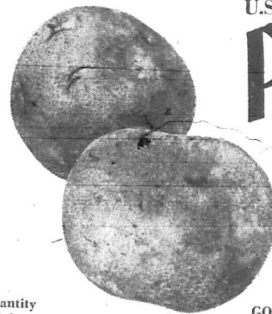
