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MSU Eagle A Reality


The Morehead State University Eagle is a reality.

"We are thrilled by the vivid and striking portrayal of our eagle," said MSU President Adron Doran. "Gene Gray again has proven himself to be one of America's truly outstanding wildlife artists."

Gray, of Lexington, who considers himself "an illustrator of animals and a painter of life," traveled to Florida to observe the near-extinct bird in its natural habitat. His painting resulted from hundreds of photographs and sketches. He was commissioned last February — by the MSU Board of Regents.

Animal Graphics of Lexington is printing a limited edition of 2,000 copies of the Morehead State University Eagle which are being sold to students, faculty and friends of the university on a "first come, first served" basis. The original painting will hang on the Morehead State campus.

Each of the prints will be signed by Gray and President Doran. Signatures of other MSU personnel are available by request.



Financing of the project is being handled by the MSU Alumni Association and no state funds are involved. Proceeds above costs will be used for scholarships.

Delivery of the first prints will begin this month. Individual copies with a colorfully-illustrated cover jacket are \$25 with an additional \$2 mailing fee. Orders may be placed with the MSU Bureau of University Affairs.

Hallum Seeks Signal Caller

Morehead State University Head Football Coach Jake Hallum is prospecting for a first string quarterback and he hopes to hit paydirt before the 1970 season opens.

Although he has 31 lettermen returning from last year's squad (6-4 overall and 3-4 in the OVC), Hallum needs a sound, strong-armed quarterback and some line replacements if the Eagles are to be contenders in the stronger Ohio Valley Conference.

The defensive line was riddled by the loss of first team All-American tackle Dave Haverdick, now a Detroit Lion,

and All-OVC end Gary Listerman, plus two other veterans. The offensive wall is missing honorable mention All-American Darrel Sadowski and guard Earl McCormick.

The Eagles' running game also may be without two-time All-OVC tailback Louis Rogan. The senior standout has rushed for 1,800 yards and 15 touchdowns in less than two seasons but he has been suspended from the squad for disciplinary reasons. He missed spring practice and his future status is uncertain.

Hallum's quarterback quest is vital if he is to take advantage of the best group of receivers in the school's history. All-OVC split end John High snared 54 passes last season and wingback Dennis Crowley grabbed 31 more. Fullback John Coning, wide receivers Jeff Perkins and Mo Hollingsworth and tight end Gary Shirk also can handle the aeriels.

Campus Station Gets Big Boost In Power

Morehead State University recently received final approval of a project to make the campus radio station 5,000 times more powerful.

The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) granted \$64,000 to MSU for equipment needed to boost the output of WMKY Radio from 10 watts to 50,000 watts.

Also, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting announced that WMKY would receive a \$15,000 grant for the employment of additional personnel. The smaller grant will furnish salaries for a news and public affairs director and a traffic and promotion manager.

The \$79,000 in federal grants and \$26,000 in university funds will allow the five-year-old FM station to expand its coverage area from one county and 11,000 persons to 12 counties with a population exceeding 127,000.


Alma Rose McCauley, '66, became the bride of Bruce Mitchell on July 25. Alma is employed by the United States Courts in Lexington.

Lou Mains, a red shirt freshman, and Buck Donley, an injury-prone junior transfer, are the best of the five quarterbacks on hand. Mains was the star of the spring game but he is short on experience.

The secondary should be the pride of the Eagle defense with seniors Ron Gathright, an All-America candidate, and Larry Baldrige, considered the best free safety in Eagle history, leading the way. Gathright broke the school record for pass interceptions last year.

Offensive tackle Ed Mignery, All-OVC in 1968, center Steve Ward, guard Buddy Harrison and running back Bill Cason are seen as sparkplugs in the rebuilt attack. Tackle Mark Sheehan, middle guard Jerome Howard, ends Clint Walker and Jim Edwards and linebackers Harry (Sugar Bear) Lyles and Ron Little will be defensive mainstays.

"Some of our reserves and a few of these new kids will have to come through for us," Hallum said after spring practice. "We still have big holes to fill and the job won't be easy."

Reed, McDowell Renamed To Board of Regents

B. F. Reed of Drift and Cloyd McDowell of Harlan have been reappointed to the MSU Board of Regents by Gov. Louie B. Nunn.

Reed, treasurer of the Turner Elkhorn Mining Co., is the first MSU board member to be so honored by five governors.

The highly respected mining executive was first named in 1953 by Gov. Lawrence Wetherby for a one-year period to fill the unexpired term of E. R. Price. He was reappointed by Gov. Albert B. Chandler in 1958 and has served continuously since then. Gov. Bert T. Combs reappointed him in 1962 and Gov. Edward T. Breathitt did the same in 1966.

McDowell, who is president of the Harlan Coal Operators' Association, will be serving his second consecutive term on the board.

An alumnus of Morehead State, he received the bachelor of arts degree in 1935 with work in economics, sociology, history and government.

Duncan Elected To Fraternity Post


Dr. J. E. Duncan, dean of the School of Humanities and professor of music, was recently elected first vice president of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, professional music fraternity.

He was chosen for a three-year term during the group's national convention in Interlochen, Mich. Traditionally, the first vice president is elevated to the presidency after one term.

Dr. Duncan, who had been chairman of the fraternity's national council of province governors, also was elected president of the Sinfonia Foundation, Phi Mu Alpha's educational funding arm.

A member of the fraternity since 1942, Dr. Duncan has been active in its national operations for six years. Phi Mu Alpha has more than 300 chapters in the U.S., including one at Morehead State.

Succeeding Dr. Duncan as governor of the fraternity's Kentucky-West Virginia Province is Dr. Glenn Fulbright, head of the MSU Department of Music.



Technical Institute To Cost \$3 Million

Morehead State University has announced plans to construct a \$3 million building to house its Appalachian Technical Institute, hailed as a "significant breakthrough" in technical education.

The five-story classroom and office structure will house a technical education program ranging from college graduate work to high school teaching.

"This new facility will be the only one of its kind in Kentucky and among just a few in the country," said MSU President Adron Doran. "It is a significant breakthrough and will enable our institution to better serve the career needs of Eastern Kentucky and Appalachia."

Financed through an \$800,000 federal grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission and university revenue bonds, the building is expected to be completed in early 1973. Construction will start late this year and require about two years.

Dr. Doran said the institute, to be operated by the university's School of

Applied Sciences and Technology, will enable MSU to expand technical course and program offerings on the graduate, four-year and two-year levels.

A cooperative agreement with the Kentucky Department of Education will provide laboratory teaching experiences at the nearby Rowan County Vocational Extension Center, a satellite of the Ashland Area Vocational-Technical School.

"Not only will Morehead State University be able to improve the quality of technical education in this region but we also will be in a position to prepare more industrial technicians through our associate degree (two-year) programs," Dr. Doran added.

The reinforced concrete structure will connect to the existing Industrial Arts-Home Economics Building via an overhead, enclosed bridge. Encompassing more than 109,000 square feet of floor space, the new building will have two floors of parking and three floors of classrooms and offices.

Dr. Harry Mayhew, Director of Alumni Affairs, is currently serving as president of the council, which is comprised of alumni officials and administrators of Kentucky's eight state-supported universities and colleges.

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Harrell Optimistic About Cage Season

Morehead State University Head Basketball Coach Bill D. Harrell is optimistic but does not expect any miracles from his 1970-71 team.

Recently, while unveiling his 1970-71 varsity and freshmen for interviews and photographs, Harrell said the play of All-OVC forward Jim Day would be "vital" to his plans.

Day, a 6-8 senior from Ashland, was praised by his coach as a "dedicated, talented basketball player." Harrell said his leading scorer and rebounder from last season would be stronger defensively.

The Eagle head coach said sophomores Royce Woolever, Alonzo Cole, Bubba Abell, Vic Wharton and Ike Unseld would be counted on heavily to assist returning lettermen Day, senior center Jerry Hueseman and junior guards Jerry King and Eddie Conley.

On Monday, Nov. 23, the varsity and freshman squads tangled in a benefit game and proceeds were donated to Marshall University.
