### A BETRAYED WOMAN.

A Case Where Mob Law Would Be Sanctioned by the Highest Tribunal.

The following excerpt is from the Winchester Democrat, and shows the perfidy of man and the downfall of a trusting woman:

Saturday, on the noon train from Lexington came a young woman. In her arms she carried her little baby, born out of wedlock. Her name is Laura, daughter of Mrs. Henry Pence, who lives in Madison county, over the river from the ford, in this county. The poor woman was afraid to go home bearing her shame. Wrapping her child as best she could and placing a bottle of milk in its mouth, she placed it over the fence in the rear of a North Main street residence. She did not try to conceal her act. She then ran away. Parties who saw what she did took charge of the child and reported to the authorities. The police began in their efforts to find the woman. She went east to the city park and circled back to the Union depot, where she was arrested; then taken before Judge Pendleton. She did not try to conceal anything. It was a sad story—a woman betrayed. Almost crazed with grief, the poor woman pleaded that her child be returned to her, saying that she would work and support it. Her offense under the law is a felony.

She could not give bond, but the kind hearted Judge said: "Until the county provides a jail where a woman like this one can be protected from brute convicts, I will not send one there. Turning to the woman, he said: 'You are a good woman, but you are subject to whatever action the grand jury may take.' A purse was made up and a buggy procured. In it went the poor young woman, hugging her child, which she said was four weeks old. She was driven on the way to her mother's to the river at Ford.

I don't pretend to be good, but somehow or other, a case like this gets very close to me, and I am just mean enough to think that somebody, ought to be killed.

The Dead Comes to Life. James Simpson, supposed to have been dead, returned to Anderson, from Arkansas after two years absence and found his wife married to another man. The woman took the precaution to get a divorce but the husband instituted proceedings to recover the custody over the two children.

#### That Durn Dog Law Again.

A movement is on foot at Russellville to institute suit in the Logan Circuit Court, in which the constitutionality of the dog law will be assailed. Those opposed to the measure propose to push the case with vigor, as there is great objection to the law in that section.

#### A HEROIC ACT.

A. C. & O. Breakman Saves Life of Child by Forfeiting His Own.

Hugh Griggs, a C. & O. brakeman saved the life of a little child, Saturday and now lies in the hospital at Montgomery, W. Va., unconscious and near to death. His train was speeding down the main line of the road near Hansford, when, as it rounded the curve he saw a man and two children on a railway bicycle, and so close that escape seemed impossible. The man with one of the children in his arms, leaped from the machine, but the child on the other seat he could not handle, but for the plucky brakeman it would have been killed. Griggs who was in the cab of the engine, ran out upon the running board and climbed over the side. As the heavy engine grasped the child, but the bicycle was swept upon the pilot and against his head, fracturing the skull. The child, however, was saved.

Other great marble architectural piles like the District building, the new National Museum and the Agricultural Department Building are being rapidly pushed to completion. At no time in the history of Washington has there been so much money invested in public improvements nor are semi-public and private improvements lagging. The Bureau of American Republics and the George Washington University are embarking on magnificent architectural enterprises.

Rev. Eugene Snodgrass, well known throughout Kentucky as editor and minister, died at Lexington Tuesday night. He had been in Japan as a missionary for seven years, and falling ill, concluded to return to America to die. He had arrived here only Monday.

#### RAILROADS RETALIATING.

Better Conditions, Cheaper Rates and Adequate Equipment is Being Fought.

On account of freight congestion twenty States are passing reciprocal demurrage laws. Extraordinary powers are being given railroad commissions. Freight rates are being arbitrarily limited. Adequate depots and stations are being required. Twenty-eight States have enacted railroad legislation, or are considering such legislation with the sanguine expectation of its early passage. Reduced fare, generally to two cents a mile, is demanded by nineteen States. In return the railroads are ceasing all extension, cutting off passes, threatening to discontinue fast trains, abandoning excursion rates, increasing freight rates wherever possible, and preparing for a general fight in the courts. The fight may continue for some time. Sweeping reforms are not made in a day. It is the national spirit of fair play that created the very legislation about which the railroads are now concerned. This legislation is not the result of any radical tendency. It does not mean that a lot of local statesmen have gone off half cocked.

#### Won The Fight.

J. Will Clay, of Mt. Sterling, Democratic nominee for Representative, won his fight Thursday for indorsement of the November primary held in this county, at which he was nominated, and will go on the ticket.



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### ANNOUNCEMENT.

We are authorized to announce Hon. M. M. Redwine, of Elliott county, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Circuit Judge of the 32nd Judicial District of Kentucky at the primary to be held at each voting precinct Saturday, June 22, 1907, at 1 o'clock, p. m.

It costs Olive Hill \$150 a year rent for the use of a building in which to hold its half of the Circuit Court, and the building is not occupied over 30 days in one year. The rent is simply an extortion, as the accommodations are limited to say the least; and when Court convenes the city is compelled to stand the expense of renovating and fixing up the interior.

Grayson Tribune: "The Tribune has nothing bad to say about the Olive Hill Times this week. In its last editorial the Times admitted that the people of Grayson had a right to stand for their town, and actually stated that it had interviewed a Grayson man who was both reasonable and good looking."

I am sorry, but am compelled to state that the "good looking" gentleman referred to was not either of the Tribune editors. They are both reasonable, but well, "nuff sed."

A committee, consisting of the Town Board, appointed by itself, will go forth tomorrow, Thursday, to inspect and pass on a desirable site on which to locate the proposed Court House. I don't want to be a knocker, but it appears to me that the citizens as a whole should have a voice in the matter. It is the common people, not the Town Board, that is going to pay the bill. Better yet, let the man who comes up with the largest number of figures on his check have the privilege of selecting the site.

The lynching statistics for 1906 show an increase over 1905. The total for 1906, was seventy negroes and two whites, which shows the preference of "judge lynch" for negro subjects. The crimes charged against the persons lynched varied from the carrying of concealed weapons to quintuple murder and triple assault. One negro was lynched in Louisiana for stealing a calf, and another in the same State for

But there was one condemnation or investigation they overlooked, and that is the failure of the proper official or officials to make a statement of the financial condition of the county. It is the duty of that body to see that the officials of the county walk the straight and narrow path as well as we "hill bellies." If the county seat is not moved the old ark at Grayson must be repaired or a new one built, and at the expense of the county, and before this is done the tax-payers of Carter county want to know how they stand financially.

Left Olive Hill Mo. 5th 1907 got to Eldorado, Kansas, Mo. 8th will say I passed through some fine country between Olive Hill Ky. and Eldorado, Kansas. I am now located at a small town viz Cassody Kansas, a bout 15 miles to the nearest R. R. Station the town is only 7 months old and has a population of about 250 people the Orient R. R. is graded from Eldorado, Ks. (the county seat of Butler County where I am located) to Wichita, Ks. and will be in operation about July they are bringing the steel, ties and iron bridges for this line of R. R. last this is the finest country I ever saw take it all in all it is almost as level as a floor, black rich loam soil and produces fine quantities of Corn, wheat, Potatoes, Alfalfa Clover and in fact everything that has been planted and fruits of all kinds grow in abundance here Peaches here the Orchards are not properly taken care of they just Sow the seed and let the trees come and bear as they please and they have all dropped a heavy bloom this Spring and the apple trees are in full bloom Alfalfa Clover is about 12 inches high now and people are planting Corn and Sowing Oats. Kiefer Corn is a great Crop here makes fine feed here. here you can buy hay for \$2.50 per Ton I know that some of the Carter County and adjoining people would like to purchase some at this price, corn 40c per bushel, meal \$1.10 per hundred, people here are just as clever as they are in Ky. or any-where else plenty of work and the best wages, the land here is cheap yet but is expected to make a big raise any time owing to the many improvements and fast settling up the country. Two years ago there were not a house every three miles, here now we average a house to every quarter section and is fast settling, land that is selling now at \$20 and \$30 will in 12 months be selling at \$75 and \$100 per acre. I am well satisfied here, would not for quite a bit come back to Ky. to live, this country heads a big lot, I have been over Oklahoma, but none of it suits me like Butler county, Kansas. There is plenty of water here and plenty of rain and a good market for everything you raise. It would please me to see more Kentucky people here, especially the young man, lots of opportunities for honest upright young men. I am operating a job press here and will begin publishing a newspaper on Mar 9th, at \$1 per year, 6 months for 50c and will give you the news of this country. Yours respectfully,

## WILDCAT MINING CONTINUED

Methods Less Dangerous and More Profitable at Present  
MINES ARE WORTHLESS

Cheapest Form of Stock Gambling—If Property Should Prove Valuable Strike to Retain a Controlling Interest in their Corporations.

Immediately after the discovery of a new gold camp the mining stock syndicates get the bustled. For a few hundred dollars the shark can buy or locate in the vicinity of the new camp shreds and patches of ground that have no present or prospective value as mines. A mining corporation with an attractive name and a million or two of capitalization is formed. A few friends are called in and a set of officers and directors is selected. They at once negotiate a deal whereby all or nearly all of the stock is turned over to the owners of the claim in payment for it. Thus whatever stock of the company has been issued is owned by the promoters, while the company has the claims. If the latter cost \$1,000 and the stock issued, 2,000, of which cost money, is sold at an average of five cents the clean up is close to \$100,000.

All of this, however, is not velvet. There must be expensively fitted up offices, a corps of clerks and stenographers, advertising expenses and various little details to be covered, all of which cost money. The whole object of the campaign is to get rid of the stock quickly. A year is the usual limit.

There are many legitimate mining brokers but there are harpies in abundance also. It is difficult, save for little details to be covered, all through experience or previous careful inquiries, to distinguish the real mining broker from the sham. The latter is a close imitator. He, too, controls some brokerage or financial company, and he, too, advises his sole business as the handling of sound stocks of proved value. Oftentimes a group of these sharks will organize a half dozen companies. Each is thus able to guarantee to inquirers the solvency of the legitimacy of another, and by freely commending one another, help to swell the number of suckers.

Many of these mines are located in territory that has been prospected and found to be practically worthless. Any one can ride out, putting a notice saying that he has discovered the "Little Monarch," that he claims 150 by 150 feet in a northerly direction, that he claims sixty days in which to do the assessment work, and thirty days in which to do the work with the County Clerk.

Under, in a few hours he can stake out half a dozen claims, and within sixty days he can get a hole put in each one for \$25.

If he is impetuous he may go to a friend and tell him that if he will put up enough money for the forming of the corporation he will make him president and give him half of the promotion stock. Half of the capitalization will be given as pay for the promotion and the remainder is sold as the treasury stock.

As the head of the proposed mining company he makes a contract with the brokerage company, in which he is also interested, by which the latter gets 50 or 75 per cent. commission for selling the treasury stock. After the work ceases on the unpatented ground, the claim reverts to the Government and is open for relocation by the first comer after January 1 following. If it should happen that one of the claims located by these sharks shows indication of giving guarantee in any assessment work will be abandoned and the claim quietly relocated by the shark himself. Instances have been known also where small dividends have been declared and paid out of the money received for the sale of stock. This often proves a good investment for the promoter, since the receipt of a dividend is likely to cause a good demand.

Promoters always strive to retain for a time a controlling interest in their corporations. This is done through the retention of the promotion stock, usually half of the amount issued. If the project is developed and proves a paying one it is done upon the money furnished by the purchasers of the treasury stock, but the promoters get an equal dividend upon stock that cost them only the preliminary expense. If it proves a failure, the promoter, the man on the inside, has the chance to unload his stock before the public hears of the failing out.—Philadelphia Record.
